### Farm Bill Expected ASCS Chief Reports

bill has been passed by both the House and Senate, and signed by the President. Mr. Lawson says that the new program covers wheat, cotton, feed grains, wool and mohair for a period of three years. It does not cover peanuts or

the ACP program. The present peanut program is still effective and expires at the end of the 1971 program year. There is still no final determination as to whether or not there will be an ACP for 1971. It is not expected that we will have detailed information on the new farm program until around the 15th of December. 1971 Allotment notices for the 1971 peanut crop will be mailed to producers by Dec. 4, 1970. The National allotment of 1,610,000 acres-the

same as for 1970 has been announced by the USDA. In general, peanut growers who grew their full allotment of 1971. The authorization that permitted the sale and lease of peanut acreage in 1970 has expired. It is our understanding that a bill to permit the sale and lease of peanut acreage is being considered but has not passed either the House or Senate. If such a Bill is not passed it will not have sale and lease of peanut acreage for 1971.

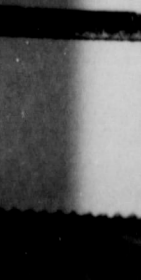
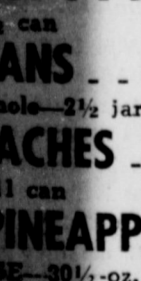
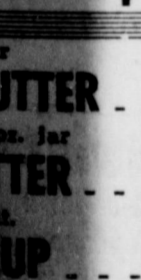
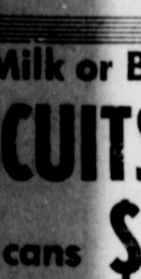
**YOUR 1970 PEANUT MARKETING CARD SHOULD BE RETURNED WHEN YOU ARE FINISHED MARKETING.**  
During the last half of Nov. some 40,000 ranchers and farmers received a livestock questionnaire from Cary Palmer of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Accurate estimates are of great importance to producers for providing a true picture of Texas Agriculture. Each one receiving a questionnaire is urged to fill out carefully and return prompt-

ly to the Agricultural Statistician in Austin. Producers of wool, unshorn lambs, and mohair who have not already filed applications for incentive payment, should do so as soon as they have completed all marketings. The final date for filing applications for the 1970 marketing year is Jan. 31, 1971. Be sure to bring the original sales document to support the application for payment. It is possible that cotton payments for 1971 will be based in part on the actual yields

for 1970. Your 1970 actual production evidence may be required. Producers having an interest in cotton farms should make sure the cotton being carried to market this year is properly identified as to producer and farm number.

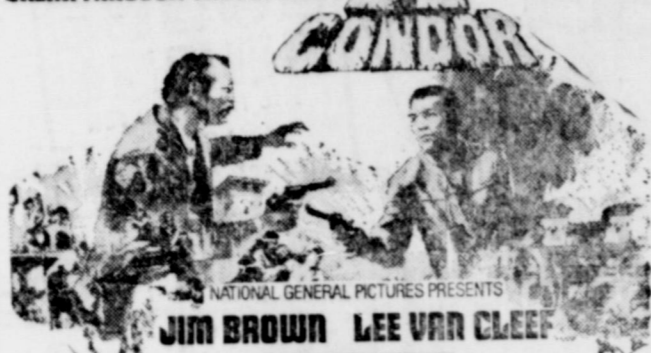

many larger towns. This is mainly due to wonderful help from customers by: mailing early in the day, using zip code, mailing early in the season, customer sorting and bundling local and out of town mail, and priority handling of town mail.

Each employee in Eastland is dedicated to giving their customers the very best service possible. Their personal goal is to improve, he said.

## Erosion Controlled, Production Improved by Conservation Plan

J. R. Files, 2 miles West of Gorman has controlled erosion and is getting good production from critical areas. Files prepared his conservation plan early in 1967. He signed a Great Plains Contract to establish his plan on a cost-share basis. Six acres of critical areas were shaped in 1968. These areas were gullies from 3 to 8 feet deep sur-

rounded by a dense cover of mesquite trees. After the mesquites were removed, the gullies were filled, seed-bed prepared, their coastal bermuda was sprigged, and fertilized along with a 23 acre pasture. Files applied 110-60-30 lbs of plant food in 1970 at a cost of \$17.50 per acre. This area was grazed for 90 days with 35 animal units. Then he reserved the Fall growth for

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Files dozed oak on 17 acres and seeded the disturbed areas. Twenty-nine acres of mesquite was controlled by root plowing and seeded to native grasses during the 1st year of the contract. He also built new outside fences and 4,250 feet of cross fencing for management of his grassland. All cropland is being rotated between small grain and forage sorghums, to supplement the pasture grazing.

"This program has greatly helped my native grassland" says Files. Files' success was based on a plan before he started his work.

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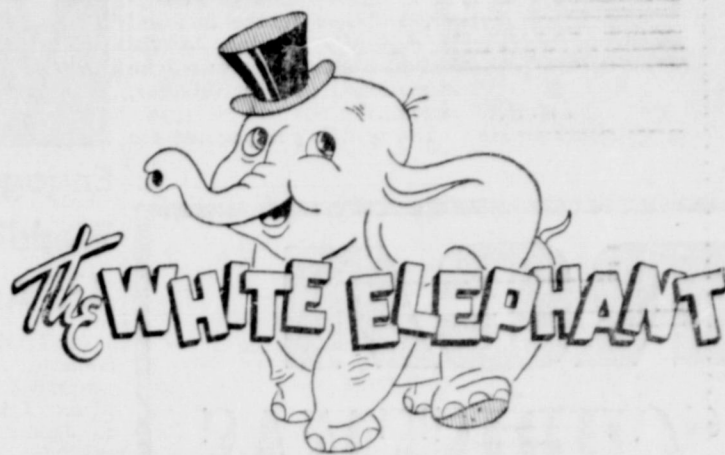
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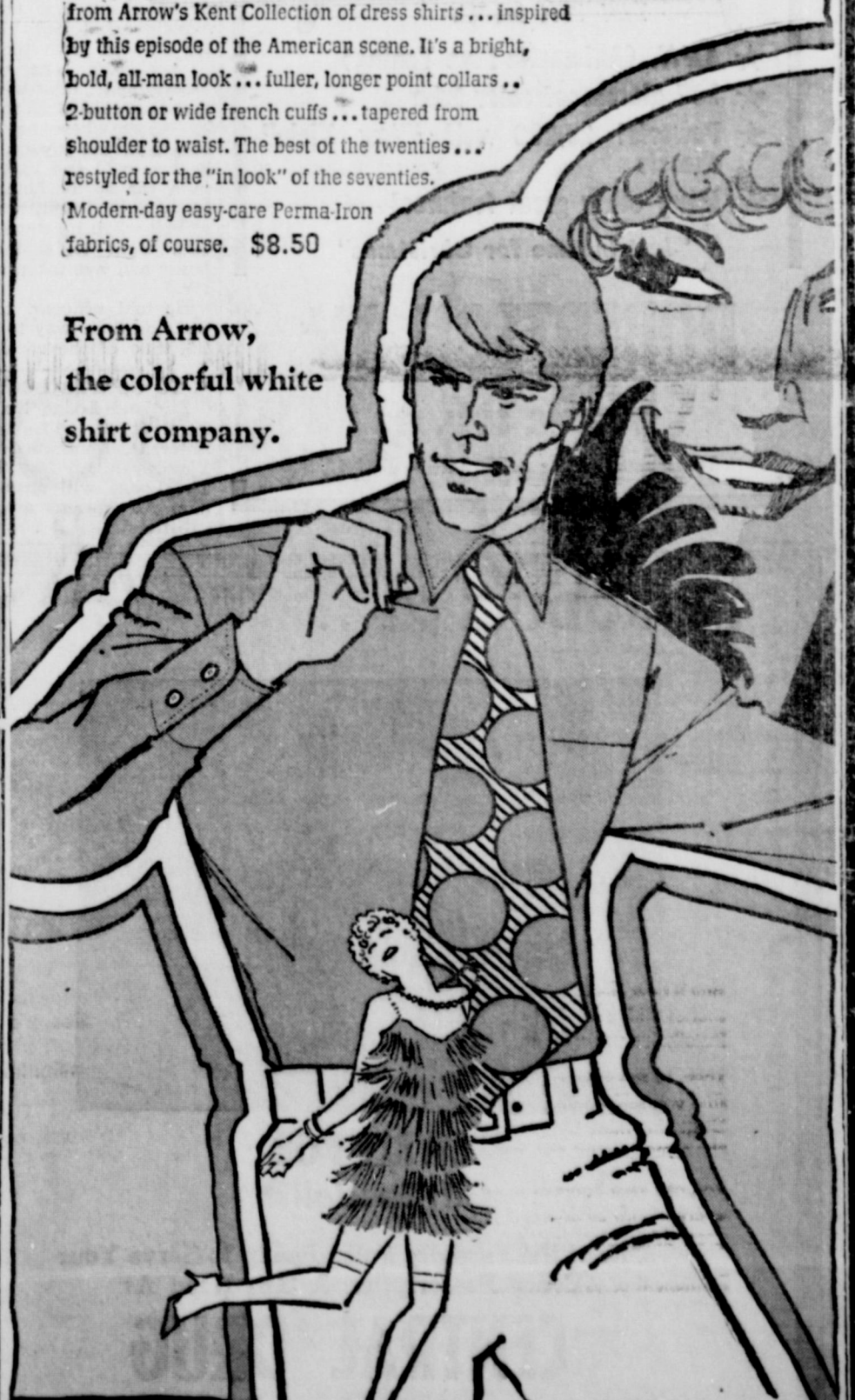


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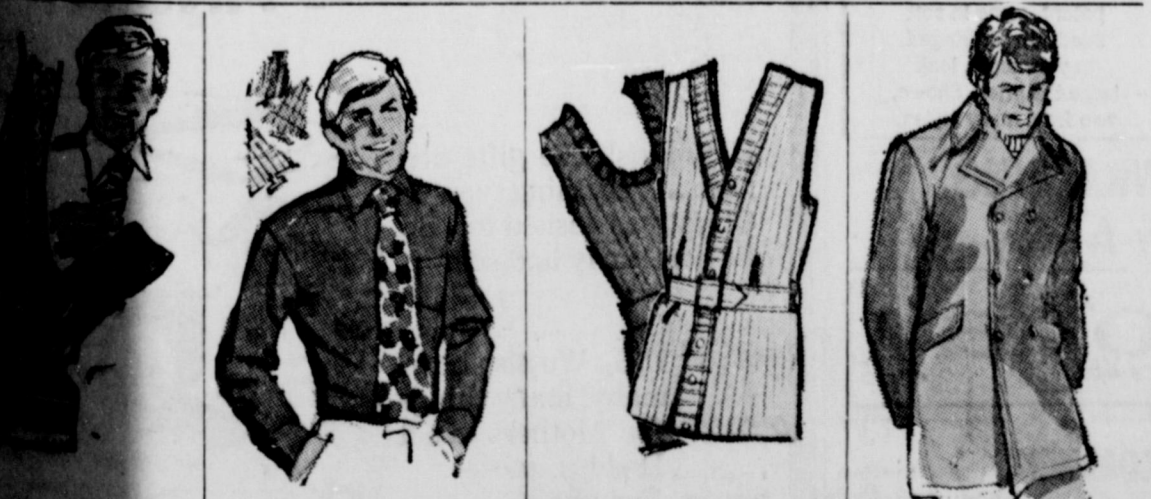
