## Arlington Mayor To Be Speaker for Chamber Event

Mayor Tom Vandergriff of Arlington will be the featured speaker for the Annual Eastland Chamber of Commerce Banquet to be held Thursday, Jan. 14 at the Eastland Elementary School Cafeteria.

Tickets are now on sale. Mr. Vandergriff was born at Carrollton, Tex. and educated in the public schools there and in Arlington. He attended Northwestern University, Southern Methodist University and the University of Southern California, gaining his degree from the last named institution.

Mr. Vandergriff is associated with his father, W. T. Vandergriff, in Vandergriff Enterprises. The firm operates Chevrolet dealerships in Arlington and Carrollton and the Buick dealership in Arlington, as well as a number of other related activities.

Mr. Vandergriff is serving his twentieth year as Mayor of Arlington. He has been Chairman of the Tarrant County Convention Center Board during the planning, construction and operations to date of that giant facility. He is past President of the Tarrant County United Fund and Chairman of the Board of Arlington Memorial Hospital. A former President of the Arlington Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Vandergriff is still a Director of that organization. He was the first President of the North Central Texas Council of Governments and served as a member of President Johnson's National Commission on Urban Problems. He is Chairman of Governor Smith's Texas Urban Development Commission.

Honors bestowed upon Mr. Vandergriff in the past include Arlington's "Citizens of the Year" award and the Distinguished Service Citation of the University of Texas at Arlington. He was once recognized by the Texas Jaycees as one of the "Five Most Outstanding Young Men in Texas."

Under Mr. Vandergriff's leadership, the City of Arlington is presently involved in a most ambitious effort to develop one of the nation's leading summertime recreation and sports centers. Alongside the leading single tourist attraction in Texas, Six Flags, the City of Arlington is expanding Turnpike Stadium, in the hope of attracting Major League Baseball to the region, and constructing Seven Seas, which is to be the country's largest sea life park.

## CofC Directors Re-Organize, Discuss IH-20 Billboarding Plans

Reorganization of the Chamber of Commerce leadership for the new year, and a "brass tacks" discussion of billboards occupied directors at their last monthly meeting this week.

Retiring President Ben McKinnis presided at the White Elephant Restaurant luncheon meeting Thursday.

These new directors have been elected by the membership in a recent balloting: R. P. Haun, Saul Pullman, M. H. Perry, Monroe Rollins, Wade Freeman and J. T. Carter.

The recommendation of the nominating committee was unanimously approved by the directors and these will head the chamber work in 1971:

Jeff Glazner, president; Marcus O'Dell, first vice president; and Nolan DeFord, second vice president.

A representative of the Martin Sign Co. of Sweetwater appeared and showed a preliminary sketch of a proposed billboard for Eastland. The chamber has a billboard fund into which it has been putting money for several years, and with the re-routing of traffic onto Int. 20 expected "possibly" next fall, the chamber directors want to get signs up in time to help condition tourists to come into Eastland.

Resident Highway Engineer Haun also present and showed maps of proposed highway signing and discussed the highway routing. He suggested that the nine-mile stretch of divided highway between Cisco and Eastland, which will remain designed Highway 80, might be a good topic to exploit in signs.

Reasoning is that cross-country travelers look for good, safe, and generally slower, routes, off the interstate network, for relaxation, and the Eastland-Cisco route qualifies, because it offers a break from the faster freeway driving.

Haun stated that the county road exit, a recently added route from Int. 20 onto Highway 80, between Eastland and Cisco, will not be signed as an Eastland exit, but that it will be another opportunity for travelers to get off the freeway and come into the area.

It was agreed among the directors that Cisco and Eastland should work together on exploiting this nine-mile stretch, reasoning that any traffic that gets off Int. 20, east of Eastland, will likely travel to west of Cisco on Highway 80, before getting back onto the freeway, and by the same token, any traffic that gets off west of Cisco, will probably come all the way on 80, to east of Eastland.

The billboard sketch presented prominently displayed Old Rip, and it was agreed that Old Rip "speaks" loudly for Eastland, and should be included in billboard advertising. Directors further discussed the possibility of having the famous frog taken out of the courthouse lobby and placed in a safe, convenient display outside where travelers could see him any hour of the day or night. Details are to be worked out.

The sign company man presented cost figures on billboards as follows:

Under a lease program, the company will furnish site, a 10 by 40 foot sign and maintain it for \$72 per month per sign, on a three year contract. The chamber would be responsible for providing electricity for such a sign. The company would provide insurance.

On an out-right purchase

plan, the company will build at the rate of \$4.75 per square foot, with the chamber providing site, insurance, maintenance, and electricity.

A maintenance contract could be bought from the company at \$25 per sign per month.

The lease cost figures out to be some 18 cents per square foot.

The chamber directors are considering two major signs, one east and one west, and possibly minor signs, one on Highway 6 south of town, and perhaps another at the county-road cut off west of Eastland, to condition driver's to start slowing down for the next Eastland turnoff.

It would not benefit the chamber, tax-wise, to go the

lease route for write-off purposes, it was decided because of the chamber's non-profit capacity.

Haun explained that the highway department traditionally waits until after the highway is open and its known how and where these facilities will be located. There's generally a lot of re-locating as the freeways open.

It was estimated that electricity cost might run from \$10 to \$14 per month per sign, and these lights could be timed to best take advantage of daylight.

Asked about "overhead" signs, Haun explained that the department uses the overheads only when there are three routes available. The

major highway department signs to be erected for Eastland will be "US 80 - Eastland," to be on one sign to be erected east of town, and "Eastland-Gorman" to be erected west of town.

The Chamber board emphasized that suggestions and ideas, particular on copy for the billboards will be welcome from citizens beginning immediately, and the new officers and directors encouraged local residents to offer any help possible in helping get the best signs available to benefit from highway traffic.

## WHAT'S RIGHT WITH AMERICA

Some of us are getting a little tired of all the emphasis on what's wrong with America.

Certainly, this country is not without fault; and it is right and proper that a great and free people should know its faults and seek to mend them.

But, if the left-wing broadcasters and the liberal press had their way, Americans would conclude that all public officials are corrupt; that war is being prolonged by greedy, profiteering industrialists; that rioting and anarchy are in control; that we are waging an aggressive war against a poor, defenseless people; that dope addiction and alcoholism are universal; that racial discrimination and poverty have made us a third-rate nation, utterly incapable of world leadership; in short, that the skids are under America the beautiful, the home of the brave and the free — and that it won't be long now.

We can be genuinely grateful for commentators and newsmen — men like Paul Harvey — who are unafraid to call it like it is.

We can point with genuine pride and hope to the countless young people of our nation whose ideals are high, whose morals are sound, whose faith is strong, and who love their country.

While we have, and will continue to have in the future, some bleeding-heart, liberal, demagogic Senators and Congressmen, we still have a hard core of realistic, patriotic, courageous statesmen that try to keep the ship of state on an even keel even though the waters around them are turbulent and threatening.

We can be thankful that our government is conscientiously trying to strangle the inflow of dope from Mexico and other countries.

## Four Classes Set In Police Teletype Web

Orientation classes will be conducted in this region by the West Central Texas Council of Governments during the week of January 5-8, to teach area law enforcement personnel procedures and operation of new teletype equipment which will be installed in 22 cities and counties in mid-January, it was announced this week.

The new non-voice communication equipment is available to the WCT COG law enforcement agencies as a result of a \$39,857 grant awarded in August by the Texas Criminal Justice Council to establish the State's first regional law enforcement teletype network. This network equipment is the latest device to control public offenders, providing area police and sheriff's departments with a direct connection with member units, local Department of Public Safety Patrol Units, the Texas Department of Public Safety headquarters in Austin and the State and Federal Crime Information Centers in Austin and Washington. This will also include a hookup with other regional council networks as soon as such systems are developed statewide. The machine is a print out model, and operates on a 24 hour basis, sending out messages at the rate of 100 words per minute.

Instructors will be furnished by the Department of Public Safety and the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company. Cities and counties already signed up for the system are: Abilene, Ballinger, Breckenridge, Brownwood, Coleman, Colorado City, Comanche, Cross Plains, Eastland, Snyder, Stamford, Sweetwater, San Angelo, Callahan, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Mitchell, Nolan, Scurry and Taylor.

Other Council cities and counties interested in affiliating with the WCT COG network are instructed to contact the WCT COG Staff officials in Abilene.
