# THE WORLD OF WOMEN +

READING

WRITING By JOHN SELBY

e novels from the many-Not all the standard practitioners

have done their best this fell, aithough in quantity, the number of novels must be greater than last year, or perhaps any year since the

depression.

Warwick Deeping is still trying to do another "Sorrell and Son," and not succeeding. H's fall novel is called "The Woman at the Door" (Knopf; \$2.50), and although it has a kind of gently sentimental glow, its central problem has been rehashed pretty often. "Is there a supreme morality of love?" de-mands the jacket. A snippy little echo says "who cares?"

There also is another version of Sholem Asch's "The Mother" (Putnam; \$2.50). Aside from the fact that this is the 26th novel in our record using that title, there are some other considerations which militate against general accept-ance of the book. Mr. Asch is trying to praise a sort of world mother, but he does it in terms of a race whose conception of the duties of motherhood is quite fore gn to that of most peoples. A species of self-murder may be, in some ways, noble. The question is whether it is often sensible. According to the publisher, a former English trans lation of this same text failed.

So with Robert Briffault's "Europe in Limbo" (Scribners; \$2,75). It is possible that those who ad "Europa" will admire its sequel; this reader considered "Eu-ropa" a book for intellectual snobs, and so quite frankly when it was published. With equal frankness it s possible to say that the adven tures of Julian Bern in the war whether viewed as a world panor ama or personal history, seem thin, unreal, unimportant. It has en said better before.

And finally, Jules Romains' mon-strous "Men of Good "Will" con-tinues to inch along, its progress I ke that of a legless baggar on a boulevard. "The Depths and the Heights (Knopf; \$3) is better than some installments, less pointed than some others.
