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C. I. O. Should Be Last to Ask Censorship

Any recent dropping of jaws on the part of those who stand for civil liberties and oppose any sort of speech or press censorship, may have been caused by a motion passed by the Cleveland Council of the Committee for Industrial Organization. That motion demanded that "libelous" literature attacking the C. I. O. be removed from the shelves of the Cleveland Public Library and that the C. I. O.'s educational committee examine other library books - und pamphlets in order to recommend the expurgation of all literature hostile to C. I. O. interests.

Now it should be clear that this action of the Cleveland Council does not necessarily represent the attitude of the C. I. O. nationally. It is merely a demand by one local body of the C. I. O. and the motion was passed only after a hot floor fight. But the idea is there just the same.

The idea is that the C. I. O., which has had to fight for its very life against attempted censorships and denial of civil liberties, now sees one of its local bodies attempting to set itself up as a sort of censorship board to determine what sort of labor news a municipal library will weep on its shelves and also, of course, what sort of labor literature people will read.

Now a progressive, ultra-liberal movement such as the C. I. O. just can't afford to have any such nonsense taking place within the organization-even when one of the offending pamphlets has the title, "Join the C. I. O. and Help Build a Soviet America."


Misguided zeal of this sort will harm the C. I. O. cause infinity more than any action its opponents could conceive. A start toward censorship and anti-labor literature will naturally and justifiably bring demands that prolabor material be treated the same way. The C. I. O. would not take kindly to the suggestion that any material unfavorable to industrial monopoly be eliminated from li-

Speaking against the motion, Robert Parker, president of the WPA teachers' union, made this point: "If we start a book burning campaign, the anti-labor forces will start another and have all pro-labor and C. I. O. material removed. We should not give impetus to such a move." The point is well taken.

There is no reason why a labor union can be smart. The Cleveland motion will build more antiC. I. O. sentiment than all the carpings of the deepest dyed of re-actionary labor-baiters. Besides issuing an invitation to antilabor groups to march on public libraries, demanding that literature sympathetic to labor be destroyed, the motion has the further effect of advertising the "malicious" pamphlets. Probably more Clevelanders will read "Join the C. I. O. and Help Build a Soviet America" within the next month than have read it during the last year.

"Book burning" has no place in the United States, whether the agitation for it be inspired by the American Liberty League or the Communist party.

heard men speak of the surrender of Lee at Appomattox. In 1860, scarcely two months after the first battle of Bull Run, John Joseph Pershing was born in Laclede, Mo. His father was a farmer and railroad section

In 1880, four years after the Custer massacre, he was being graduated from the Kirksville, Mo., Normal School. In 1886, as President Cleveland was

agitating the whole country with tariff reform, he was graduated from the U. S. Military Academy, 30th in his class. In 1889, the year of the Samoa affair, which almost brought war with Germany n the Pacific, he was serving with the

6th Cavalry against the Apache Indians In 1891, while "Queen Lil" ruled in Hawaii and American tunexation loomed, he was military instructor and student of law at the University of Nebraska.

In 1895, the year Japan was fighting her first war with China, he was earning his lifelong nickname of "Black Jack" as first lieutenant with a regiment of negro cavalry in Montana. In 1898, the year which saw the rise to military fame of Theodore Roosevelt,

was serving with the 10th Cavalry in the Santiago campaign in Cuba. In 1899, the Spanish War finished, he was sent to the Philippines to help subdue the Moros, which he did so effectively as to become something of a national hero. His storming of the Moro fort of Bacolod

and his personal achievements in treating with the native chiefs or dattos established his reputation. In 1905, the year of the Dusso-Japan-ese War, he married Helen Frances Warren, daughter of Senator Francis B. War-ren, chairman of the Senate Military

Affairs Committee. In 1906, after a brief service as military attache with Kuroki's Japanese army in Manchuria, he was promoted over the heads of 862 ranking officers from cap-tain to brigadier-general.

In 1915, after further Philippine service against the Moros, he was serving on the Mexican border at El Paso when word came that Mrs. Pershing and their three daughters had burned to death in a fire at the Presidio, California.

In 1916, while the Germans were smashing their armies against the rock of Verdun, he was sent into Mexico with 20,000 troops to catch Pancho Villa, revolutionist who had raided New Mexican towns. He didn't catch Villa, but he impressed Washington with his conduct of the expedition.

In 1917, he was chosen to command the In 1917, he was chosen to command the American Expeditionary Force against Germany, and in May, in advance of his troops, he sailed for France as General of the Armies of the United States. There, in the face of tremendous pressure, he trood firm for an independent American stood firm for an independent American

In 1918, May saw the battle of Chatean Thierry; June saw Belleau Wood taken; July found Pershing's Americans on the Vesle; September wrote St. Mihiel; October the Meuse Argonne; Nowarber 11 found them before Sedan vember 11 found them before Sedan.

In 1919, he was advisor to the American peace delegation at Versailles, and on his return to the United States he was voted the permanent rank of General, fifth American military leader to hold it.

In 1921, as Mussolini was preparing to seize power in Italy, he was named Chief

In 1924, as the French were withdrawing from their invasion of the Ruhr,

he was retired from the army, being 64



In 1926, as Pilsudski was making him-self dictator in Warsaw, he sailed to France as chairman of the Battle Monu-





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

Underprivileged Children Will Be Happy May Day

AUSTIN .- More than 5,000 underprivileged crippled children will spend a happier May Day this year because of the work of the crippled children's division of the Department of Education, which has helped restore them to a more normal life, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, whose department is cooperating with the May Day-Child Health Day statewide movement.

Among the twelve divisions of the Department of Education is the crippled children's division, whose work is the correction of physical deformities and the train- Strange Twin Lamb ing to overcome such handicaps. 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

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
