Long, Constant Work Gains Its Rewards

It is easy enough to do a great deal of hard, uphill work if the populace keeps standing around telling you what a great man you are while you are doing it. It is ever so much harder to keep plugging away without recognition, stocking on a thankless job whose importance hardly anyone but yourself ever realizes.

But some of the most important work in the world is done in precisely that way. And once in a while the chap who is doing it does come through, at last, to the recognition and the broadened opportunity which he deserves.

First there is the case of Hugh Hammond Bennett. Mr. Bennett has been in the U. S. Department of Agriculture since 1905, or thereabouts. Away back in the early years of the present century he awoke to the menace of soil erosion and discovered that we were using our soil so carelessly that we would ultimately ruin the rich farm areas which have helped to make us a great and powerful nation.

So Mr. Bennett undertook a campaign to remedy matters. For many long years he toiled unheeded in the Department of Agriculture, striving to bring about a saner any recognition, that he must have felt sometimes as if his work were utterly useless.

But finally the government and the nation awoke and installed a soil erosion service with 21,000 employes and ample funds and publicity to carry the fight to victory. And the man who was put in charge of this vast job was Hugh Hammond Bennett.

Another case. Dr. William Hallock Park has been head of the laboratories of the New York City Health Department for something like 40 years. During that time he has saved heaven only knows how many human lives, kept epidemics from striking down children, and done more than a thousand ordinary men to extend the sum total of human happiness.

He has had the fearlessness characteristic of medical scientists; when a new infantile paralysis vaccine was devised, for instance, he boldly tested it on himself, to make sure that it had no ill effects.

All this time Dr. Park went practically unheard-of by the public at large. But the other day recognition came at last, with the award to him of the Roosevelt Medal for Service, tributes from distinguished citizens, and columns of eulogy in the newspapers. He had to wait until he was 72, but he finally got it.

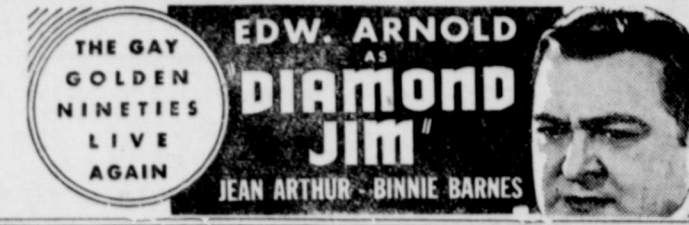

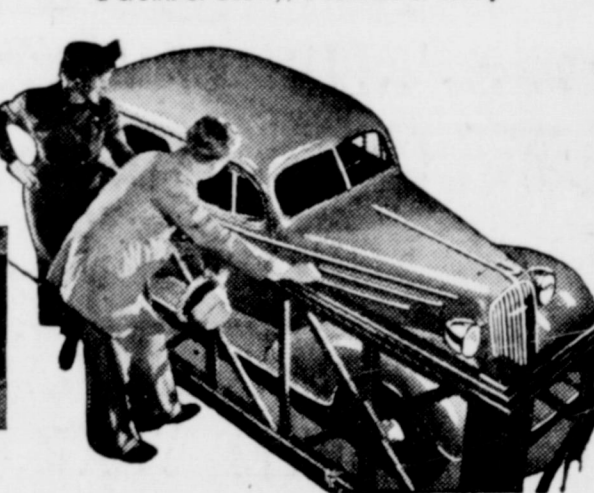

Texas Rangers Will Guard Centennial Central Exposition

DALLAS. — Texas rangers, among the most colorful law enforcement figures in the world, will guard the Texas Centennial Central Exposition and will patrol the grounds both on foot and on horse if plans of the exposition's management committee materialize.

The management committee, headed by R. L. Thornton, discussed the plan with Capt. Tom Hickman of the Texas rangers, Chief of Police R. L. Jones and acting Mayor D. R. Graham. The committee also discussed a proposal for the erection of a Texas ranger building of logs, to furnish the atmosphere of 100 years ago when the ranger force was organized, and to establish a regular troop of rangers here during the centennial exposition.

Tentative plans for the Exposition's police force, which, at the peak, will number about 150, calls for the appointment of each man as a Texas ranger. They will be costumed appropriate to the general idea of the appearance of a Texas ranger. Some of them will be mounted on horses rigged in the trappings of the west.

The proposed ranger building would be located in the southwestern corner of the exposition grounds. It would have dormitories as quarters for the troops of regular rangers and would include a corral for horses and pack trains.

Old time rangers would be invited to make the building their headquarters as long as they desired to attend the exposition.

A section of the structure would be devoted to a museum of Texas ranger relics and would include ancient rifles and pistols, saddles and similar articles. A part of the museum would be devoted to the equipment to the modern day ranger and to a display of the means he uses in the suppression of crime.

Centennial officials expressed the belief that presentation of the Texas ranger idea to the exposition visitors would prove one of the most attractive and interesting features, since many of the visitors will be from northern and eastern states, where the name Texas rangers carries even more glamour than in the southwest.

The committee announced that it would continue working on this plan and that in the meantime it would take steps to assure the finest type of police organization for the celebration, regardless of whether or not the Texas ranger idea is adopted. A well-trained force of 40 men will be policing the grounds by April, the committee said.

Leonard Paek, slated to head the exposition's police force, was present for the conference, however, the committee made no official announcement of his appointment as chief of the organization.

SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

Now is the time to make your Thanksgiving mince-meat so it can ripen a few weeks before using and if you use apple brandy in the making you'll have a flavor that can't be imitated.

Charlotte E. Field, noted New York chef, also uses this fine seasoning aid in plum pudding, wine omelette, fruit cakes, brandied peaches, sauces and mousses.

This is Miss Field's recipe for mince-meat. She says it will make six pies.

Mince Meat

Two pounds lean beef, 5 pounds apples, 1 pound beef suet, 2 pounds raisins, 2 pounds currants, 1 pound Sultana raisins, 1-2 pound shredded citron, 1-3 pound candied orange peel, 2 tablespoons ground cinnamon, 1 tablespoon grated nutmeg, 1 tablespoon cloves, 1 tablespoon allspice, 1 tablespoon salt, 2-3 pounds brown sugar, 1 pint sherry, 1 quart apple brandy, grated rind and juice of 2 oranges, grated rind and juice of 2 lemons.

Boil beef until tender and chop fine. Pare and chop apples and weigh. Chop suet and remove strings. Mix all ingredients and cook until apples are clear. Seal in jars and let ripen for two weeks.

Don't think mince-meat is good only in pies. It makes delicious cakes and puddings, too, and it's very easy to use.

Mince Meat Pudding

One cup mince-meat, 2 eggs, 4 tablespoons butter, 1-2 cup milk, 2 cups flour, 1-2 teaspoon soda, 1-2 teaspoon salt.

Beat eggs until light. Soften butter and add with milk to eggs. Mix and sift flour, salt and soda several times and sift into first

mixture. Add mince-meat and mix thoroughly. Turn into a buttered mold and steam two and one-half hours. Unmold and serve with hard sauce.

When mince pie or a pudding made with mince-meat is the dinner dessert, the meat course should not be heavy because there are a lot of calories in mince-meat. A nourishing cream soup, an egg dish with a vegetable and a fruit salad makes a splendid setting for mince pie.

Eggs and Mushrooms

Four hard boiled eggs, 1-2 pound mushrooms, 3 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 1 tablespoon salt, 1-5 teaspoon pepper, 1 cup milk.

Melt butter and add mushrooms which have been cleaned and cut in small pieces. Cook five minutes and sift over flour. Stir until blended and add parsley, salt and pepper. Add milk stirring constantly and bring to the boiling point, cover and simmer for five minutes. Cut hard cooked eggs in thick slices and add to mushroom mixture. Heat thoroughly and serve on squares of hot buttered toast.

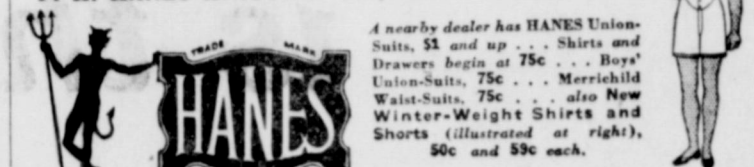

THE IMPORTANCE OF . . . VENTILATION

The warm air throughout the home during winter should be just as pure and contain just as much oxygen as the fresh, pure air of summer. Without proper ventilation the air becomes stale. Sooner or later the tender air passages of the body become inflamed, leaving them an easy prey to vicious attacks of "colds" and serious respiratory diseases.
