



Mavericks, Haskell Indians to 'Play It Off' In Local Stadium Friday With 8 p.m. Kickoff

Season-Opener to Pit Potent Pair in Re-Play

Some things have changed: It'll be a different field and the temperature will be higher. Some features are unchanged: Two of the highest-rated teams in School Boy AA action will be putting on a Season-Opener that stands to be the Spirit-Charged Game of the Week in anybody's book. Eastland's Magic Mavericks will be clashing with the Haskell Indians Friday night at

Maverick Stadium to what is expected to be a capacity crowd. Ironies abound: It was in November, last year, in what proved to be the final game of a perfect season for the Mavericks, that the Indians, on a neutral - Breckenridge field, earned the right — on penetrations — to be the representative to the Regional playoff. Coach Shirley Frazier's big

Mavericks had a perfect 10-0 record, sweeping their District

8-AA, to face the potent Indians from 7-AA.

Scheduling these two teams to open a grid season is a press-agent's dream. They battled to a 0-0 draw in Breckenridge and proved equal on most counts.

Maverick fans naturally are looking for an unbalancing act, hoping for the Mavericks a big victory to start them on the long grind to another district championship.

But it's to be a battle for the Mavericks come Friday night. They met the Indians last season at the peak of their game — after ten big wins in a row.

Both teams have lost through graduation — but Haskell probably lost less. They lost their top-notch All-State Quarterback and some fine offensive linemen. Eastland lost two All-State Linebackers and some All-District and All Area offensive men.

The Indians will be bringing, among others, the All-State Super Duper Halfback Charlie Franklin: "The greatest running back I have seen in 10 years," says Coach C.T. Everett.

Franklin (1,814 yards rushing — 10.5 per carry avg.) the team has Guard Clifford Campbell (6-2, 210), who is also all-star timber and the hub of a fine line which includes Center Gary Mayfield, Guards Jack Smith, Wayne Reeves and Gary Glack and Tackles Wayne Davis and Steve Guess. QB Keith Everett and HB Jackie Young and Joe Fincher lend additional backfield quality.

The Mavericks have some fine material back with six veteran offensive men and 8 defensive holdovers.

Haskell has scrimmaged twice — Iowa Park blanked them 6-0 and they out-played Colorado City, 3-1.

Eastland has also scrimmaged twice — Rotan, 1-1; and out-played Stephenville, 2-1. Eastland shows a lot of improvement since the Rotan practice, the local coaching staff reports.

Eastland and Haskell are evenly matched in many respects, just as they were last year, and the coaches say that the team that makes the fewer mistakes will win and start its season on a high note.

The lucky are those holding season tickets to Maverick Stadium. The Wise non-holders will be there early Friday night for seats.

Darco Throws In Sponge as Money Fails

Construction on the 9.5 mile section of U. S. Highway 163 from Cisco to Romney was halted this week for a reletting of contract following the voluntary default of the Darco Construction Company, College Station, Texas, original contractor to its bondsman, the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, a Mayland based concern, it was announced by R. P. Haun, Jr., county resident engineer of the Texas Highway Department.

Haun said that there would be an industry day of a week to a month, while the bonding company which retains responsibility for the construction under the original contract, determines which of three available routes it will choose in carrying out the terms of the defaulted contract.

It can either:

Hire a new contractor outright to complete the job;

Ask for bids on its own responsibility, or

Ask the Texas Highway Department to offer the remainder of the construction for bids on a contract.

Meanwhile the highway department was doing a complete re-engineering job on the highway to determine what part of the job has been completed and what remains to be done so that a new contract can be negotiated.
