Uncle Sam Is John Smith

It is the business of Harry L. Hopkins, WPA administrator, to pass money out rather than take it in. He does receive some money once in a while, however, and it is doubtful that he ever got a more significant check than the one he received recently from Fred Hohner.

Fred Hohner is an unemployed mechanic living in Newark, N. J. In 1925 he got some help from the WPA. Since then he has not needed any help; but he never could forget that he had had help when he needed it, and so the other day he set out to square the account.

He had \$112 at the time—and no job. But he went down to a postoffice and bought a money order for \$100, and then mailed it to Hopkins.

My money was getting so low that if I hadn't paid it when I did I might have had no money to pay," he explained. "The government did its best to me, and I wanted to do my best to the government."

The obvious comment on all of this, of course, is that it is a pity that more people don't have the same kind of conscience that Fred Hohner has. Millions upon millions of people have been helped by the government in the last five or six years; only a few have remembered to pay the government after they got on their feet again.

That doesn't mean that most people are ungrateful. It simply means that very few of us ever realize just what this government of ours really is.

It isn't a thing which exists of itself, an independent entity which floats cloudily in the sky over Washington and glowers down blessings every so often. In reality it is nothing more or less than the instrument through which all of us act. It is ourselves, in short—John Smith and his fellow citizens.

So when "the government" does something for a man—provides a job for him, pays his rent, bails out his business, or whatever—that is actually happening is that that man's fellow citizens are coming to his rescue. He isn't being aided by a benevolent old gentleman with chin whiskers, known as Uncle Sam, or Santa Claus; he is being aided by his own countrymen, and all of them, in one degree or another, are paying the bill.

Perhaps people like Fred Hohner recognize that fact. If so, it is a little easier to see why they insist on repaying what they have received. They aren't repaying a mythical Uncle Sam; they are repaying their own fellows, precisely as they would if they had borrowed from the next-door neighbor.

We would have a much clearer perspective on all of the activities of our government, and of our own obligations toward it, if we shared in that recognition of its true essence.

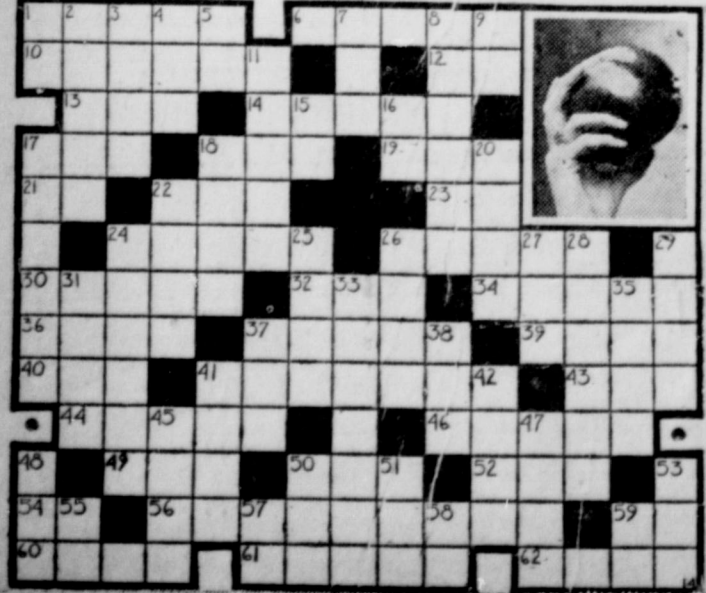

Review of Parole System Is Planned

AUSTIN.—Whether the parole system now in force in Texas is working satisfactorily will be reviewed next month. A conference of 1,100 parole board members serving in 243 counties has been called for June 17 and 18. The conference will be at Huntsville, seat of the prison system.

Burke P. Dougherty, governor's assistant in charge of the prison system, is urging all board members to attend. He said other states are making inquiries about Texas' results. The Texas plan attracted the attention of the federal government. A special survey was made, resulting in a favorable report. Under the Texas system, convicts are paroled to county boards, which promise to keep track of them and help them to obtain lawful employment. Failure to report to the local board results in cancellation of a convict's parole.

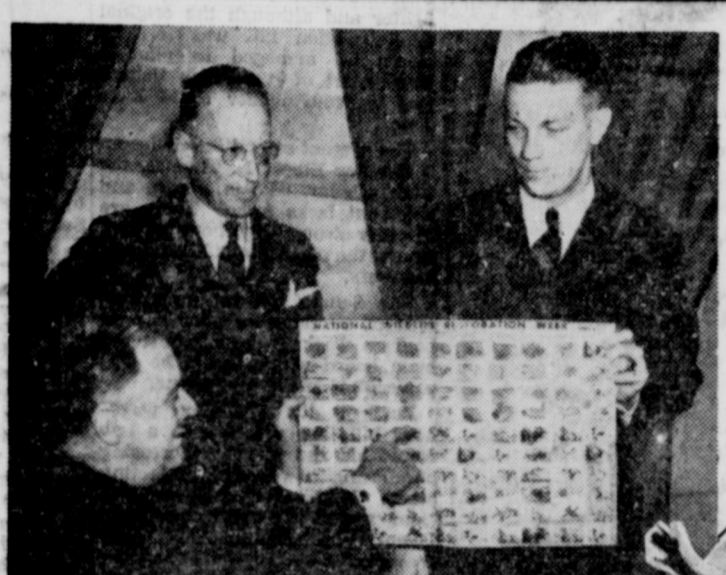

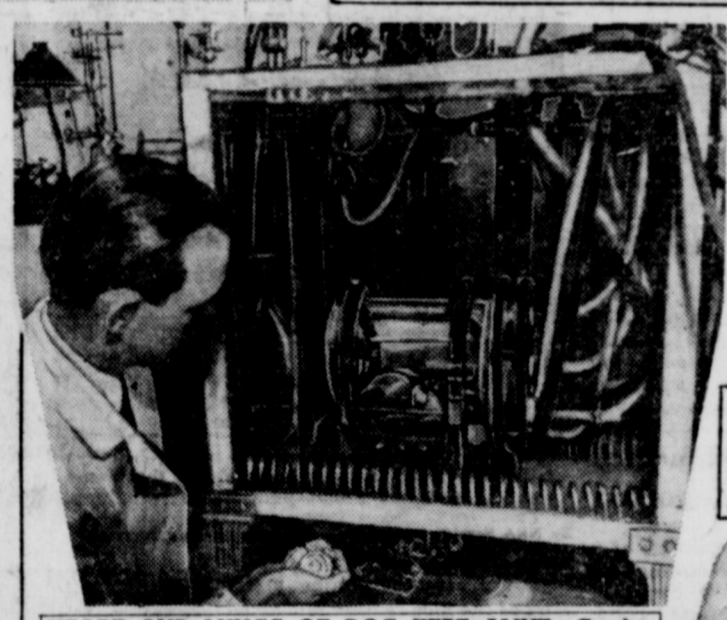

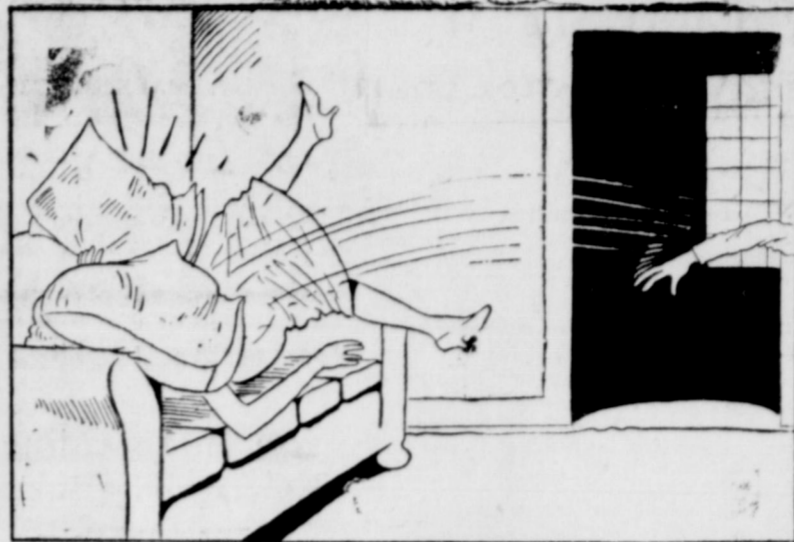

"Family Style" by Mrs. Baker. Oil! You and your family live for years on the land, and then, almost overnight, the whole face of the country changes. You become a gambler; you pour every available dollar and all your credit into sinking a well. You make a play for a fortune. You may get a smoke-blackened crater and ruined farm.
The characters of this novel, led by Kathleen and Duke, are a

group of native Texans who have tilled their farms for generations and are now being uprooted socially, mentally and financially through the discovery of oil on their properties. What this does to them, from discovery to fruition, individually and collectively, makes the book. Some through sheer chance are ruined; others are unable to bear the sudden fortune; and still others, among them Kathleen and Duke, emerge, having grown by experience to a larger maturity. The outstanding feature of the book is its utter and complete normality. Yet this doesn't mean the book is written on a dull level. On the contrary there are humor and pathos and tragedy in the striking of oil and waiting for a gusher. The characters themselves range from the splendid old grandparents, full of wisdom and virtue, each in their own way, to the orphan youngster made rich over night.

The title is taken from the sign so frequently met with throughout the oil fields—Family Style.
