



Plans are complete for Eastland's Annual New Car and Farm Equipment Show and Sidewalk Sale to be held Saturday, October 16 in downtown Eastland, according to an announcement by the sponsoring Chamber of Commerce today.

All Eastland auto dealers are participating and will have new model displays on the south and west side of the square that day.

In addition, over 30 merchants will be participating in a gigantic merchandise and service give-away, and will be taking registrations for the free gifts in their respective stores on Thursday, Oct. 14, through Saturday, Oct. 16. The Chamber of Commerce will provide booths on the square for Saturday registration for those firms ordinarily closed on Saturday.

Lower hail insurance rates for Eastland County? Don't guess anyone would object to that.

And it's a possibility -- thanks to the initial efforts of officials from seven affected counties.

Eastland County is one of seven counties that border, and are now a part of, the high-rate Inland-Northwest Insurance Rate zone, where premium payers pay the highest extended coverage rates in the state. This zone includes the high-risk Lubbock-Panhandle area, and the officials will appeal to the State Insurance Commission which meets each February to hear complaints and requests, to be transferred to the middle-inland-central zone which pays the lowest rates.

## Creel Murder Trial To Begin Here Monday

Columbus Day will be marked in Eastland County Monday with the closing of banks, federal and state offices -- and the beginning of the James Creel murder trial.

The Dyess AFB airman will be tried for murder with malice of an 11-year-old Abilene girl. The case was transferred here on a change of venue, May 25.

The death penalty is being asked.

Presiding Judge Earl Conne Jr., who denied a defense motion to change the site from Eastland County in a hearing on July 8, will convene the court Monday and a long list of special veniremen will visit the courtroom on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and perhaps Thursday.

Creel has been in custody in the Eastland County Jail since the motion for another change

of venue was denied. A total of 40 witnesses have been subpoenaed for the state and the defense has called five witnesses.

Eastland Attorney, Bill B. Hart, has been engaged as local counsel to assist with the defense, and he guesses that it may take four days to seat a jury.

On Monday, 66 of the potential jurors will appear; 60 on Tuesday; 60 on Wednesday; and 60 on Thursday.

## United Fund Budget Approved

The Indians, instead of scalping someone were scalped Friday night in Comanche as the Mavericks turned the tide on the Indians.

Howard King scored four touchdowns and three two-point conversions as the Eastland Mavericks, top-ranked in 2A, demolished the Comanche Indians 61-14.

One of King's TD jobs covered 76 yards, but teammate Randy Rexroat best that with an 85-yarder, both scores coming in a busy second quarter.

Tony Thomas scored two touchdowns for the undefeated Mavericks and James Eidson and Craig Lund one apiece, the latter a 20-yard trip.

All nine Eastland touchdowns were scored on the ground. Eidson kicked one extra point.

## Fire Prevention - A Must

An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. A touch of carelessness can cause hundreds of dollars of damage and cost human lives.

Last week, October 3-9, was a time of the year set aside to emphasize fire prevention. However, it needs to be realized that fire prevention is a full time job. Citizens of Eastland need to be made known the importance of fire prevention all year long. According to Fire Marshall, Guy Robinson, it is easy to forget how really important fire prevention really is, as we do not see the galmour in fire prevention as we do in fire fighting. "There is something about fire that attracts people," says Robinson.

It is not always easy to see just how much one accomplishes in fire prevention. That life that is saved because someone taught fire prevention. All the property that was saved by prevention methods.

It is not always easy to realize how much this really means to a community and individuals. Fire occurs each day and every day in the United States costing an average of 33 lives, 1,486 homes, 215 apartment buildings, 30 schools, 10

churches, 215 stores, offices and restaurants, 129 industrial plants, and buildings and buildings on 127 farms.

Last year alone, approximately 2,550,000 fires claimed 12,200 lives and cost the nation \$2.65 billion in property destroyed or damaged.

The tragic fact is that much of this is waste of lives, and property is avoidable. If the basic rules of fire safety were observed at home and on the job, the record could be far different.

Some 85,000 building fires in the United States each year originate with dirty, defective heating and cooking equipment.

Fire Marshall Robinson Says, "Right now, during the Fire Prevention Week, is a good time to have your heating system cleaned and repaired. Don't let it go until you could be caught by the first cold snap. Check your chimneys, make sure they are clean and tight. How long since you cleaned the greasy deposits from the exhaust fan and duct over your range? A little elbow grease now may save a lot of grief from fire later."

Fires kill an average of more

than 33 victims in the United States each and every day of the year. Residents of fires are responsible for about half of the nations fire deaths.

Children and elderly are most frequently the victims of fire at home. About a third of the children of the children who die each year from fires are without supervision of a responsible baby sitter when tragedy occurs.

Smoking and matches consistently rank as the number
