Jury Verdict Is Returned Late Tuesday

A jury in 91st District Court at Eastland Tuesday afternoon found James Richard Sikes, Brownwood country singer, guilty of the firearms robbery of the First State Bank in Rising Star in a verdict returned about 4:25 p. m. and then took about 40 minutes to assess a penalty of 50 years in the state penitentiary.

The case is a companion to that of Thomas Dwight Jenkins, also of Brownwood, who was convicted in the same court in May 27 of armed robbery and likewise given a 50-year term.

The jury received the case after arguments of opposing counsel which began about 3 p. m. following delivery of the charge to the panel by District Judge Earl Conner, Jr., at 2:40 p. m.

It returned a verdict of guilty about 4:25 and then retired to decide on the penalty which Foreman Carl Garrett, Jr., reported at 5:18 p. m.

Both sides rested their cases shortly after noon and Judge Conner recessed court usual 2:40 to prepare the charge.

Sikes is accused of taking about \$9,200 from the bank in a holdup in which four men are accused of participating. Three of the men were directly involved.

The case was called for hearing in 91st district court Monday morning and most of the day was occupied in the selection of a jury which was completed about mid-afternoon.

About an hour of testimony was taken Monday afternoon. In that hour District Attorney Emory Walton placed Texas Ranger H. K. Block and Bank President James A. Kutherford on the stand.

Texas Ranger H. R. Block testified that he investigated the robbery on the day of the holdup and after interviewing all employees and customers in the bank, established the general description of the three men involved.

Rutherford, the second witness, did not positively identify Sikes as being one of the men he saw in the bank however.

Other state's witnesses appearing Tuesday included Mrs. Bruce Harris who told of being forced into the bank when she opened the door and discovered the robbery in progress.

Venue Change To Be Sought In Creel Case

A hearing on a motion for a change of venue in the James Duke Creel, Abilene airman charged in a rape slaying of an Abilene girl, is set for hearing in the 91st district court at Eastland at 9:30 Thursday morning.

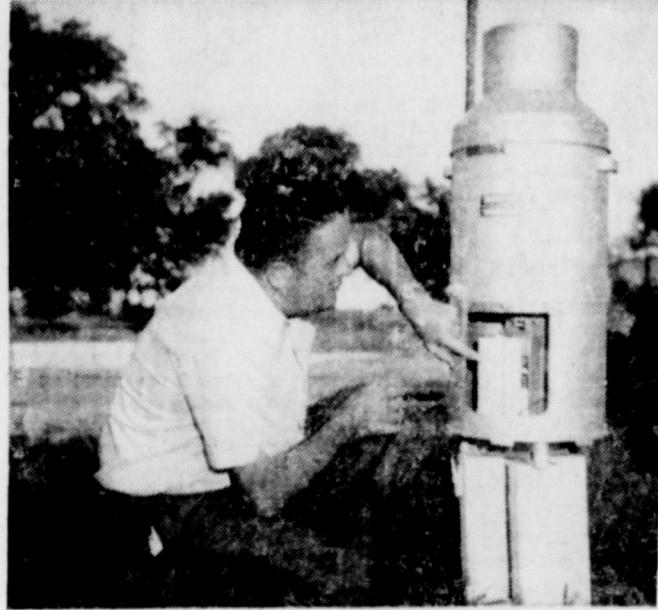
The case was transferred to Eastland county on a change of venue from Taylor, but the defense has asked a further change contending that the case has been so publicized in the county by Abilene news media that a fair trial is not possible.

District Atty Emory Walton has summoned a number of county witnesses in an effort to show that an unprejudiced jury can be obtained here.

2 Rain Gauges Measure It Bureau Accurately

Here in Eastland, the National Weather Service has two official gauges, both installed side-by-side at 606 S. Lamar Street.

There is a purpose for having two gauges, inasmuch as one acts as a "check" upon the other, for accuracy sake.

One gauge, a recording type, shown in the accompanying picture is composed of many different parts, all very carefully calibrated at regular intervals by a service man for the weather service. As can be seen in the picture, access to the clock cylinder, and seven day chart, can be gained through the small door on the front. This gauge will accurately measure a total of twelve inches of rain, with the chart giving the exact time, down to the minute, that the rain began and quit.

However, should this gauge not register, for some reason or another, then the standard twenty inch gauge, not shown in the picture, would be available to make accurate measurements. The rainfall

JR. RODEO POSTPONED

The first annual Eastland County Junior Rodeo which was scheduled for Thursday, Friday and Saturday night at the Ranger Jaycee Rodeo arena has been postponed due to the spread of encephalomyelitis and the government's restrictions on the movement of horses.

The camp directors have already registered over 200 people and more are pouring in each day. The largest crowd is to be expected this coming Saturday and Sunday.

The Reverend James R. Diggins is camp evangelist. He has pastored churches throughout the United States: Colorado, Ohio, Michigan, and is now full time evangelist which leads him anywhere the Lord may call.

Activities for the camp made up a full daily schedule: the Women's Missionary Society meets each morning at 10:00, the youth find a most enjoyable time when they swim at 1:30 each afternoon, the entire camp takes part in a "Praise Service" held at 2:45 until 3:45 (Clearance Todd leads this special service), then choir rehearsals begin at 6:30 with Charles Stanely as their director, and all these activities lead up to the one big general service at 7:30 in the evenings of which James Curtis is chairman and director.

The camp has undergone some very nice changes and changes are still being made.

John Ryan Is Installed As New Rotary Prexy

The Eastland Rotary Club met Monday at the White Elephant for the regular noon meal and meeting.

The first act of business was the installation of the new officers. Those installed to serve were as follows: John Ryan - president; Saul Pullman - vice president, and Buddy Carter - secretary-treasurer.

Dr. Bob Moreton made a presentation of slides and a film covering the Texas Rehabilitation Acts Program of rehabilitation cancer patients at the University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital in Houston where Dr. Moreton is chief of research and development section. The program included statistics and four case histories.

The Rotary meeting was adjourned by the new president, John Ryan.

The rodeo was to begin Thursday night with young cowboys and cowgirls from throughout the state participating in several events. Wednesday morning some 214 entries had signed to ride in the rodeo.

Eastland County Livestock Raisers' Association is sponsoring the rodeo. A new date for the rodeo has not been set, according to word from an official of the sponsoring organization.

When the rodeo is held all proceeds will go to county FFA and 4-H Clubs for prizes to be given at their annual livestock show.

The junior rodeo has been approved by the West Texas Junior Rodeo Association.

Vaccination Clinic for Horses Set

Vaccination of horses in the Ranger area against a rapidly spreading strain of "sleeping sickness" will be available by week-end, Lt. John Foster, Ranger veterinarian said Wednesday.

Under the embargo imposed upon Texas horses by the U. S. Department of Agriculture in an effort to halt spread of the disease all home quartered horses must stay in stable and no horses can be moved from one county to another.

The vaccination clinic will be conducted in Ranger as soon as the vaccine is available, Dr. Foster said. A vaccination charge of \$3 will be made and details of the clinic will be announced as soon as possible.

The quarantine imposed by the USDA has caused cancellation of rodeos in the area including the Eastland County Junior Rodeo here, the Breckenridge Jaycee Rodeo and a rodeo at Stephenville. There was no announcement concerning the Rising Star weekly rodeo but it was more than likely that this, too, has been cancelled for the duration.

U. S. Sen. John Tower, R-Tex., said the Agriculture Department-imposed embargo also means that horses cannot be transported from one county to another and that horses cannot be shipped out of the state.

"These measures should be effective in the control of this disease," Sen. Tower said in a telephone statement.

Announcements concerning increased efforts came not long after a spokesman for the Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis (VEE) task force said the number of suspected cases of VEE in Texas horses had passed the 100 mark.

The spokesman said about 90 per cent of those horses had "clinically observed" symptoms of VEE and that the disease has apparently spread to nine South Texas counties. The counties are Matagorda, Refugio, Calhoun, San Patricio, Aransas, Nueces, Cameron, Hidalgo and Starr. There were reports of encephalitis symptoms in horses in Harris County, but they remained unconfirmed, the spokesman said.

LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE No. 423
INDUSTRIAL
WASTE ORDINANCE BY THE
CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS,
REGULATING THE USE OF
PUBLIC AND PRIVATE
SEWERS AND DRAINS AND
THE DISCHARGE OF WATERS
AND WASTES INTO THE
PUBLIC SEWER SYSTEM;
PROVIDING PENALTIES
FOR VIOLATIONS THEREOF;
PROVIDING A SAVINGS
CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING
AN EFFECTIVE DATE:
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE
CITY COUNCIL OF THE
CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS:

ARTICLE I
Definitions
Unless the context specifically indicates otherwise, the meaning of terms used in this ordinance shall be as follows:

Section 101. "City" shall mean the City of Eastland, Texas.
Section 102. "City Manager" shall mean the City Manager of the City of Eastland, Texas, or his authorized deputy, agent, or representative.
Section 103. "Director" shall mean the Director of Water and Sewer of the City of Eastland, or his authorized deputy, agent, or representative.

Section 104. "Sewage Works" shall mean all facilities for collecting, pumping, treating, and disposing of sewage.
Section 105. "Sewage" shall mean a combination of the water-carried wastes from residences, business buildings, institutions, industrial establishments, together with such ground, surface, and storm waters as may be present.
Section 106. "Sewer" shall mean a pipe or conduit for carrying sewage.
Section 107. "Public Sewer" shall mean a sewer in which all owners of abutting properties have equal rights, and is controlled by public authority.

Section 108. "Sanitary Sewer" shall mean a sewer which carries sewage and to which storm, surface, and ground waters are not intentionally admitted.
Section 109. "Storm Sewer" or "Storm Drain" shall mean a sewer which carries storm and surface waters and drainage, but excludes sewage and polluted industrial wastes.
Section 110. "Sewage Treatment Plant" shall mean an arrangement of devices and structures used for treating sewage.

Section 111. "Industrial Wastes" shall mean the liquid wastes from industrial processes as distinct from sanitary sewage.
Section 112. "Garbage" shall mean solid wastes from the preparation, cooking, and dispensing food, and from the handling, storage, and sale of produce.

Section 113. "Properly Shredded Garbage" shall mean the waste from the preparation, cooking, and dispensing of food that have been shredded to such degree that all particles will be carried freely under the flow conditions normally prevailing in public sewers, with no particle greater than 1/2 inch in any dimension.
Section 114. "Building Drain" shall mean that part of the lowest horizontal piping of a drainage system which receives the discharge from soil, waste, and other drainage pipes inside the walls of the building and conveys it to the building sewer, beginning 3 feet outside the inner face of the building wall.

Section 115. "Building Sewer" shall mean the extension from the building drain to the public sewer or other place of disposal.
Section 116. "B. O. D." (denoting Biochemical Oxygen Demand) shall mean the quantity of oxygen utilized in the biochemical oxidation of organic matter under a standard laboratory procedure in 5 days at 20 degrees C, expressed in parts per million by weight.

Section 117. "pH" shall mean the logarithm of the reciprocal of the weight of hydrogen ions in grams per liter of solution.
Section 118. "Suspended Solids" shall mean solids that either float on the surface, or are in suspension in water, sewage, or other liquids; and which are removable by laboratory filtering.

Section 119. "Natural Outlet" shall mean any outlet into a watercourse, pond, ditch, lake or other body of surface or ground water.
Section 120. "Watercourse" shall mean a channel in which a flow of water occurs, either continuously or intermittently.

Section 121. "Person" shall mean any individual, firm, company, association, society, corporation or group.
Section 122. "Shall" is mandatory; "May" is permissive.

ARTICLE II
Director of Water and Sewer
Section 201. The City Manager of Eastland shall appoint a Director of Water and Sewer, and such assistants as the City Manager may determine to be necessary, and it shall be the duty of the Director to see that certain provisions of this Ordinance as pertaining to the Use of Public Sewers are carried out; to determine if the sewage collected by the sewer collection system is treatable; and to supervise the treatment of the sewage.

ARTICLE III
Use of the Public Sewers
Section 301. No person shall discharge or cause to be discharged any storm water, surface water, ground water, root runoff, subsurface drainage or unpolluted industrial process waters into any sanitary sewer.
Section 302. Storm water and all other unpolluted drainage shall be discharged to such sewers as are specifically designated as storm sewers, or a natural outlet approved by the City Manager. Unpolluted process waters may be discharged, upon approval of the City Manager, to a storm sewer, or natural outlet, or into the sanitary sewer system upon prior written approval of the City Manager or Director.

Section 303. In cases where, and in the opinion of the Director, the character of the sewage from any manufacturer or industrial plant, building or other premises is such that it will damage the system or cannot be treated satisfactorily in the system, the City Manager shall have the right to require such user to dispose of such waste otherwise, and prevent it from entering the system.
Except as hereinafter provided, no person shall discharge or cause to be discharged into the sewer or drainage system of the City, directly or indirectly, any of the following described matters, water or wastes:
(a) Any liquid or vapor having a temperature higher than 150 degrees F.
(b) Any water or waste, which may contain more than one hundred (100) parts per million, by weight, of fat, oil or grease.
(c) Any gasoline, benzene, naphtha, fuel oil or other flammable or explosive liquid, solid or gas.
(d) Any garbage that has not been properly shredded.
(e) Any ashes, cinders, sand, mud, straw, shavings, metal, glass, rags, feathers, tar, plastics, wood, paunch manure, or other solid or viscous substances capable of causing obstruction to the flow in sewers or other interference with the proper operation of the sewage works.
(f) Any wastes or waters containing suspended or dissolved solids of such character and quantity that unusual attention or expense is required to handle such materials at the sewage treatment plant or in the public sewage nuisance.

(g) Any waters or wastes having a pH lower than 5.5 or higher than 10.0 or having any other corrosive property capable of causing damage or hazard to structures, equipment, and personnel of the sewage works.
(h) Any water or wastes containing a toxic or poisonous substance such as plating or heat treating wastes, in sufficient quantity to injure or interfere with any sewage treatment process, to constitute a hazard to humans or animals, or to create any hazard in the receiving waters of the sewage treatment plant.

(t) any radioactive wastes greater than allowable releases as specified by current United States Bureau of Standards Handbook dealing with the handling and releases of radioactivity.
*Note: All quantities are in mg.-l. (i) thru (s).
Section 304. Where the operation of a person, firm or corporation entails the discharge of water or wastes containing toxic or poisonous substances, a written statement on a standard form provided by the City Manager setting forth the nature of the operation contemplated or presently carried on shall be filed with the City Manager. The statement shall contain the amount of water which will be used and its source, the proposed point of discharge of acid wastes into the sewage system of the City, the estimated amount to be discharged, and a fair statement setting forth the expected bacterial, physical, chemical, and other known characteristics of said wastes.

Within 30 days of receipt of such statement, it shall be the duty of the City Manager to make an order stating such minimum restrictions as in the judgment of the Director may be necessary to guard adequately against unlawful uses of the City's Sewage Works.
Section 305. Grease, oil, and sand interceptors shall be provided for the proper handling of liquid wastes containing grease in excessive amounts, or any flammable wastes, sand, and other harmful ingredients; except that such interceptors shall not be required for private living quarters or dwelling units. All interceptors shall be of a type and capacity approved by the City Manager.

Section 306. Where installed, all grease, oil and sand interceptors shall be maintained by the owner, at his expense, in continuously efficient operation at all times.
Section 307. The admission into the public sewers of any waters or wastes having (a) a five day Biochemical Oxygen Demand greater than 300 parts per million by weight, or (b) containing more than 400 parts per million by weight of suspended solids, or (c) containing any quantity of substances having the characteristics described in Section 303 or (d) having an average daily flow greater than 5 percent of the average daily sewage flow of the City, shall be subject to the review and approval of the Director. Where necessary in the opinion of the Director, the owner shall provide, at his expense such preliminary treatment as may be necessary to (a) reduce the Biochemical Oxygen Demand to 300 parts per million and the suspended solids to 400 parts per million by weight, or (b) reduce objectionable characteristics or constituents to within the maximum limits provided for in Section 305, or (c) control the quantities and rates of discharge of such waters or wastes, rags, speculations, and any other pertinent information relating to proposed preliminary treatment facilities shall be submitted for the approval of the Director, and no construction of such facilities shall be commenced until said approvals are obtained in writing.

Section 308. Where preliminary treatment facilities are provided for any waters or wastes, they shall be maintained continuously in satisfactory and effective operation, by the owner at his expense.
Section 309. When required by the Director, the owner of any property served by a building sewer carrying industrial wastes shall install a suitable control manhole in the building sewer to facilitate observation, sampling and measurement of the wastes. Such manhole, when required, shall be accessibly and safely located, and shall be constructed in accordance with plans approved by the City Manager. The manhole shall be installed by the owner at his expense, and shall be maintained by him so as to be safe and accessible at all times.
Section 310. All measurements, tests, and analyses of the characteristics of waters and wastes to which reference is made in Section 303 and 307 shall be determined in accordance with "Standard Methods for the Examination of Water and Sewage", and shall be determined at the control manhole provided for in Section 309 or upon suitable samples taken at said control manhole. 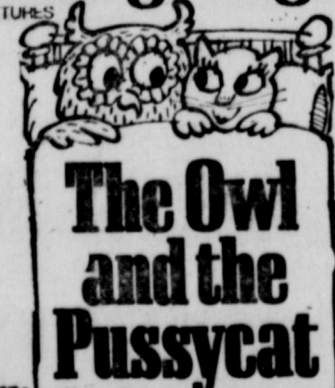

As Strike Hits Western

The Cisco office of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company was the only office in the Cisco district affected Wednesday by the strike of the Communications Workers of America.

John McGowan, district manager explained, that company operations employes in the office have refused to cross picket lines established here by employes of the Western Electric Company, suppliers to Southwestern Bell, and the company against which the strike is directed. Cisco is the only office where a unit of the Western Electric Company is located in the district.

In the absence of regular operations workers for the Bell company here, management personnel has taken over the operation of the switch-

boards, the business office and the repair and installation departments were maintaining service in all departments Wednesday.

McGowan said, however, that unless a settlement of the strike is effected by Monday the effects of the walkout will spread to other offices in the district.

"The present strike of the Communications Workers of America is against the Western Electric Company — not Southwestern Bell," said Mr. McGowan in a statement explaining the measures taken to insure that telephone service will continue on a limited but effective basis during the indefinite period of the strike, and asking the public cooperation in the emergency.

"The contract between Southwestern Bell and the union remains in effect and negotiations between company and union are still in progress.

"We regret that the C W A has seen fit to take this action against the public interest. We don't want a strike and we know the public doesn't want a strike.

However, we do have pickets at several locations, resulting in some work stoppage. Meanwhile, the company is doing everything possible to see that the public continues to receive good telephone service. Switchboards are being manned and vital equipment is being maintained.

"Local calls and customer-distilled Long Distance calls are being served through pretty much as usual.

"We think we can continue to give customers good service and speed their calls through if they will:

"1. Dial their own local and Long Distance calls.

"2. Look up numbers in their directory, rather than calling the Directory Assistance operator.

"3. Delay move or installation requests until the work stoppage is over.

"Callers who require the assistance of an operator may encounter some delays. Often a man may answer. He will do everything possible to complete the calls, though it may take a little longer than usual.

McGowan said it would be helpful if customers with bills to pay would drop them in the night slot at the office or mail them.

"However, if it is necessary to come to the business office, the office will be open Monday through Friday from 9 a. m. to 12 noon and 2 p. m. to 4 p. m.," he said.

All repair calls will be worked, he said. But calls for changing or installing equipment will be on a "first come, first serve" basis.

The local office had a force of management personnel on duty at 6 a. m. here Wednesday when the strike began for the purpose of manning the switchboards and accepting calls.

Manning the various services in the Cisco office Wednesday were Mr. McGowan, district manager; Mrs. Thelma Mills, chief operator, and Mrs. Joan Wastley, assistant chief operator, plus some people moved in from Mineral Wells and other offices.

IT HAS BEEN

When oil flowed in golden streams from sandy land farms, dry pastures and rocky hillsides, during the early twenties, money was also flowing in streams from the pockets of young and old, rich and poor.

People rushed to and fro seeking things they had never been able to buy before, ranging from bric-a-brac to Cadillac and luxurious homes and furnishings.

There were law abiding citizens and bad ones. Among the oil boom celebrities in this section was a tall, wiry, smooth-shaven attorney with a high-pitched voice by the name of L. H. Flewellan. He had served in World War I and came to Ranger at the peak of the oil boom and became judge of the city court.

He was shrewd, aggressive and somewhat of an innovator, and he soon was dubbed "The Law East of the Pecos." His most celebrated corporation case was one in which he fined a man, accused of murder, the sum of seventy-five dollars.

There was a brawl between two men in a dance hall. One man drew a knife and stabbed the other man and walked slowly around him.

The knife wielder was arrested and placed in the city jail. Several days passed and the prisoner's lawyer protested that his client was being deprived of his liberty according to rulings of the Supreme Court. After investigation it was ruled that the slayer had killed his victim in self defense.

The prisoner was brought before the judge and told to stand up. In a stern voice the Judge said "You can't come into our peaceful community, and strike down one of our citizens without feeling the hand of the law. I fine you seventy five dollars and if you ever kill another man I'll fine you the full limit of the law, \$200 and costs."

There was the time when he issued an injunction. Injunctions are not unusual; district judges often issued them. But not judges of the city court.

It happened after a policeman rushed into the judge's office to report that a merchant who owed the city of Ranger \$200 in back taxes was preparing to move to another county.

"Well," said Judge Flewellan, you had better go to the courthouse at Eastland and get an injunction restraining him from moving his stock of goods until he pays the delinquent taxes."

The officer protested that by the time he could drive to Eastland over the rough, muddy roads, secure an injunction and return to Ranger the merchant would be gone for he had all of his merchandise on a truck.

"In that case," said the corporation judge, "it looks as if I'll have to issue the injunction myself." And he drew up a high sounding document, fortified with legal phraseology, and signed it T. H. Flewellan, Judge of the Corporation Court.

Ranger had been incorporated such a short time that the municipal seal had not arrived and so make the document look as impressive as possible, he added "Notary Public" and affixed the notary seal.

Judge Flewellan was a colorful person in many respects and he served with distinction in many local capacities in his state and area. He once presided over the Supreme Court of Texas by special appointment.

As an attorney his most celebrated case was that of Robert Hill, a member of the famous Santa Claus bank robbery gang. He was appointed by the court to represent Hill with out pay and made such a good fight that Hill escaped with a life sentence, the outcome of the case when did not see the penalty of death. Outside of his role as a lawyer he was prominent in church circles and civic affairs. He served on the City

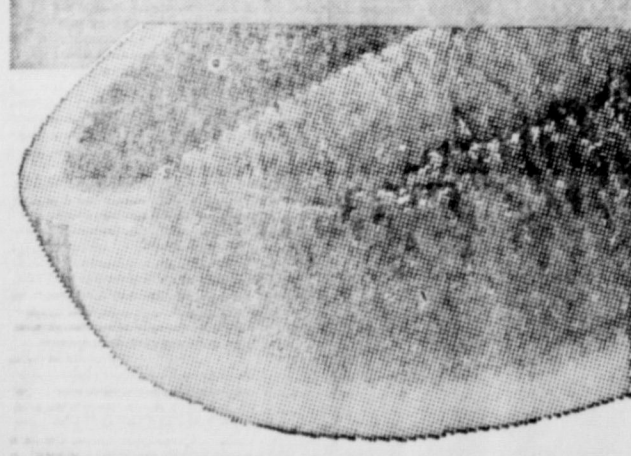
