Mayor Reid to Launch DDD With Call to 'Ambassador'

Eastland telephone subscribers will be switched to Direct Distant Dialing (DDD) Friday morning at 8 — and a side result will be appointment of an official ambassador for the city.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., in instituting the new program, is offering Eastland Mayor James Reid the choice of any person in the nation, to whom he will officially place the first DDD call.

Mayor Reid has selected Mrs. John C. Smith of Arlington, Va., and will name her Eastland's Ambassador to the Eastern Seaboard. She's the former Venetta Van Geem, and is presently employed by the United States State Department. "She's always been one of our best ambassadors," Mayor says, "maintaining her contacts with Eastland, and selling the city where ever she goes."

"We're going to use DDD to let her know we appreciate her and want her to keep up the good work."

At mid-week Bell Telephone Co. officials reported all in readiness to the change over to the DDD system. Under the new program, all station-to-station calls can be handled without the need for operator assistance.

"Direct Distance Dialing permits telephone users to dial direct across the nation almost as easily as they now call across the street," John McGowan, manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, said.

McGowan also noted that three other towns in this area will be able to dial DDD by the end of January, 1971. DDD will go into effect at Ranger on Dec. 15; Albany, Dec. 18; and Cisco, Jan. 8, 1971.

"DDD is another evidence of our faith in the future growth of Eastland," McGowan said.

"This new and faster method of calling out-of-town telephones has been hailed by

communications engineers as one of the single greatest advancements in communications since the old magneto, crank-type instruments disappeared from the walls of homes and businesses," he added.

"The change to Direct Distance Dialing will not cause any layoffs of regular telephone employees," McGowan said.

"Long range planning and the growth of this area will enable us to continue providing jobs for all regular employees currently on our payroll," he said.

Record Participation Due In 18th Pecan Show Here

Choice pecans and pecan bake goods will be on display in the Eastland County court house Friday and Saturday, Dec. 11 and 12. The event will be the eighteenth annual Eastland County Pecan Show, sponsored by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce and the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association.

De Gordon, county Agent, says the pecan show is the oldest county pecan show in the nation and had more entries than any other county show in Texas last year. The champion in-shell pecans of Eastland County was later named the champion in-shell pecans of the state last July in Dallas. They were an entry of Choctaw pecans owned by Mrs. C. E. Smith of Rising Star. One new feature of this year's show will be a class for the smallest pecans.

Anton White, president of the Pecan Growers Association, announced that visitors will be able to purchase choice pecans as well as baked goods at the show Dec. 11 and 12. The Home Demonstration members will operate a concession where coffee and pecan food will be sold.

White estimates that about 200 entries of top quality pecans representing over 40 different varieties will be on display. Each entry consist of at least 40 pecans. They must have been grown in 1970 by the person entering the pecans in the show. All entries of pecans must be entered by noon on Friday. Ribbons will be given to the top three places of each variety. Plaques will be awarded to the exhibitor of the champion in-shell pecan, the champion in-shell pecan, the champion native pecan and the overall Grand Champion pecan entry of the show.

Top place entries in all varieties will be entered in the regional pecan show at Temple December 16-18.

The bake show and centerpiece arrangement division will be supervised by the Home Demonstration Council. These entries are due on Friday, Dec. 11, at 11 a. m. in the court house lobby.

The divisions in the bake show are pies, cakes, nut bread, and cookies. All of which must feature pecans as a part of the ingredients. The top three places will be awarded ribbons and prize money. Any adult or youth of Eastland County is eligible to enter.

The centerpiece arrangements must be composed with some part of the pecan tree such as leaves, wood, or nuts. Prize money and ribbons are awarded to the top three places in this division.

Judging for the pecan show

will be done Friday afternoon by Dr. B. J. Storey, Horticulture professor from Texas A&M University and Dr. Ardie Powell, Extension Horticulturist from Texas A&M.

Total income from the current harvest which had been handled by the bank to last Monday was \$1,814,868.49, the banker reported. Most of this "gross" income has been used to pay off notes and bills owed by farmers which reduced the amount left on deposit in the bank, it was explained. This means that the average grower is in excellent condition financially and well fixed for next year's crop.

Few Peanut Farmers Will Get Questionnaires

Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, John C. White, announces that a few peanut farmers will receive a questionnaire in the mail asking for information about peanut yields, rates of planting, insecticides used, and other items. Commissioner White explains that this information will be used as a part of a research project to help farm-

grow better crops. The questionnaire should be filled out by the farmer giving the information requested and returned to the Texas Department of Agriculture Laboratory, 301 West Navarro, De Leon, Texas 76444. After all the questionnaires are in, the information will be summarized and will be published in the form of a survey. Commissioner White added that no individual farms or names will be used.
Those farmers who have already received the questionnaire and have harvested their crops should complete and return the questionnaire as soon as possible. Where harvest has not been completed, the questionnaire should be filled out and returned as soon as peanuts are harvested.

President Ton Duc Thang; Democratic Republic of Vietnam; Hanoi, North Vietnam.
To the Honorable Ton Duc Thang:
We do not come as ministers, diplomats or heads of state to plead for the lives of Americans you hold or whose fate you know. We are the wives, their children, their parents, their brothers and sisters, their friends, their neighbors and their countrymen.
We remember them. We remember them as children; as young men who played and worked and lived and loved among us. We remember other young men who we know have died in Vietnam.
And we remember you. We

We are the people pleading and remembering. We are the people who chose new leaders from time to time, while we remain—with our memories. We are "doves" and we are "hawks" and we are undecided about the issue of the war, but we are united in believing that wives should know if their are widows and mothers, should know if they still have sons.

We are united in believing it is less than humane to use the lives of these men and the agony of their families as a bargaining point at the conference table.
We, the American people, whose goodwill will not be undesirable when the war is ended, ask you to release these men who can be no good to you and who are precious to us.

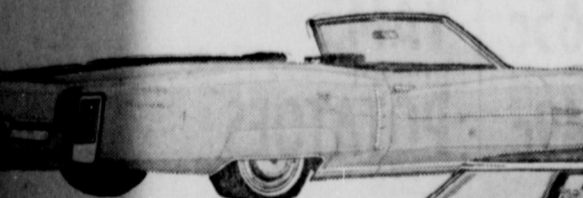

Specifics about Direct Distance Dialing (DDD) were outlined for members of the Eastland Lions Club by Kirby Fears, Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. officials, at the regular luncheon meeting Tuesday at the White Elephant Restaurant.

What happens if you get a wrong number?

"Stay on the line and learn from the wrong-number party what city and what number was reached. When call the operator 'O', and explain that you've gotten a wrong number and give her the information about the call."

What do you do when you get cut off or can't hear because of a poor connection? "Again, call the operator," he explained.

All DDD calls will be station-to-station and none will be placed from pay phones. All collect per-on-to-person and other such calls must be placed in the usual manner through an operator.

"The DDD calls are virtually untouched by human hands," he said.

Eventually some 17 towns will be served DDD through the Cisco office.

Subscribers on eight-party lines will be asked by operators to give their own telephone numbers even on DDD calls, because equipment hasn't been installed to determine the calling number from these multiple-line systems, he said.

The company doesn't expect any telephone operators to be released because of the new system. With the increase in volume, we're really adding operators, President J. B. presided and announced that Dist. Gov. Lloyd Neely of Wichita Falls will be here Dec. 22.

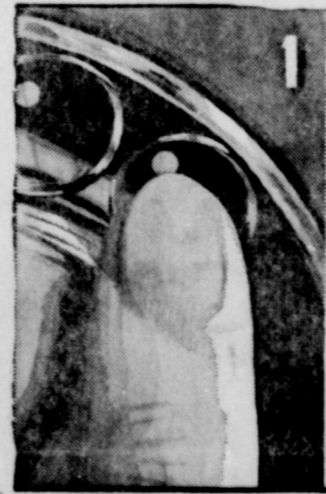



COG Gets \$31,859 Grant

Gov. Preston Smith today approved a grant of \$31,859 to the West Central Texas Council of Governments for a regional training center. Approval of the award was recommended by Texas Criminal Justice Council at its regular monthly meeting.

Judge Joe Frazier Brown, executive director of the Criminal Justice Council, said the grant will be used by West Central Texas COG to continue its training academy for police officers in the region. Four courses will be held for 100 students with subjects ranging from criminal investigation to teletype operation and record keeping.

The classes are approved by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education. An in-kind match of \$48,140 will be provided by the grantee for the project.

Counties in the West Central Texas State Planning Region are Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Shackelford, Stephens, Stone-wall, Taylor, Throckmorton, Comanche and Scurry.

The Criminal Justice Council, responsible for statewide planning, administers grants to units of state and local government to assist them in carrying out projects for improving the criminal justice system. The funds come from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, U. S. Department of Justice, under provisions of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968.

\$97,702 To Aid County Pupils Of Low Income

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Congressman Omar Burleson announced today a \$97,702.16 Office of Education grant to the State of Texas for 666 children in Eastland County, age 5 to 17, all of whom are in low income families.

The allotment of funds was made available for fiscal year 1971 under the provisions of Part A of Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act which provides special programs for educationally disadvantaged children.

Payments To Be Made On 1970 Wool Sales

Mr. Lyerla, Chairman of the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee, who reminded producers that the 1970 marketing year under

the wool and mohair program ends December 31. Wool payments are based on the difference between the incentive price (72 cents per pound for shorn wool marketed in 1970) and the average national price for marketings during the year. Wool and mohair sales made after December 31, 1970, will not be eligible for payment until 1972. Incentive payments are made through ASCS county officers to all eligible producers who file applications and present the necessary sales receipts and other records. Mr. Lyerla reminded producers that sales documents must show all details if the sale was completed during the current marketing year—including passing title to the buyer. There must be a record showing either actual delivery or transfer of control of the wool or mohair to the buyer. The buyer's total purchase price must be clearly stated also. Proof of ownership for at

least 30 days is an important requirement, the ASC Committee Chairman said. To be eligible for payments producers must own for at least 30 days the livestock from which the wool or mohair was shorn and the unshorn lambs on which they apply for payment. Records must be presented which clearly establish compliance with the 30 day ownership requirement. Requests for 1970 marketing year payments under the National Wool Act may be filed with Eastland County ASCS Office, Eastland, Texas as soon as the sales documents are available, but should be filed no later than January 31, 1971, to ensure early payment.

Baptists Start Work On New \$120,000 Sanctuary

Construction was begun last week on a \$120,000 brick modern design to replace the Rising Star First Baptist church destroyed by fire early in October.

The new plant, to consist of a sanctuary and educational building and to contain 10,956 square feet of floor space, is designed in the form of a massive "T" with the stem containing the auditorium and facing North Main street, as did the burned building.

A panel of stone incised with a large cross of colored glass, illuminated from the interior, will be presented to the street.

The worship area containing the pulpit, baptistry, choir loft and railing will occupy the west, or street end of the sanctuary. Entrance to the auditorium will be through a vestibule dividing the sanctuary from the educational building, with access from

either side. The auditorium, to contain 3,956 square ft. will seat 260 with overflow seating for 48 additional worshippers behind folding doors at the rear.

Both the sanctuary and the educational departments will be carpeted wall to wall. Carpet used in the educational department — which also will contain a large fellowship hall, kitchen, pastor's study, office space for the church staff, library and storage facilities — will be of the all-weather variety.

The educational area will be bisected by a hall from north to south with entrances from the outside at both extremities. A covered walkway will lead from the south entrance to the nursery building, which was the only part of the original plant to escape the fire. There will also be an entrance place in the extreme rear of the educational building.

For greater convenience during weddings, funerals and special programs, doors will be located on either side of the sanctuary just in front of the rail dividing the pulpit space from the congregation seats.

The contractor, who also furnished the design approved by the congregation, is Paden Co., Inc., of Fort Worth, specialists in church architecture and construction.

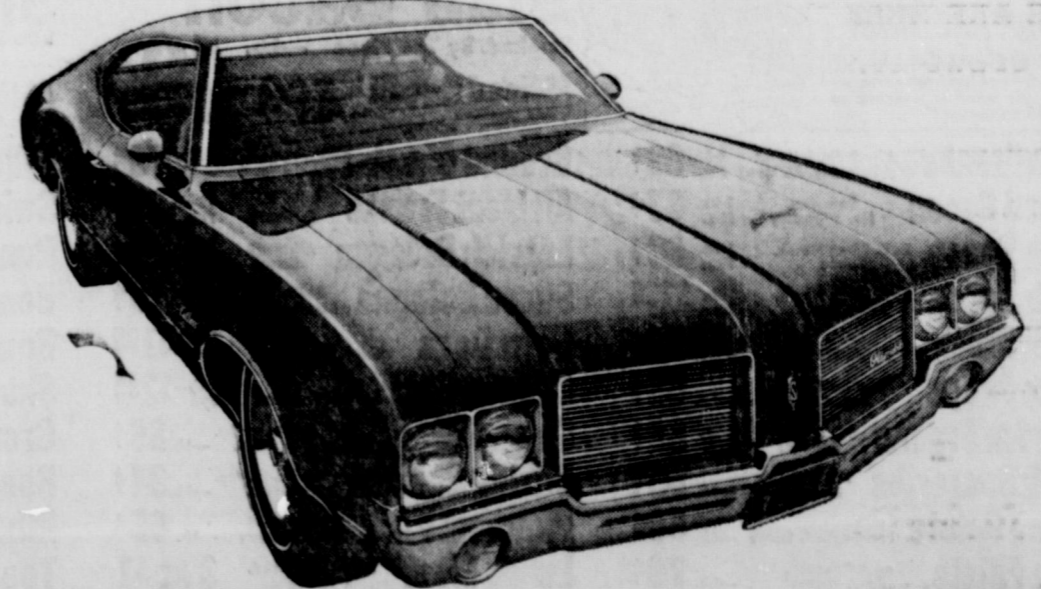

Newsmen-Telephone Cooperate To Bring Quick Election Reports

Your favorite candidates may or may not have emerged victorious on November 3, but either way you knew the winner in a hurry. For the first time in election coverage history, newsmen and the telephone com-

pany coordinated to compile and analyze election results with the fastest and most precise communications network ever, according to John E. McGowan, Manager for Southwestern Bell. Fort Worth served as regional collection center for voting information funneled into the network from all parts of Texas, Missouri, Kansas, Arkansas, and Oklahoma.

"The telephone company worked for two years with members of the News Election Service (NES) — composed of the ABC, CBS and NBC Networks, and the UPI and AP wire services — to coordinate a special nationwide communications network," Mr. McGowan explained. "This effort employed thousands of people and large amounts of computer hardware on November 3 as voting results were gathered, packaged, and delivered into American homes within minutes of the time they were tallied."


The election results information also got a big boost from new Dataspeed communications equipment which can print at more than a thousand words a minute — ten times faster than ordinary printers.

Mr. McGowan explained how the system worked. "As soon as the polls closed and the votes were tallied, NES reporters located at each precinct relayed results by long distance telephone calls to regional centers located across the country — like the one we had in Fort Worth," he said. "There, the information was translated into computer language and sent by Data-Phone Service to the NES national computer located at Rockefeller Center in New York."

Simultaneously, the same data branched out by private line teletypewriter to the various state headquarters and the NES affiliate members in the respective states. The millions of pieces of information fed into the national computer in New York were pumped out and carried continuously to the news media by private line data services. The entire process — from precinct to on-the-air broadcast — averaged about ten minutes.
