Hapsburg Duke in Nazis' Hands



Newest victim of the ruthless purge being carried out by Nazis against non-Nazi or anti-Nazi elements in Austrian life, is the Hapsburg, Duke Maximilian of Hohenberg, shown in the photo above. He is a son of the luckless Archduke Francis Ferdinand whose assassination at Sarajevo in 1914 led to the World War. The Duke, with his brother, Ernest, was active in Austrian monarchist circles. He is under arrest, together with other prominent monarchists.

AID PLANNED FOR REFUGEES FROM EUROPE

WASHINGTON, Mar. 25.—President Roosevelt said today that the State Department invitation to 29 nations to cooperate in providing a haven for political refugees was designed to aid minorities in Russia, Spain and Italy as well as Austria and Germany. He explained the invitation sent last night by Secretary of State Cordell Hull, suggesting the 29 nations work with the United States to set up a special committee to assist the escape of political refugees from countries in which they are unwelcome. It was first believed that the invitation was made principally in behalf of Jews in Germany and Austria. Mr. Roosevelt added that it was also meant to apply to a great many Christians. The President said no special legislation would be required, pointing out that the refugees could be cared for under immigration quotas. Expenses, he indicated, could be borne privately. "Does this mean the oppressed groups, for example, in Spain, Russia, and the anti-Fascists in Italy?" the President was asked. He nodded that it did.

County Farmers Got \$34,205 In 1936 Benefits

WASHINGTON, March 25.—The Agricultural Adjustment Administration announced today payments to farmers under the 1936 conservation program up to Nov. 30, 1937, including administrative costs, totaled \$398,230,333. Payments were made to 4,000,000 farmers. Farmers in Texas received \$37,559,401. Expenses of the 1936 program in Texas were \$1,066,709. The amount for advance 1937 program is not included in the following payments by counties: Eastland County, \$34,205. Johnson County, \$276,938. Nolan County, \$152,408. Palo Pinto County, \$26,853.

HEPLER CASE JURY UNABLE ON AGREEMENT

A mistrial was declared Friday morning in the case of Clyde Hepler, charged with murder without malice, when a jury, unable to agree, was dismissed by Judge George L. Daveyport in 91st district court. The jury received the case Thursday afternoon. Hepler is a mechanical engineer for an oil company and was located temporarily at Ranger when the charge grew out of the death from automobile injuries of M. D. Cox of Odessa near Eastland November 30 last year.

Callahan County To Vote On Beer Upon April Fifth

BAIRD, Mar. 25.—April 5 was designated by the county commissioners' court as election day in Callahan county to determine whether or not four per cent beer shall be legally sold. Simultaneously the Cross Plains precinct votes on a like issue. It has been dry for a year. Callahan county, wet with repeal of national prohibition, voted dry in a subsequent election. Shortly thereafter, it voted wet, remaining in that status up to now, with Baird, Putnam and Opalin now allowing the sale of beer. The election petition contained 217 signatures. Eighteen county voting boxes will conduct the election.

Wage Reductions On Railroads to Await Proposals

WASHINGTON, Mar. 25.—Wage reduction proposals affecting nearly 1,000,000 railway employees were laid aside today until the President studies recommendations for aid to the railroads. A special report, understood to include proposals to Congress, was airmailed to Mr. Roosevelt at Warm Springs, Ga. Railway labor and management decided to defer discussion of wage cuts until he acts. It was understood the report recommended facilitating reorganization of the carriers to reduce heavy fixed charges and urged railway consolidations.

Road Improvement Jobs Announced

AUSTIN, Mar. 25.—Thirty-eight highway improvement jobs to cost an estimated \$3,000,000 were selected by the State Highway Department today for bidding on April 19. The U. S. Bureau of Roads must approve federal aid projects.

Mexico Is Seeking Customers for Oil

MEXICO CITY, March 25. The government is seeking customers for the output of the expropriated \$400,000,000 foreign oil industry, it was learned today. Efforts to find an outlet were started when the realization by the government for the need of foreign exchange to pay for food imports and also by the fact the wells must be operated to prevent salt water encroachment.

Graham May Send Band to Conference

H. J. Tanner, director general of the Oil Belt Safety Conference to be held May 6 at Eastland, reported Friday that Graham will likely send its band to the meeting. Tanner and L. H. Taylor of Ranger, safety program chairman, were at Graham, Albany and Breckenridge this week in connection with plans for the conference.

He attacked proposals for a state agency to assess property taxes. "The people no longer could appeal to their county commissioners, sitting as boards of equalization if a state assessing bureau was founded," he said.

Tank Cars Being Held at Juarez

EL PASO, March 25.—Seventy railway oil tank cars, belonging to American corporations, are being held by Mexican customs officials in Juarez, it was announced today by officials of the Standard Oil Company of Texas. The tank cars carried the last shipments of gasoline and fuel oil into Mexico before President Cardenas signed a decree expropriating foreign owned oil interests.

Ranger Fire Damage Proves Negligible

The Ranger Fire Department answered a call at 901 Foch street Friday morning when a flue fire caused little damage. Firemen reported that the blaze was extinguished with "only about half a dozen shingles" being burned.

Case Is Appealed To Supreme Court From Lower Ruling

An appeal of the state from a decision of the Eleventh Court of Civil Appeals at Eastland, holding certain Jones county property was owned by the City of Abilene as a site for a future dam is not subject to taxation was on file Friday in the Supreme Court at Austin. The trial court held the land could be taxed but the Eastland court reversed the decision and rendered judgment for the city. The city said the project which would give it an additional water supply had not been completed because of insufficiency of funds. The land meanwhile is being rented for agricultural purposes.

Cases Appealed From Taylor Get Tribunal Action

Two cases from Taylor county, one from county court and the other from 104th district court, were acted upon Friday by the Eleventh Court of Civil Appeals at Eastland. In the case appealed by D. G. Bowers against C. C. Ground, appealed from county court, the higher court, its opinion written by Associate Justice Clyde Grisom, reversed the judgment of the trial court and rendered judgment that Ground take nothing. The case had its outgrowth from a loan of \$244.44 by Bowers to Ground. The note was to be paid in 12 monthly installments and was secured by a mortgage on Ground's automobile. It was contended by Ground that after he failed to pay two installments he had a verbal agreement with Bowers that Bowers store the car 10 days; that Ground within 10 days would pay to Bowers the two past due payments and a third installment which would not then be due; that upon such payment Bowers would surrender the car to Ground. Bowers took the car before the expiration of 10 days and sold it. Ground sued Bowers for conversion. The jury found a verbal agreement had been made; determined the car was worth \$278.25; that Bowers did not take possession of the car and sell it under terms of the chattel mortgage; that in disposing of the car Bowers acted willfully and with malice. Exemplary damages were awarded in the sum of \$113.66. Upon findings of the jury, judgment was rendered for the plaintiff for aggregate of sums, less the amount of plaintiff's debt. Bowers appealed. The higher court said that since the plaintiff had failed to show the facts amounting to a converse, the case in Taylor county should have instructed a verdict for the defendant. The court also added that the plaintiff failed to have cause for action. The other case, affirmed, from Taylor county was appealed by Colorado Life company from the 104th district court in opposition to a verdict from Mrs. Earl L. Teague, who was awarded \$785 in a suit on an insurance policy of her husband. Chief Justice W. P. Leslie wrote the opinion in the insurance case.

Senate Approves a Probe of the TVA

WASHINGTON, Mar. 25.—The Senate today approved a resolution calling for a joint congressional investigation of the T. V. A. The resolution now goes to the House, where concurrence appeared certain. The resolution represented a compromise and authorized points of inquiry desired both by friends and foes of the much-disputed New Deal agency. The Senate finance committee virtually completed work on provisions of the tax revision bill. Final vote on the reorganization bill is set for Monday, leaving the way open for consideration of the tax bill Tuesday.

Teacher Salary Aid Announced by Woods

AUSTIN, March 25.—Dr. L. A. Woods, state school superintendent, today announced payment of \$1,348,155 salary aids for teachers, half the amount appropriated by the legislature. The balance will be appropriated to schools on a percentage basis.

TEXARKANA, March 25.—Officials were unable to determine today whether August Becker of Dallas, whose body was found in the Red river near here, was slain or died from natural causes.

Called Secret Wife of Schuschnigg



Countess Vera Fugger von Badenhausen above, thought to be the woman who shared ex-Chancellor Kurt Schuschnigg's imprisonment in Belvedere Palace following German annexation of Austria, has been reported as secretly wed to him shortly after he was deposed. Her marriage to Count Fugger had been dissolved.

EUROPE HAS HOPES FOR A YEAR OF PEACE

Europe grasped today at the hope for a year of peace and better business before the next world war. The hope spread, except in Spain, as a result of the declaration of foreign policy by British Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain, designed to end immediate war threats by diplomacy and to speed up industry by building armament on a wartime scale. It was reflected in a more cheerful outlook in Czechoslovakia and France, despite a cabinet crisis in Paris and a statement by U. S. Ambassador Joseph Kennedy at London that prospects for peace in 1938 ought to help American business. The British National Labor Council, incorporating all phases of labor, said today continuance in office of the present British government is a menace to the peace of Europe. Meantime Great Britain agreed to a proposal by the United States to set up a special international committee to aid political refugees from Austria and Germany. The British government was said to have secret data on German armaments, which was the basis for the general speeding up of manufacture of arms and expected to result in 10,000 fighting planes.

Correspondent Of Newspapers To Be "Exiled"

VIENNA, March 25.—George Gedye, veteran European correspondent of London papers and the New York Times, received orders today to leave Austria by Monday night. Gedye has been in Vienna for 13 years. He is a former British army officer and author of a number of books. Meantime it was announced that 1600 persons have been arrested in Vienna since the nazis came into power. Three hundred have been released.

Texas Is In Path Of A New Cool Wave

DALLAS, March 25.—Texas is in the path of a cool wave will send temperatures in the Panhandle almost to freezing tonight, government observers said today. The cool weather will be felt to the gulf coast and will be accompanied by showers in South Texas.

Tests Indicate 'Pep Talks' Do Key Up Athletes

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn.—Many a spectator has wondered what actually brings about a change in an athletic team when the coach roars between halves "to get in

there and win this game." The trick words, too, often are not, and Dr. Ansel Keys, who heads the University of Minnesota project for studying the effect of athletics on the human body, has an explanation: "The coach's speech goes to the players' adrenal glands, located near the kidney, according to Dr. Keys. Whenever a person is afraid, angered, excited or otherwise emotionally upset, the adrenal glands release a substance known

as adrenalin. This, which likewise may be injected artificially into the body, causes the liver to secrete more sugar than ordinarily used. Thus the body has more than the usual supply of fuel to burn. "Adrenalin," Dr. Keys said, "also raises the blood pressure. The heart is working harder to supply the muscles with more oxygen. You can hit harder, run faster, work harder, stand a greater shock than under normal conditions.

It is also requested that the citizens living adjacent to vacant lots gather up any trash that may have accumulated there and place it in piles so that it may be disposed of daily.

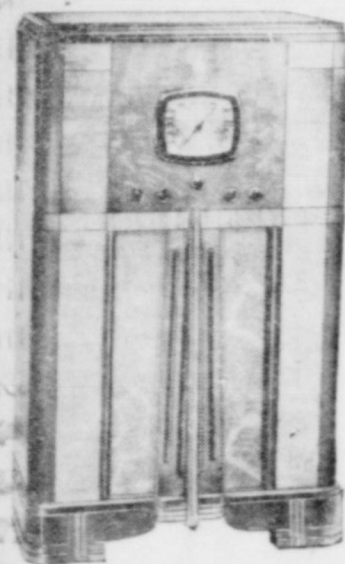

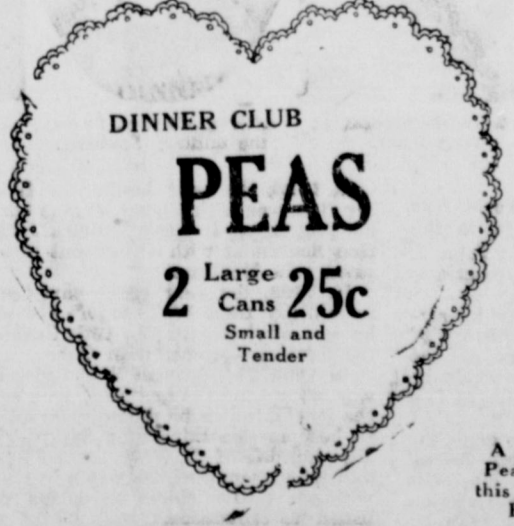

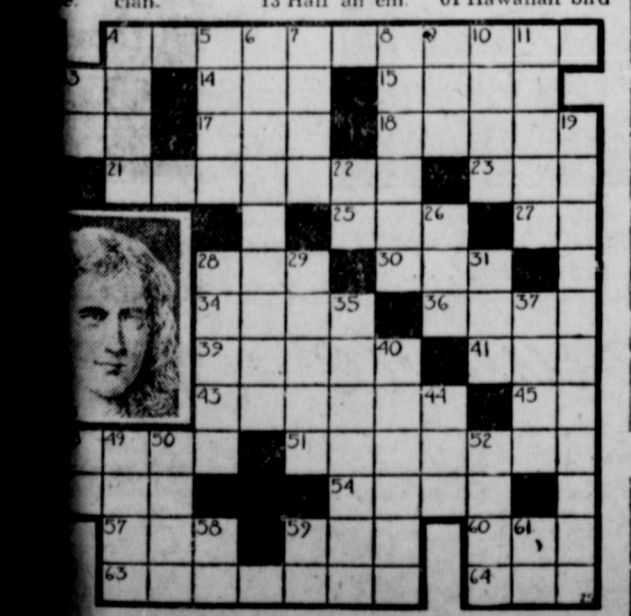

BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WITH RODNEY DUTCHER

WASHINGTON.—Whether the
government is competent to
sit in as referee on the problems
of an industry is a question very
much bound up in the new effort
of the National Bituminous Coal
Commission to start out and do its
job all over again after an initial
fiasco.

The commission is sometimes
known as the "Goofy Board" be-
cause it operates under the Guffey
coal act and for numerous other
good and sufficient reasons. Its
job is to set minimum coal prices
so that mine owners in each of
10 soft coal areas will receive ap-
proximately the average cost of
production per ton in their area.

Conditions had been fiercely
after ruinously competitive. The
measure skinned through the
House only after certain members
had been assured the public
would be protected from gouging.
Bituminous consumers include
railroads which burn 19 per cent
of it, "manufacturing and miscel-
laneous" (including cities, states,
schools and so on) 52 per cent,
utilities and domestic users 16 per
cent, the last figure covering hos-
tels and apartment houses. No-
body knows how many house-
holders use soft coal. The act
set up a Consumers' Counsel em-
powered to learn all pertinent
facts, to advise, to protest and to
spread information.

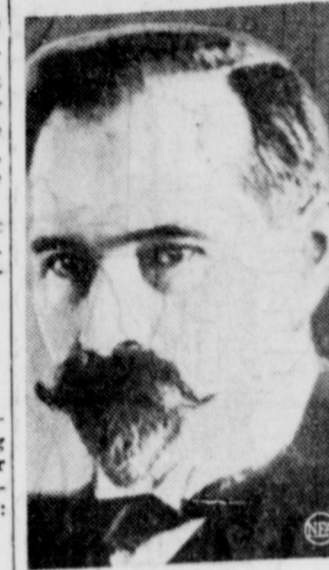

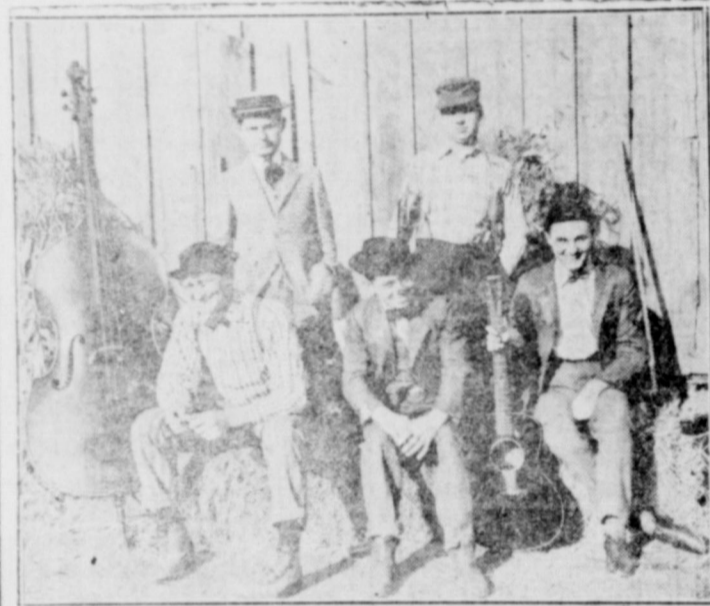

Underprivileged Children Will Be Happy May Day

AUSTIN.—More than 5,000 underprivileged crippled children will spend a happier May Day this year because of the work of the crippled children's division of the Department of Education, which has helped restore them to a more normal life, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, whose department is cooperating with the May Day-Child Health Day statewide movement.

Among the twelve divisions of the Department of Education is the crippled children's division, whose work is the correction of physical deformities and the training to overcome such handicaps. Through ministrations of this division, the child who has watched his friends at play may be able to join them. What greater happiness may be brought to a child? In the enthusiasm to do good, many blame this division for failure to take every call, without realizing that this division is bound by legislative act to the definition of a crippled child as "any person of normal mentality under twenty-one years of age, whose physical functions or movements are impaired by reason of a joint, bone, or muscle defect or deformity, to the extent that the child is or may be expected to be totally or partially incapacitated for education or remunerative occupation. To be eligible for service under this act, the child's disability must be such that it is reasonable to expect that such child can be improved through hospitalization, medical or surgical care, artificial appliances, or through a combination of these services." A child is not eligible if his parents are financially able to pay for the necessary treatment.

The United States Children's Bureau, through the Social Security Act, matches dollar for dollar the appropriation of the state legislature for this work. Surgeons and hospitals are approved by the State Board of Health on compliance with standard requirements.

Do you know that, first, 2,037 crippled children were hospitalized? Second, over 1,200 crippled children were examined by orthopedic surgeons? Third, over 700 children eligible for treatment wait on sufficient funds for further treatment?

Of every hundred crippled children, 24 are born crippled, 11 are crippled because of accidents, 55 because of disease, and 10 are crippled because even in Texas they have lacked sunlight and proper food. The crippled children's program is four-fold—a program of prevention, early discovery, treatment, and vocational training.

The state May Day committee lists with pride this member, the crippled children's division of the Department of Education, Dr. Cox said.

Trade Agreements
A severe test will be given the reciprocal trade agreement by Secretary of State Cordell Hull. He intends to make an agreement with the United Kingdom, to add one more to the 17 already made. A tariff adjustment reciprocal agreement between this country and Czechoslovakia was the last to be entered under the 17 agreements.

CCC
Three hundred CCC camps will be closed before June 1, in order to reduce the strength of the corps from 300,000 to 250,000. The reduction will take place even though applications for enrollment have shown a continued increase instead of decrease. Approximately 4,000 supervisory and administrative officials will be

NATIONAL SELF-SUFFICIENCY IN RUSSIA



Accidents
Ten million accidents serious enough to disable their victims one day or longer occur annually in the U. S.—30,000 daily. Each day, 500,000 persons in the U. S. are unable to work, go to school or pursue other usual activities as the result of injuries caused by accidents.

Building
Building costs throughout the country have turned definitely

downward, confirming the trend noted in scattered sections since the early fall of 1937.

Highway Bill
Congressman Elmer H. Wene of New Jersey has introduced a bill, H. R. 9666, which would build a system of super highways that would be as permanent as the Appian Way of the Roman Em-

pire, linking every section of America. This highway system would consist of at least four lanes of traffic in each direction, with parking shoulders, all on a reinforced base of concrete. About 25,000 miles of road would be required to link all sections of the country. These super-highways would be built only as fast

as necessary to keep American industry and labor operating at capacity. The cost of the highway, including over and under passes would be about \$250,000 to \$300,000 per mile, or from \$8,000,000,000 to \$10,000,000,000 complete. To build this self-liquidating highway would require every bit of available labor of every description for many years. About 10,000,000 tons of fabricated steel, 500,000,000 barrels of cement and more than 100,000 tractors, road-building machines, and other motor equipment would be required.

Business Men's Bureau
The farmers of the U. S. have a bureau to perform services for them—the bureau of agricultural economics. Now the business men are to have a similar bureau for their services. The Commerce Department is setting up a new bureau of industrial economics to study problems of industry.

WPA Projects
On the theory that home building might be encouraged if neighborhoods were put in better conditions, the WPA wants approval of numerous projects for laying out new streets and sewer installations.

War Situation
The State Department officials are keeping a close eye on developments in Europe. The U. S. will maintain a "hands off" policy, no matter what happens.

Water Conservation
A special message from President Roosevelt outlined to Congress a six-year plan for conservation and development of the nation's water resources. It is said the President has three or four messages to be delivered.

Boycott
An unofficial boycott in this country, it is said, has caught Japan off guard and has reduced sharply the imports of goods from Japan. As a result war financing plans have been upset.
