STAFF WATER COMMITTEE MEETING HELD

The Steering Committee of the proposed Staff Water Supply Corporation met Wednesday night June 23, 1971 in the E. F. Arterburn home at Lake Leon to report on progress in getting persons living at Lake Leon or in the area signed up for treated water.

There were twelve of the sixteen steering committee members present and reported that at that time they had 104 persons signed. The Committee members reported that they were receiving very good response from those contacted.

The target of the Committee is for 140 signers by August 1, 1971, at which time the list will be turned over to the engineers for a feasibility study. Mr. E. L. Foster, District Supervisor and Mr. O. M. Boyle County Supervisor of the Farmer's Home Administration are cooperating in every way with the group in trying to get the project over. They think the project is entirely feasible and with a little more work can become a reality.

Markers Keep Alive Remarkable History Of Old Scranton Academy

Memories of 60 and 70 years ago crowded upon the prairie community of Scranton a month ago when some 200 former residents gathered to relive the days when old Scranton Academy was in flower, and particularly the season of 1915-16 when its basketball team was the toast of the area.

Two first string members of that remarkable quarter which won 28 games and lost none, defying even the college teams of the section participated in the unveiling of two historical markers which

A part of the employee force at the Delta P Incorporated plant in Cisco walked off the job Thursday afternoon in what was described as a strike in protest of a failure to reach agreement in a wage dispute.

A member of the union who asked not to be identified said that 30 to 35 of the workers quit their jobs, but company office sources said that only about 15 or 20 had done so.

The issue in dispute was not clarified. Bill Myers, plant manager for the Cisco facility, which makes noise and air pollution control equipment, was in Dallas and a spokesman at the office said there would be no statement on behalf of the company until he returns, probably Monday.

The plant employs about 70 workers, the office said. According to information given the Press, Delta P employees voted about six months ago to unionize and to let the Plumbers and Pipefitters Local No. 654 of Abilene represent them in negotiations with the management.

No contract has been signed with the union, however, it was explained. Roland Blackstock is business manager of the union and J. B. Jessup of Cisco, and Harce Gibbs of Rising Star were named stewards for the Cisco plant force.

There has been no picketing of the plant as yet but a union spokesman said it would probably start Monday.

now stand upon the shrunken campus of the early day educational institution.

They are Otis Neill of Slaton, a moving force behind a program to designate the site for its historical significance, and George Boyd of Cisco. Mrs. Ira McNeill of Winters, the widow of another member, assisted in unveiling a marker commemorating the team, and its coach, Clinton E. (Shorty) Adams.

Mr. Neill made the dedicatory address. A second and larger marker with a brief history of Scranton Academy, was dedicated in the same ceremony on Sunday, June 6.

Oren Speegle, who also is listed on the roster of the 1915 team, and Ples Ray unveiled the larger marker in ceremonies emceed by Bill Ledbetter and addressed by Mike Collins, Eastland County Historical Committee chairman. County Judge Scott Bailey accepted the marker from the State Historical Commission on behalf of Eastland county.

In his opening remarks Mr. Ledbetter thanked County Commissioner C. E. (Runt) Dill and Judge Bailey for their assistance in providing the markers.

He particularly thanked Mrs. Louise Snoddy, Cisco, a retired school teacher and a former member of the faculty of the Scranton public schools, for her work in re-

searching the records to substantiate the history as told upon the two metal plaques.

The markers are the result of a program set on foot during the 1970 homecoming of Scranton Exes when a committee composed of Mr. Neill as chairman, Miss Snoddy, Mr. Ledbetter and Bob Star, all of Cisco, was named to make an application to the State Historical Committee.

The resulting application, helped along by Mr. Collins, the county chairman, and Mrs. A. L. Murrell, county historical secretary, and fortified by Miss Snoddy's careful research, was promptly approved by the State Historical Committee, and two markers were provided and erected.

The text of the large metal plaque recites that Scranton Academy was organized in 1903 by public subscription to augment the Scranton Public Schools and that it existed until 1917. At one time its enrollment rose to 325 students. Its status was that of a modern high school and it functioned in the state educational set-up and in the youthful Interscholastic League in that rating.

O. C. Britton, who later organized Britton Training School at Cisco, was its president from 1903 to 1908. Among other presidents was J. E. Temple Peters, who later served as manager of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce.

Murder, Assaults Draw Grand Jury Indictments

Violent crime appears to be on the increase in Eastland County as a 91st District Court Grand Jury handed down indictments this week.

One person was indicted for murder with malice and two other persons for assault with attempt to commit murder.

Making up the other ten indictments rendered by the jury which recessed Thursday are one possession of marijuana, one felony hot check, three felony DWI and two felony thefts.

Two kidnapping charges and one assault with attempt murder were no-billed (not indicted).

Peanut growers from Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico will meet in Stephenville, at 9:30 a.m., July 16 for the 1971 Association Annual Meeting. The session will be held in the main auditorium on the campus of Tarleton State College. An impressive array of speakers will cover topics of importance to peanut producers throughout the morning. The meeting will include a complimentary luncheon and "after dinner" speaker. This phase of the program will be held in the college dining hall. Immediately after lunch a session will be held in the student center involving a panel discussion on agricultural pesticides. Attending the meeting in addition to peanut growers will be area peanut shellers, peanut inspection service personnel, county agricultural agents, county A&CS personnel and others interested in the peanut industry.

Lieutenant Governor Barnes June 14 announced that he will be a candidate for Governor of Texas in next year's elections.

Barnes announced his decision as a news conference at the State Capitol. The announcement ended speculation whether Barnes would seek the Governorship or run for the United States Senate.

Barnes, at 34, has more than ten years of experience in public office in Texas. He first won election to the Texas House from De Leon in 1959. He was elected Speaker of the House in January, 1965, and was re-elected to that post in 1967, thus becoming the youngest Speaker in Texas history to serve two consecutive terms.

In his first bid for statewide office Barnes was elected Lt. Governor in November of 1968, and became the first candidate in the history of Texas to poll more than two million votes. He was re-elected to a second term in November of 1970.

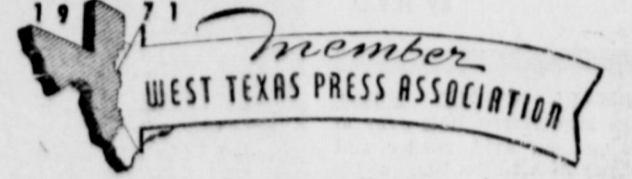

New Program Would Provide Free License Plates For Vets

AUSTIN — Details of a new program which will provide free 1972 automobile license plates to some disabled veterans were revealed today by the Texas Highway Department.

The program was set up by an act of the 62nd Legislature. To qualify, an applicant must:

- Be a Texas resident;
- Be a veteran of the armed forces of the United States;
- Have a disability rating of 70 per cent or more;
- Be drawing compensation from the federal government as the result of service-connected disability.

A qualified veteran is entitled to register one passenger car or light commercial vehicle with a manufacturer's rated carrying capacity of one ton or less for his own use without paying the prescribed registration fee. There is a statutory fee of \$1 which must accompany each application.

Specialty designed license plates will be issued with the letters "DV" appearing as either a prefix or suffix to the license number. The words "Disabled Vet" also will appear on the plates.

Vehicles with Disabled Vet plates will be exempt from paying parking fees charged by any governmental authority other than the federal government. This includes parking meters.

The license plates will not be available until the beginning of the 1972 registration year. The law provides that the disabled veteran must make application by October 1 preceding the registration year for which the plates are requested.

All Disabled Vet plates will be issued directly from the Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department in Austin.

As a prerequisite, the veteran's disability rating must be verified by the Veteran's Administration or the branch of the armed forces from which he draws his disability compensation.

Also, the Texas title to the vehicle must be issued in the name of the veteran.

Application forms and instructions may be secured from the Texas Highway Department, Motor Vehicle Division, 40th and Jackson Aven-

We Are Now 195 Years Young

If a person should ever reach the age of 195, he might be excused for feeling a few aches and pains and getting somewhat crochety. Can the same excuse for complaint be allowed a nation?

When our country was young, it underwent — and survived — severe growing pains. In its middle years, it faced the issue of divorce — and overcame it. Later, it fought off the threat to its body politic from aggressors overseas. Now that we are 195, what ails us and what can we do about it?

It's clear from our history that as a nation, we have often come close to extinction. But we have had the strength to survive. And we have had the good fortune to do more than that. We have had the blessing of a life that flourishes, that fulfills, that grows.

Not often enough, but more than we might expect, we have seen in America not just material plenty but prosperity of the human soul.

Our special blessing has come from leaders who have risen among us when needed to keep us on our forward course. As we turn 195 this July, let us pray for a renewal of the faith they showed to keep us ever growing as a nation — not so much in size as in spirit.

1776

"We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. That secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, that whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect

their Safety and Happiness."

1787

"All legislative Power here-in granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives." "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press, or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances."

1789

"There is no truth more thoroughly established, than that there exists in the economy and course of nature, an indissoluble union between virtue and happiness — between duty and advantage — between the genuine maxims of an honest and magnanimous policy and prosperity and felicity: — Since we ought to be no less persuaded that the propitious smiles of Heaven can never be expected on a nation that disregards the eternal rules of order and right, which Heaven itself has ordained . . ."

1801

"All will bear in mind this sacred principle, that though the will of the majority is in all cases to prevail, that will, to be rightful, must be reasonable; that the minority possess their equal rights, which equal laws would be oppression."

1819

"The Government of the Union is, emphatically, and truly, a government of the people. In form and in substance it emanates from them. Its powers are granted by them, and are to be exercised directly on them, and for their benefit . . . It is the government of all, its powers are delegated by all; it represents all, and acts for all."

1863

"On the first day of January . . . all person held as slaves within any State or designated part of a State, the people whereof shall then be in rebellion against the United States, shall be then, thenceforward, and forever free . . ."

"We here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain — that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom — and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

1910

"The object of government is the welfare of the people. The material progress and prosperity of a nation are desirable chiefly so far as they lead to the moral and material welfare of all good citizens. Just in proportion as the average man and woman are honest, capable of sound judgment and high ideals, active in public affairs — but, first of all, sound in their home life, and the father and mother of healthy children whom they bring up well — just so far, and no farther, we may count our civilization a success."

1918

"What we demand in this war is nothing peculiar to ourselves. It is that the world be made fit and safe to live in; and particularly that it be made safe for every peace-loving nation which, like our own, wishes to live its own life, determine its own institutions, be assured of justice and fair dealing by the other peoples of the world as against force and selfish aggression."

1919

"The ultimate good desired is better reached by free trade in ideas . . . We should be eternally vigilant against attempts to check the expression of opinions that we loathe and believe to be fraught with death, unless they so imminently threaten immediate interference with the lawful and pressing purposes of the law that an immediate check is required to save the country."

1933

"This great nation will endure as it has endured, will revive and will prosper. So, first of all, let me assert my firm belief that the only thing we have to fear is fear itself — nameless, unreasoning, unjustified terror which paralyzes needed efforts to convert retreat into advance. In every dark hour of our national life a leadership of frankness and vigor has met with that understanding and support of the people themselves which is essential to victory."

1943

"American must choose one of three courses after this war: narrow nationalism which inevitably means the ultimate loss of our own liberty; international imperialism, which means the sacrifice of some other nation's lib-

**ORDINANCE No. 423
INDUSTRIAL
WASTE ORDINANCE**
AN ORDINANCE BY THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS, REGULATING THE USE OF PUBLIC AND PRIVATE SEWERS AND DRAINS AND THE DISCHARGE OF WATERS AND WASTES INTO THE PUBLIC SEWER SYSTEM; PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS THEREOF; PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE, AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS:

**ARTICLE I
Definitions**
Unless the context specifically indicates otherwise, the meaning of terms used in this ordinance shall be as follows:

Section 101. "City" shall mean the City of Eastland, Texas.
Section 102. "City Manager" shall mean the City Manager of the City of Eastland, Texas, or his authorized deputy, agent, or representative.

Section 103. "Director" shall mean the Director of Water and Sewer of the City of Eastland, or his authorized deputy, agent, or representative.

Section 104. "Sewage Works" shall mean all facilities for collecting, pumping, treating, and disposing of sewage.

Section 105. "Sewage" shall mean a combination of the water-carried wastes from residences, business buildings, institutions, industrial establishments, together with such ground, surface, and storm waters as may be present.

Section 106. "Sewer" shall mean a pipe or conduit for carrying sewage.

Section 107. "Public Sewer" shall mean a sewer in which all owners of abutting properties have equal rights, and is controlled by public authority.

Section 108. "Sanitary Sewer" shall mean a sewer which carries sewage and to which storm, surface, and ground waters are not intentionally admitted.

Section 109. "Storm Sewer" or "Storm Drain" shall mean a sewer which carries storm and surface waters and drainage, but excludes sewage and polluted industrial wastes.

Section 110. "Sewage Treatment Plant" shall mean an arrangement of devices and structures used for treating sewage.

Section 111. "Industrial Wastes" shall mean the liquid wastes from industrial processes as distinct from sanitary sewage.

Section 112. "Garbage" shall mean solid wastes from the preparation, cooking, and dispensing food, and from the handling, storage, and sale of produce.

Section 113. "Properly Shredded Garbage" shall mean the wastes from the preparation, cooking, and dispensing of food that have been shredded to such degree that all particles will be carried freely under the flow conditions normally prevailing in public sewers, with no particle greater than 1/2 inch in any dimension.

Section 114. "Building Drain" shall mean that part of the lowest horizontal piping which receives the discharge from soil, waste, and other drainage pipes inside the walls of the building and conveys it to the building sewer, beginning 3 feet outside the inner face of the building wall.

Section 115. "Building Sewer" shall mean the extension from the building drain to the public sewer or other place of disposal.

Section 116. "B. O. D." (denoting Biochemical Oxygen Demand) shall mean the quantity of oxygen utilized in the biochemical oxidation of organic matter under a standard laboratory procedure in 5 days at 20 degrees C, expressed in parts per million by weight.

Section 117. "pH" shall mean the logarithm of the reciprocal of the weight of hydrogen ions in grams per liter of solution.

Section 118. "Suspended Solids" shall mean solids that either float on the surface, or are in suspension in water, sewage, or other liquids; and which are removable by laboratory filtering.

Section 119. "Natural Outlet" shall mean any outlet into a watercourse, pond, ditch, lake or other body of surface or ground water.

continuously or intermittently.
Section 121. "Person" shall mean any individual, firm, company, association, society, corporation or group.
Section 122. "Shall" is mandatory; "May" is permissive.

**ARTICLE II
Director of Water and Sewer**
Section 201. The City Manager of Eastland shall appoint a Director of Water and Sewer, and such assistants as the City Manager may determine to be necessary, and it shall be the duty of the Director to see that certain provisions of this Ordinance as pertaining to the Use of Public Sewers are carried out; to determine if the sewage collected by the sewer collection system is treatable; and to supervise the treatment of the sewage.

**ARTICLE III
Use of the Public Sewers**
Section 301. No person shall discharge or cause to be discharged any storm water, surface water, ground water, roof runoff, subsurface drainage or unpolluted industrial process waters to any sanitary sewer.

Section 302. Storm water and all other unpolluted drainage shall be discharged to such sewers as are specifically designated as storm sewers, or a natural outlet approved by the City Manager, to a storm sewer, or natural outlet, or into the sanitary sewer system upon prior written approval of the City Manager or Director.

Section 303. In cases where, and in the opinion of the Director, the character of the sewage from any manufacturer or industrial plant, building or other premises is such that it will damage the system or cannot be treated satisfactorily in the system, the City Manager shall have the right to require such user to dispose of such waste otherwise, and prevent it from entering the system.

Except as hereinafter provided, no person shall discharge or cause to be discharged into the sewer or drainage system of the City, directly or indirectly, any of the following described matters, water or wastes:
(a) Any liquid or vapor having a temperature higher than 150 degrees F.
(b) Any water or waste, which may contain more than one hundred (100) parts per million, by weight, or fat, oil or grease.

(c) Any gasoline, benzene, naphtha, fuel oil or other flammable or explosive liquid, solid or gas.
(d) Any garbage that has not been properly shredded.

(e) Any ashes, cinders, sand, mud, straw, shavings, metal, glass, rags, feathers, tar, plastics, wood, paunch manure, or other solid or viscous substances capable of causing obstruction to the flow in sewers or other interference with the proper operation of the sewage works.

(f) Any wastes or waters containing suspended or dissolved solids of such character and quantity that unusual attention or expense is required to handle such materials at the sewage treatment plant or in the public sewage nuisance.

(g) Any waters or wastes having a pH lower than 5.5 or higher than 10.0 or having any other corrosive property capable of causing damage or hazard to structures, equipment, and personnel of the sewage works.

(h) Any water or wastes containing a toxic or poisonous substance such as plating or heat treating wastes in sufficient quantity to injure or interfere with any sewage treatment process, to constitute a hazard to humans or animals, or to create any hazard in the receiving waters of the sewage treatment plant.

Section 309. When required by the Director, the owner of any property served by a building sewer carrying industrial wastes shall install a suitable control manhole in the building sewer to facilitate observation, sampling and measurement of the wastes. Such manhole, when required, shall be accessibly and safely located, and shall be constructed in accordance with plans approved by the City Manager. The manhole shall be installed by the owner at his expense, and shall be maintained by him so as to be safe and accessible at all times.

Section 310. All measurements, tests, and analyses of the characteristics of waters and wastes to which reference is made in Section 303 and 307 shall be determined in accordance with "Standard Methods for the Examination of Water and Sewage", and shall be determined at the control manhole provided for in Section 309 or upon suitable samples taken at said control manhole. In the event that no special manhole has been required, the control manhole shall be considered to be nearest downstream manhole in the public sewer to the point at which the building sewer is connected.

Section 311. No statement contained in this article shall be construed as preventing

Section 304. Where the operation of a person, firm or corporation entails the discharge of water or wastes containing toxic or poisonous substances, a written statement on a standard form provided by the City Manager setting forth the nature of the operation contemplated or presently carried on shall be filed with the City Manager. The statement shall contain the amount of water which will be used and its source, the proposed point of discharge of acid wastes into the sewage system of the City, the estimated amount so to be discharged, and a fair statement setting forth the expected bacterial, physical, chemical, and other known characteristics of said wastes.

Within 30 days of receipt of such statement, it shall be the duty of the City Manager to make an order stating such minimum restrictions as in the judgment of the Director may be necessary to guard adequately against unlawful uses of the City's Sewage Works.

Section 305. Grease, oil, and sand interceptors shall be provided for the proper handling of liquid wastes containing grease in excessive amounts, or any flammable wastes, sand, and other harmful ingredients; except that such interceptors shall not be required for private living quarters or dwelling units. All interceptors shall be of a type and capacity approved by the City Manager and shall be located as to be readily and easily accessible for cleaning and inspections.

Grease and oil interceptors shall be constructed of impervious materials capable of withstanding abrupt and extreme changes in temperature. They shall be of substantial construction, watertight, and equipped with easily removable covers which when bolted in place shall be gas-tight and watertight.

any agreement or arrangement between the City and any industry concern where an industrial waste of unusual strength or character may be accepted by the City for treatment, subject payment therefor by the industrial concern for any portion of the excess cost to the City of handling and treating such industrial wastes, as may be established by the City Council.

**ARTICLE IV
Protection from Damage**
Section 401. No authorized person shall maliciously, willfully, or negligently break, damage, uncover, deface or tamper with any structure, appurtenance, or equipment which is a part of the municipal sewage works. Any person violating this provision shall be subject to immediate arrest under charge of disorderly conduct.

**ARTICLE V
Powers and Authority of Enforcing Agents**

Section 501. The City Manager and other duly authorized employees of the City bearing proper credentials and identifications shall be permitted to enter upon all properties for the purposes of inspection, observation, measurement, sampling, and testing, in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance.

**ARTICLE VI
Penalties**

Section 601. Any person found to be violating any provision of this ordinance except Section 401 shall be served by the City with written notice stating the nature of the violation and providing a reasonable time limit for the satisfactory correction thereof. The offender shall, within the period of time stated in such notice, permanently cease all violations; if the offender continues violation after the expiration of the time stated, the City Manager may prohibit the further use of the sewage system by the offender and may remove or close the offender's sewage and water connections.

Section 602. Any person who shall continue any violation beyond the time limit provided for in Section 601 shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in an amount not exceeding One Hundred (100.00) Dollars for each violation. Each day in which any such violation shall continue shall be deemed a separate offense.

Section 603. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall become liable to the City for any expense, loss, or damage occasioned by the City by reason of such violation.

**ARTICLE VII
Validity**

Section 701. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 702. The invalidity of any section, clause, sentence, or provision of this ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other part of this ordinance which can be given effect without invalid part or parts.

**ARTICLE VIII
Effective Date**

Section 801. In view of the fact that this ordinance is necessary for the immediate protection and preservation of the public health, safety and general welfare, it becomes necessary that this ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately from and after its passage and it is accordingly so ordained.
