

Mavericks Seek Quarter-Final Title In Tilt With Childress Friday Nite

SHOTWELL ABILENE: 8

The Eastland Mavericks and the Childress Bobcats have at least one other thing in common.

They both will be gunning for the State Quarter-Final Football Title in Abilene Friday night, with a 8:00 kickoff in Shotwell Stadium.

Their other common tie is the fact that the "Stinnet" means something to each. Childress lost to Stinnet, 35-20 in pre-season play this year, and a 1966 Maverick team lost to a Stinnet team, in a semi-Final Contest.

As the Mavericks head into the genuine finals for the State Crown, it's getting down to the brass-tacks time for the Big Herd. So far, they're riding a win streak that goes way back to the beginning of this season. Undefeated, they've earned the District 8-AA, Bi-District and Regional Crowns for the EHS trophy case. Their work is cut out for them in their bid for a Quarter-Final prize.

Childress is rated no push-over. They had a perfect district season, beating Quanah, 25-0; Seagraves, 13-0; Shamrock, 27-0; Wellington, 33-0; and tied Electra, 0-0. They beat Phillips, 37-7 for Bi-District Title and Lubbock Roosevelt, 14-6 for the Regional crown. In pre-season play, the Bobcats also lost to Class A

Clarendon, 41-19; Tulia, 15-6; beat Hamlin, 24-0; and Paducah, 34-0.

Maverick Quarterbacking duties appeared to be in fine shape at midweek as Chief Signal-Caller Craig Lund reported his knee "feeling better" after getting it injured slightly in drills Monday. Last season, the Mavericks lost the fine services of Lund. Last season, the Mavericks lost the

fine services of Lund to a knee injury, and surgery early this year appeared to have it under control. The Monday injury to the opposite knee was reported slight, and attendants expect it to be ready for Friday night action.

In either event, the Mavericks' back-up Ron McCleskey reported himself ready to go if needed at the slot position.

Reserved seat ticket sales were booming at the school office this week, with over 1,075 sold Monday, and the school re-ordering to be ready for the mid-week sales. Tickets are \$2.25 for adults and \$1 for students. No student tickets will be sold at the gate, and the gate price will be \$2.50 each. Tickets will be available here through 1 p.m. Friday.

The Childress squad appears to be relatively light, but agile,

and a duel equal to the lofty contest is expected Friday night.

Eastland is being joined by other teams in its district in boosting for a win. Coleman, whom Eastland beat for the district title, will send its cheerleaders to Eastland Thursday for a pep rally, and

BRIEFCASE FLY-AWAY

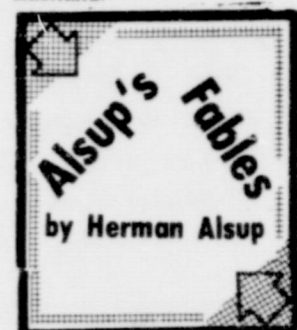
LOST: one important briefcase!

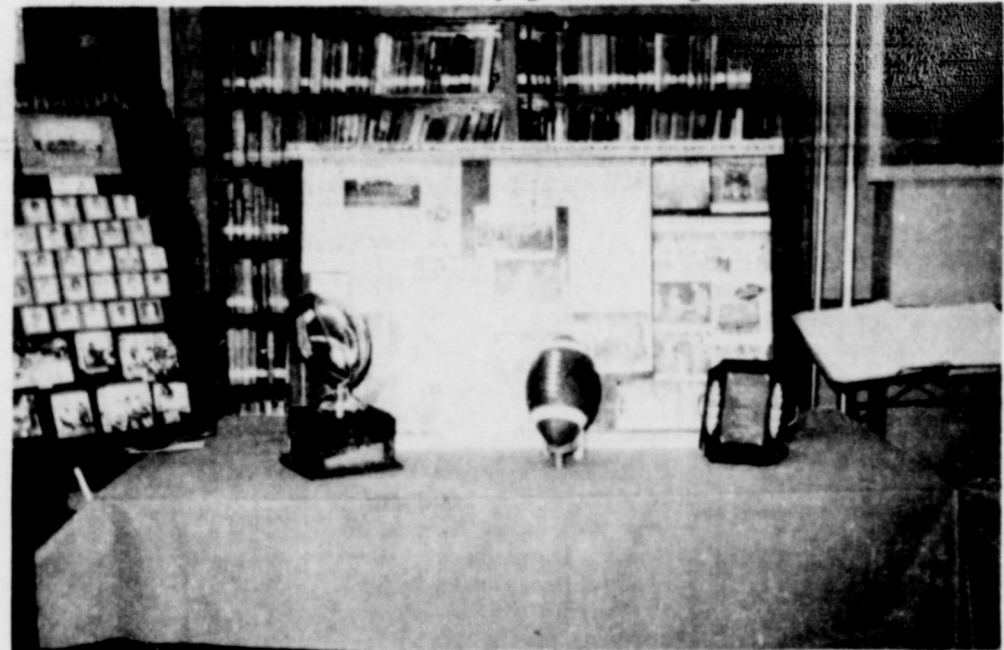

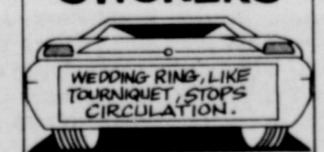

Granddaughter Of Locals Gets Achievement

Susan Crouch Geary, granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. W.F. Crouch of Lake Leon, is one of the 23 finalists from Texas in the Achievement Awards. Last spring a committee of English teachers in Odessa High School nominated Susan to represent that school in the national competition. 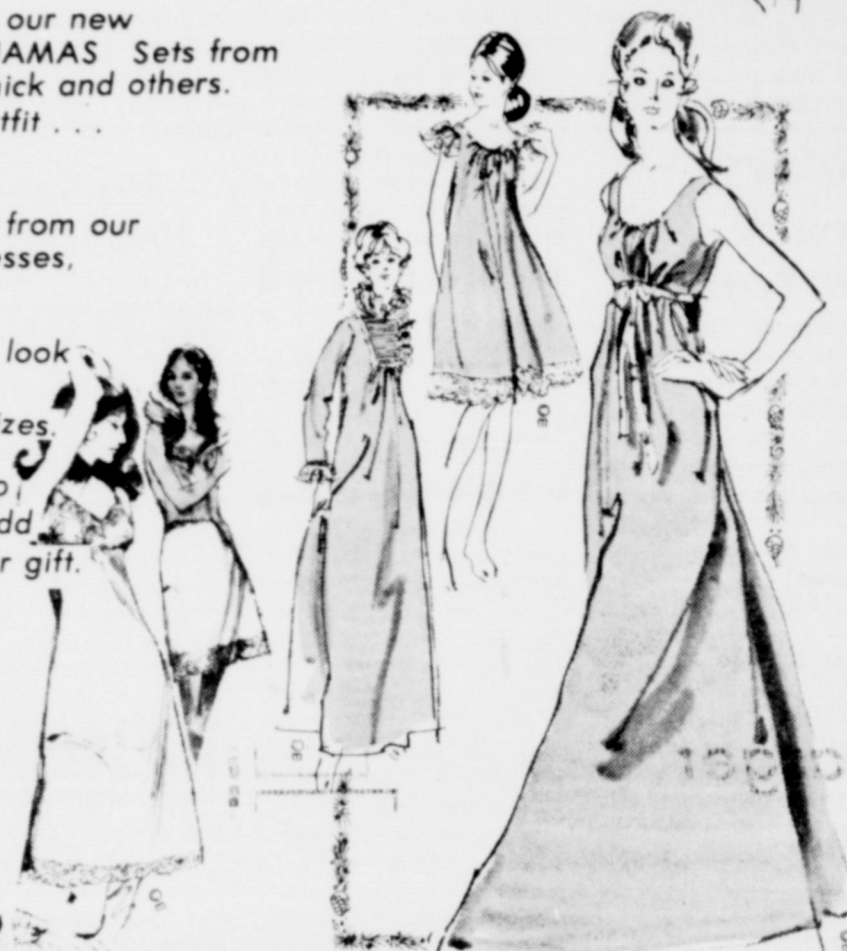

A Look At The Opposition... Room For New Faces

Childress coach Charlie Johnston must feel like old Mother Hubbard who went to the cupboard and found it bare. Johnston's not quite in that bad a predicament as he examines his depleted forces for the 1971 gridiron season. Only eight lettermen return from last year's mighty Class AA state quarter-finalist and only one back. All-State tackle candidate John Holland and halfback Larry Johnson are two of the three starters returning on offense while only two veterans return on defense. But lest one gets the idea that the Bobcats won't be the team to beat, take a look at their record the last three years. Besides last year's 11-1-1 team (lost to Haskell in the playoffs and tied Shamrock 6-6), the Bobcats finished 9-1 in 1969, losing only to eventual state champion Iowa Park, and were 7-2-1 the year before. That figures out to 27 wins, four losses and two ties in the last three years under Johnston. "We will have to get experience quickly

in order to play with the teams in our district," remarked Johnston, a drawing little mentor. The Bobcats will send their troops into rugged gridiron warfare in the season opener against a veteran Clarendon team. Experience will come the hard way. Fair speed and winning tradition are the two ingredients in Childress' favor, according to Johnston, but a stronger district and better balance will make a repeat of the 2-AA championship a difficult task. "We have only six seniors and we lack experience and depth in key positions such as the backfield, linebackers, centers and guards." Holland, a big lineman at 6-4 and 190 pounds, has exceptional quickness as proved by his play on the basketball court and a rugged sparring partner in tackle Paul Rogers. The latter, a one-year veteran, stands 6-5 and 195. No other team in the loop will have a pair of tackles to match. Larry Johnson, a fleet 160-pound halfback, is the lone backfield veteran but he's a good one. Johnson, who started in 1970, romped for five touchdowns. A big man in the Childress rebuilding program is little 5-8 quarterback Tuck Nelson, who lettered in 1970. The Bobcat offense can hardly be expected to score 290 points like the 1970 crew and it will be a challenge for the defense to match the defense which rationed a meager 49 points in 13 games.

Ends David Bradford (6-1, 180), Brett Parr (6-2, 155) and Jerry Neel (5-8, 140), who will probably play wingback, form a nifty receiving trio. The only other experienced lineman is Terry Compton, a 5-11, 160-pounder. Johnston takes the "bull by the horns" this season and the fiery director realizes the challenge. He just hopes that a look in the cupboard at the end of the season will produce the district championship trophy.

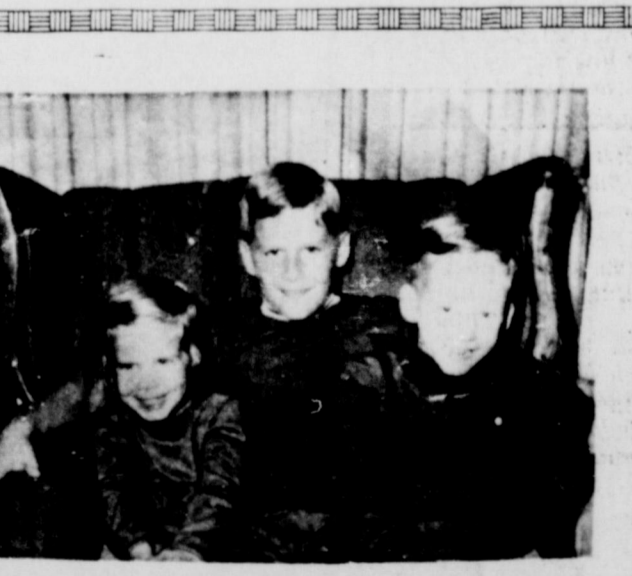

Agriculture Primes County Pump by \$33 Million Annually

Agriculture in all its phases—called agribusiness—adds almost \$10 billion annually to the Texas economy and over \$533 million to Eastland County's economy.

Eight billion dollars of the total are off-farm revenues. Revenues are generated from manufacturing and supplying essentials for producing, processing and distributing agricultural commodities. The remaining \$2 billion consists of value added in farming and ranching and government payments to agriculture.

Agribusiness provided employment for 35-40 percent of the Texas labor force. Farm and ranch operators, or members of their families working on farms, numbered 190,000 during 1970. Hired workers on farms and ranches numbered 92,000 and were paid \$250 million in 1970.

An additional 1,315,000 workers were engaged in off-farm agribusiness employment. The off-farm percentage has increased as Texas farms enlarged, commercialized, specialized and mechanized. The rural population has dropped to approximately 2.3 million out of a total of more than 11 million, but many who live in cities own farms for revenue, recreation or other reasons.

Total value of farm assets in Texas is about \$29 billion including \$27 billion for physical assets and \$2 billion in financial assets. Real estate taxes paid by Texas farmers were \$119 million in 1970 compared with

\$70.6 million in 1960. Taxes averaged 82 cents per acre in 1970 and 47 cents in 1960.

Texas Agriculture consists of some 188,000 farms and ranches which contain 140 million acres.

Last year, 282,000 farm workers applied a half billion man-hours of labor to this vast enterprise.

To operate the agricultural plant, Texas farmers and ranchers spent:

- + \$517 million for feed and seed
- + \$387 million for machinery and other capital items.
- + \$352 million for repairs, petroleum, etc.

- + \$294 million for livestock.
- + \$250 million for hired labor.
- + \$127 million for interest on farm mortgage debt.
- + \$115 million for fertilizer and lime.
- + \$119 million for farm real estate taxes.
- + \$460 million for interest on operating loans, and a wide variety of other operating inputs.

From this agricultural plant, farmers and ranchers sold:

- + \$1,383 million of cattle and calves. (\$3,935,500 in Eastland County in 1971)
- + \$221 million of poultry and eggs. (\$1,045,300)
- + \$205 million of dairy products. (405,280)
- + \$68 million of hogs. (\$240,000)
- + \$69 million of other

livestock and livestock products. (\$223,340)

- + \$395 million of feed crops. (\$1,318,500)
- + \$355 million of cotton.
- + \$149 million of wheat and rice.
- + \$185 million of vegetables, fruits and nuts. (\$136,500)
- + \$107 million of other crops. (Peanuts, \$5,018,000)

About 40 million tons of products are hauled from Texas farms and ranches each year. Nearly all of it requires further handling by the food and fiber marketing system before being consumed.

The marketing system has the equivalent of one million full-time workers who add \$5.5 billion in value to the agricultural food and fibers. Cash receipts for farm marketings during 1970 were \$3.1 billion compared with \$3 billion in 1969, and \$2.7 billion in 1968. Livestock and their products' sales brought \$1.9 billion in 1970 and \$1.8 billion in 1969. Crop cash receipts were \$1.2 billion in 1970, slightly above 1969.

Interdependence among sectors of the economy is readily recognized. The impact of change in any one sector depends on the overall structure of the economy—local, state-wide or national. Agriculture as a sector has a significant impact on all Texans and their economic well-being. There are many ways of illustrating its importance.

Agriculture is one of the most efficient sectors of the

economy. In 1970, each farm worker supplied himself and 45 people. Only 10 years ago, he was producing enough for 23.

Output per man-hour of farm work has increased 223 percent since 1950. During this same period, total U.S. crop and livestock production increased 40 percent. Improved technology and management were key factors in these increases. The benefits were reflected through the marketing system to the consumer.

The average consumer spent 16.5 percent of his 1970 disposable income for food—a drop of 19 percent in 10 years. Per capita food consumption increased 6 percent during that same decade.

Consumer market value of Texas agricultural products is almost \$9 billion compared with value of production for raw minerals (fuels and non-fuels) of about \$6 billion. These two segments dominate the state's economy.
