Eastland JV Beats Ranger 20-14 in Cold

A touchdown plung from the one-yard line spelled the difference in a Junior Varsity grid game in a cold Ranger Stadium Thursday night. The touchdown by Eastland JV QB Tony Thomas and the two extra points he ran over gave Eastland a 20-14 win over the Ranger JV. It was Ranger 14-12 through the third quarter and the Eastland scoring capped it off. Ranger's David Graham ran 11 yards to score the first touchdown and run for extras failed, in the first period. In the second stanza Thomas ran 34 yards for the first Eastland score. Extra points try failed. Thomas repeated from 15 yards in the third, but Ranger's Graham also got himself a touchdown and a pass was good for the two extra points, good for a Ranger lead. And that's the way it was until the fourth quarter.

Peanut Growers Urged to Attend Stephenville Demonstration Oct. 15

STEPHENVILLE (SpI) — More net profit for Texas peanut growers is the joint aim of two related educational programs here on October 15.

Scheduled in the morning is the firsthand inspection of results at an ambitious project on the Jimmy Grissom Farm, where 48 chemicals (each applied in three different amounts per acre) are being demonstrated in the control of peanut diseases.

Scheduled in the afternoon is the annual field day of the Texas A&M University-Tarleton Experiment Station, where the emphasis of research is centered on the control of peanut insects, the selection of quality seed, the use of herbicides, and the breeding for new varieties.

County Agent Gordon emphasized the importance of these meetings for Eastland County growers.

"We realize that our farmers are awfully busy with their own harvest right now, but we hope as many as can will go to Stephenville to learn as much as they can about the peanut industry, and thereby increase their own profits."

The Eastland County crop is seen as less than record-breaking this year, he said, but still, we should see a pretty good yield. There are several areas which are going to be far below what we've been seeing on the past three or four years, but generally, it's going to be a pretty good crop, he said.

Lack of rain, particularly in the Gorman area, has cut down considerably on the yields, he said, and the irrigated crops aren't as good as they could have been because it was just so dry that the irrigation systems just weren't able to put out enough water.

Of course, he said, we've been measuring our crops of late by the records we've seen since the introduction or irrigation the past few years, and we're just not going to be up that level this year.

The Grissom demonstration is the work of Erath County Agricultural Agent Richard B. Gary and Dr. C. Wendell Horne, plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M University.

Hosts at the Experiment station will be Shelby Newman, superintendent; Dr. C. E. Simpson, peanut plant breeder and Tom E. Denman, horticulturist.

The Extension Service tour of the Grissom farm will depart the Experiment Station at 10 a.m. and return in time for a catered noon meal.

Tours of research plots at the Station will be from 1 until 4, and a question-answer session, from 4 until 5. Educational booths and equipment displays will be concentrated at the headquarters.

Gordon urges all Eastland County peanut producers to attend it at all possible. He says it will be a day profitably spent.

With their enthusiasm the women have met a good response from the public.

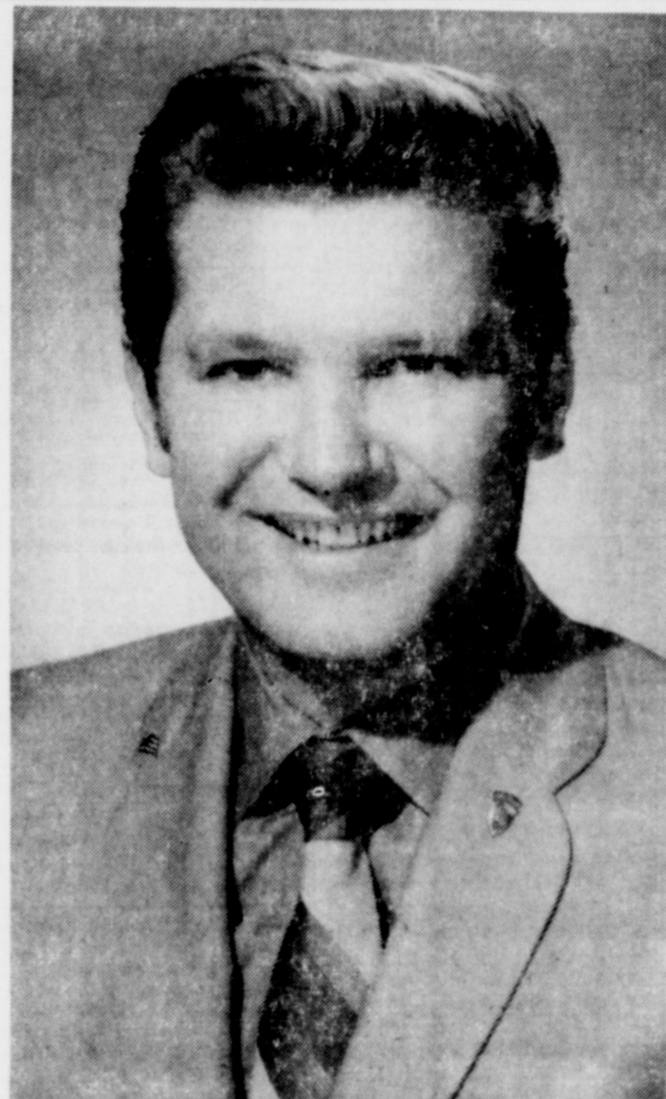
Not being professional politicians, the women make up with their vim and vigor, the desire to awaken in Eastland County a response to their plea for a two party system.

County Attorney Warns Against Swindlers Operating In This Area

County Attorney Walton Thursday told Press and other Eastland newspapers that swindlers should be warned of the presence of confidence men who have been operating particularly in the Eastland areas with the use of swindling elderly homeowners.

Walton said that one well known swindler from Snyder is active in the county. He said, "although we do not have any evidence at this time to connect him with recent swindles," said Walton.

One modus operandi of these characters is to engage the confidence of elderly homeowners who are targets for profitable swindles by making "free" examinations of the property they own and then showing them "evidence" of extensive termite or roof damage which is faked, the county attorney explained. They are very clever in gaining the confidence of their intended victims by representing themselves as honest workmen, often by casting reflection upon the honesty or dependability of established local business men who offer the services these strangers claim to provide, he suggested.

He said that once a job is contracted by them, they may or may not do a small amount of work to cover their fraud and then make off with the money they have been paid, leaving no address.

The county attorney advised that any person who is approached by a stranger with one of the above "sells" should require identification and then check with his office at Eastland, the sheriff, local police, the local chamber of commerce, Better Business Bureau or credit agency.

"In one instance last year," said Walton, "one of these swindlers got between \$6,000 and \$7,000 from an Eastland victim. This and other sums that have been lost by elderly people who can ill afford the loss, could have been saved, if the victims had taken the precaution to check on salesmen who approach them with offers to repair their homes or exterminate termites. The best advice we can give is not to deal with strangers."

Walton pointed out that the swindler is very clever in gaining confidence. One of the ways in which he does so is to explain that he did a job for some other person known to his intended victim.

He advised elderly people who wish to have their homes checked or repaired to call a reputable local business man who is permanently located in the area and has to stand behind his work.

Walton said his office has been swamped with investigation work as the result of these underground operatives and also with a type of "auction" animals.

HOLIDAY SNAFU!

The "Monday Holiday" law takes effect for federal employees in 1971. We are told that 37 states have enacted similar legislation so that for practical purposes the entire country will be effected.

We wonder if anyone in Congress or the various states ever looked at a 1971 calendar before they voted to guarantee the nation at least five three-day weekend holidays, including Labor Day.

Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day, Columbus Day and Veteran's Day are specified in the legislation.

The law says that Washington's Birthday (even though it falls on Monday the 22nd next year) shall be observed on the third Monday of the month which happens to be the 15th in 1971. Memorial Day falls on the last Monday in May, which will be the 31st instead of the traditional 30th. Columbus Day will become a national holiday for the first time and is pledged for the second Monday in October—Oct. 11—instead of on Oct. 12th. Veteran's Day, which used to be Armistice Day and used to mark the end of World War I, has for some strange reason been earmarked for the fourth Monday in October—the 25th—instead of November 11 when the event actually occurred.

In 1971, Lincoln's birthday, the 12th will fall on Friday, and Washington's Birthday has been officially declared for Monday the 15th.

"That's what you call far-sighted legislation."

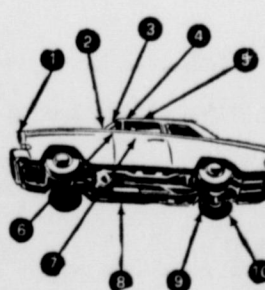

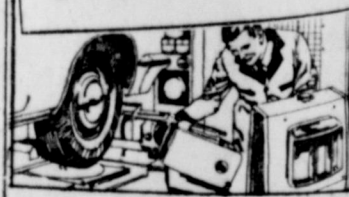

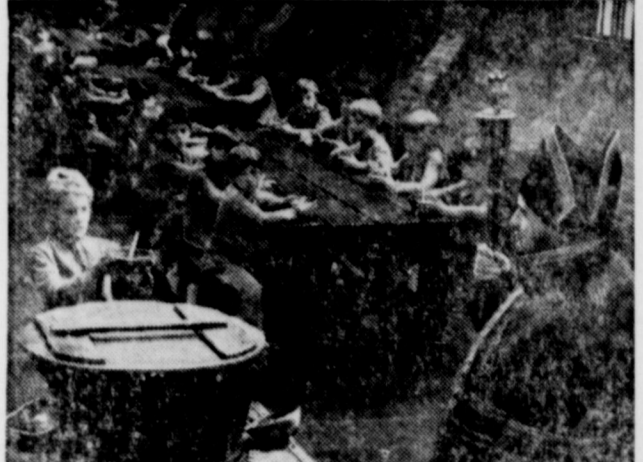
