LOBOES BEGIN DRILLING FOR GAME FRIDAY

CISCO, Texas, Oct. 20.—The Cisco Loboes Monday began drilling for their game with the Eastland Mavericks on Chesley Field next Friday, which will be one of the best ones of the Oil Belt.

The Loboes emerged from their game with the Breckenridge Buckaroos Friday without any serious damages to anything but their Oil Belt record, and ready to take on the Mavericks.

The battle in the mud proved that the Loboes have much more than many of the fans have given them credit for having and that they have improved vastly since the beginning of the season.

They were the first team to jump into the lead over Breckenridge and the second to score on weight and numbers as the game progressed.

Over at Eastland the Mavericks, picked to finish about last or near it, have been coming along by leaps and bounds. After scaring the Brownwood fans badly in the last quarter of their game, they snatched a game from the Ranger Bulldogs in the closing minutes of play.

The Mavericks are light—something about the weight of the Loboes—but are fast. Their linemen made monkeys of the Ranger line all afternoon, sifting through as though the Bulldog forwards were not there, to bring down the big backs before they could get started.

Their passing attack is vastly improved, while there are a couple of backs wearing the Red and Black who could go places on almost anybody's team.

All in all, it looks like a natural. Eastland won last year for the first time in history and will be out to repeat and make it a successful season, while the Loboes will be trying just as hard to wipe out that 1934 loss.
