Arson Seen In Burning

County officers were investigating the possibility of arson in an early morning fire which destroyed the Ernest Hittson ranch house five miles north of Cisco Monday.

The six room residence, with its contents, was burned to the ground and county sheriff's officers were checking on evidence of trespassing by unidentified parties.

County Attorney Emory Walfire. The investigation of possible arson is being continued,

The house was not occupied. The gate to the site was broken down and the wire fence torn at another point and there were tire tracks made by a pickup or other motor vehicle leading through both breaks,

The residence was built about 1933 on a tract adjoining the old Hittson homeside ranch. It had not been occupied since



Selective Service all deferments are issued for **Makes Changes** In Policies

Austin, —Colonel Charles tions issued to local board personnel by Dr. Curtis W. Tarr. National Director of Sel-ective Service, alter the year-end policy announced last month by the Selective Ser-

vice System.

Duncan said that registrants wishing to drop deferments and be reclassified in-to class I-A status to take advantage of the year-end policy, have been given until midnight, December 31, 1870. to file for the reclassification. Such requests may be received by local boards by that date or carry a postmark dated December 31, 1970 or

earlier. These instructions alter pre-vious policy which stated that the application had to be in the hands of local board personnel prior to a December meeting of the local board.

In particular, the instruc-tion to local boards will be of interest to men who hold high numbers in the 1970 draft lottery. Should a young man hold a number higher than that reached by his local board—and No. 195 has been set as the highest number which any board can reachit is to his advantage to volunntarily give up his deferment for a 1-A classification. In these cases, he will move to the Second Draft Priority Group on January 1. rather than to the First Priority Group upon termination of his deferment.

While recognizting young men holding lottery numbers over their local board "high" could effectively limit their vulnerability to the draft by being classified into 1-A by the year's end, Dr. Tarr stated that "the law allows young men to elect whether they will apply for a deferment and those young men granted de-ferments should be able to drop them if desired."

Dr. Tarr said the new polcy was issued because various boards throughout the country were scheduling their last meetings of the year at different times. By defining a specific cutoff date, the new policy allows all registrants an equal amount time to take advantage of the

reclassification offer.
Previous to changing this policy on dropping ofdefer-ments, registrants holding deferments were generally unable to voluntarily relinquish them as long as they contined to meet the criteria for deferment, except at the end of the defrement period when they could cancel them simply by not submitting the necessary documents for an extension.

The types of deferments affected by the memorandum are high school and college deferments, occupational deferments, agricultural deferments, paternity and hardship deferments. 




