Pastor's Wife, Berlin Native, Tells Christmas Customs of That Land

(ED. NOTE: To provide our readers with a report on Christmas customs from another land, we asked Mrs. Robert W. Marsh, a native of Berlin, to share some of her recollections of Christmas in Germany. An Eastland County resident only since August, 1969, her husband is pastor of the First Presbyterian Church Eastland, and in charge of services for the First Presbyterian Church. Cisco, Rev. Marsh was studying in Switzerland and vacationing in Berlin when he met Marlis. They have a 30-month-old daughter, Kirsten. Mrs. Marsh was a chemical assistant in a soil research laboratory in Berlin.)

CHRISTMAS IN GERMANY

There are some differences in the way Christmas is observed in Germany from the way it is observed in the United States. In the United States, for example, only Dec. 25th is a legal holiday; but in Germany official holidays for factory and government works are the 24th, 25th, and 26th. Shops close at 12 noon on the 24th. And after all the rush of shopping and activities of preparation everything becomes very quiet as people go to their homes to celebrate Christmas with their families. Restaurants are closed the evening of the 24th but reopen the 25th and 26th.

More is made of Christmas Eve in Germany than in America. The "Weihnachtsmann" (Santa Claus) comes on the evening of the 24th between 6:00 and 7:00. The Christmas trees are not lighted until the 24th; and the lights, a practice different than in the United States, are usually candles. Church services, both Protestant and Catholic, are held, on the 24th, beginning at 3:00 p.m. or so, and continuing until the final service is held at Midnight. The services are well-attended; and often there is not seating space for all the people. At the time for the Midnight Service to begin, the bells in the churches are rung; and beneath the towers of some churches a band of trumpeters herald the news that Christmas has arrived. The atmosphere is festive.

In the home on the 24th, the children stay out of the room until the "Weihnachtsmann" leaves gifts under the tree. Then, the family gathers in the early evening around the Christmas tree; and all join in singing Christmas songs and carols, or in playing and listening to recorded Christmas music. The children and the grownups open their gifts; and the children stay up late and play with their toys. If they have not gone earlier, the family attends the Midnight Service at the church.

On the 25th, people generally sleep late. The children get up and play with their toys. And the woman of the house prepares a big meal. These days it is often an American turkey that is prepared rather than the traditional German goose. Cake, rather than pie, is eaten. A favorite cake is "stolle," a kind of fruitcake shaped like a loaf of bread.

One of the sweets of which Germans are especially fond is "marzipan." Marzipan, made from almonds, sugar and rosewater, is often shaped into the form of tiny loaves of bread or of tiny potatoes. Marzipan originated in the seaport town of Lubeck. In the middle ages, so the tale goes, the town was under siege; and the people were out of food or nearly so and had nothing with which to make bread. Someone had the idea to make bread from almonds, of which Lubeck, being a seaport town, had a supply; and so the town was

Mrs. Williams moved back to Texas because of the climate, effecting an arthritic problem. In 1959, she moved from San Angelo, to Eastland, where she has lived for the past 12 years.

Mrs. Williams has been a member of the First Methodist for 92 years. She joined when she was 8.

During the past four years, she has broke both hips. Once in 1968, and exactly 1 yr. 1 mon. 1 week, and 1 day, later, she broke the other hip. As a result she is in a wheelchair, although she can walk a little.

Mrs. Williams takes care of all her business affairs. Her mind is sharp, though her eyes are failing.

She does love to read, and the Readers Digest is her favorite.

Mrs. Williams has a house keeper who lives with her, and helps with the housework Mrs. Ruth Campbell has been with her 14 months.

Her hobbies are playing "42" with neighbors, and tating.

Mrs. Williams owes her happiness to thoughtful neighbors, and friends who love her. She says she has a world of friends here in Eastland, and they are all so good and kind. She makes it a point never to forget old friends.

She always keeps in touch. Mrs. Williams comments that she is grateful to the good Lord, for the years she has lived, because he has blessed her greatly.

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
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
