MR. D. E. FRAZER retires after 34 years

State Officials Join Locals In Saluting Mr. Frazer Here

... Mr. D. E. Frazer, a man whose work has affected the lives of thousands of Eastland County and area people during the past 27 years, is retiring Friday and was honored with a special reception Wednesday at the Courthouse in Eastland.

... Hundreds of associates, friends and State Welfare Dept. officials attended the ceremony, thanking Mr. Frazer for his years of faithful service, and wishing him well in retirement.

... Approximately 250 persons attended. A native of Franklin, Tex., Mr. Frazer was employed as an investigator with the old Texas Age Assistance Commission on Dec. 28, 1936 in Grimes County.

... He was promoted to Assistant Area Supervisor on Oct. 6, 1941 in Greenville, serving Hunt and Collin Counties. He was transferred to Nacogdoches as Assistant Area Supervisor in November of 1942.

... With a promotion to Area Supervisor, he was transferred to Eastland in March of 1943, and then elevated to Field Representative in July of 1944, with headquarters in Eastland. Two titles changes: one to Regional Director in April, 1961, and another to Program Director in September of 1969, and Mr. Frazer retires from that position.

... A tall, handsome man, Mr. Frazer's work perhaps has affected more people, through local administration of State Welfare programs, and yet, it is a mark of his office, that while he is warm and well-liked by the circle of associates and friends who know him, he is not as well known throughout the area, as perhaps some other long-time public office holdtirs.

... The retirement program was held in the District Court Room (close by where his office has been for years, and a reception was held in County Court Room.

... His wife, Ruby Lee, is a Second-Grade Teacher in the Eastland Elementary School. They have two daughters, Mrs. R. D. (Shirley) Thompson of San Antonio, and Mrs. Amedee (Alice) Feund of Fort Worth.

... Mr. Frazer looks forward to retirement with a view to gardening and traveling with his wife, undoubtedly part of which will include visits with grandchildren, Daryl Jay, 16, and Stephen, 11, in San Antonio, and with Alison Leigh, three months, in Fort Worth.

DA Blames Movies, Permissiveness For Crime Influx; Says Change Due

... The constant barrage of violence by all media, particularly the movies, and permissiveness are cited as the two main reasons for the prevalence of so much crime right here at home, District Attorney Emory Walton said this week.

... Speaking for members of the Lions Club at their Tuesday luncheon meeting at the White Elephant Restaurant, DA Walton spoke on "Your Being Involved in Crime" and proceeded to show that all are involved, simply because it's all around us.

... "The purpose of criminal laws are to protect us, our property and our society," he said. Citing examples, he said that about a month ago that of 40 cases called in county court, 30 were liquor law violations. "If you drink at home, that's your business," he warned, "but if you're going to drink while driving or provide liquor for a minor, then it becomes my business."

... Ten of 25 indictments returned by the past grand jury were for marijuana violations," he said. "So we've got a dope problem right here now." Why do children resort to dope?

... Pointing the two recent bank robberies, in Rising Star and in Gorman, he called the Gorman job, highly professional, and said that the FBI agents think they know who pulled it. "The robbers had really cased that bank, but in spite of their preparation, they missed the big money."

... Another area in which crime is rampant here, is the bilking of this county's elderly, out of life savings. The confidence men prey on the old. "Last year an Eastland woman lost \$7,000."

... Labeling violent movies as being prime motivators, he said the movie "Bonnie and Clyde" undoubtedly affected more young people (by glamorizing criminals), and that he had personal knowledge of two incidents in which young people patterned their lives and actions after the infamous pair. He cited Harvey Dale Webb, Eastland County rapist, jail breaker and bank robber in another county as being a prime example of one who tried the "Clyde route."

... He wouldn't let us call him by his right name. He wanted to be called Clyde. Of permissiveness, Walton said, "We're seeing a tendency to be too forgiving. Very often we see prosecution stopped when restitution is made. "So many people just don't want to get involved—when actually, they're already involved."

... Good citizens have the most to gain from less crime because they have the most at stake, he said. What can we do? Testify when called on and serve on juries.

... Of jury duty, he was most complimentary of the percentage of people in this county, who are willing to serve. In an almost unheard example, he told of a recent DWI case in which not a single one of some 30 jury prospects asked

Few Peanut Farmers Will Get Questionnaires

Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, John C. White, announces that a few peanut farmers will receive a questionnaire in the mail asking for information about peanut yields, rates of planting, insecticides used, and other items. Commissioner White explains that this information will be used as a part of a research project to help farmers grow better crops. The questionnaire should be filled out by the farmer giving the information requested and returned to the Texas Department of Agriculture Laboratory, 301 West Navarro, De Leon, Texas 76444. After all the questionnaires are in, the information will be summarized and will be published in the form of a survey. Commissioner White added that no individual farms or names will be used. Those farmers who have already received the questionnaire and have harvested their crops should complete and return the questionnaire as soon as possible. Where harvest has not been completed, the questionnaire should be filled out and returned as soon as peanuts are harvested.

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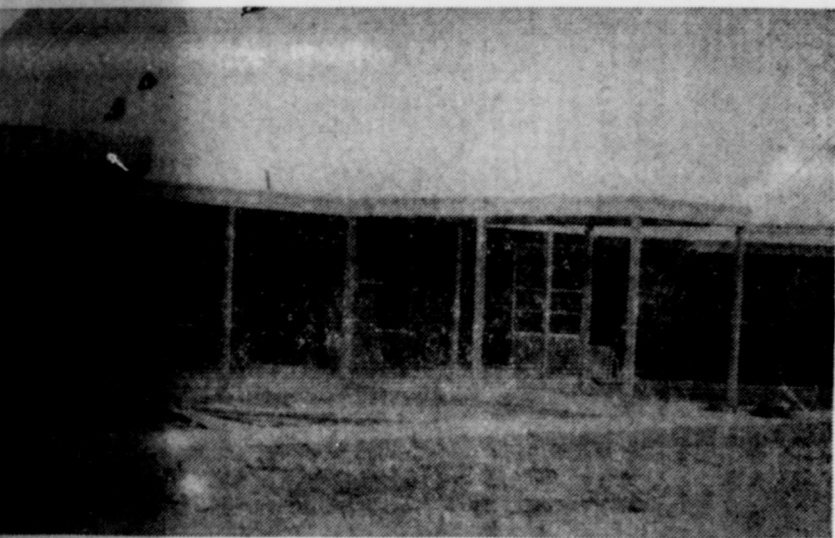

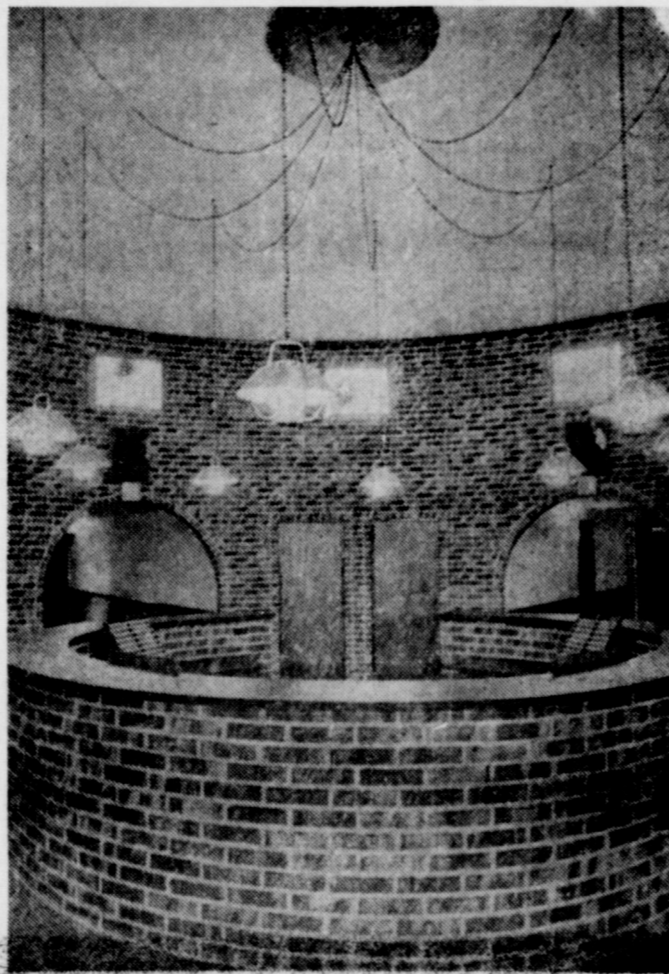

State Board of Insurance Recommends New Rates

Austin, Tex.—Car owners in Texas got the expected bad news when the staff of the State Board of Insurance recommended a 23.4 per cent average increase in auto insurance rates.

Board took no immediate action, but will set new rates by January 1.

If the agency holds to its past policy of allowing no increase in any line of coverage greater than 25 per cent, the staff proposal may be scaled down to an affective 18.6 per cent boost.

Earlier the regulatory body committed itself to a new rate-making formula taking into account investment income of companies and guaranteeing profit on underwriting after taxes.

Staff recommendation would build into the rate base a 4.7 per cent profit on policy writing and an 8.7 per cent allowance for state and federal taxes.

Industry representatives still not satisfied, argued their case for a 27.7 per cent average statewide increase and removal of the arbitrary maximum change limitation of 25 per cent for any line. They claimed serious underwriting losses of \$45.7 million over the last decade.

Proponents brought angry rumbles from legislators. Sen. Oscar Maury of Dallas predicted that lawmakers "will not allow this economic mismanagement of justice to stand unchallenged." Rep. Joe Allen of Raytown also called the proposed rate increases "frankly a case of government regulation and free enterprise system."

Texas AFL-CIO has called on drivers to appeal to the Legislature for a change in the rate system, and reportedly is studying possible legal action.

WELFARE CHANGES URGED—A raise in welfare benefits, removal of the constitutional ceiling on payments reorganization of the Department of Public Welfare and a new approach to problems of needy families with dependent children were recommended by the blue-ribbon Senate Welfare Study Committee.

Committee said the state must aim at development of children rather than simply maintaining them on aid rolls to break the poverty cycle.

These additional recommendations were included in the 85-page report.

A constitutional amendment to permit garnishment of wages for court-ordered child support.

A vendor drug program to supply medicines to Medicaid outpatients.

Renaming the Welfare Department of Human Resources and reorganizing it with a head named by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate.

Complete overhaul or streamlining of department administration with increased use of computer methods.

Committee Chairman William P. Hobby Jr. said that the Legislature next January will have to pass an emergency appropriation of more than \$40 million just to carry the welfare program at present levels to the end of the biennium. AG OPINIONS—County jury wheels must be re-filled from tax renditions, as well as voter registration lists, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

* Penal code provision requiring a \$25 license fee for fish farm operators who grow fish for sale is constitutional.

* Estate of a deceased state employee should be paid for the same number of days to

which he would have been entitled had he lived and claimed his vacation and sick leave, beginning the day following his death.

Martin has been asked to rule on the legality of a verbal contract for the first phase of construction on Mustang Island fish pass.

APPOINTMENTS — Gov. Preston Smith named his former executive assistant, Harold K. Duddy chairman of the Texas Employment Commission, succeeding Mrs. Nancy Sayers, TEC's first woman chairman.

Smith also appointed Charles Weldon Kirk of Sweetwater as district judge of the 32nd district, effective January 1.

He picked Frank Ginzel of Colorado City, county attorney for Mitchell County, to replace Kirk as 32nd district attorney.

Bill Doggett of Brownwood was confirmed as deputy commissioner for mental health of the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation.

Dr. Bill R. Walker of San Angelo was appointed superintendent of the Austin State School replacing Larry W. Talkington.

J. W. (Bill) Irwin, Denton State School business manager since 1960, will succeed Walker at San Angelo.

Dr. Arch M. Connolly of Austin was appointed superintendent of Wichita Falls State Hospital, replacing Dr. Bernard A. Rappaport who accepted a teaching job at the University of Illinois Medical School.

Walker and Irwin's appointments are effective December 16, Connolly's February 1.

ISLAND CONTROVERSY RAGES—Governor Smith urged the Texas Conservation Foundation to call a special session and review the facts surrounding the controversy over purchase of Mustang Island park land.

Parks and Wildlife Commission Chairman Pearce Johnson has refused to sign an application for federal aid to buy 3,900 acres from Mrs. Sam E. Wilson Jr. of Corpus Christi, claiming other areas have higher priority for the state's limited park bonds. Two other members of the Commission disagree and want to buy the Wilson property now.

Conservation groups have called for Johnson's removal as liaison officer to break the impasse.

TRAFFIC SAFETY PROMOTED—Legislative measures to get more problem drivers, especially drunks, off Texas highways were urged at the second annual Governor's Traffic Safety Conference.

Col. Wilson Speir, Department of Public Safety director, said the 12-month minimum suspension law for drunk driving now opens the door to an excessive number of prohibited sentences. He suggested a 60-to-90-day mandatory suspension without probation.

DPS head also proposed statutory fixing of .10 per cent blood alcohol level as the presumption test of intoxication, broadened support for driver education, prescribed safety equipment for motorcycles

RETURNS CERTIFIED — Official canvass of returns of the general election showed Democrat Lloyd Bentsen beat Republican George Bush for U.S. Senate by 155,334 votes and Governor Smith defeated GOP Paul Eggers by 158,675 votes. Total turnout exceeded 2.3 million.

There was one upset in the canvass. A constitutional amendment allowing the Governor to appoint a three-member State Building Commission, believed to have passed, actually was defeated by 6,337 votes.

SHORT SNORTS

Traffic deaths on interstate highways, down early in the year, took a big jump in recent weeks—seven per cent above 1969—according to the Department of Public Safety.

Texas Hospital Association applauded the U. S. Senate finance committee amendment authorizing waiver of the requirement that Medicare hospitals have a registered nurse on duty 24 hours a day.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes said the state tax bill next year may be the highest in Texas history, but he will make an all-out effort to get the Legislature through with its job in 140 days.

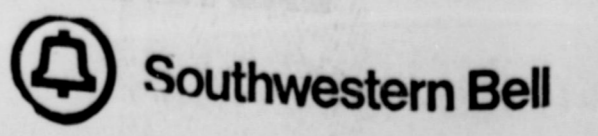

Incendiarism Seen In Plague Of Grass Fires

Cisco police were on the lookout during the week-end for two youths in a brown and white old model car who were reportedly seen setting one of six grass fires which kept Cisco firemen on the jump late Thursday and early Friday.

A Cisco resident told fire department officials that he saw the youths set one fire and gave chase but that they eluded him in the direction of the Breckenridge Highway north of town.

The Cisco blazes, all of them believed incendiary in origin, were an aftermath of fires which swept over thousands of tinder dry farm and ranch pastures midway between Cisco and Eastland Wednesday afternoon and night.

Even fire fighting units from Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, and Carbon fought the rural flames, fanned by high south wind, until they were finally subdued near midnight against the right-of-way of Highway 183 north of town.

The fire started along the north service road of IH-20, burned over 200 acres of the W. B. Wright ranch and other grassland, jumped Highway 80 at a curve, destroyed a residence and then swept northward in a path of destruction one to two miles wide for a distance of six to eight miles until it was finally brought to bay against the Breckenridge highway and Highway 6.

Four fire units from Cisco, three each from Eastland and Ranger and one from Carbon fought the blaze for 11 hours, shuttling tanks of water to be sprayed on the flames.

The fires cost ranches affected many thousands of dollars in pasture loss and feed that must be purchased to sustain their herds until a new crop of grass can be grown. The residence destroyed and numerous outbuildings and small barns which were burned represent a further economic loss, officials said. There was no estimate of the total loss.
