"I AM A SICK AMERICAN . . ."

"There are those that claim ours is a 'sick' society; that our country is sick; our government is sick; that we are sick. Well, maybe they're right. I submit that I'm sick . . . and maybe you are, too. I am sick of having policemen ridiculed and called 'pigs' while cop killers are hailed as some kind of folk hero.

"I am sick of being told that religion is the opiate of the people, but marijuana should be legalized.

"I am sick of commentators and columnists canonizing anarchists, revolutionaries and criminal rapists, but condemning law enforcement when such criminals are brought to justice.

"I am sick of being told that pornography is the right of a free press, but freedom of the press does not include being able to read the Bible on school grounds.

"I am sick of paying more and more taxes to build schools while I see some faculty members encouraging students either to tear them down or burn them.

"I am sick of Supreme Court decisions which turn criminals loose on society — while other decisions try to take away my means of protecting my home and family.

"I am sick of pot-smoking entertainers deluging me with their condemnation of my moral standards on late-night television.

"I am sick of being told that policemen are mad dogs who should not have guns — but that criminals who use guns to rob, maim and murder should be understood and helped back to society.

"I am sick of being told it is wrong to use napalm to end a war overseas — but if it's a molotov cocktail or a bomb at home, I must understand the provocations.

"I am sick of not being able to take family to a movie unless I want to have them exposed to nudity, homosexuality and the glorification of narcotics.

"I am sick of riots, marches, protests, demonstrations, confrontations, and the other mob temper tantrums of people intellectually incapable of working within the system.

"I am sick of hearing the same phrases, the same slick slogans, the cries of people who must chant the same thing like zombies because they haven't the capacity for verbalizing thought.

"I am sick of those who say I owe them this or that because of the sins of my forefathers — when I have looked down both ends of a gun barrel to defend their rights, their liberties and their families.

"I am sick of cynical attitudes toward patriotism. I am sick of politicians with no backbone. I am sick of permissiveness.

"I am sick of the dirty, the foul-mouthed, the unwashed. I am sick of the decline of personal honesty, personal integrity and human sincerity.

Most of all, though, I am sick of being told I'm sick. I'm sick of being told my country is sick — when we have the greatest nation that man has ever brought forth on the face of the earth. Fully fifty per cent of the people on earth would willingly trade places with the most deprived.

Twenty-thousand accident victims die unnecessarily each year as a direct result of inadequate emergency care and at least another 25,000 are permanently disabled from the same cause. These are the alarming statistics released after a national study. Communities can do something about it, and many are.

C. E. "Pete" Walter, Field Consultant with the Division of Civil Defense and Traffic Safety of the Texas State Department of Health, will present a program at the meeting of:

Flag Day Observance Saturday will be honored by presenting Lieutenant Colonel John B. Holder.

Lt. Col. John B. Holder, assistant secretary of the U.S. Army Primary Helicopter School, came to Fort Walters in February, 1967 from a tour of duty as battalion maintenance officer of the 11th Combat Aviation Battalion in Vietnam.

Prior to assuming his present position at Fort Walters he has served in the Office of the Helicopter School's Requirement and Budget Division at Fort Walters, the Fort Walters' comptroller, and as commanding officer of the School Brigade's Second Battalion.

The 39-year-old Transportation Corps officer is a Senior Army Aviator.

Overseas service since entering the Army in 1953 includes Germany, Korea, Japan, and Vietnam.

His decorations include the Bronze Star Medal, four awards of the Army Commendation Medal and five awards of the Air Medal.

A native of Arkansas, he

holds a bachelor of science degree from Henderson State Teacher's College of Arkansas. He and his wife Madge and two daughters, Kim 16, and Shannon, 14, live in Mineral Wells.

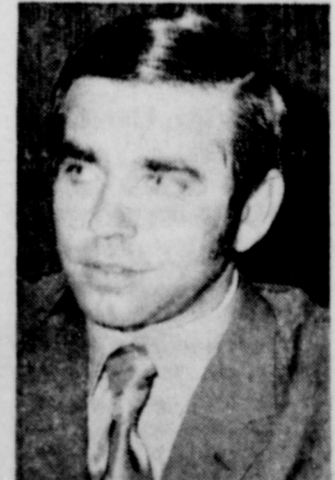

ed, the most underprivileged among us.

"Yes, I may be sick, but if I am only sick, I can get well. I can also help my society get well — and help my country get well.

You will find me contributing my time, money and personal influence to helping churches, hospitals, charities and other establishments which have shown the true spirit of this Country's determination to ease pain, suffering, eliminate hunger and generate brotherhood.

But, most of all, you'll find me at the polling place. There — if you listen — you can hear the thunder of the common man. There, all of us can cast our vote — for America where people can walk the streets without fear.

The hall was beautifully decorated in White and Green accented with large baskets of white roses.

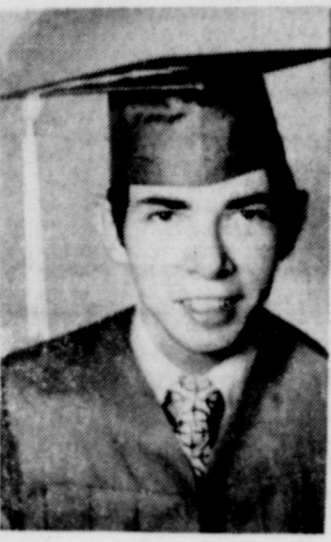

"As it looks from here"

WASHINGTON, D. C. — THERE WAS A TIME when golfers went to the course to forget about everything except to keep the head down, a straight left arm on the back-swing, shift weight to the left side on down-swing and carry the club through with a high finish.

NOW WORRIES ARE BE-SETTING some older clubs and their members with courses closed in with building developments. The space is needed for other things, some say, (other than golfers.) But

there are other problems too. PENDING LAWSUITS AL-LEGE THAT is discrimina-tory to limit or qualify mem-berships or to charge fees of any kind. Contention is made that golf courses are a pub-lic responsibility and should be publicly owned and oper-ated as a service.

SAFETY ON THE GOLF COURSE IS getting attention too. Several years ago some-one came up with statistics to show that in proportion to the numbers of players, golf was the most hazardous of all

American sports. Doubts on such a conclusion are, of course, in order. As recalled, included in the statistics were heart failures, lightning and probably apoplexy following a slice or a missed putt.

THE NATIONAL SAFETY COUNCIL now adds a dimen-sion not present a few years ago—the unsafe golf cart. The Council confidently predicts "several thousand" injuries from golf cart accidents dur-ing the summer season.

THE COUNCIL CALLS THE CARTS "a safety problem that warrants attention." It says that many carts are unstable and roll over while traversing slopes on the bias and others lose their brakes completely, crash into brakers, other carts, trees and fences, resulting in some serious injuries.

AMERICA BEING WHAT IT IS, there is, of course, an American Golf car Associa-tion. It claims to be working on the safety problem right at this minute. According to their report they are financ-ing a study on proposed new standards to provide greater cart safety.

SAFETY, THOUGH, IS NOT REALLY the thing that sort of saddens the heart about all this. It is rather the idea that grown men can't use a little common sense for their own protection. If everything is going to be fixed up where no judgment is necessary, then the golfer should also be for-bidden to take a shower be-fore changing into his other clothes. Just let him smell like a golfer, whether he plays well or not. And then too, there is that 19th hole which could hold some hazards. Bet-ter still, maybe he should give up golf for croquet. (There are probably records to show some nasty falls over wickets.)

EVERYBODY IS IN THE ACT SOME WAY or other. The Transportation Depart-ment doesn't want under 21 year olds to drive farm trucks on the highway. It proposes that those who do be required to have a medical certificate not more than 24 months old and to pass a Federal written test.

WE COULD LIVE WITH-OUT THE PLEASANT, quiet, natural activity of the golf course—but not as well. Many farmers or ranchers would be in pretty bad shape if their boys are prohibited in operat-ing trucks and tractors. There's not much future in croquet if it's depended on for a liv-ing.

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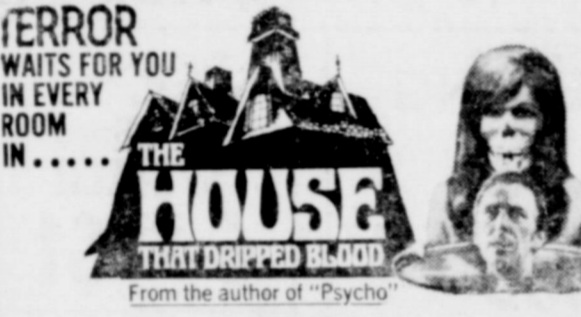
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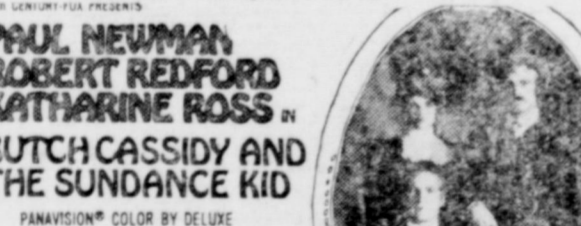
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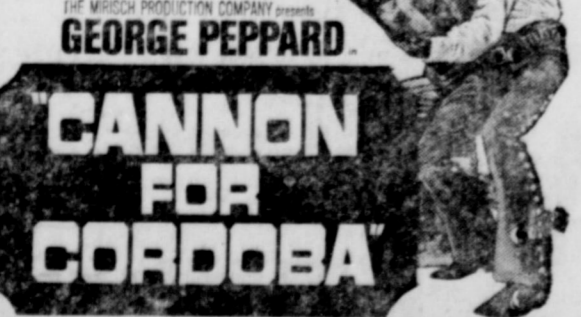

A Look at FANS!

(Ed. Note: The following article, from the October issue of TEXAS COACH is being passed around and discussed with interest in Eastland. We offer it here for readers' consideration in view of the recent near-perfect season of the Mavericks, who share district championship honors.)

H. L. Buster Moffett says **A FAN IS A FAN . . . is a fan . . . is a fan IS A FAN . . . is a fan**

I STAND BEFORE YOU this evening representing the typical Billy Supporter of Fredericksburg, Texas. For the benefit of those here to-night, that are not quite clear as to what I mean by the expression "Typical Billy Supporter," I would like to give you a brief description of myself and the role I play with the Billies.

Just what is my association with the Billies? As a typical Billy Supporter I like to think of myself as being their vast reservoir of Spirit, Hope, Faith and Strength.

I am that secret source of power that sometimes help lead the Billies to victory when all other systems have failed.

Ladies and Gentlemen, you have just heard the biggest Croak of shipwrecks since the Spanish Armada of 1588. It just so happens I go to the games because I like to be associated with a winner.

I go to the games because these Billies have made the entire state sit up and take notice of Fredericksburg since I live in Fredericksburg part of that glory goes to me.

I go to games because I have this selfish emotional need for victory and I have the ability to project myself into the lineup of a team loaded with glory.

When Jay Cox carries that ball I suddenly find myself five foot four and a bruising young dynamo of power, crashing through the line and picking up yard after yard while the hysterical crowd proclaims me their man of the hour. On the next play I become a six foot seven tackle crashing through the line and throwing a cowering quarterback for a 20-yard loss.

On the next play we fumble the ball, so I immediately get out of the game I do this by giving the Billies a good tongue lashing from where I sit in the stands.

Thereby convincing myself that I played no part in the blunder.

I go to the games to root for selfish personal victory and if the Billies deny ME my victories too often then I go to a few home games if I

don't have anything better to do.

I faithfully attend the Billy Booster meetings, with flamboyant patriotism . . . that is, if we're headed toward district championship but, if we're losing I consider these Billy Boosters just a bunch of OLD JOKERS who have to struggle to keep occupied.

If the Billies are good enough to keep ME in the lineup I hide my cigarettes when I see Coach Carlin Wicker on the street and run over and tug on his sleeve and say, "Ah-you coach Ah-you" and there I am standing on Main Street chatting with MY COACH right in front of God and everybody, but you let Carlin break a twenty-game winning streak with four straight losses and he suddenly reduced to an EGOTISTICAL LUNATIC who doesn't have the intelligence to listen to my grandstand advice on how to win a football game.

Their glory is MY glory, their mistakes are their own. If it's a good play, we did it; if it's a bad play they did it. It's STRICKLY A WE WON. They Lost proposition.

I personally couldn't stand the game. I sweated blood in those stands. I was miserable, nervous wreck in those stands, and chewed my fingernails all the way down to the quick.

All year long I've been trying to get those two out-of-town friends to come see US play. When are you going to come see us play? You just got to see us play. Well, they finally did come see us play. They came to see us play Friday before last.

There I was sitting in the stands with my pockets full of cigarettes and matches. . . Had my shoulder pads on and a friend looking over each shoulder. Boy, this was going to be MY NIGHT. I was really

going to SHOW OUR STUFF, but what happened? At the end of the first quarter we were leading by a measly seven points. I didn't waste any time letting my friends know that wasn't US playing the Billies playing that first quarter. I made that clear to them by making a simple statement. I said, "That's the sloppiest football I've ever seen the Billies play."

I played the last three quarters and as you know we won -43 to 0.

How about the time they carried our star halfback out of the game with a bad leg injury: I couldn't have cared less about that boy's agony, I was concerned about the state playoffs coming up next week. After all, everybody knows you can't win a state championship with a one-legged halfback.

Now, I've only got one set to help me lift myself from the depths of this limitation and immature cast in which I play, and that asset is insight, and if I work enough and long enough I hope one day to attain the title held by relatively few . . . that of a Genuine Fredericksburg Billie Supporter. But until I do attain that title I just have this to say to the Billies: "Your ability to love your fans in spite of all these weaknesses shows that you have qualities . . . qualities that each and every one of you can be proud of."

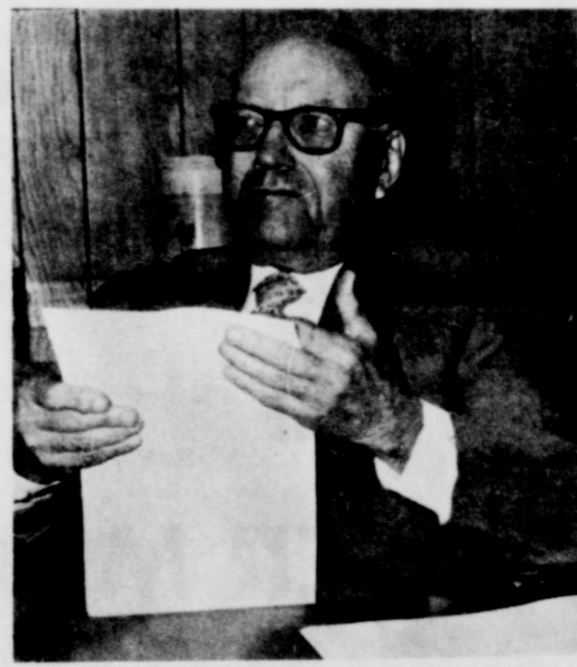

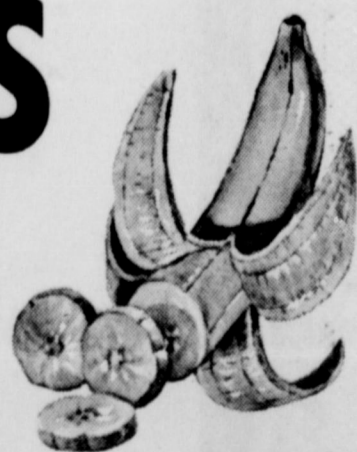

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
