

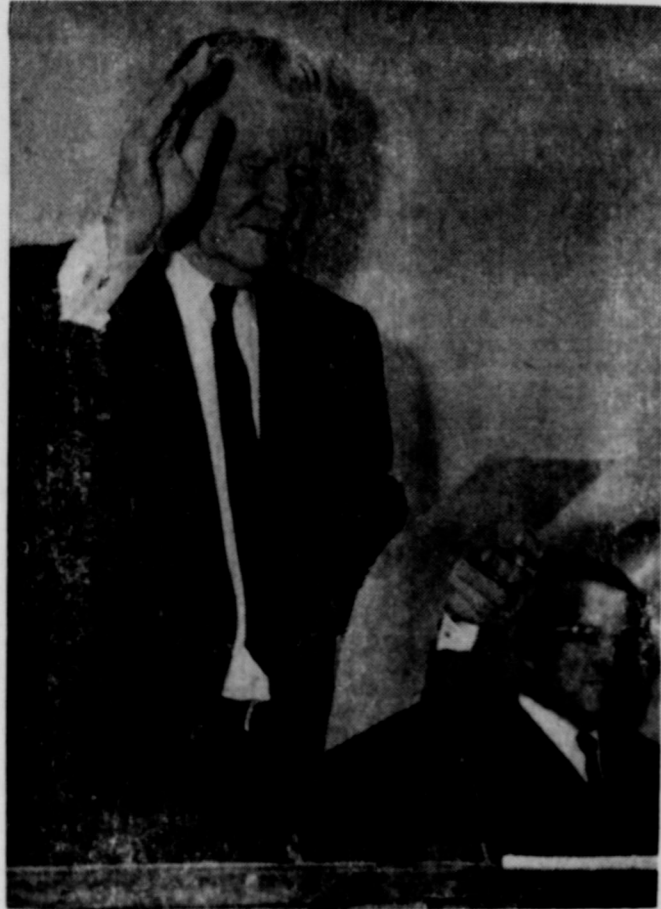

## Chamber of Commerce Banquet Set To Begin at 7 p.m. Thursday Evening

The Rev. Bernie Ayers, the "Preaching Parson of Iraan," will speak at the Eastland Chamber of Commerce banquet at 7 p.m. Thursday, Jan. 16, at the elementary school cafeteria.

Tickets, priced at \$2.50 each are available from the Chamber office, City Hall, KERC radio, the Eastland Telegram, or from any member of the board of directors. Lewis Tiner is in charge of ticket sales.

Mrs. C. W. Hoffmann Jr., is in charge of decorations, announced the theme will be—"Eastland: Jewel of a City."

These officers will be installed. Grover Hallmark, president; Ben McKinnis, first vice president; and Jeff Glazner, second vice president. J. T. Gregory is retiring president. Hallmark and McKinnis served as vice presidents during the past year.

The 33rd Golden Deed Award will be presented to a local citizen. Plans call for an outstanding farmer to be given an award and for the four high ranking students of Eastland High School to receive certificates.

Ayers, who organized the Iraan Chamber of Commerce and served as its manager for three years, designed the "worlds most unusual park," the Alley Oop Fantasy Land.

In 1966, Iraan and its 1100 people had two "claims to fame;" it was home of Texas football grad Bud McFadin and site of the largest producing oil well on the North American continent.

Then Ayers, who received a dollar a year as Chamber of Commerce manager, remembered that V. F. Hamlin, creator of Alley Oop, was working in the Iraan oil fields when he got the idea for the big-footed caveman comic character.

An oil company had given the City of Iraan seven acres which connected to a 40 acre county park. Ayers went to the mayor for use of the property.

"I'm going to build a dinosaur on it," he said vaguely. Ayers was vague because he

knew nothing about dinosaurs but armed with a drawing of Dinny, Alley's friend, the chamber manager fashioned a head from old wire hangers and asked the local high school shop class to weld the concoction together.

Next he began from various oil well supply firms a 14-inch steel beam, a 101 inch beam, sucker rods, wire mesh and cement. He talked local construction workers into donating their time and talent.

With no guide but the hanger model, Ayers began constructing his dinosaur. Six weeks later Dinny was completed. The 14 inch beam was a backbone, the 10 inch one the neck. Legs were formed of 8 1/2 inch casing and the body reinforced cement steel overlaid with wire mesh. Dinny's hide is 2 inch thick sprayed concrete.

Over all, the dinosaur rises 15 feet above the prairie and is 65 feet long. Children love to scramble over their monster.

With Dinny complete Ayers planned an Alley Oop Day in Iraan. Hamlin came back from Sarasota, Florida (at his own expense) and Dinny was unveiled before 3,000 out of town visitors.

Since the opening the chamber has collected and housed on the seven acres a museum and erected a huge sign—Ayers begged sheets of steel from the oil companies—above the park's entrance.

Pastor of the First Christian Church in Iraan, Ayers is noted for his spark and enthusiasms during his speeches.

## Government Brought to People In Musgrove Swearing-In Event

Bringing government to the people was vividly demonstrated in Eastland County Tuesday morning when State Rep. Burke Musgrove elected to be given his oath of office among consultants rather than with the 149 other law makers in Austin on the same day.

And symbolically, the event was held in the 11th Court of Civil Appeals, a court which the young Musgrove has helped keep here, and the oath was given by Chief Justice Clyde Grissom. A large group of county and district residents were present for the event on the fifth floor of the county courthouse. A reception was held in the 91st District Court, where County Home Demonstration Club

members and 4-H Club members served cookies and coffee.

In brief remarks prior to the actual swearing in, Judge Grissom spoke of the importance of the people's interest in our form of government and pointed out that those country's which had our form of government and tried to replace a system of law and order with other forms have failed.

"Some people believe we have too much government," he said. "Others believe we have too little. But regardless of the amounts, the system works only when people have respect for law and order," Judge Grissom said.

Introducing members of the staff of the 11th Court of Civil Appeals, including Justices Cecil Collings and Esco Walters, Clerk Homer Smith, Mrs. E. N. Varner, Mrs. Pat Mosley and Joe Jones, Judge Grissom stated that everyone, including himself, was here because they preferred to live in a small town.

During remarks prior to the reception in the 91st Court Room, Rep. Musgrove re-sounded the same thought when he talked briefly on the governor's proposed educational re-vamping plan when he suggested that rather than consolidating all the rural schools that emphasis should be placed on strengthening

them to help maintain and improve the quality of education in the rural area so that urban problems aren't compounded by the evacuation of people to the larger areas.

Special guests and assisting with arrangements were members of the government classes at Ranger Junior College and their instructor, Charles Deaton.

County Political Leader Mike Collins presided and the Rev. Len Layne, pastor of the First Methodist Church, Eastland, gave the invocation. Mr. Musgrove introduced people from this county and from the other counties in the five-county 53rd District. RJC Student Government President Ronnie Smith lead the assembled audience of several hundred in the Pledge of Allegiance.

"We wanted to be sworn in for our second term by the people who helped elect me," Musgrove said. This was the second time that he has done this, having been sworn in at Palo Pinto County last term.

Predicting the most stormy session ever, Rep. Musgrove lashed out at the proposed education program, stating it will just cost too much to do all that's recommended. "To pay for all that's proposed," he said, "we'll eat up most of what is referred to as a 60% increase in economic prosperity as well as need an additional 2% state income tax and probably a corporation tax to pay the bills."

He proposes as an alternate plan the emphasis to strengthen the rural school programs with the use of shared teachers, educational network television and other means. "We agree," he said, "that a problem in adequate education exists."

Closing, he touched on his oft-repeated plea for full-time status for representatives and asked one and all to stay in contact with him, saying "although we may occasionally disagree on certain areas, be assured that I want to know your opinions and have the benefit of your suggestions and recommendations."

# Texas Farm Bureau Organized in 1920

The combined assets of Farm Bureau Insurance Companies in the United States now amount to more than \$1,450,000,000, according to Eastland County Agent Buddy Aaron.

The first Texas Farm Bureau was organized in the summer of 1920. The organization grew rapidly at first but by 1932, the first Farm Bureau in Texas had ceased operation.

With the increasing interest in agricultural legislation during the first years of the New Deal came renewed efforts to organize Texas farmers and ranchers.

The Texas Agricultural Association was chartered in 1934. Two years later it became affiliated with the American Farm Bureau Federation, and still later changed its name to Texas Farm Bureau.

The fledgling organization never had more than a few thousand members during the 1930's although dues were only \$2 a year during that period. By 1945, there were some 7,000 members in the Farm Bureau in Texas. During the next five years, it grew to more than 50,000 members as

scores of new counties were organized. The organization has grown each year since 1952.

The Texas Farm Bureau initiated its first service-to-member program in 1944 when it entered into an agreement with Blue Cross-Blue Shield of Texas for a hospital and surgical program. In 1946, the TFB joined with other states to found the Southern Farm Bureau Life Insurance Co. The Southern Farm Bureau Life Insurance Co. was established in 1947 in association with other southern state Farm Bureaus. In 1950, the TFB set up its own TFB Insurance Co., offering fire and extended coverage. The Company, which was converted into a mutual company in 1958, later began writing crop - hail insurance for members.

In the early 1960's, the TFB expanded its services to include promotion and development of export markets in Europe for Texas commodities. In 1966, the TFB inaugurated a domestic cattle marketing program limited to pilot counties. A used-hen marketing program was begun in 1967.

The latest economic service program, instituted in 1965, involves sale of Farm Bureau's own Safemark tires and batteries to members through independent dealers. More than 175 Texas counties are now participating in this program. Texas is one of 33 states in the program.

The Texas Farm Bureau today has 110,689 members in 203 organized counties. About 165 counties have their own offices.

The Texas Farm Bureau board of directors is composed of 13 directors, one from each of the 13 districts in the state. Officers of the organization are elected by board members from among their own number.

"We believe that the potential for expansion in the area is virtually unlimited and Safeway intends to offer the best facilities and services possible."

First on the 1969 building agenda is construction of 27 new stores, 10 of them replacements. Land acquisition plans have been finalized, 7 stores are currently under

construction and the balance are in the final planning stages. All stores are scheduled for completion during the calendar year, totaling approximately \$13,500,000, with another \$4,000,000 set aside for interiors and fixtures. The stores will create jobs for 750 to 1,000 new employees.

Many of the new locations will have in-store bakeries & delicatessen operations. To accommodate more products, all of the new stores will be larger in size, averaging 20,000 to 23,000 square feet of space.

Another step in the modernization program is individual designing of the stores to adapt to the neighborhoods in which they are being built, a distinct change from the universal style or "trademark" store exterior which has been used in the past.

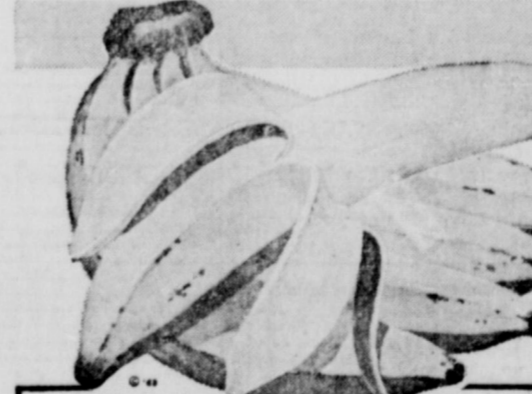
