





- TIDBITS - Breck Firm Low Bidder **On Big Motel Complex** Eastland, Hamilton and Winters. . . Hundreds of men and boys from this Central Texas

Armstrong Construction Company of Brockenridge was announced Saturday as the low bidder on a 60unit motel and restaurant complex to be built at the intersection of U.S. Highway 133 and IH-20 in the south part of Cisco.

The bid opening took place at the chamber of commerce at 10 a.m. Saturday morning. No figures were announced, but it was understood the investment would be in the neighborhood of half a million dollars.

Richard Redwine, formerly of Cisco, one of the organizers of the corporation which will build the big facility, said that construction was scheduled to get under way within 60 days.

The corporation, yet to be chartered, has secured a frontage of 300 feet on the IH-20 right of way. Mr. Redwine said. It will be known as The Cisco Corporation and the motel will be known as The Ci:co Inn. Charter application is now in process.

It will be associated with a national motel chain, Mr. Redwine said.

Associated with him in the development of the big complex are Don Franklin of Odessa, Thomas C. Powell of Abilene, and local investors.

The project will be of pre-cast concrete tilt-slab construction and it will represent the most advanced design in big motel construction and in operation, Mr. Redwine said.

An announcement that the project was under development appeared in the Cisco Press about a year ago together with a picture of the proposed motel.



worla-wide commitments of the 516th Tactical Airlift Wing (TAW), Dyess AFB, require continous low level flying training. The highest degree of proficiency must be maintained by the 516TAW air-crews in all modes of aerial delivery. As a re sult, C-130 Hercules and C-7A Caribou aircraft are flown at low altitudes over the "Big Country" on a daily basis.

These low level flights may be scheduled between 8 a.m. and midnight. Monday thru Friday, and less frequently on weekdays. Daylight missions are flown at an altitude of 500 feet above the ground while night low level activit-ies are conducted at least 1,000 feet above any obstacle or terrain feature within three miles of the prescribed track of the aircraft. Airspeeds will very from 115 to 290 miles per hour.

All flights are made along specific routes which are selected to provide maximum training and minimum disturbance of farms, ranches and communities.
