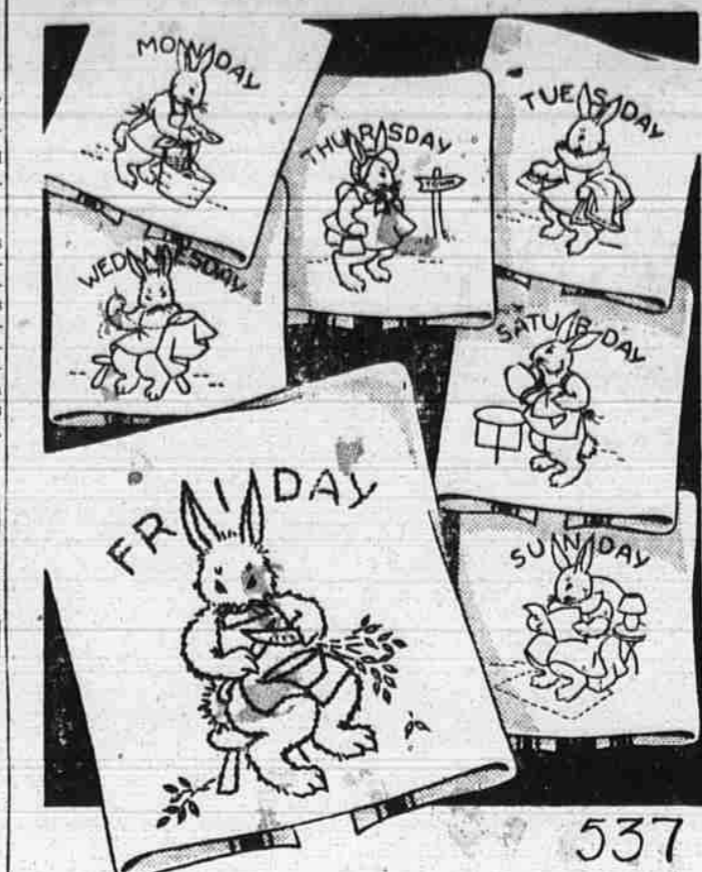

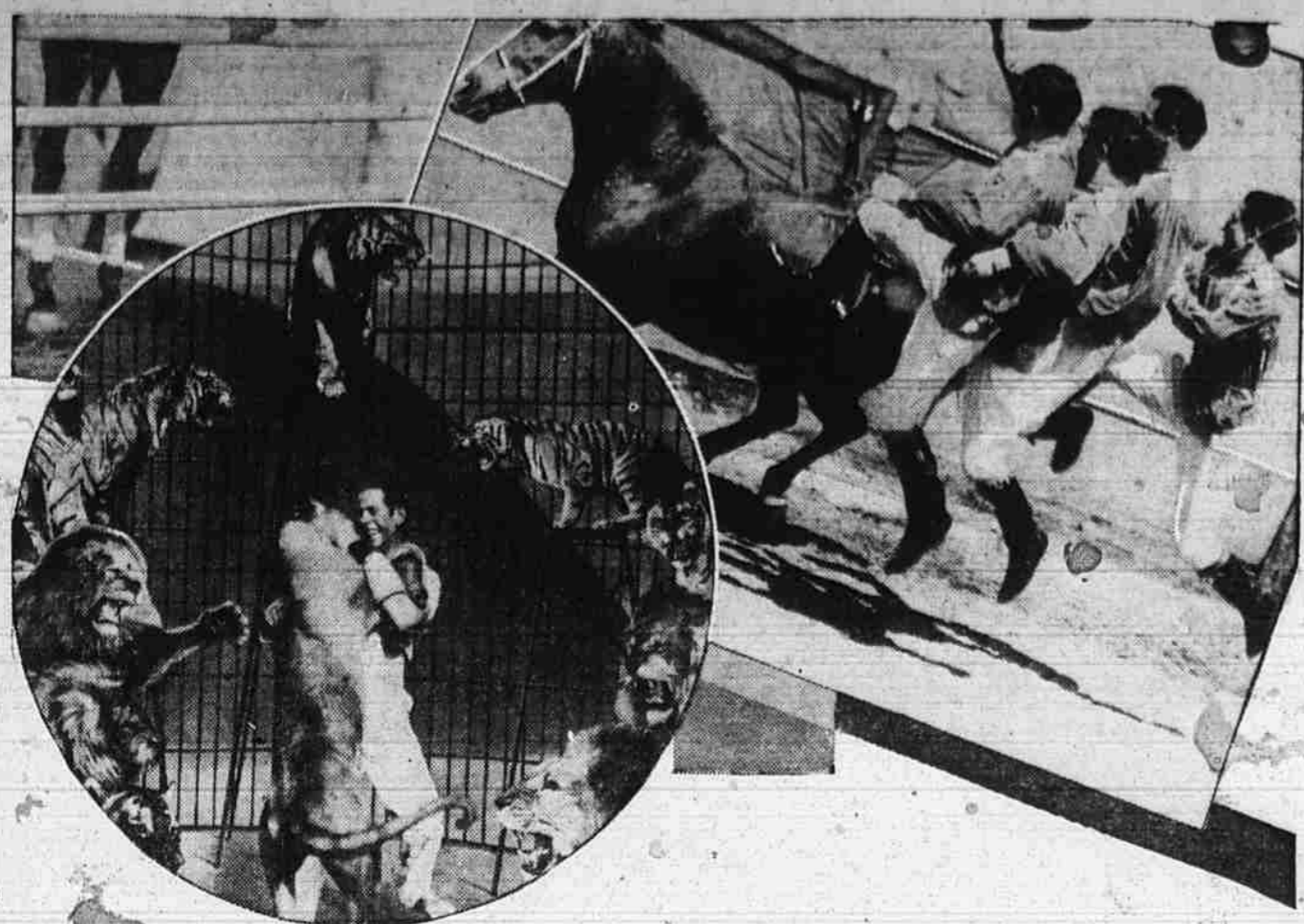

Plane Crash Victims Are Identified

Three Investigations Launched Into Air Disaster

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 20 (AP)—The 19 victims of the most disastrous airplane crash in American aviation history were identified satisfactorily at Evanston, Wyo., early today, Bob Johnson, United Airlines press representative, said.

First body reported identified was that of Earl Woodgerd, Denver, pilot of the United Airlines "mainliner" which crashed into a mountain peak 80 miles east of here during a terrific storm Sunday night.

Woodgerd's body was the last re-

moved from the wrecked transcontinental transport. The mangled bodies were taken to Evanston in wagons over crude mountain roads late yesterday.

None of the bodies has yet been viewed by relatives and friends of the persons traveling in the ill-fated luxury liner, Johnson said.

Three investigations are planned. A federal board appointed by Secretary of Commerce Roper is scheduled to meet here Saturday. United Airlines will conduct its own investigation. Third probe will be made by the U. S. postal department.

Relatives of the ill-fated sky liner's passengers were arriving at Evanston today to claim their dead. Searchers reached the plane yesterday. Except for the rear fin, the 21-passenger luxury liner was demolished.

Bodies lay grotesquely in the snow.

Oil Activity Some Slower

Leaders See Industry In Better Position Than Last Year

TULSA, Okla., Oct. 20 (AP)—A slackening of activity in all departments of the petroleum industry with the approach of colder weather was apparent today.

Most executives, already setting their sights for 1938 business, construed the tenor of present business entirely in keeping with the season, and in general, better than a year ago.

An increase during the past week of 23,100 barrels daily in the national output of crude oil, bringing the output to 3,602,150 daily, according to the American Petroleum Institute, was construed today as a clinching argument for lower state allowances for November.

Predictions were for lower nominations at the Texas allowable meeting today and more of the same at the Kansas and Oklahoma meetings Oct. 27 and Oct. 28 respectively.

Mid-continent crude oil producers were heartened by the apparent ability of the market to absorb the effects of two crude price cuts in Pennsylvania within about a month.

CHURCH CONCLUDES HARMONIOUS MEET

CINCINNATI, Oct. 20 (AP)—Delegates heading homeward from the 52nd triennial general convention of the Protestant Episcopal church described it today as one of the most successful and harmonious in the history of the denomination.

A wide range of business having world-wide importance to the work of the church was transacted with "a speed and an atmosphere of harmony rarely equalled," one leader said.

New Weather Maps Aid To Airlines

3-Dimension Chart Called Necessary For Smooth Flying

LONDON, Oct. 20 (UP)—A three-dimension map, probably in the form of a cube, like a child's building block, is one of the minor problems technicians must solve before regular trans-Atlantic flights may be performed smoothly.

Experimental survey flights by Imperial Airways and Pan-American Airways during the past summer demonstrated the paramount importance of accurate weather reports and forecasts to the pilots of the oversea aircraft.

The value of radio, of course, is beyond computation in transmitting weather information after the flight has begun.

Maps Now Flat Charts

But since the overwater crossing takes only about half a day, the pilots lean heavily on the weather maps handed them at the takeoff. And these maps, at present, must express on a flat chart of Mercator's Projection weather tendencies in three dimensions. The commander must imagine he is looking at a cross-section of the air and interpret the symbols on the chart accordingly.

Experts are working on a plan whereby in future pilots will be given a large cube on which all weather data is described. Thus altitude will be shown as well as latitude and longitude when movements of air currents and temperatures are shown.

Experimental flights to date have led to these conclusions:

Atlantic weather has proved stable; that is, it behaves according to forecast. Therefore the 24-hour forecast may be depended upon.

DALLAS, Oct. 20 (AP)—The Corsicana Business and Professional Women's club was plaintiff in a suit on file here today in 116th district court against the Greater Texas and Pan-American exposition and its agent of the exposition, Frank Youree.

The club asked \$564.40 damages in connection with a contract to sell 1,000 exposition coupon books. The petition set forth it was agreed that unused books could be returned. 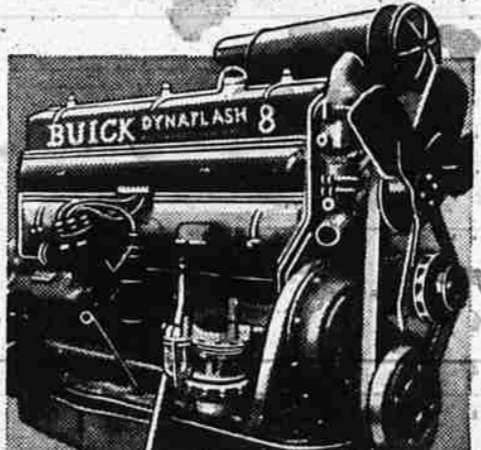

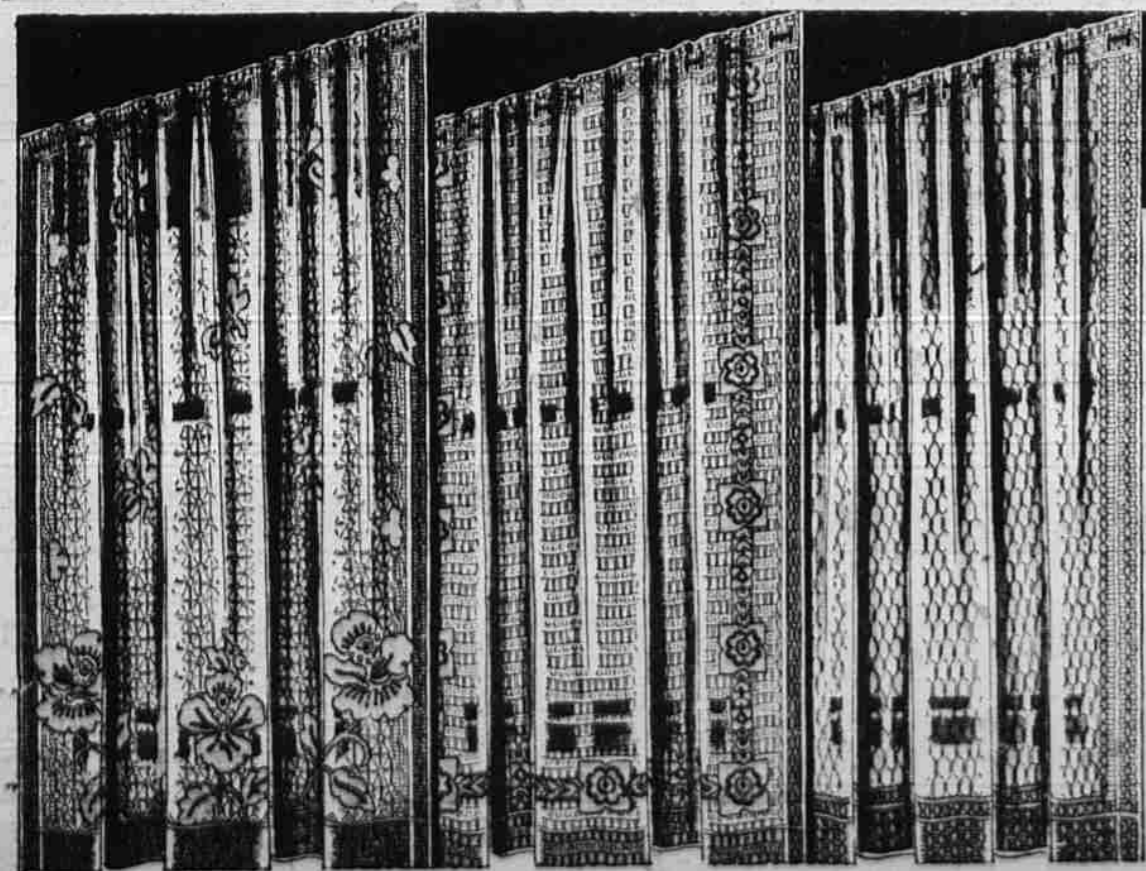

Nation Is Not Committed On Peace Plan

Envy Will Attend Parley Without Any Deals, FD Says

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (AP)—President Roosevelt returned to the capital today after spending a week at the summer White House at Hyde Park, N. Y. H's special train arrived at 8:30 a. m. The chief executive went immediately to the White House where he planned conferences on farm, budget and housing problems today after asserting the United States would enter the nine-power treaty conferences at Brussels October 30 unhindered by any advance commitments to "other governments." A 184-word formal statement on the Belgian parity to consider peace in the Orient was issued after a conference at Hyde Park, N. Y., with Norman H. Davis, American delegate to the conference, who sails today for Europe. "It was generally regarded as a reply to the statement of Senator Hiram Johnson (R-Calif) demanding the president state his foreign policy intentions in plain language," and asserting America was entering the conference undoubted by with a prior understanding with Great Britain.

Mr. Roosevelt said: "Mr. Davis, of course, will enjoy the conference without any commitments on the part of this government to other governments." Johnson, declaring against League of Nations entanglements, had asked the president to explain "just what he will do and not do" to achieve world peace. He also wanted to know what was meant by "quarantining" warring nations.

COIN MACHINE TAX IS RULED INVALID

AUSTIN, Nov. 20 (AP)—The third court of civil appeals today invalidated the state occupation tax on coin-operated vending machines.

It upheld a Travis county district court's ruling restraining collection of the tax and destruction of machines for failure to pay the levy. The ruling was in a case brought against the comptroller by F. E. Giebel, Jr., of Austin and other operators.

"Uncertainty and ambiguity both as to who was the proper person to pay the tax, or in case it was not paid, who would be subject to criminal punishment" was given as the appellate court's reason for its ruling.

The case in question specifically concerned coin-operated phonographs.

STUNT FLYING UNDER NEW REGULATIONS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (AP)—The bureau of air commerce announced today that effective November 1 all "stunt" and acrobatic flights will be prohibited over congested areas in cities, and towns or within 1,000 feet of an airport.

Other new "stunt" flight regulations: No person shall be carried on a flight for hire except for instruction. Auxiliary parachutes will be required. No parachute jump shall be made at less than an altitude of 2,000 feet.

Delayed parachute jumps shall not be made at less than 1,500 feet. No parachute jumps shall be made within two miles on an open body of water unless the jumper wears a flotation device and motorboat is available.

FDR SAYS MACHINERY NEEDED FOR AN ENDURING PROSPERITY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (AP)—President Roosevelt said today the government must improve and coordinate credit and other machinery to "achieve and maintain an enduring prosperity, free from the disastrous extremes of booms and depressions."

The president, speaking at ceremonies dedicating the new federal reserve building, made no direct reference to the recent tumbling stock market or down swings in business barometers.

A portion of his address, however, appeared to give a partial answer to those who have blamed administration policies for the stock market plunge.

Reciting that the government has made many changes in its monetary and credit machinery in the last few years, Mr. Roosevelt said that "it must continue step by step to make the banking system what it should be."

"We must not complacently suppose that we have achieved perfection," he asserted, adding: "By the banking and security exchange acts of 1933, 1934 and 1935 the federal reserve system was given increased power to improve banking conditions and to aid the government in combatting practices which were evil in their results."

"Those powers have been concentrated to a greater degree than before in a single public body, so that they can be used promptly and effectively in accordance with the changing needs of the country."

The president served notice the administration plans no reversal of its banking policies, asserting: "1937 is not 1913; nor do we want to turn the hands of the clock back."

GRANARY PROPOSAL MAY RUN INTO A LEGAL SNARL

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (AP)—Tucked away in the administration's proposed new farm program is a constitutional question that may argue considerable debate in next month's special session of congress.

Secretary Wallace has said that some of the features of the "ever-normal granary" system he is advocating were picked up from the old "triple-a" law invalidated by the supreme court early in 1936. The granary system provides for storing surplus crops for use in lean years.

SALVATION ARMY IS SHORT OF GOAL

Still several hundred dollars short of its goal, the Salvation Army unit here will continue its finance campaign, Maj. L. W. Canning said Wednesday in urging more general response to the organization's appeal. The Army's work can go on here only because the general organization is doing more than its share of the financing, and more local support is needed, Major Canning said.

He urged workers who have cards to complete their solicitations and report to him as soon as possible. Appeal was renewed for firms and individuals to send donations to the Army.

Psychiatrist Held For Questioning In Girl's Death

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Oct. 20 (AP)—Deputy Sheriff Walter Cross said today Dr. Douglas W. Owen, 35, South Bend psychiatrist, had been "booked on open charges" pending an investigation of his activities the night of October 12, when 16-year-old Melba Moore was shot to death on a lonely country road near here.

Dr. Owen, 250-pound owner of the St. Joseph Valley sanitarium, hospital for treatment of mental cases, underwent close questioning overnight, the deputy sheriff said, but appeared "dazed and unable to talk coherently."

"Dr. Owen" Chief Deputy Sheriff Frank J. Bruggner pointed out "has been unable to account satisfactorily for his movements on the night of the murder, when he returned home after midnight."

Miss Moore was wounded fatally by an unidentified assailant, who fired six shots without warning into an automobile in which she rode with her fiance, Adolph Stoffer, 20, and a companion, Charles Walton, 17.

The young people, Bruggner said, had stopped in the lane to see if the gunman, sitting in a parked car, needed aid. The assailant jumped out of his automobile and fired the shots in rapid succession.

IN CHECKER TOURNAMENT

Lloyd Rush and H. A. Morrison of Big Spring made creditable showings in a checker tournament held at Lubbock Sunday, reports from that affair showed Wednesday.

Competing against a field of 24 of the strongest checker players of Northwest Texas, Rush placed second in the tournament, being edged out by D. C. Hulse of Rochester, Texas. Morrison placed sixth.
