Rams Butt Mules In Season Opener

PORTALES, NM — The Portales Rams used a late fourth quarter scoring pass from quarterback Johnny Poe to tight end Rod Simon to ruin the Muleshoe Mules season opener, 6-0 here in Greyhound Stadium Friday night.

Poe's touchdown toss came on the heels of one of three Mule fumbles and tarnished what had been an outstanding Muleshoe defensive effort.

For 46 minutes of the game, the Mule defense held the Rams in check. Portales was able to get

only minimal yardage on the ground and almost nothing in the air. Only bad Muleshoe punts gave the Rams field position.

But two Muleshoe defensive breakdowns in the last two minutes proved fatal.

With the Mules in possession and driving at the Ram 39, Muleshoe quarterback Sam Gonzales fumbled and Portales' Johnny Poe recovered at the Muleshoe 49.

On the Rams first play, Poe

handed the ball to Derek Bigham, who had alternated at quarterback for the Rams. Bigham swept right, stopped, then fired a halfback pass downfield to Ram wingback Greg Speck at the Mule eight.

With first and goal at the eight and 1:45 to play, a stiff Muleshoe defensive surge forced a Ram fumble, but Portales recovered for a loss of six yards. The Rams called time out to regroup.

With second and goal at the 14, Portales lined up in their full-house back field and faked a lead to the left. Poe bootlegged and fired a pass to Simon in the corner of the endzone for the games' only score with 1:40 to play.

Portales muffed the PAT snap. Muleshoe tried to get back the points in the final minute, but another fumble insured the Rams' win.

The three fumbles and 53 yards in penalties hurt Muleshoe, who led in every statistical category except passing and punts. The Muleshoe line blew open huge holes in the Ram defense to allow the Mule backs to run up 189 yards, but the Mules were unable to complete a pass.

County Receives More Moisture

Late Friday afternoon and night, black thunderclouds opened up and dumped from 2/10 to over 1 inch over already soggy Bailey County farm lands. At press time Saturday, slow drizzle was still falling.

Sources at Lazbuddie reported from 1/4 to 1/2 inches in that general area, while Clay's Corner reported about the same with a peppering of small hail. Some cotton leaves were knocked off the plants, but no severe damage was reported.

Bill Millen who farms in the YL community reported close to an inch of rain and

winds. From 1760 north to West Camp approximately one inch of moisture fell, while Needmore to the south of Muleshoe received only a sprinkle, as did Baileyboro.

In the Stegall area and west toward the state line, from 6/10 to 1 inch was reported on dryland crops in that area. Bula in the southeastern part of the county received approximately 1/2 inch to sprinkles.

The Three Way area reported showers only; however, a few miles north of the school approximately 7/10 was reported falling. Muleshoe proper received

Bollworm Threat Still Possible

Since the first outbreak of bollworms approximately two weeks ago, some producers have been able to control these pests by chemical applications. However, Spencer Tanksley, Bailey County Extension Agent, advises that producers should still be on the lookout for fresh outbreaks of bollworms, as eggs are beginning to hatch out once more. Some additional spraying may be necessary to contain this threat to the county cotton crops.

Tanksley stated; "Another outbreak such as the one just past would be very costly to the farmers in our county. We still can be attacked again with this pest. I cannot caution producers enough to check their fields on a regular basis for eggs and worms."

The weather situation has not been the type that producers need over the past two weeks, according to the Agent. Cool nights with low temperatures are detrimental to the growth of the boll on cotton. The growing process is slowed considerably by this kind of weather; however, the tonnage is not affected so much as the quality. With the quality down, the prices are less than desirable to the producer Tanksley informed.

"Our cotton crop prospects are still good, however the problems that beset us in late August have definitely not been to our advantage," Tanksley said.

"Our county corn crop is looking good at this time. It is standing good and has not been infested with insects. Harvest time is almost upon us and while some harvesting is being carried out at this time, we should be in full swing within the next week or so" the Agent said.

"Corn, like cotton needs to have some good warm weather in September to aid in harvesting.

The corn prices also leaves something to be desired," said Tanksley.

Other activity in the county involves the planting of wheat. Many farmers have been busy preparing fields for planting as well as actually planting wheat. The moisture outlook for wheat at this time is favorable.

Tanksley suggested that farmers might need to be concerned at this time over the weed growth. The wet fields prevented an adequate control of weeds; however, since the fields are now dry, this should be a good time to think about spot spraying and ropewicking for weeds.

Bailey County's dryland grain sorghum outlook is basically the brightest crop in the county at this time, in the prospect of yields.

Minicomputer use increases workload of bigger computers

COLLEGE STATION — The growing use of minicomputers is increasing the workload of the giant, more sophisticated computers like the two owned by the Texas Engineering Experiment Station (TEES) and used by agencies throughout the state.

Dr. Dick B. Simmons, director of the Data Processing Center located on the Texas A&M University campus, said he encourages agencies and departments contracting with his center to buy their own small computers. In the long run, it will mean more work for the bigger machines.

"They become computer-oriented and discover more and more jobs the computer can do. They also discover that their minicomputers cannot do all they need them to," he said.

Approximately 10 percent of the center's work, which involves two large computer systems, is done for state agencies and universities from Alpine to Amarillo through telephone lines. The institutions include the University of Texas at Tyler, Blinn College in Brenham, Sul Ross State University in Alpine and the Texas State Technical Institute in Waco, the Texas Industrial Commission, Texas Youth Council and the State Auditor's Office.

The Sandhills Philosopher

Editor's note: The Sandhill Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sandy Creek discusses OPEC leaders and human nature this week.

Dear editor:

As I understand it, there's a lot of squabbling going on among the OPEC leaders because they can't agree on how much to stick the rest of the world for oil.

Some want to charge \$32 a barrel, some \$42, and some would go even high-

er, on the principle that the world can't get along without the stuff and let's get the money while the getting's good.

What the sky's-the-limit producers don't realize is that people in Muleshoe and elsewhere have discovered that a trip to town on two-bit gas was important, but on \$1.25 gas it's not.

As a result consumption has dropped, a glut has developed, and importers aren't grabbing oil at whatever price some OPEC country demands. As a further result OPEC leaders are squabbling among themselves because some members who need more

money to buy fighter planes and Rolls Royces won't hold the line, on the grounds that if you can't get \$42 a barrel, take \$32, since it costs only about 25 cents a barrel to get it out of the ground and nothing to put it there in the first place. I'd be happy to sell a calf for \$32 a barrel if it cost only 25 cents to produce.

What this demonstrates once more is that human nature, regardless of what country it operates in, hasn't been abolished.

Expecting 13 OPEC leaders to stick together forever on the price of oil is like expecting the U.S. Congress to always vote unanimously, or 13 farmers to agree on anything, or all members of a family to

always see eye to eye, or a newly wed Hollywood couple to live happily ever

after.



The cry is still being heard for modernized beef grading. Gene Schroeder, National Cattlemen's Association spokesman, said the USDA's beef grading standards must be modernized to encourage the growth of leaner beef which, in turn, will make cattle feeding more profitable. The beef industry, Schroeder said, is facing serious competition from other livestock producers, and, "Our challenge is to improve the image of beef... and to discourage over-feeding which produces excessive fat which is wasteful of energy and costly to produce." He made the point that although one can trim away a lot of excess fat, one can't trim away the cost of putting it on. The NCA has submitted a new grading system to the USDA which would widen the prime grade, be more objective and result in more uniform eating quality within each grade, while also shortening, by 15 to 30 days, the time cattle were on feed.
