He attended schools of his community and entered the Kentucky University in 1869, from which Institution he received a diploma. He came to Dallas County in the fall of 1872, and taught school until July, 1873.

Tractors In Fields After Good Rain

The light to moderate rains that covered Eastland County the last few days gave hope and a new outlook to farmers and ranchers. The rain was not enough to break the long drought, but everyone is thankful for the rain that came.

Before the rain on April 16 several peanut growers had said they did not plan to spend any money on seed, fertilizer or herbicides until there was some sign of a break in the dry weather. By Tuesday tractors could be heard all over the county. The rain provided just enough moisture to begin land preparation and seemed to give the "go-ahead" signal. Of course, everyone is hoping this is the beginning of a series of spring rains.

The livestock men have been hurt worse than the farmers by the winter drought. The shortage of hay and water has forced some producers to sell all or part of their herds. Almost all have had to feed five or six times more

OFFICIALLY 1.15 INCHES Not a drought-breaker, but certainly appreciated was the rains amounting to 1.15 inches through Monday. Beginning on Friday, the 16, .52 of an inch fell; 24 of an inch Saturday, and 39 of an inch early Monday.

Mayor James Reid Re-Elected; Several New Projects Proceed

The Eastland City Commission organized, heard equipment proposals, gained a building, discontinued teletype service and found out it needs to be busy about making plans for a new sewer system at the regular monthly meeting Monday.

After a canvass of the April 6 election, Commissioners Dale Bakker, W. Q. Verner and H. V. O'Brien were sworn in. Bakker and Verner are in-

cumbents. Mayor James Reid was re-elected by the commission to that post and Verner was elected mayor protem. Durel Reid was elected treasurer and Bakker, assistant treasurer. Mayor Reid reported that he had worked out an arrangement with the Cisco Police Dept. to use that city's teletype service and the one installed here will be returned it was agreed. Eastland will

pay for its share of the lease for the Cisco machine.

Proposals were made by Caterpillar and International for a loader to be used when Eastland begins its new landfill disposal system this summer. Both new and used equipment was discussed, new items tagged at some \$30,000 and used at something like \$17,500, and possible with a new warranty. Mayor Reid, City Manager Lewis Tiner and Verner plan to look at a used item in Abilene Friday when they attend a West Texas Council of Governments meeting.

Former resident Joe Culpepper was a spokesman for International and it is at his place in Abilene where the city fathers will look at the used two-way loader. It's reported complete with cab and accessories.

The City has been informed that it owns the Woman's Club House Building, and Commissioners agreed to stand the cost for a termite spraying job there.

A motion that City Manager Lewis Tiner be relieved of his duties as City Judge, with these duties to be vested in another party, failed for lack of a second.

A letter from the Texas Water Quality Board was read and the gist of it is that Eastland needs to be taking steps on its proposed sewer system. Manager Tiner was instructed to have the engineering firm of Yeatts and Decker begin the necessary steps for the program.

The letter says in part: "The purpose of this letter is to not only outline the pending possibility of increased federal grant assistance, but to advise you, that the federal funds for fiscal year 1971 expire on June 30, 1971. Therefore, if the city intends to apply for financial assistance for sewerage work, the application should be submitted at this time. There will not be sufficient time to process an application prior to June 30 if it is not submitted until after the election on Amendment No. 4 on May 18."

(The May amendment vote, if passed, would authorize the state to proceed with the necessary legislation to implement the State program.) If such a program is established, then the city could receive 50-55 per cent federal financial grant assistance and state financial assistance. Eastland has been waiting to see which direction the state program takes.

The present cost-sharing plan provides that the city provide 67 per cent and the federal government, 33 per cent.

The May vote, if passed, would bring the ratio to city, 45, and federal, 55 per cent.

Eastland women turned up the 1926 deed from Prairie Oil and Gas Co. which conveyed the Club building to the city for use by the women's clubs.

AMMERMAN, he located several acres of land. They put down the first water well on the Staked Plains of Texas.

In 1876 they caused the County Seat of Eastland to be moved from Merriman to Eastland and laid out the present thriving oil town of that name. (ed. note—this account is from a 1920 book)

J. S. Daugherty was the father of the Business League idea in the United States. Served as Chairman of the first League in Dallas, from 1882 to 1888, giving his full time and paying his part of the expense of the committee.

This committee laid the foundation upon which Dallas has grown. He organized in 1882, the first Real Estate Association ever formed in Texas and was elected its Chairman. As Chairman of the Association he brought on the fight that caused the cattlemen of Texas to pay into the Public School Fund of the State \$250,000, to \$500,000, per annum, as rents for school lands they had previously grazed their cattle for nothing.

In 1898 he organized the Texas Bureau of Immigration, composed of a representative from each Senatorial District. He was elected Chairman of the Bureau and brought on the fight that resulted in the formation of the Texas Railroad Commission.

In 1892, the Trans-Mississippi Commercial Congress, by unanimous vote, asked to prepare an address to the people of the United States on the Silver Question which he did, and they elected him orator of SILVER DAY, at the Chicago World's Fair. When Richard P. Bland made his argument in 1893, in behalf of the free coinage of silver, he asked and received unanimous consent of Congress to have Mr. Daugherty's address printed in the Congressional Record, as part of his argument on the question.

At the Trans. Mississippi Congress he offered a resolution in the Good Roads Com. to provide a fund to protect their depositors against loss and was the first public advocate of that idea.

Between the years 1890 and 1895 he represented Texas in the Good Roads Committee of the United States, printing and distributing large quantities of Good Roads literature and holding Good Roads meetings all over the State.

In 1909 he was Chairman of

the Harris Co. Drainage Association and took an active part in the creation of the first Drainage District in Harris County.

In 1910 he drafted resolutions, presented and secured the adoption by the Texas Industrial Congress, memorializing the United States Congress to locate a Naval Station, Navy Yard, Dry Docks, Arsenal, and Ordnance Factory in Texas, the site to be selected by a Naval Board.

He took an initiative part in securing the construction of a deep water harbor at Galveston.

During his 50 years of residence in the state, there has been no question agitated, pertaining to its general welfare, that did not receive his intelligent co-operation.

On the 27th of September, 1919, Jacamiah Seaman Daugherty was instantly killed, while crossing the public thoroughfare at Fulton, Kentucky, by an Illinois Central passenger train. His tragic death is sincerely mourned by all who knew of his genuine worth to the great state of his adoption.

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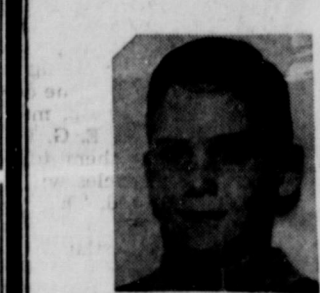

**County Traffic Record
'Some Improved'**

With April half gone, Eastland County is "slightly ahead" of last year in traffic statistics, according to a report issued by Texas Department of Public Safety Sgt. Jerry Mathews.

Deathwise, the number is even for the first three months, with three having been killed in 1970 and the same number in 1971.

In total number of accidents, there were only 62 through March this year, compared to 71 same period last year.

The Month of March was good for the county's record, with zero deaths, only 20 accidents and four persons injured (In March, 1970, 14 were injured; two deaths, 28 accidents, 22 property damage accidents; five personal injury accidents, and one fatal accident).

During the first three months of 1970, there were two fatal accidents; 14 personal injury accidents; 55 property damage accidents; 71 total accidents, 3 deaths; and 28 persons injured.

Good weather and general driver carefulness is credited with the improved record, but as vacation time draws nearer, more caution is going to be needed Sgt. Mathews said.

120 Hear State President At County Farmers Union Dinner

Eastland County Farmers Union members and their families met in the dining room of the Rising Star American Legion Hall Monday evening at 7 p.m. for a bar-be-cue banquet, catered by Underwoods of Brownwood. Minister James Haney of the local Church of Christ said grace before the meal.

Following the bar-be-cue, State president, Jay Naman was introduced. Speaking to 120 people, he predicted "favorable concessions" or possibly full retention of the agricultural exemptions to the Federal Motor Transportation Safety Act. He said "this is completely a horseback opinion, but I do feel encouraged over the situation. If this agricultural exemption expires July 1 and is not re-issued farmers will no longer be allowed to hire truck drivers under 21 or over 60 without violating the act. Drivers will be required to have regular physical check-ups under the act."

Naman also discussed the possible reorganization of the United States Department of Agriculture, where the department would be divided among seven or eight depart-

ments. He said he felt that agriculture would lose its identity with its departments and would have little chance of solving new agricultural problems. Mondane Bargaining Bills were discussed and new agricultural appropriations.
