P-T-O Hears of Local Drug Situation, Gives to S.A., Urges Immunization

At the initial meeting of the Eastland Parent-Teachers organization on Monday evening, Sept. 14, 1970, an unusually large group of approximately 200 parents and teachers were in attendance for a business meeting conducted by Mrs. Mike Collins, president, and for an enlightening program concerning drug abuse.

The P-T-O elected to make a contribution of \$25.00 to the Salvation Army in Eastland for that organization's help to the needy children in the elementary school. Also, the PTO approved an officers' recommendation, introduced by Mrs. H. V. O'Brien, Vice-President, that the Eastland school board of trustees commence a policy of a mandatory requirement for the DPT measles and polio immunizations for all entering students in September of 1971.

Dr. B. B. Alexander was the guest speaker and was introduced by Emory Walton, Eastland County-District Attorney. Dr. Alexander gave a most informative report concerning drug abuse not only by the adults but also by the young people in our country. He told the group that there is so far as he knows no particular problem in Eastland itself at this time but that there is apparently drug abuse by young people in the county. He reported that last year in Texas alone there were approximately 6,000 arrests for various drug and narcotic violators. He also gave some alarming figures as to the number of students in the large cities' schools who are taking drugs of some type.

Dr. Alexander said that one of the possible causes of our national drug abuse problem in adults as well as the young people stems from our society where there is a pill for every pain as well as social problems. He also stated that the disregard of personal

Spectacular Parade Will Begin at 3:00

Final preparations for the 1970 edition of the Peanut Bowl are now being made. All the parade entries have been received and placed, the route has been mapped, floats and decorated cars are being completed, and excitement is mounting.

Parade Chairman Herman Alsop reports that the largest number of entries in recent years will be on hand at 3 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 19, to be viewed by hundreds of spectators along the streets of Eastland.

The parade will form and begin at the corner of Commerce and Connelie Sts. and will continue east along Commerce to Bassett, where it will disperse.

Mr. Joe Hanna of Breckenridge, newly elected State Representative of District 64, will serve as Grand Marshall of the parade.

Prizes and trophies will be awarded in each category in the parade. Cash awards of \$25, \$15 and \$10 will be given the winning floats, and trophies will be awarded to the best band in each class of competition, the best decorated car, and to the top Riding Clubs.

A special feature of this year's parade and game is the honoring of past queens. Five of these young ladies are to ride in the parade and will be presented in halftime ceremonies at the Peanut Bowl game, to be held Saturday night at 8 p.m. in Maverick Stadium. It will be the 11th meeting of county rivals, Cisco and Ranger Junior Colleges.

Past queens planning to attend the festivities are Mrs. Joe Cooper (Jan Taylor) of Dallas, 1963 queen; Mrs. Truman Read (Sharon Denton) of Hurst, 1964 queen; Mrs. Don Guy (Becky Patterson) of Abilene, 1966 Queen; Miss Joan Kelly of Eastland, 1967 Queen, and Miss Barbara Williams of Gorman 1968 Queen.

Miss Susie Howard of DeWitt County, reigning Texas State Peanut Queen, will grace the Jaycee float and will be joined there by Miss Carolyn Telford of Atascosa County, first runner-up, and Miss Marilyn Hill of Fannin County, second runner-up and Miss Congeniality. Susie will be presented a \$500 scholarship by officials of the Peanut Industry during halftime ceremonies.

County Princesses attending will be Miss Beth Calhoun of Comanche County, Miss Beth Pearson of Eastland County, Miss Martha Thiebaud of Erath County, and Miss Barbara Ritter of Jones County. Other title-holding young ladies to appear will be Miss Ramona Camacho, Miss Ranger 1970, and Miss Brenda Nikirk of Fort Worth, Junior Miss Majorette of Texas.

Four area bands and a 50-member drill team will further make up the roster of parade entries. Cisco Junior College and the Wrangler Belles, Baird High School, Cisco High School, and Eastland High School will compete for band honors. These units will also present a special massed band show at 7:45 p.m.

Eastland football fans will especially be watching two former EHS grid stars, Fred Keith and Steve Wilson, now members of the Ranger squad.

Floats sponsored by the Girl Scouts, 3D Bake Shop, Farm Bureau and the Co-Ed Club will compete in the float division. Decorated cars will be sponsored by the Zeta Pi Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi for Little Miss Eastland Becky Gailey, the Eastland County Republican Party, the Eastland County 4-H Club, Ranger Junior College, Cheerleaders, Eastland High School Cheerleaders, and Eastland Junior High Cheerleaders.

New 1971 model automobiles and equipment will be displayed by Fullen Motor Co., King Motor Co. and Squires Farm Store. Other entries include City Cab and Ray Dunn barbecue wagon.

An added attraction will be the 15-member Shrine Motor Club Motorcycle Corp. of Ft. Worth. This group has performed in parades all over the country and will put a special demonstration on the square immediately following the parade.

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
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Nimrod Honored At Banquet Held On A & M Campus Recently

Mr. H. H. Harrelson and Mrs. Herman Schaefer, President and Secretary of the Nimrod Neighbor's Progressive Club of Eastland County received a silver tray from Gov. Preston Smith, Sept. 9. The Nimrod community was honored along with 34 other small communities at a banquet held at Texas A&M University. The 35 communities had all worked in the community improvement program for at least ten years.

Also attending the banquet from Eastland County were Mr. and Mrs. Jack Cozart, Mrs. H. H. Harrelson, Herman Schaefer, and Eastland County Extension Agents Mrs. Janet Thomas and DeMarquis Gordon.

Gov. Smith addressed the more than 400 community leaders, representatives of private officials of Texas and A&M.

The Governor told the audience that we need strong rural communities and thriving small towns. "They have," he said "been and are a great source of strength for America and we need to preserve them.
