Entrants from all over the county are invited. Winner of the pageant will be eligible to compete for State Peanut Queen.

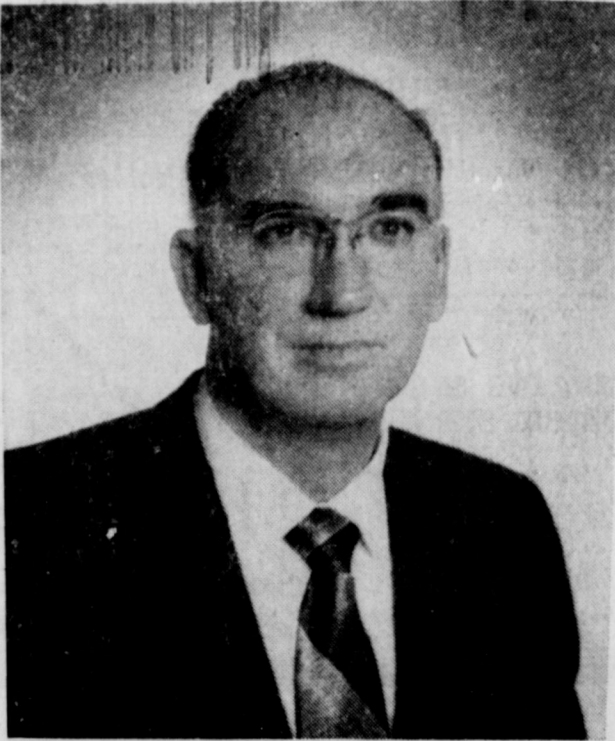

Verdict Of Suicide In Cisco Death

A verdict of death due to an overdose of injected dangerous drugs, self-inflicted, was returned by Justice of the Peace Carl Lamb Saturday in the death of a 24-year-old woman here Friday night.

The woman, Mrs. Wanda Lee Kirk about 24, was pronounced dead on arrival at Cisco's E. L. Graham Memorial Hospital by a physician who examined her shortly after 11 o'clock Friday night.

Burial was to take place in Oakwood cemetery here following funeral services at the Cisco Funeral Home Chapel at 2 p. m. Sunday conducted by the Rev. Russell Pogue, pastor of the First Baptist Church.

Information furnished the funeral home by the husband, Donald Kirk, said that she was born in Carthage, Mo., on August 8, 1947 the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Corbet Johnson of Carthage, who survive her. A sister, Mrs. Janice Judd of Fort Worth also survives. Investigating officers said they had been able to learn little of the background other than that Mrs. Kirk, who formerly worked as a secretary in Fort Worth, and her husband came to Cisco about the middle of March, where Mr. Kirk was employed as a welder on the ranch of John S. Chandler, Jr. on the base line road about two miles east of Cisco. Mr. Chandler, Sheriff L. E. Sublett said, had also been here only a short while.

Sublett said that Mr. Kirk told him that he had gone outside his house Friday night on an errand and when he returned to the bedroom he found his wife seriously ill on the bed. The sheriff said that Mr. Kirk told him he then ran to the Chandler home about 150 yards away and asked Mr. Chandler to take him and his wife to the hospital, which Mr. Chandler did. Sheriff Sublett said that investigation of the death was continuing.

Library Week Proclaimed --- 'Don't Blow It'

"You've got a right to read. Don't blow it."

With this as its theme, National Library Week will be observed at the Eastland Public Library April 18-24, 1971.

Governor Smith in his proclamation says: "Throughout the nation libraries, concerned citizens and educators are joining forces to achieve the 'RIGHT TO READ' for all during the decade of the 1970s."

Whether it be the Mayor of Eastland, with his proclamation, the Governor with his, or President Nixon speaking out for libraries all over the nation, or an Eastland high school reader, or a small child cherishing a bright colored book, National Library Week should bring people together to work for the common good.

The Eastland Public Library began in a small way in 1901 with Mrs. J. L. Johnson in charge of the books. The yearbook of the Hawthorne Club in 1902 carried on its cover the chosen motto "Tis the mind that makes the body rich." Their course of study was English Literature and English History, and the books chosen were in those fields. In 1907 they studied England, Ireland and Scotland with Mrs. H. P. Brelsford as President. In 1916 the club changed its name to Thursday Afternoon Club and increased its scope of influence in a much enlarged library. Today, almost 15,000

books crowd the shelves and 500 readers make use of its facilities.

Thus, for over 70 years books have been available to Eastland readers.

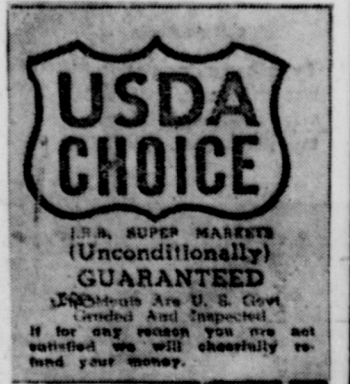

REA Loan Opens Expansion For Comanche Co-Op

Comanche County Telephone Company has announced that a long sought after long distance service expansion program is now under way in the south part of the system.

Finalization of the program came upon the announcement last week of a \$305,000 loan to the company from the Rural Electrification Administration, Washington, D. C.

Approximately \$100,000 will be invested in the new toll design which will include the one to four party exchange areas of Newburg, Proctor and Sidney. Service features for the above exchanges will include new operator level trunk lines and Direct Distance Dialing. In addition to the new trunking plan, forty-four miles of new toll route will be owned by the company and will provide new revenue that has in the past been paid to connecting companies. All intra-company toll lines will be underground from exchange to exchange. Newburg will switch into the nationwide network in area 915 (General Telephone). The Proctor and Sidney Exchanges will continue to switch into the nationwide network in area 817 (Southwestern Bell).

The entire installation will be completed during 1971 and is scheduled to be switched into the new networks by November 10, with the exception of DDD service for the Newburg Exchange which will be delayed pending new central office equipment designs for that exchange, and the addition of extra trunking in the new CAMA center at Brownwood owned by General Telephone Company. During this period of delay on the DDD features the Newburg subscribers will simply dial a Zero to access the new trunk lines.

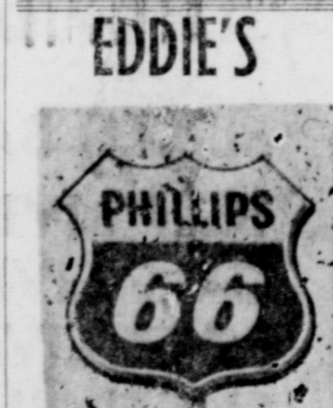

Cisco, Eastland On TAW Training Flight Route

The world-wide commitments of the 516th Tactical Airlift Wing (TAW), Dyess AFB, require continuous low level flying training. The highest degree of proficiency must be maintained by the 516TAW air-crews in all modes of aerial delivery. As a result, C-130 Hercules and C-7A Caribou aircraft are flown at low altitudes over the "Big Country" on a daily basis.

These low level flights may be scheduled between 8 a.m. and midnight, Monday thru Friday, and less frequently on weekdays. Daylight missions are flown at an altitude of 500 feet above the ground while night low level activities are conducted at least 1,000 feet above any obstacle or terrain feature within three miles of the prescribed track of the aircraft. Airspeeds will vary from 115 to 290 miles per hour.

All flights are made along specific routes which are selected to provide maximum training and minimum disturbance of farms, ranches and communities. Towns, local airports, hospitals, hatcheries and stock pens are avoided when planning these routes and they will not be overflown under any normal circumstances. 516th officials would like to emphasize that, even though training must be conducted at low altitudes and high airspeeds in order to be realistic, all possible precautions are taken to prevent disruption of local agricultural and community activities.

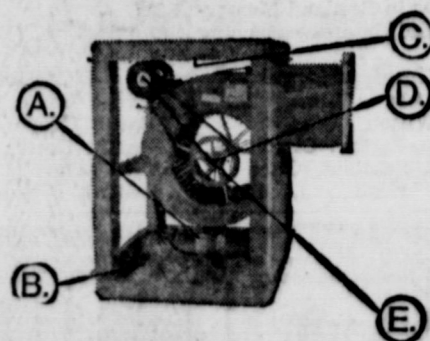

Ballots Due April 19-30 On Mohair Program

Ballots for voting in the April 19-30 referendum on continuation of the mohair promotion and market-development program have been mailed to all known mohair producers in Eastland County, announced Robert G. Lyerla, Chairman of the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee.

"The vote will determine whether producers want to continue their support for the mohair sales promotion programs," Lyerla said, "but it will not affect present price-support payment legislation." Under the new agreement, the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the Mohair Council of America would set up price-support payment deductions of up to 1½ cents a pound on mohair marketed during 1971-73. Funds collected would be used by the Mohair Council to continue a program of mohair advertising, sales promotion, and related activities.

The ASC County Committee Chairman said a similar agreement was approved by producers in March of 1967. During the past three years, the Council's budget for advertising and sales promotion programs has been \$395,000 annually. With mohair poundage expected to be down a little bit from recent years, the Council proposes to maintain its current level of programs by using its reserve fund built up over the last four years when the deductions from producers' payment exceeded the Council expenditures.

Anyone who has owned Angora goats, 6 months old or older, for 30 consecutive days during 1970 may vote in the referendum.

Approval of two-thirds of the total number of producers voting, or of producers having two-thirds of the total volume of production represented in the referendum, must be obtained before the agreement can go into effect.

The voting will last for two weeks in order to enable as many mohair producers as possible to vote in the referendum.

"Ballots may be mailed or brought to the County ASCS Office beginning April 19," the Chairman said. "Anyone who considers himself eligible and who does not receive a ballot by April 16 should get in touch with the County ASCS Office."

To be counted, the ballots must reach the County ASCS Office before close of business, Friday, April 30," he cautioned.

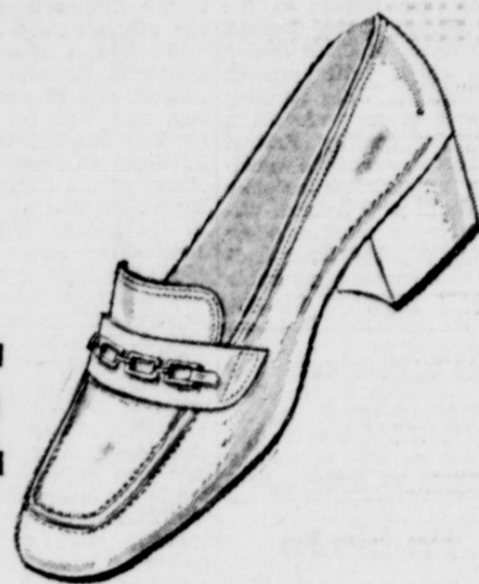

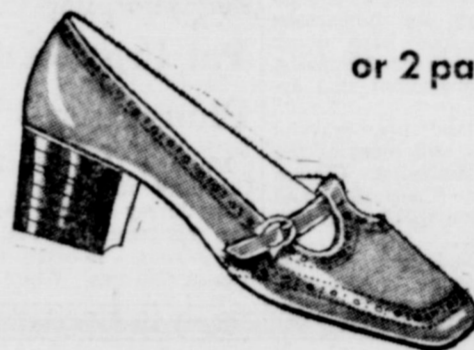


