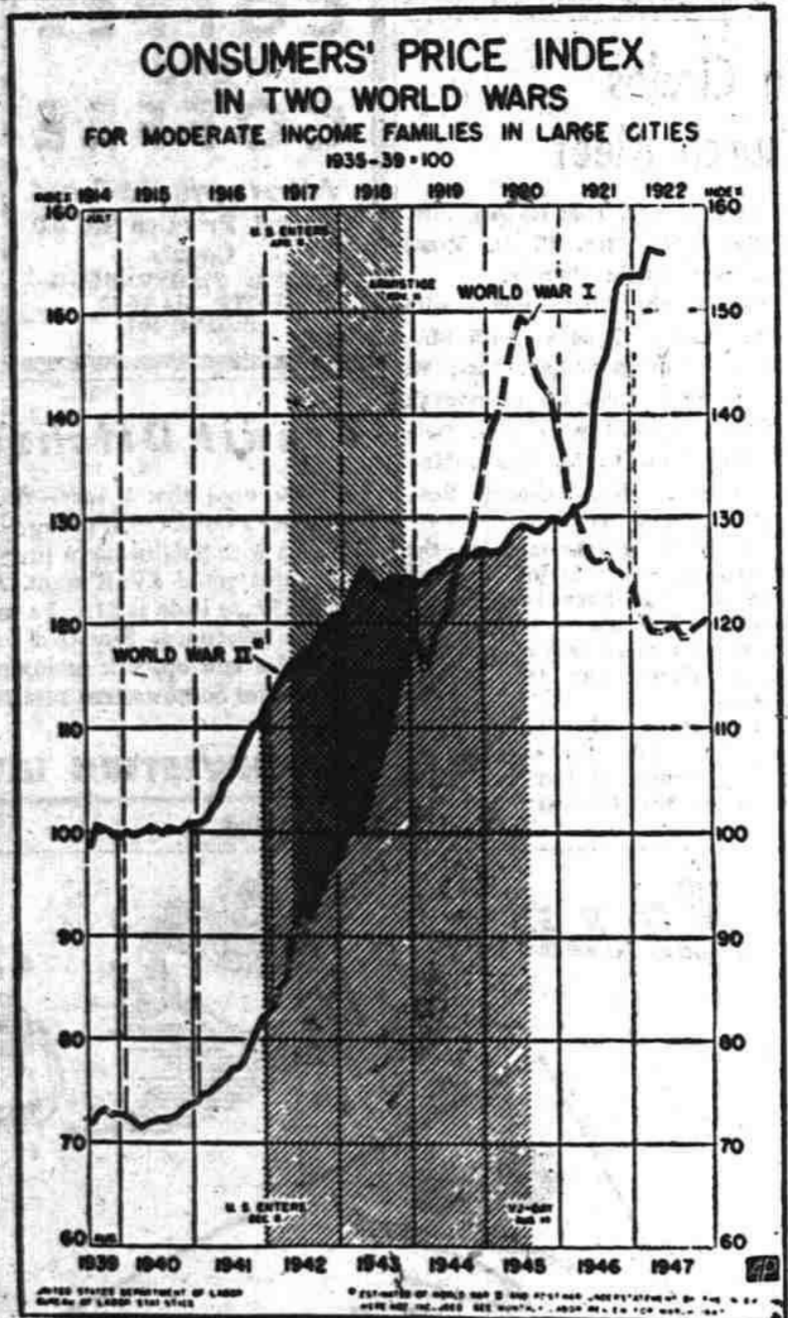


Thousands Of Japs Work To Stem Floods

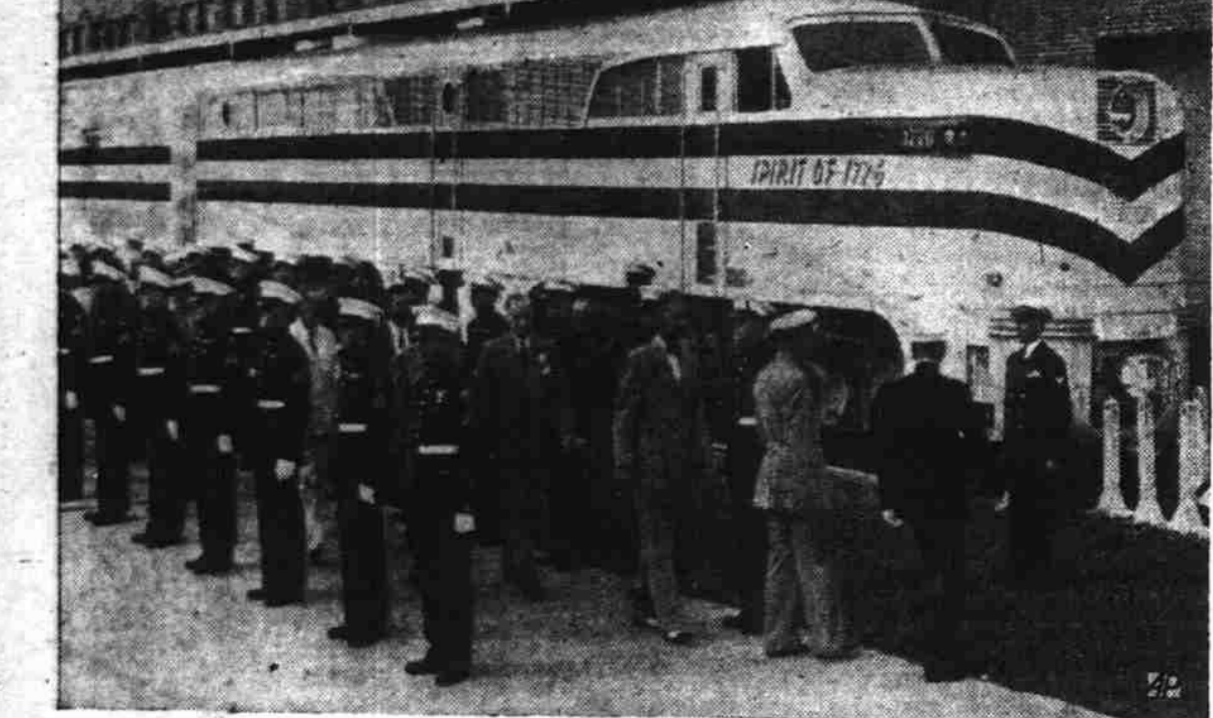

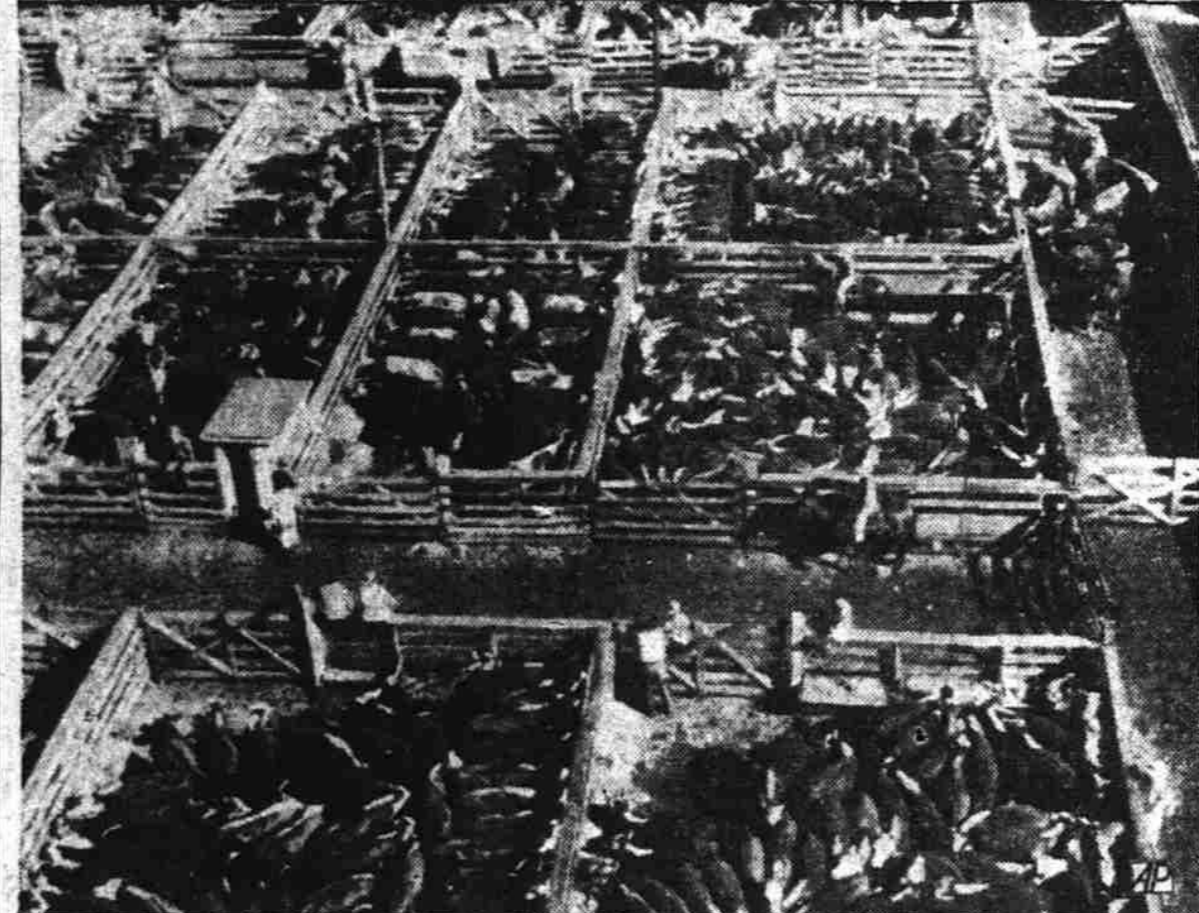

"OR WE ARE SUNK"
Speaker Says World Revival Imperative

A spiritual revival must come to the world "or we are sunk," the Rev. Arthur De Loach, pastor of the First Baptist church in Odessa, told Baptists at the first day of the 33th associational meeting at the First Baptist church here Monday.

The Rev. De Loach recently returned from Copenhagen, Denmark where he attended the World Baptist Alliance. He gained the impression, he said, that the world is in such "a bad way," that nothing short of a successful worldwide Christian conquest will prevent utter catastrophe and another world conflict.

If there is a key to the situation, it lies in more and stronger local churches and in members who are on fire for the Lord," he said. "Some might like to turn back the pages of time and be isolated, but we cannot. This is not an easy age. What affects one part of the people of the world affects the rest."

Destruction of property in Europe is nothing beside what seems to have happened spiritually, he said. "The people are meeting in many instances in what amounts to little holes in the wall. Congregations are small. They are dazed, defeated."

Churches in the United States must be seized with such zeal and purpose that they will not only discharge their responsibilities at home, but become so consecrated that they will open their hearts and purses to finance appeals for help and workers to enter these particular depressed fields and go into all the world.

The Rev. De Loach addressed the Brotherhood (men's) meeting in the afternoon with a passionate appeal to claim the power which early Christians claimed, to overcome hate, to talk convincingly, to have a religion of substance. He also was the principal speaker at the evening meeting, dealing more fully with the World Baptist meeting.

Highlights of the digest of reports of the 30 churches in the association, which embraces those in Howard, Martin, Midland and Ector counties, showed a total membership of 12,654, reflecting net gains which reversed the trend last year immediately in the wake of post-war adjustments. During the past year these churches had combined gifts of \$334,874.66, added 789 members by baptism, 1,437 by letter for total additions of 2,226. Sunday school enrollment aggregated 9,509 and training union 2,768. New churches were reported along with prospect that this year will be one of the most active in the association's history in this respect. The meetings conclude today at Calvary Baptist church in Midland.

DESPITE LAWS
Politics Still Affect Job Of Postmaster

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16. (AP)—Postmasterships such as that at Fort Worth, which Pat O'Daniel is seeking, are supposed to be lifetime jobs but veteran congressmen here say such appointments still are far from being permanent.

"Pat O'Daniel, son of Senator W. Lee O'Daniel, is one of 19 seeking the \$8,400 a year position at Fort Worth.

In 1938 Congress, in action which members said was designed to remove postmasterships from politics and give appointees a permanency not enjoyed previously when national administrations changed, passed a law to provide for appointment of first, second and third class postmasters for life.

The law stipulates that the only grounds for removal should be a finding that the postmaster was guilty of dishonesty, inefficiency or some similar charge.

Theoretically, that placed the job "above politics." Then, the Hatch Act was passed, forbidding them from engaging in political activities.

Congressmen who have been around here for a long time, say postmasterships still are far from being permanent positions.

While there has been no change of party in power since the '38 act was passed, most Democratic legislators acknowledge that if the Republicans get control of the White House and Congress at the same time there undoubtedly will be a wholesale turnover in postmasters throughout the country.

They point out that there are many technicalities on which a postmaster may be found inefficient or otherwise unfit for the position, if he isn't right politically.

ISOLATIONISM
Poles Find Barrier Of Soviet Suspicion

WARSAW, (AP)—Russia's suspicion of all foreigners in described by pro-Soviet Poles here as "the iron curtain in eastern Europe."

Warsaw is barely 100 miles from the Soviet Union. It could hardly have less contact with the Russian people if it were 10,000 miles away.

Poles encounter the cold shoulder as often as Americans when they seek Russian visas. Soviet officials in the capital of communist-dominated Poland are even more difficult to meet than those stationed in Washington or London.

Moscow newspapers are on sale at several Warsaw bookshops. Yet a Polish left-wing journalist told me:

"I've been trying to make excerpts of political writings in the Soviet press, but it's hopeless. I don't think one per cent of our readers would understand what they are driving at. Their expressions are sadly alien to our way of thinking."

Another left-winger summed up his perplexity:

"Naturally the Soviets must want to win friends and influence the masses in the smaller, neighboring countries which they overshadow because of their military power."

Turkey's War Role Defended

ISTANBUL, Sept. 16. (AP)—President Ismet Inonu says that Turkey rejected all German overtures—which he said grew violent at times—to bring her into World War II against Soviet Russia.

In a lengthy article written for the Encyclopedia Britannica at Chicago and distributed by the official Anatolia agency today, Inonu defended Turkey's war role which had often been criticized because Turkey swung over to the side of the Allies only a few weeks before Germany surrendered.

Germany, Inonu said, spared no effort to bring Turkey into the conflict.

The most important events for Turkey came when Germany started her most threatening political aggression," Inonu wrote. "During France's occupation documents had fallen into German hands and in virtue of these it was proclaimed that the Turks had been partisans of certain Anglo-French projects against the Russians.

"In publishing the French documents the Germans worked with all their heart to provoke in this troubled tense atmosphere a armed conflict between the Russians and Turks. Also they presumed the Turks—left alone—would approach them as did the Romanians, in order to guarantee themselves against Russian aggression."

Inonu said Turkey rejected flatly all German demands for passage toward the mideast while the Reich armies were assaulting Egypt.

Embezzlement At Waxahachie Charged

DALLAS, Sept. 16. (AP)—A federal grand jury has indicted Charles Talley Morse, one-time employe of the Waxahachie Bank and Trust company, on a charge of bank embezzlements of over \$30,000.
