"Uncle Foggy" might not mean much to folks around Eastland, but up in the Midwest, that name was nearly magic - and when you really think about it, it's possible that the man Clarence Tolg who earned that nickname, may have influenced lives in and around Eastland more than you might think.

He was an executive of the Munsingwear Co. at Minneapolis, Minn., as Operations Vice President, until his retirement in 1952. He was largely responsible for the company's expansion program and figured heavily in the company's growth and move toward the South and Southwest. While he didn't personally pick Eastland for the site of a Munsingwear plant, his thinking may have influenced decisions that affected people down here.

The Eastland Holly-wood-Vassarette plant, a division of Munsingwear, will celebrate its 25th Anniversary in November of this year and big plans are in the works. And quite a history it is.

Hollywood - Maxwell opened here in 1946 in the Lodge Hall Building and in 1952 the Commerce St. plant was opened. Later the same year, a East Main St. plant was opened. In 1957 Eastlanders built the present plant and all the operations were moved under one roof. That same year the giant Munsingwear Co. purchased Hollywood-Maxwell. Three years later the plant here was enlarged by some 10,000 square feet, and today the company has 250 employees and produces 840 DOZEN (10,080) bras a day - all shipped daily on a company truck to a Dallas warehouse for distribution.

There are two women who were here at the opening of the plant in 1946, who will be honored as employees of longest standing at the November celebration. They are Tina McBee and Stella Goforth. Stella was the manager of the original plant.

Herridges Hold A&M Record

COLLEGE STATION - Bill Herridge is a student at Texas A&M University.

So are his brothers Jim and Rusty and sisters Sharron and Teresa.

They are five of the six children of Mr. and Mrs. Bert T. Herridge, 203 N. Daugherty, Eastland.

The Herridges may hold the record, concedes university and Association of Former Students officials.

"It just sort of happened," commented Bill, a sophomore journalism major and eldest, at 24, of the campus clan. Jim is a senior in industrial technology; Bert (who goes by Rusty), a junior in physical education; Sharron, a Distinguished Student sophomore in pre-veterinary medicine, and Teresa, a freshman in journalism.

Bill admits he is largely responsible for the situation, which accounts for almost a fourth of the Aggies in the West Texas town of Eastland, between Fort Worth and Abilene.

He first visited Texas A & M in 1959 with a close friend and fourth generation Aggie, John R. (Randy) Leonard.

"I saw a football game and kind of got eaten up with the Aggie Spirit," Bill said. "We had always been traditional 'teasippers,' but I won them over one by one."

Rusty, like Jim and Bill a married student, revealed the depth of the job.

"When the Aggies hoodwinked TU with the Texas Special in the 1965 Thanksgiving game, Rusty got so mad listening on the radio he punched his fist through the wall," Bill related.

He and Teresa enrolled the first time this fall. An experienced newsman through work for the Eastland

Telegram, Bill has four years Air Force service as a sergeant and radar-navigation equipment technician.

Bill transferred 33 hours from parttime study at Tarrant County Junior College and also was a North Texas State student before entering the Air Force. Jim and Rusty transferred from Cisco Junior College.

"We've never had an Aggie in the family," he said. His father, area manager for a livestock handling equipment firm who checks by with the College of Veterinary Medicine occasionally, may have influenced Sharron into pre-vet.

"We go our separate ways," Bill added, "but every now and then we'll drop in and visit."

He and his wife Duane have a three-month-old son. Rusty has a nine-month-old. An older married brother works in Dallas.

"With six kids in the family, the folks always provided the necessities. Anything extra, we worked for ourselves," Bill explained his background of newspapering, photography, third class FCC license, butcher and short order cook.

"We're not afraid of work," he said the family is "real close and every holiday usually turns into a family reunion."

With Bill and Jim and Rusty and Sharron and Teresa all at A&M, Bert and Marjorie Herridge won't have any problems keeping track of their children.

Sewer Plant Would Please Grid Fans, Residents, State Board

People who go to football games in Eastland, people who live in the general vicinity of the present plant and the Texas Water Quality Board know that Eastland must have a new sewerage disposal plant.

Could it really be that the football season just around the corner will be the last to be plagued by the odor from the plant? It could be if all goes well. Folks in Eastland understand that the need is great. It's been one of those things that all have known we've needed for years, but due to a tight-money policy (that got the city out of debt) the city has just kept postponing the inevitable of replacing the plant.

The time is just about here when the Water Quality Board won't let the city postpone it any longer. The file of letters from the Board to City Officials is fat and the reports are unkind, because examiners come out and measure the actual amount of suspended solids and tell officials in no uncertain terms that the Eastland plant does not meet minimum standards.

Some residents on the east side of town have expressed their concern that the new plant might even be closer to them. This is not the case. Actually, a definite site has not been settled upon. A preliminary report has been made by the engineering firm of Yeatts and Decker, and even in its initial thinking, location of a new plant won't be any closer, and certainly with the improved efficiency of a new system, odor should not be a problem for any resident.

Voters will decide on Tuesday, Sept. 21 on a \$92,000 bond issue to help install a new plant.

The State Board has been very understanding because they've realized that Eastland people were aware of the problem and that steps were being made to correct the situation. (The Board has the right to impose fines of up to \$1,000 per day for faulty operation.)

A sample report from the Texas Water Quality Board:

ving your community was conducted by Mr. Joe Morgan, Sanitarian, Region XI Fort Worth, Texas, in company with Mr. Don McClendon, Water and Sewer Superintendent.

"As a result of this survey we have the following recommendations to transmit to you for your consideration and necessary action:

"With maximum efficiency in daily maintenance and operation of the sewage treatment plant being obtained, an acceptable effluent may be discharged to the receiving stream. However, the plant was constructed in 1920 and is in a state of deterioration in addition to not meeting the present day design criteria for sewage treatment plants set forth by the Texas State Department of Health. Further, the topograp by is such that only a slight rise, approximately 12 inches, in the receiving stream will restrict the sewage from flowing through the trickling filters, consequently flooding the secondary sewage treatment facilities. Therefore, it is recommended that at serious consideration be given to retaining the services of a registered professional engineer well versed in the field of sewage treatment processes to make a study of these problems and design and construct adequate sewage treatment facilities for the City of Eastland."

Courthouse. The telephone number is 629-1636. In charge of the office is Tommy J. Lawson, County Executive Director. The office has a staff of 5 persons.

"Ours and all ASCS Offices throughout the nation, will function as information centers in all locations outside of highly urbanized areas," Lyerla said.

County ASCS offices are not to handle complaints or appeals, he said. They will serve only to provide official information. Persons with complaints will register them with the most convenient district or sub-district office of the Internal Revenue Service.

The Musingwear people are distributing copies of a book by Uncle Foggy and though much of the locale is unknown to us here, the American wit and common sense expressed, can be appreciated anywhere:
"A man has a right to be foolish about his own house," was a favorite quote of the late Uncle Foggy, a former Operations Vice President at Musingwear, Inc. Uncle Foggy was a pseudonym for the late Clarence Toig, a 35-year veteran of the national textile and apparel firm, who retired in 1952 at the age of 65.
Musingwear and WCCO Radio have collaborated on publishing a book which is a compilation of wisdom and wit from this well-known textile man who later became a household word to thousands of fans in the upper midwest. Uncle Foggy was a storehouse of information, dispersing observations and tips throughout the day on subjects ranging from methods of making sauer kraut to thoughts on hospital baths.
The book contains numerous interesting recollections such as the Twin Cities' battle over the appropriate location of the first Federal Reserve Bank in the area; a shipment through his home town constituting the nucleus of the famous Alaskan reindeer herds and winterizing the family home in Wisconsin with manure.
Other interesting anecdotes refer to special order size underwear, and another story explaining artificial shade reveals the part Uncle Foggy and his father played in keeping the Ferris wheel rolling at the 1892 Chicago Columbian Expedition. There are many more stories both useful and entertaining.
In an effort to capture the color and flavor of Uncle Foggy's reminiscences, the book relates nearly verbatim his recorded thoughts while lying in his hospital bed toward the end of his energetic and fulfilled life.
"I've been told I'm the world's oldest tennager, which may be because a rule of life of mine has always been to have some fun everyday as you go along," Uncle Foggy said. He did just that, and in so doing brought pleasure to thousands of people in the upper-midwest area, becoming their heuristic hero.
The book is richly illustrated with sketches depicting various tales and photographs of turn-of-the-century scenes. To emphasize Uncle Foggy's concern with ecology and conservation, "The Lore of Uncle Foggy" has been printed on recycled paper stock.
Proceeds from the book will go to education grants for scholarships in the field of ecology.
Priced at \$1.95 for the paperback edition and \$3.50 for the hard cover edition, the book may be obtained by pre-paid mail request to "The Lore of Uncle Foggy", Box 780, Minneapolis, Minnesota 55440.

Gordon's Spot

By De Gordon, County Agent

Nitrogen deficiency is beginning to show up in many lawns. Several folks have called and asked why their lawns are turning yellowish-green color and the grass is "firing" even when there is plenty of moisture. Nitrogen deficiency is often confused with lack of moisture. When nitrogen is needed the tips of the grass turn yellow to brown and later this color extends down the midrib. A moisture deficiency is indicated by wilting of the plants or curling of the leaves. The abundant moisture since July 23 has caused maximum growth of lawn grasses and most of the nitrogen has been used. If your lawn shows

symptoms of nitrogen deficiency you may apply nitrogen at the rate of one to two pounds per 1000 square feet. For example if you apply 33-0-0 it would take three to six pounds per 1000 square feet. It would take five to nine pounds of 21-0-0 per 1000 square feet to give you one to two pounds of nitrogen.

Your lawn should have a more balanced fertilizer around October 15 to help feed the grass roots through the winter. This will help the grass to come out strong and vigorous next spring. This fertilizer should be applied at the rate of two pounds of actual nitrogen per 1000 square feet.

If your grass continues to be yellow after nitrogen has been applied you may have an iron deficiency which is very common in the area. An application of iron sulfate at the rate of five pounds per 1000 square feet will correct this ironing problem.

The Pioneer Farmers Cooperative had their annual meeting and barbeque Monday night, August 30. They were kind enough to invite my family and me to be their guests for this annual meeting.

About five years ago these peanut producers got together to solve a peanut marketing problem. Their success is a good example of the progress that can be made when people work together to solve common problems.

Their organization is run very efficiently. Credit is due their board of directors, chaired by Cowan Hutton, and the manager, James Cox. Vernon Phillips was elected as a new director for the Coop.

I've been told that cotton was once King in Eastland County. Have you seen a field of cotton recently? It's unusual to see cotton growing in this area. However, Robert Tucker of Carbon has about 70 acres of cotton and at first look you think it should make one bale per acre. The cotton is three to four feet tall and has blooms and bolls from top to bottom. However, the cotton insects, which ran cotton out of the county in the first place, have almost destroyed the crop.

Do you have month left over at the end of the money? If so, you are among a large group including myself. Make plans now to attend the meeting on income budgeting September 21 at the Texas Electric Reddy Room in Eastland. This will be the first night of the Family Business Institute. It will be an evening meeting and there is no attendance fee.



LEGAL NOTICE

AN Act relating to the recording and rerecording of livestock brands and marks; and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this State. In all the counties, each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Act takes effect, have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.

(b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and mark in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

(c) After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act, all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months, only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

(d) Immediately upon the taking effect of this Act, the county clerk of the county shall have this Act published in some newspaper of general circulation in the county for a period of thirty days. The publication shall be paid for by the county out of the general county fund.

Sec. 2. All clerks in reregistering brands shall comply with Articles 6890 through 6899, inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, and with Section 1, Chapter 273, Acts of the 41st Legislature, 1929, as amended (Article 6899a, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes), and shall also be aware of and comply with Articles 1484, 1485, and 1486 of the Penal Code of Texas, 1925.

Sec. 3. All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Act shall be reregistered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Act.

Sec. 4. The importance of this legislation and the crowded condition of the calendars in both Houses create an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the Constitutional Rule requiring bills to be read on three several days in each House be suspended, and this Rule is hereby suspended; and that this Act take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.

After the line is installed the fee would be \$100.00 plus the cost of tapping and service lines and other cost of connection.

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

New Mail



Postmaster Marcus O'Dell, amplifying on a new mail service program recently announced by Washington headquarters, today identified local areas which are to receive overnight delivery of first-class mail originating within the Eastland area.

Postmaster O'Dell said two Sectional Center areas contiguous to Eastland will benefit from the next-day

deliveries under a new mail service goal announced by Postmaster General Winton M. Blount.

These areas, Postmaster O'Dell said, include all associate offices of the following Sectional Centers: Stephenville, Tex. Brownwood, Tex.

This a total of 106 offices. Postmaster General Blount on August 26 unveiled the Postal Service's new goal of overnight delivery of local area first-class mail deposited by 5 p.m.

"The Postmaster General has pointed out that this program will affect more than half of all first-class letter mail

sent in the United States," Postmaster O'Dell said. "So customers of every post office in the country will be benefitting from the new service goal."

Substantially more than half of the 52 billion pieces of first-class mail handled annually are for delivery in the city where deposited or in nearby communities.

The areas outlined today by Postmaster O'Dell are those within which next-day delivery will be provided for ZIP-coded first-class mail deposited by 5 p.m. on weekdays in the Post Office lobby drops.


