

Mavericks Open Season With Big Win Over Tribe

The Eastland Mavericks went to Haskell Friday night and almost came up on the other end of the game.

On the first play from scrimmage, Haskell's Tailback Jackie Young, a 165 Junior, took a handoff from Quar-

terBack Bobby Cobb, broke over right tackle, shook off a couple of blocks, cut, and headed upfield, outrunning Eastland's backfield for an 89 yard touchdown play.

The try for point after was no good and with only 24 seconds into the game.

This came of somewhat of a complete shock to Mav fans as they were heavily favored this year being rated second in the state in Class 8 AA.

The Mavericks got on the score board with an 85 yard drive, taking only six minutes, of the quarter. Craig Lund carried the ball in from the two yard line to rack up six points for the Mavericks. With only 40 seconds left in the period, Howard King, running back, was given the handoff on the point after and charged over for the two points, and the Mav's took an 8-6 lead over the Indians.

Haskell's next drive in which the Indians found the Maverick defensive line too tough to penetrate, were forced to punt. Randy Rexroat, returned the ball 42 yards to the Indians' 10 yard line.

On the first play from scrimmage, Lund faked a hand off and went in for his second score. King again took the handoff and went in for the extra points. The score then stood at 16-6, Eastland.

The Mavericks managed to get one more push going scoring on a 27 yard drive. Ruben Gaeta, carried for the final two yards over right tackle. Craig Lund failed to collect for the two points and the score, 22-6, Eastland with 8:30 seconds left in the first half of play.

Neither team could muster a drive in the third quarter, with the exception of Haskell moving the ball to Eastland's six yard line. Eastland held and took over on downs when a fourth and five drive stopped Haskell. Jackie Young, for the Haskell Indians, totaled 183 yards on 19 carries and was the leading ball carrier.

Howard King finished the game with 137 yards in 18 carries to capture the leading ball carrier title for Eastland.



Gordon Report

By De Gordon, County Agent

We now have application forms for ordering windbreak seedling trees. These seedlings will be delivered this winter. They must be used for windbreak planting, but must not be used for ornamentals or for resale. The cost of the windbreak seedlings are \$2.50 per 100.

Some of the varieties include Arizona Cypress, Baldcypress, Black Locust, Catalpa, Chinese Elm, Cottonwood, Eucalyptus, Green Ash, Mulberry, Osage Orange, Sweetgum, Sycamore and several varieties of Pine.

We hear a lot about pollution these days. Sediment eroded from the soil of our rural areas and towns is one of the most universal and troublesome pollutants.

Eroded sediment causes serious damage to the places from which it came and to the places in which it finally comes to rest.

It reduces the productive capacity of the soil and clogs culverts, storm sewers, drainage ditches, and family rooms. It can carry diseases-causing and disease-carrying organisms into public water supplies. And, these sediments also interfere with treatment process.

The real tragedy of this situation is that there is no need for any of it to happen at all. The technical information and know-how to prevent soil erosion is available for the asking. Pollution control begins at home and is everyone's responsibility.

Farmers and ranchers as well as others in Eastland County should become familiar with the new vehicle brake law passed recently by the Texas Legislature.

Buried on Coast

An elderly man who apparently was heading back to his home, after wandering from a Robstown nursing home, Thursday August 26, was found dead yesterday by a Department of Public Safety helicopter after a three-day search by the Robstown Police Department.

Charlie Leslie Cornelius, 70, was found in some tall grass near the railroad tracks just west of the Lon C. Hill power plant about 12:30 p.m. according to Police Detective Fernando Garza.

A native of Athens, he had lived in Nueces County since 1943. Before retiring in 1959 he was a pump gauger for Mobil Oil Co. for 37 years.

Funeral services were in the Clifford-Jackson Funeral Chapel. Burial was in Memory Gardens Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife Vera Deaton Thurber; two sons, Thomas A. Cornelius of Corpus Christi and George A. The new law applies to every trailer, semi-trailer, and pole trailer equipped with air or vacuum actuated brakes and every trailer in excess of 3,000 pounds. These trailers must now be equipped with brakes acting on all wheels which can be applied automatically and promptly and remain applied for at least 15 minutes upon breakaway from the towing vehicle.

However, there are some exceptions to the law. Trailers with a gross weight of 3,000 pounds or less and those weighing 40 percent or less of the towing vehicle are exempt. Also farm trailers or semi-trailers moving temporarily on highways at speeds of 30 miles per hour or less and having a gross weight of 10,000 pounds or less are exempt from the brake requirements if they are otherwise exempt from vehicle registration laws.

Other special brake requirements were added for mobile homes, certain vehicles in driveway and towaway operations, and certain trucks and truck-trailers having three or more axles.

Officers of the Texas Department of Public Safety have more specific information on the new brake law as well as the effective date of the various provisions of the law.

GOOD Credit Is Good Credit Family Finance Session Set

30 Days to Reality

What is a credit card? You probably use credit whether you realize it or not. When you pay your gas or electric bill once a month, you actually are using credit.

A credit card makes it easy to pay later for many of the things you buy. The card is sometimes made of heavy plastic probably with your name stamped or embossed into it. When you present this to clerks, you can charge almost anything. Some credit cards even allow you to charge cash loans.

Recent legislation makes these provisions: You do not have to pay more than \$50 in case your credit card is lost or stolen and someone uses it, even if you did not notify the card company.

You do not have to pay, in any case, when you phone or write the card company.

Notice by mail is effective on the date of the postmark on a card or letter.

You do not have to pay the charges made with a credit card that you did not ask for. Your credit card must have your name in writing or a picture of you on the card issued after January 1971. After January 1972, all credit cards must have personal identifying evidence, such as your handwritten name, picture or thumbprint on them.

LEGAL NOTICE

AN ACT relating to the recording and rerecording of livestock brands and marks; and declaring an emergency; BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this State. In all the counties, each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Act takes effect, have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.

(b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and mark in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

(c) After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act, all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months, only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

(d) Immediately upon the taking effect of this Act, the county clerk of the county shall have this Act published in some newspaper of general circulation in the county for a period of thirty days. The publication shall be paid for by the county out of the general county fund.

Sec. 2. All clerks in reregistering brands shall comply with Articles 6890 through 6899, inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, and with Section 1, Chapter 273, Acts of the 41st Legislature, 1929, as amended (Article 6899a, Civil Statutes), and shall also be aware of and comply with Articles 1484, 1485, and 1486 of the Penal Code of Texas, 1925.

Sec. 3. All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Act shall be reregistered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Act.

Sec. 4. The importance of this

legislation and the crowded condition of the calendars in both Houses create an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the Constitutional Rule requiring bills to be read on three several days

in each House be suspended, and this Rule is hereby suspended; and that this Act take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.
