Basing his figure on registrations at the three previous events, Director General H. J. Tanner predicted Saturday that 5,000 persons would attend the fourth annual Oil Belt Safety conference Friday in Eastland. AIR RAIDS ARE BEING STAGED IN TWO WARS

BARCELONA, Spain, April 30.—Insurgent airplanes rained terror on Barcelona again today after a lull of six weeks.

In two raids casualties were estimated at more than 50 killed and 50 wounded. It was the first important attack of those in March in which 1,000 were killed. The raiders swooped in from the sea, the central and residential parts of the city were not bombed, but some bombs were dropped in the outskirts. The planes circled high in a cloudless sky, scattering thousands of citizens scrambling to shelters.

SHANGHAI, China, April 30. Japanese troops reoccupied Tangcheng, 17 miles north of the east-to-west Lughai Railroad today, in their drive southward toward the provisional Chinese capital of Hankow.

The fighting was bitter and the tide of battle surged back and forth. First the Chinese asserted at Hankow that the Japanese drive had been smashed and 2,000 Japanese left dead. Tonight the Chinese admitted the Japanese had retaken the city.

Coincidentally Chinese airplanes in a raid avenging a terrible Japanese "emperor's birthday" attack on Hankow Friday, raided Japanese-held Wuho, on the Yangtze River and it was asserted they shot down three Japanese planes.

Rubber Gloves Are Thought a Clue In Frome Slaying

BALMORHEA, Tex., April 30.—Discovery of a pair of rubber gloves wrapped in a San Francisco newspaper, a bundle of bamboo shoots and an El Paso hotel receipt led officers to believe they had found important clues in the murder of Mrs. Weston Frome and her daughter.

The articles were found by soldiers at a lake called Washington Tank, 14 miles west of here. The newspaper was dated March 20. The California women were slain March 30.

Officers said the tank probably would be dragged for the women's luggage. There are five feet of water in the tank, which is a few miles from the place the automobile the Fromes were driving was found abandoned.

Restraining Order Of Tribunal Made Perpetual by Judge

Ninety-first district court has ordered that an injunction issued February 28 restraining John Hasen and others, defendants, from selling or attempting to sell real estate belonging to E. A. Ringold, plaintiff, illegally levied and seized under execution January 27 as the property of E. A. Ringold, be made permanent.

All clouds on the title of E. A. Ringold to the real estate were removed. The property involved was the south 75 feet of lots 7 and 8, block 12, in Ranger, and lots 8 and 9 in Ranger.

IS FIFTEENTH OBSERVANCE IN YEARLY ORDER

Roosevelt Joins Hands With Others of U. S. In Making Event.

Eastland opens her fifteenth annual observance of National Music week with special programs to be presented in the Churches and Clubs, under the auspices of the Eastland Music Club. The programs will be with music featured in local organizations.

JUDGE SCORES "SHYSTERS" IN VAUGHN CASE

SAN ANTONIO, April 30.—District Judge W. W. McCrory, who originally sentenced John W. Vaughn to death, then made possible his execution by dissolving a court order to prevent it, described today as an "insult to our penal system" the court fight to delay the procedure.

McCrory sent a messenger to Huntsville late Friday with instructions for Warden W. W. Waid to go ahead with the electrocution. He dissolved a restraining order issued by Judge Fountain Kirby of Groesbeck, which had prevented the execution 24 hours before and ignored a suit filed by Vaughn's attorneys here that the condemned man be returned to San Antonio for a sanity hearing.

"The entire matter is a fraud," he said. "With all due respect for the attorneys now in the court representing Vaughn, this court does not intend to let East Texas shysters mess up the proceedings of this court."

W. A. Hogan, representing Vaughn, gave notice of appeal and said today he would carry his fight to the appellate court despite the fact that Vaughn was executed.

Vaughn, convinced that God would save him from the electric chair, talked desperately for nine minutes in the execution chamber at Huntsville early Saturday. When it was evident that neither divine or earthly powers would intervene, he burst into tears and permitted himself to be executed.

A week ago Friday he was led into the execution chamber twice, but each time the generator that produced electricity for the chair broke down. Vaughn believed the hand of God stopped it.

Suddenly Today Looks Better

When we talk about the great triumphs of modern civilization—as we do, pretty frequently—we usually refer to spectacular things like airplanes, radio networks, mass production lines or streamlined trains. These are the sign and symbol of Progress, and we are awfully proud of them.

But real progress is often a good deal simpler. Some of its by-products are actually more important than the headline attractions. The net total of human happiness in this world is increased by things that do not often get listed in the tabulation of scientific triumphs.

Some enterprising antiquarian recently dug back into old English records and came out with an account of the sort of doctoring that a man got when he was sick, back in the old days. The patient involved was no less a person than King Charles II, so you can be sure he got the best there was.

King Charles, it seems, fell ill, and the most learned medicos of the land were called to the royal bedside. After much conferring and wise head-wagging, they gave his majesty the works.

As a start, they bled him, twice. Then they gave him a dose of antimony, followed by sacred bitters, rock salt, camomile flowers, linseed, cinnamon, fennel seed, powdered hellebore root, some white wine (which probably was a relief), powdered cowslip flowers, some absinthe, and a weird extract of thistle leaves, mint, rue and angelica.

Somehow the king didn't seem to feel much better after taking on this load. So the doctors fixed up something new. He got black cherry waters, melor seeds, dissolved pearls, gentian root, nutmeg, quinine and cloves; and this was followed by 40 drops of an extract of powdered human skulls, topped off by a concoction of something called Raleigh's antidote, pearl julep and ammonia.

Apparently the merry monarch lived through it, but he must have been perceptibly less merry thereafter. And when you read of that horrendous dosing, you can't help reflecting that modern progress has done most for us in the simple little matter of making a man comfortable.

For obviously, nobody ever gave a thought to a man's comfort in a day when doctors cooked up messes like that for their patients. A man just wasn't expected to be very comfortable then; the ills of the flesh were something he was supposed to take and like.

We hear a good deal of talk about the simplicity of life in the old days, the implication being that people really were happier then. That must be largely eye-wash.

The simple life may have been very well; but suppose you had a toothache, with no dentist in all the world? When the doctor's handbag contained things such as were inflicted on King Charles, a mild cold or a sprained wrist must have been a major calamity.

Governor Alfred of Texas says he's not planning on running for re-election, because people are always expecting a candidate to talk, and he's tired of it. People don't expect that of a candidate, governor; they're just resigned to it.

LONDON.—A specially designed swimming pool is to be built at the Royal Lodge in Windsor Park to enable Princess Elizabeth, 12, and Princess Margaret Rose, 7, to get more outdoor exercise during the summer.

The pool, designed so that the princess can improve their swimming in safety, will be built while the royal family is in residence at Windsor Castle so that the king and queen will be able to supervise the work.

Both princesses are ardent swimmers. Princess Elizabeth has swum a length in the Bath Club bath—just short of 75 feet. Her sister is making rapid progress, too.

According to plans which have been drafted, the Royal Lodge pool will be about the same dimensions as that at the Bath Club, but it will have a specially shallow end where Princess Margaret Rose can take lessons. The bath will be equipped with diving-boards of various heights and will be lined with green-tinted tiles.

The king, it is understood, has decided that the princesses are studying too hard. Their morning lessons now include several new subjects, including Spanish.

Both princesses are also being taught geography by a new method that they find fascinating. They have large maps, several feet across, made of plastic material and other features are shown realistically.

Flanders Keeps Up The Spirit of 1530

By United Press DOUAL, France—One of the largest "toys" in the world will be 408 years old in June. It is a 47-foot wooden doll, named Lord Gayant, which has lived in Douai, northern France, since June 19, 1530. This June "Lord Gayant" will make one of his periodical appearances during the carnival season of the Flanders town. The mammoth doll was a bachelor for 35 years; but in 1865 he was provided with a wife, almost as tall as himself and worth four barrels of "new wine," according to the archives of Douai. Since that time, despite wars, sedition and panics, Lord and Lady Gayant have made their periodic

appearances in Douai, and unlike the usual carnival giants whose life lasts only a fortnight, the wooden Gayants have been preserved through the centuries. They have many offspring. French Flanders today possesses almost a hundred similar giants, ranging from 50 to 75 feet in height and fashioned of wood, metal or canvas. Each "giant" has his own legend and superstition and each is dragged out on local feast days. The latest descendant of Lord Gayant is a 55-foot colossus named "Cafougnette." Born only two years ago in Denai, French Flanders, he symbolizes the joyous, carefree traditions which the Flemish people still retain. Latest decree is that clothes of the well-dressed man should be unpressed. That's a new wrinkle.

Marauding Bobcat Is Finally Caught

By United Press SWEETWATER, Texas—E. P. Harris, employed by Sheenmas P. Brighton, recently ended the depredations of a three-year-old female bobcat that killed an estimated \$100 worth of lambs this spring. All School Children Get Benefits From Taxes Upon Oil

DALLAS.—Every public school district in Texas and all of the 1,564,000 school children in the state benefit directly from taxes paid by the oil industry, according to a report just issued by the Texas Mid-Continental Oil and Gas Association. Last year, the oil industry contributed taxes to all Texas public schools the sum of \$17,630,888, equivalent to \$11.27 for every child attending the free schools in the State. In 29 independent school districts of Texas, where tax levies plus the state apportionment averaged \$128.57 per pu-

pil. In these oil districts the scheduled tax income per pupil ranged from \$102.21 to \$278.96, of which oil was the source of from \$60.30 to \$245.48 per pupil. The average cost per child in all independent schools of the state last year was \$54.33, of which \$12.47 was for bond purposes and \$41.86 for maintenance. In all independent school districts of Texas, the oil industry paid last year an average of \$11.95 per pupil, regardless of whether or not oil is produced in any particular school district. Oil not only pays a large share of local school taxes in many counties of the state, but also is the direct source of 32 percent of all money apportioned to all common and independent school districts of the state. Last year, state tax collectors allocated to the public school fund aggregated \$29,301,000, of which the Texas oil

industry was the direct source of \$9,262,250. In 107 independent school districts, embracing 64 oil producing counties of the state, the oil industry paid last year an average of 40 percent and as much as 91 percent of all school tax levies. In 49 independent school districts located in oil producing centers, the oil industry pays an average of 72 percent of all school tax levies.

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
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
