With a perfect record, the Mavericks have faced many Bulldogs this season—those from Ranger, Clyde, Hamilton, and of course, Stamford.

"Don't under estimate 'em," Coach Franzier says he's been told all year about Coahoma. They're powerful in every respect. Even though Coahoma is a bedroom city to Big Spring, it's a big school with a lot of enrollment and talent to draw from, and they know the football business from front to back, he says.

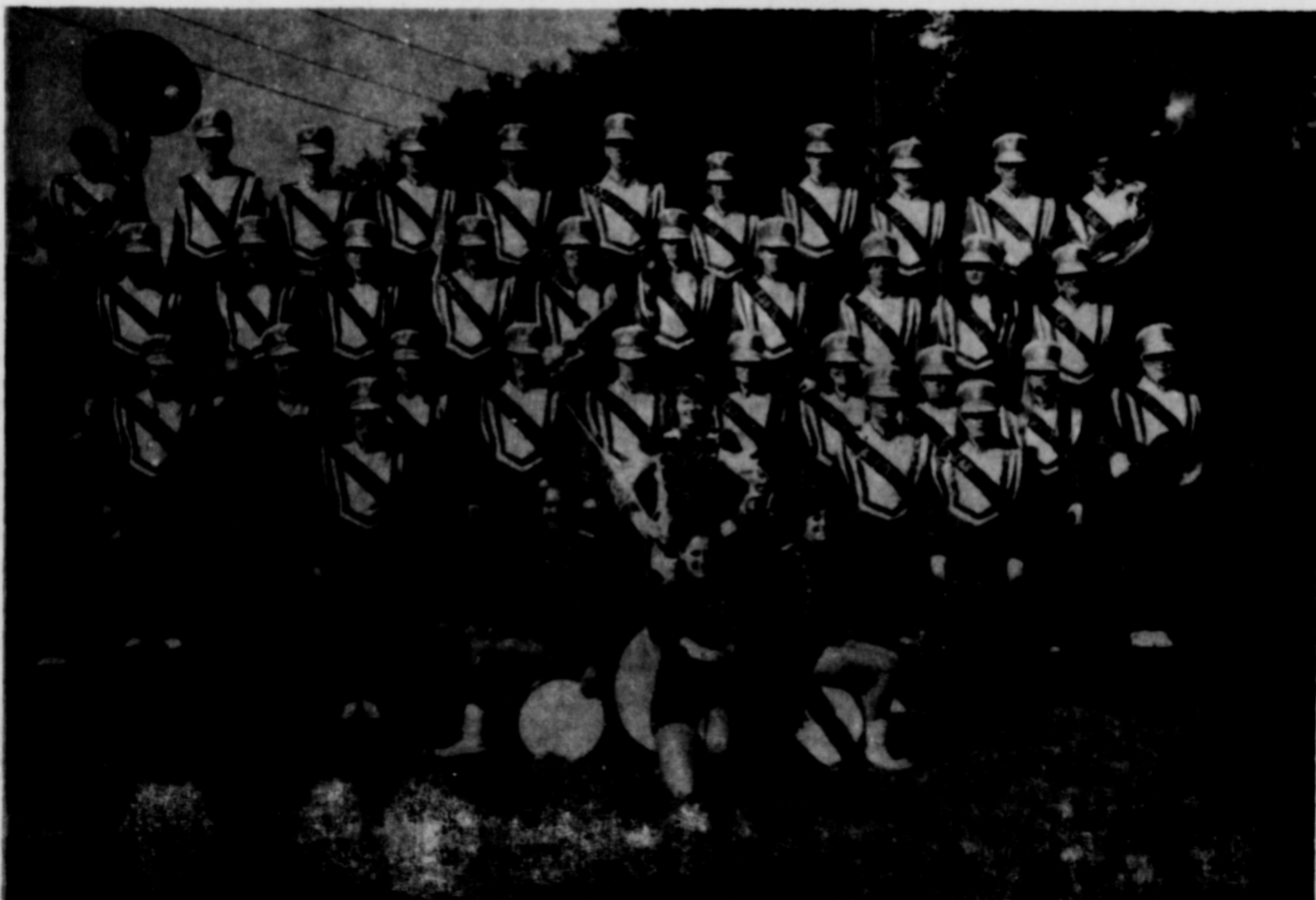
24, of Eastland.

Both women were alone in their cars and were east-bound. Royce Couch, 33, of Ventura,

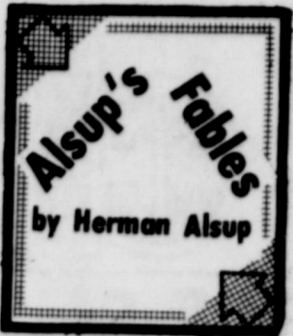
Calif., driver of the truck, taken to the Ranger General Hospital where his condition was reported as satisfactory.

I traveled to Brady Saturday with the Maverick Band to U.I.L. Marching Contest. Each Band is required to do a 6 to 7 minute precision drill on the field that consists of Marching and playing.

Judges ratings are based on playing and marching and the type of show performed. To receive the highest rating, Division I, a band must, in the judges opinion, have "straight lines, everyone picking up their feet and hitting the yard line with the same part of the foot, play correctly not overblowing or playing wrong notes, and have all music memorized. Only a few bands receive this rating.

The next rating is Division II, which the Maverick Band received. Only a few things were wrong but that few made the difference. Ranger and Cisco High School Bands also received a Division II at the contest. 8 Bands received Division III, and 3 received Division IV, and 2 received Division V. The Eastland Band "Bunch" did a fine job and are to be congratulated.

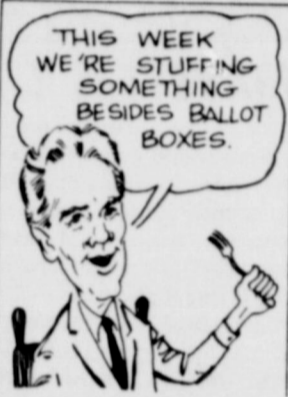

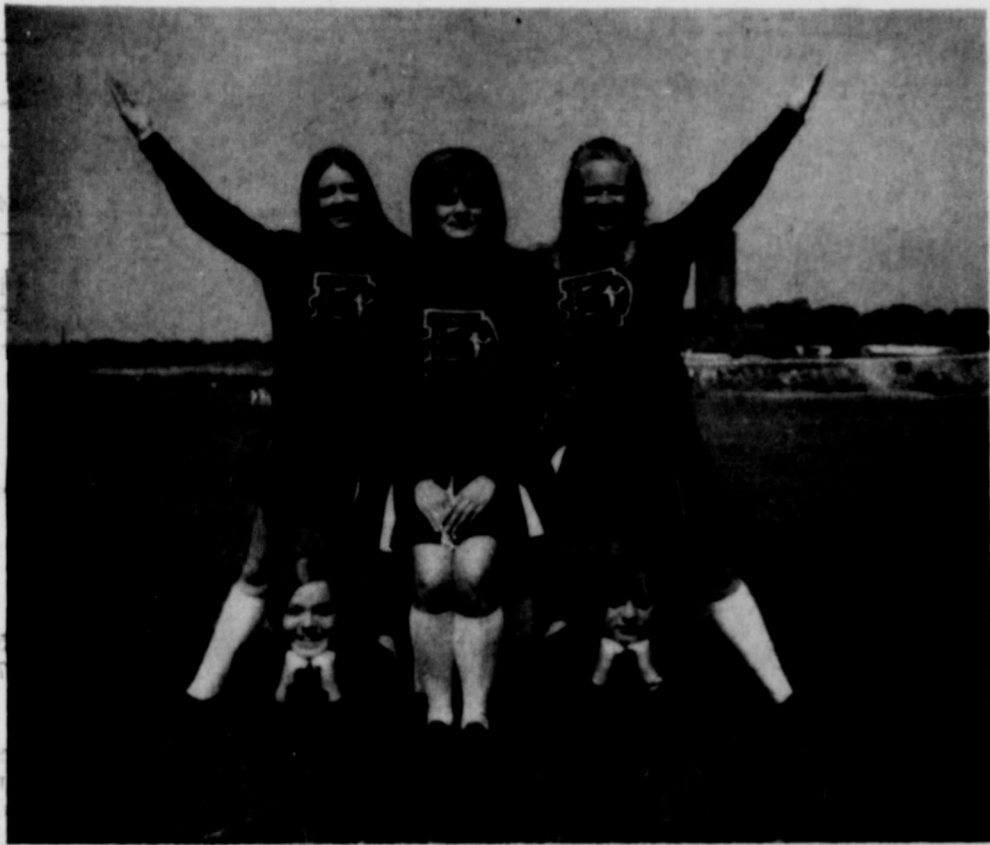

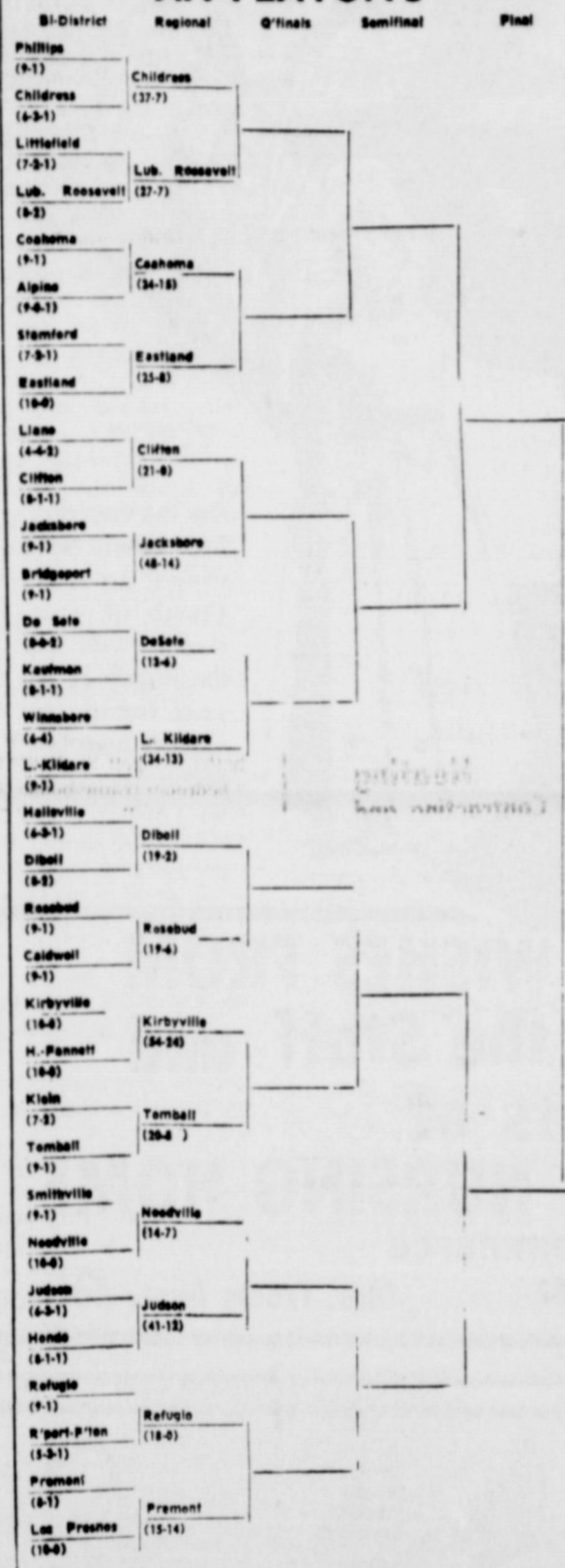

# Farmers to Vote

Peanut growers will vote by mail in a referendum on having marketing quotas on their 1972, 1973, and 1974 crops, says Tommy J. Lawson, county executive director of the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The referendum dates have been set as December 6 through 10, and ballots must be returned to the county ASCS office - By mail or in person - By the December 10 deadline.

"Growers have approved marketing quotas for each year's peanut crop since 1949. In the last 3-year vote held in December 1968, 96.9 percent of the 50,358 growers voting approved quotas. We are hopeful that all peanut voters will use the convenient mailing system to cast their ballots this year," Lawson said.

A grower will be eligible to vote in the referendum if he is entitled to share in the 1971 peanut crop of a farm which produced more than 1 acre of nuts. A landlord of a standing rent, cash rent, or fixed rent tenant is not eligible to vote.

It takes a favorable vote by two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum to approve marketing quotas for the next three years. Whether or not quotas are approved, peanut acreage allotments will remain in effect as a means of determining eligibility for government loans.

Lawson explained that if marketing quotas stay in effect there will be marketing penalties on the peanuts produced in excess of a farm's allotment. Growers who do not exceed their allotments will be eligible for loans at 75 percent of parity.

If more than one-third of the growers voting are opposed, marketing quotas and penalties will not be in effect for the 1972 peanut crop, and loans to growers who keep within their acreage allotments will drop to 50 percent of parity. In this case, another referendum would be held in 1972 for the next three crops.

Texas has received an allotment of 358,005 acres, which represents the state's share of the 1,610,000 national acreage allotment. There are some 850 peanut farms in Eastland County. Growers will receive notice of their individual farm peanut allotments prior to the referendum.

"Peanut farmers in the area

should keep in mind the referendum date, and be sure to cast their votes by the December 10 deadline," Lawson said.

"All eligible farmers are encouraged to participate in the voting. ASCS closely adheres to the non-discrimination guidelines set up by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Every farmer in the county is welcome to seek assistance, information and answers to any questions they may have concerning the agency's Farm Action Programs, regardless of race, color, sex, creed, or national origin," Lawson added.

## Off the Beaten Trail

Rowdy early times in the Eastland area are featured in a new, one-volume Texana edition of the Lone Star State's major stories, "Off The Beaten Trail", just released by Texian Press, publisher Robert E. Davis of Waco said today.
