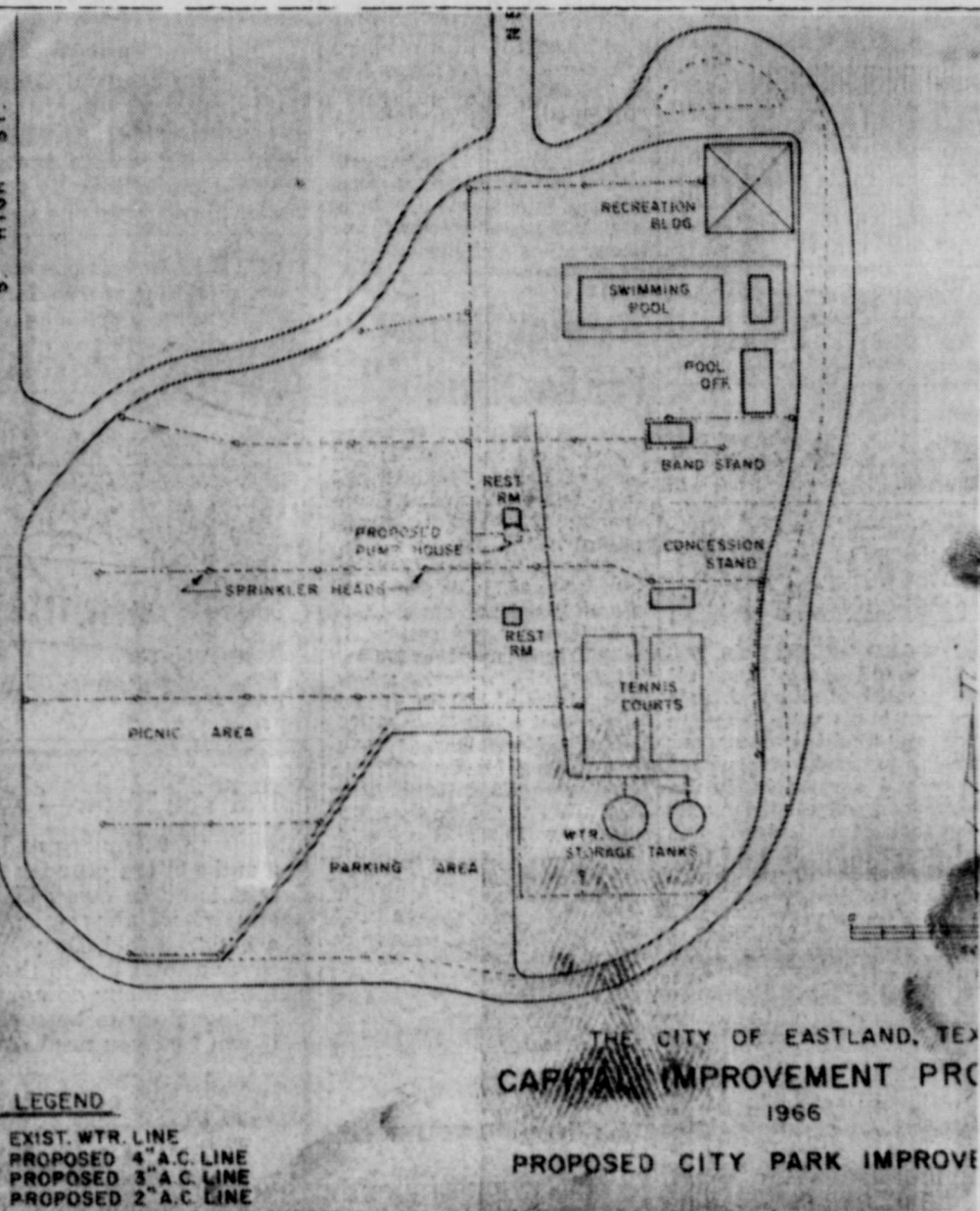

Chamber Launches Beautification Of City Park as Major Project

Eastland City Park is in for a much-needed beautification as the result of a Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors meeting this week.

Directors enthusiastically endorsed such a project, approved a \$9,000 budget and handled other important business at a luncheon meeting Thursday at the White Elephant Restaurant, with New President Ben McKinnis presiding.

In other action, the directors:

- Wondered if a cheaper Old Rip pin could be secured for give-away purposes. The silver and/or gold models sell for \$5. each. A plastic or cast model could go for less.
- Pledged complete support for the Eastland County Livestock Show upcoming, including at least a \$20 ad in the catalog and up to \$40 for premium money.
- Continued their participation in the West Central Texas Oil and Gas Association.
- Heard a report that the Gorman Chamber of Commerce will hold its annual meeting, Saturday, March 7. Tickets are available at the Eastland Chamber office.
- Heard a report that the successful recent Eastland banquet cost only \$263. Expenses were \$788 and ticket sales were \$525.
- Heard a report from the Chamber's Beautification Committee, by Chairman H. V. O'Brien, John Rhyne and Bob Perkins.

It was during this report that enthusiasm began to build for a really "all-out" beautification program this year. Naturally, City Park Hill was mentioned and when it was reported that the city had expressed the opinion that a water sprinkling system was the most badly project here, the directors began to set in motion a city-wide effort in which every individual, firm, organization and club would pool their resources to help accomplish this much needed goal.

Director Winston Boles pointed out that the South side of that City Park Hill is going to be one of the few things visible from Int. 20 when the highway goes around, so it was suggested beautification and development of the park certainly would be a boon to attracting people here. The summer reunion traffic is near and here to the City benefits from this continued use of the beautiful park facilities.

Bids are to be secured this week on the installation of a water sprinkling system, and further study is to be made of how to accomplish the project.

Another important program was launched too with the suggestion that a "work day" be held on upcoming Spring Saturdays to clean "in-a-day" some of the unsightly vacant lots around town. Bob Perkins volunteered his Ford equipment to help on this, and the city has agreed to be able to mow if and when the lots can be cleared of debris which is dangerous to mechanical mowing. All individuals and organizations are to be invited to join in this worthwhile project too.

Service and social clubs will be encouraged to accept individual projects at the park for development.

Engineers Guess 'Lot of Money' For Pretty Park

In reviewing and considering the beautification of City Park Hill, most here agree that it can be done "for a lot less" than proposed in the recent Master Plan for the City.

The City engaged the firm of Esmond-Reed and Associates, consulting engineers of Odessa and Midland in 1966, to propose several improvements for the city.

In the park development section, estimates by them was for \$61,200, which would include:

1. Construct sprinkler system, including piping, pressure tank, booster pump, and enclosure, for a total \$14,100.
2. Construct filter system for the existing swimming pool and relocate existing fence around the pool, \$22,100.
3. Construct a bathroom to serve the existing swimming pool, with showers and locker room, \$25,000.

The Chamber of Commerce board of directors generally agree that these figures could and should be lower.

Collectively, Individually Maverick Cagers Record Good

The Eastland Maverick Basketball team closed out their 1970 season with impressive, team and individual records.

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

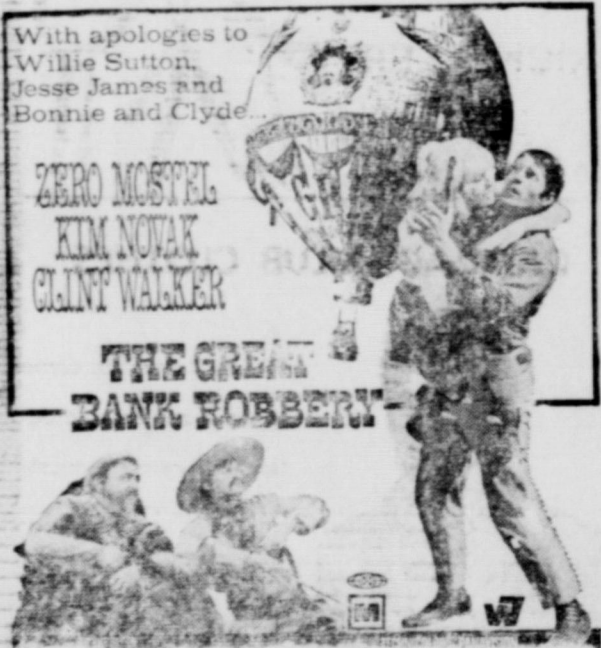

THE GORDON SPOT

By DE GORDON, County Agricultural Agent

Five Eastland County bankers attended the 18th annual Farmand Ranch Credit School for Commercial Bankers Feb. 16-17 at Texas A&M University. The local bankers attending were Grover Hallmark of Eastland, Dick Woolley of Cisco, Charles Rutherford of Rising Star, Bill Ellis and Bill Terry of Ranger. Hallmark reported that they heard some outstanding speakers from different parts of the nation.

March 11 and 12 are dates that peanut farmers should mark on their calendars. We are conducting a peanut production short course in Gorman on those dates. Extension specialists will discuss fertilization, weed control, irrigation, and marketing. The short course will be held at the Gorman High School and both sessions will be held at night.

Several Eastland County cattlemen attended the research center field day at McGregor each year. The field day will be held this year on March 12. This research center is a part of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and one of the most important beef cattle research centers in the nation. The field day starts at 9:30 with tours of the cattle research. "Designing Cattle for Tomorrow's Needs" will be the theme of an afternoon program. An auction sale begins at 2:30 in which the center will sell 17 registered, gain performance tested bulls and 14 crossbred heifers. Ike Hickman of Rising Star has purchased several performance tested bulls from the center in the past.

Now is the time to get your spray ready for your fruit trees. If you wait until insects and diseases infest the fruit, it will be too late. Start the preventive spray program when 75% of petals fall. The second application should be put on 10 days after petal fall and the third application two weeks later. A fourth application should be applied 14 to 21 days after the third spraying.

Use either malathion or sulfur. For more information check the guide for controlling insects and diseases of fruit trees available in our office.

**Special Programs Observe

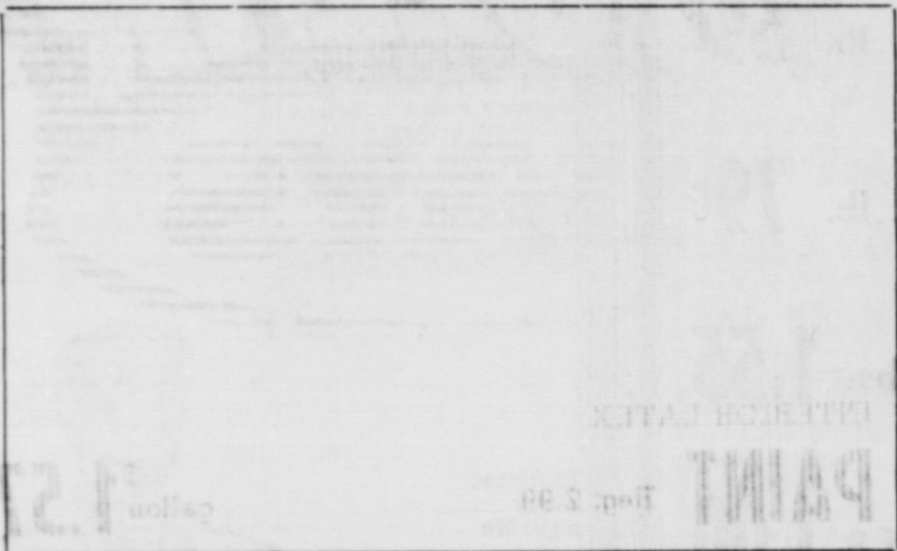

1970 Census Expected To Show A Population Of 19,000 For County

Every ten years the government finds it necessary to count its population so that it may better serve the people. This year, the first of the decade, on April 1, Americans will once more be asked to count themselves and their families and inform the government. Also on the census are questions about how Americans live, their health, finances, and occupations.

"Every question asked in the 1970 census has a national purpose," says Secretary of Commerce Maurice H. Stans. "Government programs for

welfare, education, housing, veterans, senior citizens, minorities, and many others, depend on accurate counts of our people and how they live. Schools, businesses, our state, cities, and citizen groups all use Census figures to plan their work and to measure our country's problems and progress."

President Richard Nixon states, "A good society, like a good individual, must begin by knowing itself." The census helps Americans to know themselves.

Each census becomes more complicated at the nation, and Eastland County, continues to

grow and progress. The first census was taken in 1790 for the United States, but, according to the 1970-1971 Texas Almanac, the first census in Eastland County was not taken until 1860 when 99 persons were counted.

The population of Eastland County decreased in the next ten years, perhaps a result of the Civil War, and in 1870 there were only 88 persons in Eastland County. By 1880 the population had grown to what then was considered a tremendous number, 4,855. Eastland County continued to grow and reached its peak in 1920 when 53,500 persons were counted. This was during the days of the oil boom. But by 1930 the number had fallen to 34,156, a drop of over 24,000. The decline has continued and in 1960 was down to 19,526, lowest since 1900. The estimated population in 1969 was 18,266. The 1970 census should show a figure close to this.

Although the number of citizens in Eastland County has decreased, industry and business has continued to grow. According to the 1960 census there are 339 businesses, recognized by Dun & Bradstreet of New York, in Eastland County.

Present records, in the 1970-1971 Texas Almanac, show Cisco as being the largest town in Eastland County with 120 businesses and 4,950 citizens. Eastland has 105 businesses and a population of 4,500. Ranger has a population of 3,840 and 85 businesses. Other towns, their businesses and population are as follows: Rising Star 39 businesses and 886 population; Carbon, four businesses and 286 population; Gorman, 36 businesses and 900 population; Kokomo, no businesses, and 25 population; and Scranton, no businesses and 37 population.

The information gathered aids the government in knowing the consumer items in demand, the jobs and vocations of the people, how to create better employment opportunities, the average income, the living standard, what legislation is needed and how to better provide for the people. In general it relates the mood and living conditions of the people.
