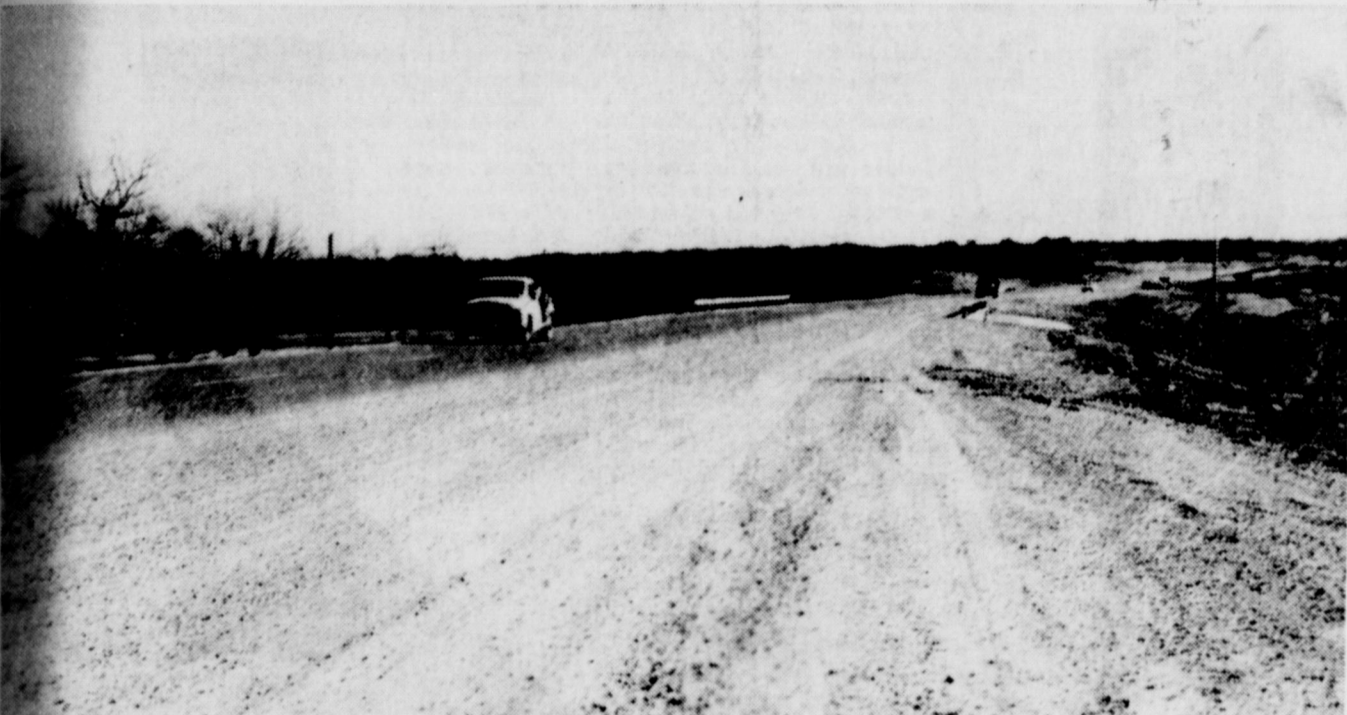

NEW HIGHWAY — Construction on Highway 183 south of Cisco is proceeding apace. This shows the section of the highway as it crosses the Leon River bottom just south of Cisco. At right, the route of the old highway with its two narrow bridges is being reshaped, the right-of-way recontoured and the channel of the Leon river straightened and contoured. The en-

tire right-of-way of the new highway is being landscaped, thousands of yards of rich topsoil spread over the clay slopes and sealed in place with binding oil. Later, planted to grass, this should afford motorists a lot of aesthetic pleasure while they enjoy riding on the smooth, wide new asphalt.

T.H.D. Sets Int. 20 Signs, Takes St. 6 Out of Eastland

Eastlanders can take comfort in knowing that steps are being taken to "sign" Int. 20 — but they can "kiss Highway 6 goodbye."

Recent action by the Texas Highway Department set wheels in motion for signs on the now-abuilding Int. 20, but in other action the department has decreed that Highway 6 will no longer go "through" Eastland.

The Texas Highway Commission today approved a signing project on Interstate Highway 20 in Eastland County.

The State Highway Engineer was directed to proceed with the signing construction from 1.0 mile west of Cisco, eastward to 2.0 miles east of Eastland, a distance of about 15.0 miles.

Estimated cost of the construction is approximately \$118 thousand.

Meanwhile, the Texas Highway Commission will extend the designation of State Highway 6 from Eastland westward over IH 20-US 80 to Cisco, then northward over the former route of US 380 to Old Glory.

The action adds significant mileage to a "plains to port" route under the SH 6 designation. SH 6 will now extend from Old Glory, through Stamford, Albany, and Cisco, joining the presently signed SH6 route through Waco, Bryan-College Station, the greater Houston area, ending in Galveston County near Texas City.

The action to extend SH 6 will cancel the designation on a section of Highway extending northward from Eastland through Morton Valley to an

intersection with US 183 in Eastland County. This section will be designated as State Highway 69.

The dual designation at US 183 and SH 6 from the intersection in Eastland County Breckenridge also will be made a single designation with the cancellation of SH

B-B Gunning Only Incident On Christmas

Only one unpleasant incident marred an otherwise quiet Christmas holiday in Eastland, according to Police Chief John Morren.

Two 13-year-old boys were caught Christmas Day "trying out" their just-received B-B guns, the chief reports. Street lights were shattered along Sadosa St. and plate-glass windows at the Eastland Elementary School broken.

Estimates are from \$500 to \$51,000 in window damage at the school.

The youths are scheduled to appear before juvenile authorities, the chief said.

Fire Chief Guy Peel reports a relatively quiet Christmas at the fire Department, with only grass fires begging the attention of firemen.

Firemen were called to four small grass fires Friday, Chief Peel said, and these were caused by fireworks. There was also one minor traffic accident Friday.

28 Operators Assist in Heavy Yule Phoning

It was a holiday "off work" for most, but for many on Christmas Day, it was business as usual. These included policemen, firemen, telephone operators and others.

Southwestern Bell expected traditional long distance telephone calling between families and friends on Christmas Day to be heavier than ever this year.

"Last Christmas, more than 747,000 long distance calls were placed by Texas customers," said John E. McGowan, Manager for Southwestern Bell. "This year, we expect that calling volume to reach 770,000."

Mr. McGowan noted that peak calling periods during past Christmas Days have been 9-11 a. m. and 7-11 p. m. "Since low, holiday long distance rates are in effect all day long, customers might find their calls go through faster by calling at other than peak periods," McGowan said. "The noon until 6 p.m. period is best."

He also suggested that Direct Distance Dialing be used if at all possible since customers find dialing their own calls is faster and the rates in most cases are even lower.

The procedure for direct dialing is to dial "1", the Area Code (if other than your own) and the distant telephone number. When calling within the same Area Code, simply dial "1" and the seven-digit telephone number.

To meet the expected high volume of long distance calling, the company had 28 operators who spent a part of their Christmas holiday at the switchboard in Cisco to handle an estimated 4100 or so calls. Many more calls were dialed directly by Eastland customers.

Mr. McGowan added that should a caller encounter a busy signal on a direct distance call, he should hang up and wait a few minutes before dialing again.

To help speed calls placed through a long distance operator, Mr. McGowan suggests the following tips:

Give the operator the type of call (station-to-station, person-to-person or collect).

Give Area Code and the number being called.

Wait for the operator to ask for your number, then give her your complete telephone number.

Whether dialing direct or placing a call through an operator, out-of-town telephone numbers can be obtained by dialing "1", the Area Code of the distant city and then the universal information number, 555-1212. On calls to a city with the same Area Code, dial "1" and 555-1212.

\$205,727 OEO Grant To This Area Announced

A telegram from Congressman Omar Bursleson dated Tuesday, December 22, announced that the Office of Economic Opportunity at Washington, D. C., had made a grant of \$205,727.00 to the Hill Country Community Action Association, Incorporated at San Saba and serving Eastland county among 16 counties in this area.

Purpose of the grant, according to Mr. Bursleson's telegram is to "provide emergency funds for food and medical services related to malnutrition, with information on available food and health services, neighbors

centers to provide vocational assistance job training, placement referral services, recreation, homemaking, environmental improvement, community organization, youth development, elderly poor."

The "local share" of the fund was designated as \$66,779.

There was no information as to the local administration of the Eastland county share.

Other counties embraced by the grant are Llano, Mason, Mills, San Saba, Blanco, McCulloch, Runnels, Coleman, Concho, Brown, Comanche, Callahan, Hamilton, Bosque and Breckinridge.
