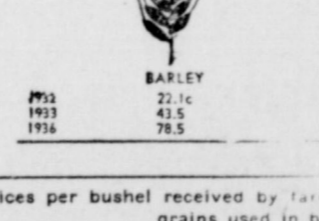

The fact that Texas is primarily a raw materials producing state, selling much of its goods in distant markets, makes it the more inescapable that generally depressed business conditions will inevitably be felt here in decline of capacity of those markets, no matter how strong the "local" buying power situation, the report said. 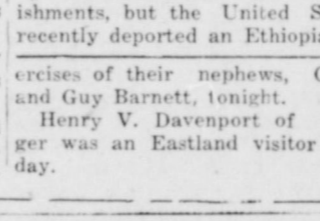

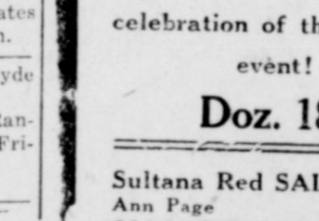

One cup sugar, 2 cups water, juice of 1 lemon for each glass to be made ice water, ice, thin half lices of orange and lemon, and shaved fresh strawberries or maraschino cherries.

One cup sugar, 2 cups water, juice of 1 to 2 limes for every glass of limeade to be made, fresh raspberry ice.

Lime Freeze
One cup sugar, 2 cups water, juice of 1 to 2 limes for each glass, shaved ice, carbonated water, fresh mint leaves.

Ginger Ale Fruit Punch
Two parts grapefruit juice, 1 part lemon juice, 2 parts orange and lemon slices, 2 cups water, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup lemon juice, 1 charged water or ginger ale.

Cranberry Spangle
One quart cranberry juice, 1 quart water, 2 cups sugar, 2 cups water, 1 cup lemon juice, 1 cup cranberry juice, 1 charged water or ginger ale.

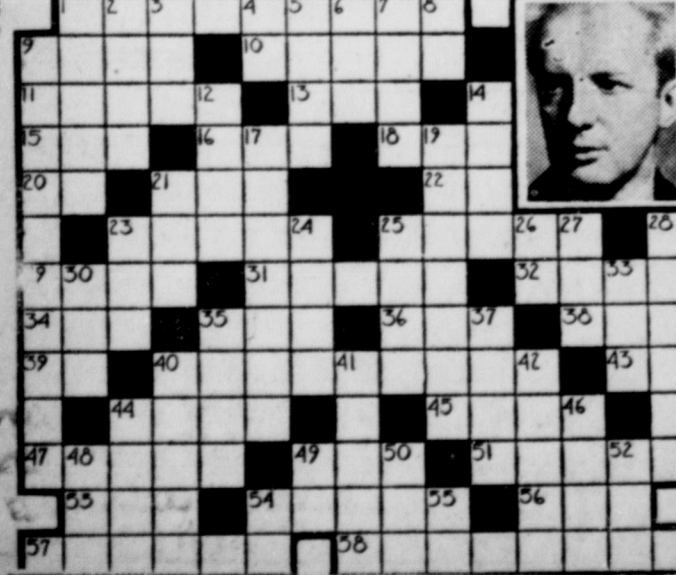

to buy more of our goods. There is one serious flaw in the picture of the substantial recovery in our foreign trade since 1932. While our total exports have doubled, our agricultural exports have increased 20%. In 1937, foreigners spent in this country one billion seven hundred million dollars more for American goods than they spent in 1932, but agriculture only gets one out of every twelve dollars of this new business. In 1929 agriculture got one out of every three dollars of our export business. The explanation largely lies in our treatment of the agricultural problem. Government price-pegging loans and Government-subsidized curtailment of production have over a period of years priced our farm products out of the world market, building up the production of competitive countries who have eagerly seized what we have deliberately surrendered. In our own interest, we must make available to other nations our great surpluses of food and fibre and raw materials at competitive world prices and on terms which will make other things than gold valid for payment. We already have their gold.

Federal Housing

Funds amounting to approximately \$63,000,000 were made available by private lending institutions to finance the construction or purchase of 14,200 small homes under the FHA plan during April. This amount exceeded by \$13,000,000 the figures for April 1937 which set the high mark in FHA records for last year. These figures do not include modernization and repair loans nor large-scale projects.

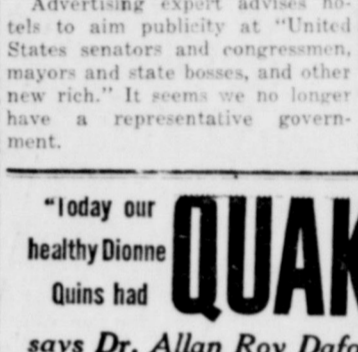

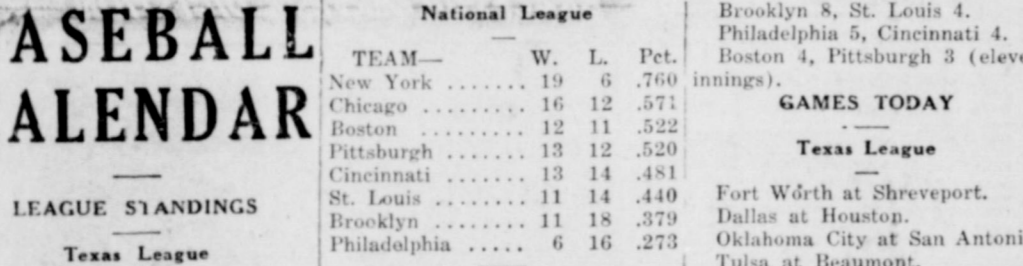

pay more attention to the clock than anything else. This is especially true when they have nothing else on which to base their deductions.

But no two racing strips are alike, which is why many experts skip the watch altogether. However, using a speed chart or handicapping strictly on a time basis, you must pick Seabiscuit to beat War Admiral in their \$100,000 match race at a mile and a quarter at Belmont Park, May 30.

War Admiral never has run as fast as Seabiscuit. In mile and a quarter gallops, the son of Hard Tack has run 2 1/2 seconds faster than the greatest racing son of Man o' War. And 2 1/2 seconds mean a few lengths.

Seabiscuit, the tourist, and War Admiral have appeared on the same tracks in Maryland, nowhere else. Seabiscuit stepped a mile at Laurel in 1:37 1/2, while War Admiral went a mile and a sixteenth in 1:46.

On Nov. 3 at Pimlico, War Admiral sped a mile and three-sixteenths in 1:58 1/2. Two days later, on the same course, Seabiscuit traveled the same distance in 1:57, or 1 1/2 seconds faster. War Admiral carried 128 pounds, less than Charles S. Howard's flyer.

WASHINGTON - "Drunkenness in the United States and all territories thereof is hereby prohibited."

That will be the next amendment to the Constitution of the United States if Congressman Gomer Smith, of Oklahoma, can put it over with the aid of two-thirds of each House of Congress and the legislatures of three-fourths of the states, whose ratification would be necessary.

This Gomer Smith is the same Gomer Smith who used to be in power in the Townsend old age pensions movement and he is serving his first term in Congress. Gomer's proposed amendment, already introduced in the House, ambitiously proceeds to provide that Congress and the states shall have power to enforce this prohibition and to fix penalties for violation.

The idea of making it a federal offense to get spiffed is admittedly not the brain child of Congressman Smith himself, who says a committee of prominent Baptist ministers got him to introduce the amendment, promising him that they would promote it as a rallying point for a temperance program. But Smith thinks it's a good idea just the same.

Although he blames the administration for all the drunkenness that has been going on, Gomer admits that most persons can drink normally and endanger neither themselves nor others. He decries the notion that men and women get drunk only because they want to.

Rambling With The Rambler

If England was in the saddle she would be just as arrogant as are some of our other foreign powers. Yet even as conditions are, England is foremost and above all interested in England. The most recent proof of this is her present entanglement with Mexico. Since the seizure of the oil properties that involved both Great Britain and this country, by the Mexican government, England has assumed a strong attitude in demanding reparation for this act. On April 8, she sent a note to Mexico declaring the expropriation of "denial of justice" and demanding that such property be immediately returned to her. This first note being rejected she sent another expressing much the same sentiment but it was also ignored. In her third note she

asked for money as compensation, instead of the property previously demanded. So far Mexico has not complied.

Now in all justice we must admit that England is within her rights in demanding that Mexico make some sort of reparation for the property seized. Without doubt her oil companies leased or bought these oil lands before developing them. That they assumed considerable financial risks in putting down wells should be apparent to anyone who has ever had any connections with the oil fields. The expenses entailed in this kind of work runs into thousands of dollars. If the oil companies were taking advantage of the people by paying them small wages, then Mexico would be justified in making laws to protect them but for her to take such property without making a reasonable refund is nothing short of stealing. America should demand as much.

It is not for this, however, that we censure England. Our grievance lies in the fact that Britain has acted much the same way with regard to this country. For the past five years she has defaulted on the lawfully contracted war debt that she owes us. Why is it then that she is so insistent in demanding from another what she refuses to do herself?

England on December 15, of last year owed the United States \$994,486,367.03, her installment amounting to \$122,670,765.05. If this amount was paid it would go a long way in helping rescue this country from the present depression. In contrast to this debt, England requires only a first installment of about \$88,103 in our money at the present rate of the peso. From this vast difference it would seem that England would do well to pay her own debts before raising such a fuss about another country. While no amount of wrongs will make a right, nevertheless it would seem that Britain is getting a little of her own medicine.

With regard to the expropriation itself, it is very doubtful that it will turn out to Mexico's advantage. While it must be admitted that there are always two sides to any given question; still it remains a fact that what might appear of benefit for the time being may eventually prove disastrous. Such a seizure of property from foreigners as this one by the Cardenas regime should offer a very serious obstacle to outsiders in risking capital in developing or establishing industries in countries other than their own. If there are no laws to safeguard their investments than it is foolhardy to take such a chance.

A second consideration is the fact that such a policy is often the means of fermenting ill will between nations. Diplomatic relations are severed and the ag-

gressive nation stands to have her products boycotted by the one offended. Most of which has already happened with regard to England and Mexico.

Now such a procedure might prove advantageous if a country could isolate itself completely from its neighbors, otherwise the answer is, "no." Difficult entangling alliances could be avoided and self-sustaining industries could be developed from within, which would greatly reduce any outside interference. Adhering to a neutrality attitude and respect to all foreign nations, war would threaten only through aggression. However, since the world is not run that way other countries, if at all possible.

To sum up the situation we find that Mexico is having difficulty in finding a market for her

surplus oil, that the value of her money is decreasing and that foreign nations are becoming less friendly towards her. Mexico is on a spot and upon the solution of this problem depends the present government of President Lazaro Cardenas.
