Heavy 3.4 Inch Rain Falls In 40 minutes

Heavy rain began to fall about 1:25, Monday afternoon, and within a 40 minute period, three inches of rain had covered the ground. According to Official Weather Reporter, James Dabney, Eastland Area received 3.42 inches of rain, as of 7:00, Tuesday morning.

H. D. Alsop reports on damage in the city as being high winds turning over a concession stand; at the Trac field; Dr. M. A. Treadwell clinic reported a fire in the office due to the lightning coming in the intercom system. Minor damage was recorded. Interstate 20 East had all of one lane blocked due to high water.

In Hillcrest, they recorded 5.2 inches of rain, and on E. Pershing 4½ inches of rain was recorded.

To date for month of June, the city of Eastland, has had 3.66 inches of rain. Total for the 1971 year to date is 15.20 inches. This same time in 1970 the rainfall was 13.62 inches.

Sales Tax To Cost More On Purchases Made On July 1

On July 1 Texas shoppers will begin paying more, along with their purchases of goods and services, for the maintenance of their state government.

On that date a law increasing the state tax from 3.25 per cent to 4 per cent will go into effect and merchant in most cities and towns will begin collecting five per cent on sales of most goods to their customers. The increase was

approved by the Legislature last spring.

Four per cent of the five will be retained by the state to be applied to the expenses of state government, while the other one per cent will be remitted to the city in which the collection is made.

Provided, of course, that the city has approved a one per cent tax as has Cisco and many other towns.

Where no city sales is in effect only the state tax will be collected.

In Eastland and many other communities in which the one per cent tax is in effect for the benefit of the municipal government, the state collects the tax along with its own and makes quarterly remittances to the cities, retaining a small amount to defray collection costs.

Planting Season Favorable But 'Deep Down' Moisture Is Lacking

Crop Outlook Depends On Further Rain

Eastland county farmers and ranchers are now in a favorable moisture condition as a result of recent general rains, but are not prepared for a hot late summer growing and pasture season. County Agent DeMarquis Gordon said this week.

Pasture grasses, stock water supplies and crop planting conditions are now general good, Gordon said. "But the drought is not yet over," he said. There is a dearth of "bottom" moisture due to the long absence of rain during last fall and winter, and the lack of this deep-down season is a condition to be regarded with much concern as the critical middle and late summer season begins, the county agent pointed out.

Most of the county and area received good rains during the late spring and early summer, although some areas are still suffering.

Planting Favorable
Generally, conditions are favorable for peanut planting and germination and most of the growers are taking advantage of the top-soil moisture to get their seed in the ground.

Gordon estimated that most of the crop would be in the ground by the end of next week. Some growers, however, were withholding their seed for planting about July 1, as they customarily do, he said.

Gordon also said that some of the older peanut plantings are beginning to show drought distress. High evaporation due to the extreme hot, dry weather is a problem both for dry-land peanuts planted on the strength of the recent rains and for the irrigated acreage, the county agent pointed out.

However, he said the conditions are not yet critical. Very little irrigation is being done now because of the rains, but Gordon expects the wells in the irrigation areas to be started up within about two weeks if the dry weather continues.

Irrigated Peanuts
About 30 per cent of a county peanut acreage of between 33,000 and 34,000 is under irrigation records show. Most of the county's peanut allotment is being planted, either by the owners or under lease or sale.

Some concern is also being felt for insect damage. Gordon revealed that inspections of a number of fields have revealed that the lesser corn borer is already becoming active with the prospect that this pest will again be the major problem that it has been during the past two seasons.

Control measures are beginning to show better results, however, as grower experience and experiment station and local demonstration studies reveal more knowledge of proper control methods.

Gordon said that his office is planning a series of field meetings to be held in infested areas at least once every two weeks during the growing season when growers will have better opportunity to understand and apply control measures.

The response of pasture grasses to the recent rains has been almost spectacular in some instances, particularly where so many thousands of acres were burned off in last fall's epidemic of range fires, Gordon said. The fires did not hurt the grasses although they were very destructive of fences, buildings and other property, he said.

It also appears that there will be a considerable amount of hay for baling, he said, since Johnson grass, sudan and other forage sorghums are responding luxuriantly to the rains. (Continued on page Four)

Commissioners Apply For Federal Grant, Buy New Equipment

The regular meeting of the city commission was held June 21, 1971.

Present were Chairman of the board James Reid and Commissioners Durel Reid, W. Q. Verner and Dale Bakker. Commissioner O'Brien was out of town.

Present to discuss business were Jerry Carter, Johnson Smith, Joe Tow and Marion Porter.

A resolution was passed authorizing chairman Reid to sign papers in connection with the City's application for a federal grant on the ponding sewer plant.

On the first reading an Industrial Waste Ordinance passed. A copy will be published and a second reading will be necessary before it becomes official.

The date for the city's equalization board was set for Tuesday, July 13, 1971.

Mr. Marion Porter, Project Coordinator for the soil conservation service discussed various services available to the city through the soil conservation service and other federal agencies. Mr. Porter discussed Park improvements and Channel clearance primarily.

The commission authorized chairman Reid to request the parks and wildlife dept. to enter into a park planning program for the city. This is a free service of the parks and wildlife dept.

A citizen was authorized to pave a city block without curb and gutter with no city participation. All materials and labor to be furnished by the individual. A drainage was discussed with a local citizen.

The city commission granted Lone Star Gas Co. an easement to install 1609' of pipe line primarily in Section 26 H&TCRR Survey.

All agreed on a project to insure paving and curb and gutter installation on High Street between Main and Commerce. The city manager was authorized to enter into a lease purchase agreement on a track loader for the new city dump ground. The commission selected the international 175 as bid by Plains Equipment Co. of Abilene.

of man's common enemies. Each year in Texas many

people are poisoned by their
own hands through improper
canning of foodstuffs. With
summer upon us and a plentiful
supply of fresh fruits and
vegetables available, now is
the time to look at canning
procedures.

It has been reported by
health authorities that over
62 per cent of food poisoning
cases in California were due
to home canned string beans,
asparagus, fruits, and other
vegetables. Another 24 per
cent was due to the prepara-

tion of animal products. With
the great amount of home
canning and freezing done in
Texas, you can see why officials
of the Texas State Department
of Health are concerned about
the possible occurrence of this
potentially fatal disease.

Food poisoning, or "botu-
lism," is caused by a deadly
poison produced by a germ
that is very resistant to heat
and cold and can grow with-
out air. The vast majority of
reported cases of botulism

have been due to eating im-
properly processed home-can-
ned foods.

Studies on the heat resis-
tance of the spores of the botu-
lism germ prove that home
canning by the cold pack
method, which is still widely
used in Texas, is extremely
dangerous. The pressure cook-
er method should be used for
canning instead.

The disagreeable odor evi-
dent with spoiled food is not
a sure-fire way to detect food
poisoning. Many canned foods

may be free of obnoxious
odor and may appear in good
condition, but could contain
organisms of botulism. The
spoiled odor is usually associ-
ated with non-acid foods
such as vegetables.

Nausea and vomiting usually
occur within 24 hours. Diarr-
hea may occur early, but in
the later stages of the dis-
ease, constipation is present.
Death can occur due to re-
piratory failure.

It is usually wise to boil
all home canned foods for at
