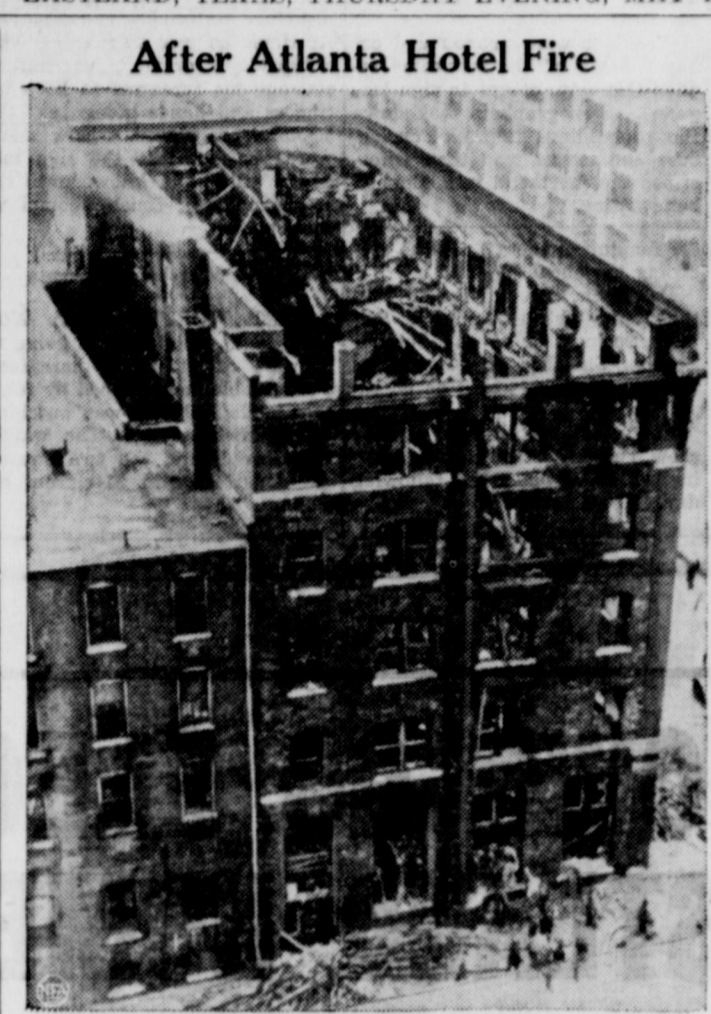

## WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON—A remarkable right-hand man, Philip Murray head of the Steel Workers' Organizing committee and active in the Kennedy campaign, was at least until recently a registered Republican in Pittsburgh.

Boss Matt McCloskey of Philadelphia, chief power behind the Jones-Earle ticket, recently was quoted by Senator Joe Guffey as saying, "I use, to be a Republican and I can be a Republican again."

Guffey himself is a Democrat from away back, although Andrew Mellon, one of the state G. O. P. bosses, once underwrote a guarantee of \$75,000 for him when the government demanded the interest on some alien property fund he had been holding.

Many other Pennsylvania politicians, including Negro leaders, have found it advantageous to keep the party fence since the Democrats began to emerge from the wilderness.

But all this is insignificant beside the importance of the Lewis bid for political power in the nation's greatest industrial state. Lewis wants not only a labor governor for Pennsylvania where until a few years ago industrialists and their Republican political allies held undisputed sway; he wants a voice in the next Democratic national convention. Pennsylvania will have a bloc of 72 votes there.

With his own governor in command of the state machine and with his ally, Guffey, operating federal patronage and politics, there's no question that Lewis would have such a voice. The test in Pennsylvania will indicate the extent to which the C. I. O. and its political friends can make headway elsewhere.

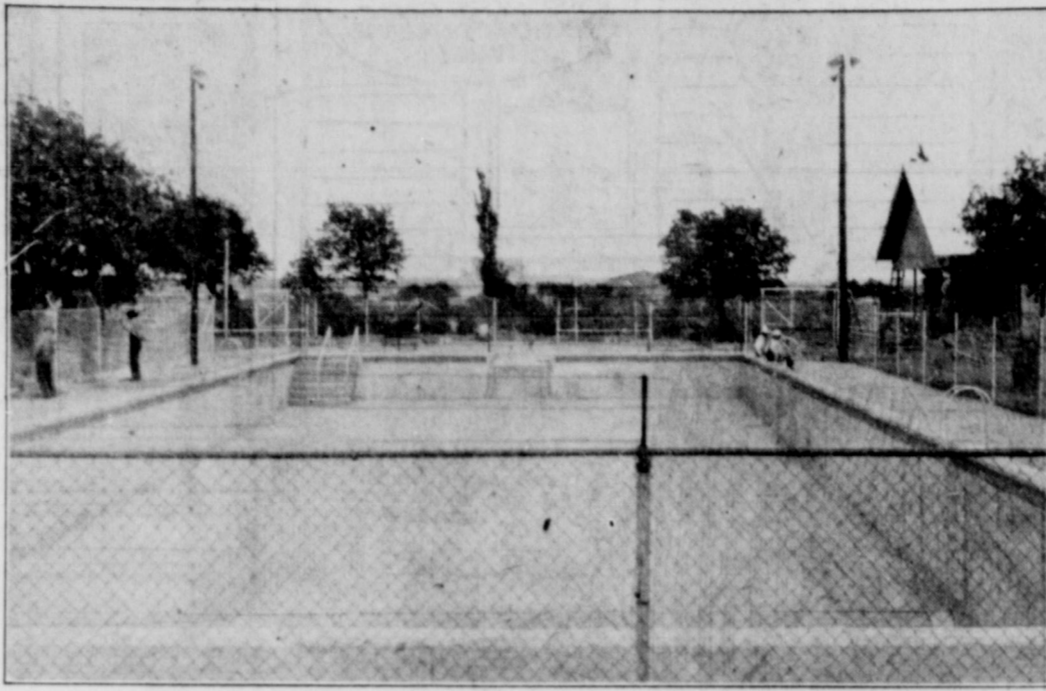

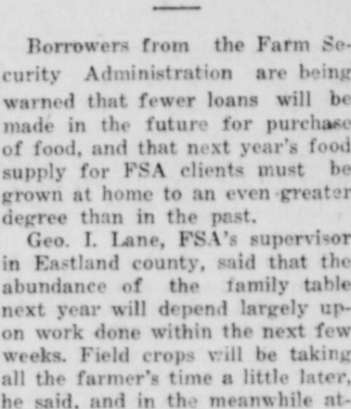

Veterans Form "Amps" Club VANCOUVER.—To have lost one or more limbs in war is the qualification for membership in the "Amps" Table Tennis Club here. The club has 16 members and was organized four years ago. One of the speediest players is Comrade Oscar Erickson, who is minus both legs.

Many families have been so centered upon the mere fact of obtaining cows, hogs and chickens that they have failed to give sufficient attention to efficient handling of this livestock, after it has been obtained," the supervisor said. "Some of them let all their cows freshen at the same time, and the result is a surplus of milk at one season and shortage at another. Others allow their sows to farrow too late to provide a winter meat supply, or they fail to set aside a calf to fatten for fresh meat or for canning."

Ilia R. Parrish, FSA's home management supervisor, said the most difficult matter of all is to keep gardens growing steadily month after month. "Some vegetables should be replanted after every shower," she said. "And just at this time, of course, the big job is to put up a supply of canned products that will carry through until next summer. The garden is of more than usual importance this year because in many areas there is a shortage of fruit. This fruit shortage can be made up by an increase in leafy, green and yellow vegetables."

The local office has been informed that 20 per cent of FSA borrowers in this county who last year required loans for purchase of food are able to carry on this year without such financing. The same is true of 15 to 20 per cent of all FSA borrowers in Texas, and 30 to 40 per cent in Oklahoma. "Money formerly spent for food will be available for paying indebtedness on livestock and equipment," the supervisor said. "When these borrowers own their teams and tools debt-free, they have made the first long step toward eventual ownership of their land."

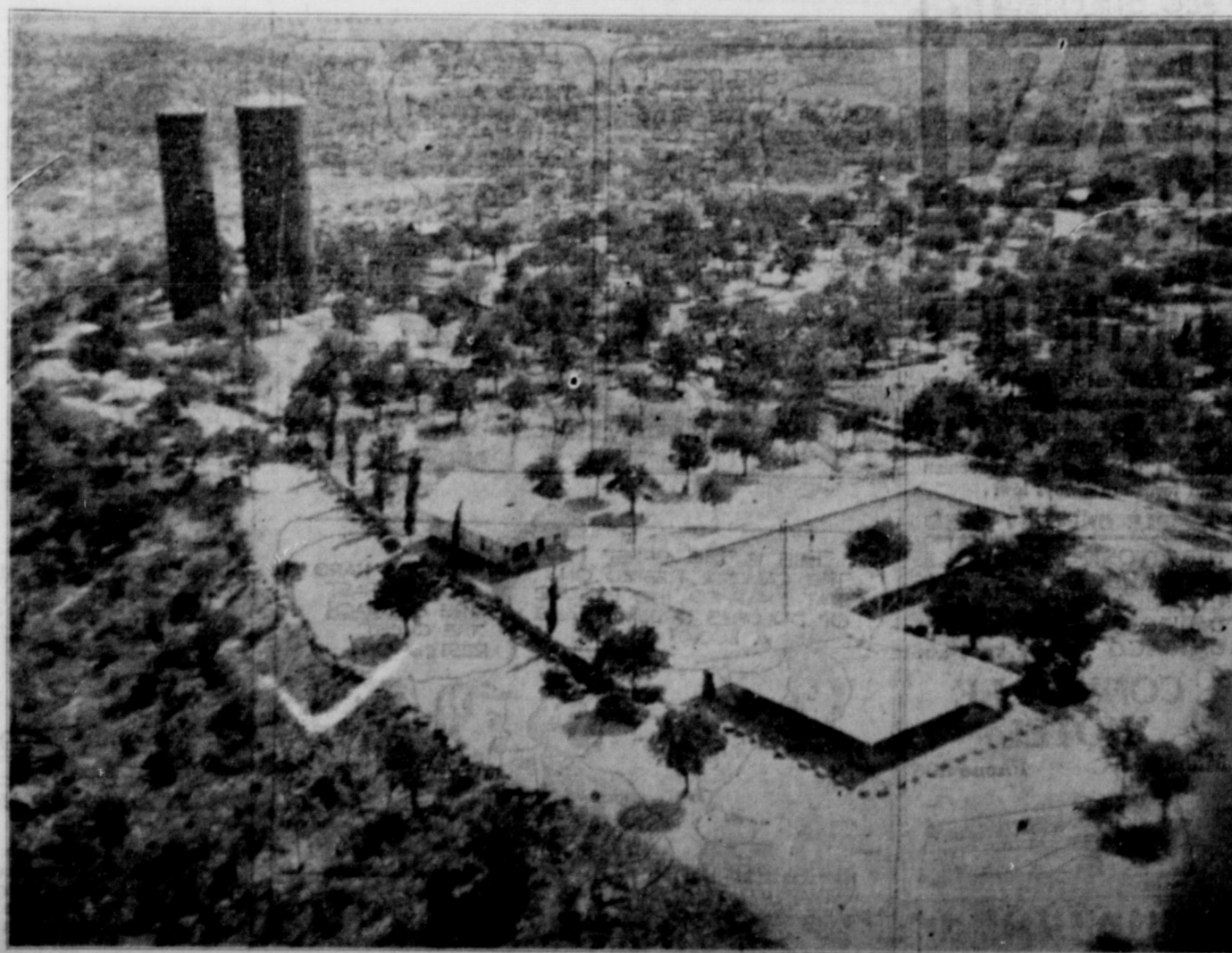
