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Eager For Dictator? Just Look At Europe

When the going gets really tough and the tax collector stalks abroad in the land like an advance agent of the seven plagues, the honest American is apt to get his cronies off in a corner and remark, soulfully: "What this country needs is a dictator."

Much of the willingness to say this, no doubt, comes from the fact that we have never yet had one. Certainly the things that have been happening to those lands which do have dictators do not make the best of testimonials.

John T. Flynn, widely known economist and publicist, pointed out recently that the two European nations which are having the most trouble these days are the two which have gone farthest with this dictator idea.

There's Italy, for instance, Mussolini, as everybody knows, made the trains run on time; but like so many other wonder-workers, he did it with borrowed money, and his present actions have a remarkable likeness to the antics of a man who is striving desperately to keep one jump ahead of the sheriff.

Italy's war in Ethiopia is a war of desperation. The country's economic position has been getting steadily worse for years. The budget is so far out of balance that it makes our own look like an exercise in frugal finance drawn up by an old-fashioned banker for the instruction of the young.

Win, lose, or draw, the Italian nation can expect to get nothing out of its Ethiopian venture but more grief.

In Germany the condition is little better. Unemployment is still going up, retail prices are painfully high, and only a spurt of orders for war materials keeps the bottom from falling away down to the realm of the departed.

As in Italy, the desperation born of a tightening economic crisis is leading people to look on war as the only hope of salvation—and when a nation begins thinking that way it is almost time to notify a few close friends and prepare for a simple but impressive service at the home.

Now all this is worth thinking about twice.

A dictatorship is the sort of thing that is resorted to as a last hope. It comes when people feel that their situation is so bad that it couldn't possibly be any worse.

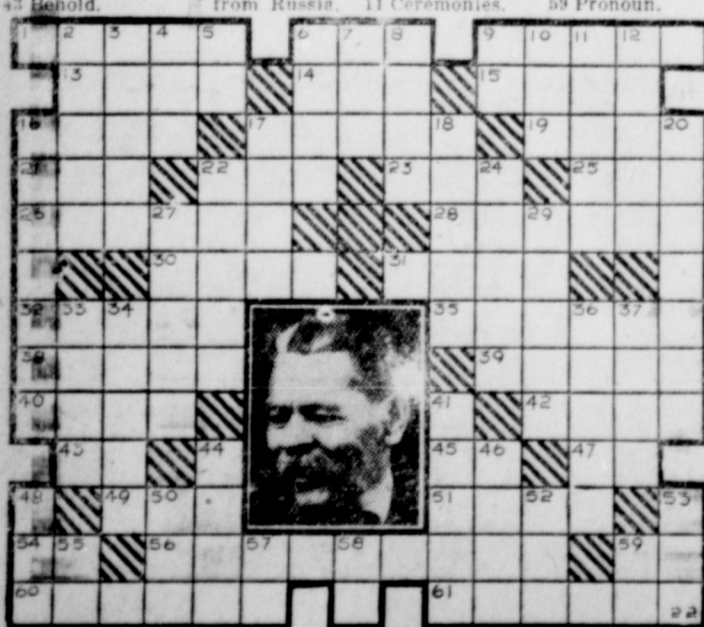
And here we have the two leading examples of dictatorship, proving that that idea is utterly cock-eyed—that the one sure way to make a bad situation worse is to band everything over to one man and tell him to shoot the works.

In bad times we may say that we need a dictator. It is not hard to imagine oppressed citizens of Italy and Germany getting off in a corner and saying, furtively: "What this country needs is a republic."

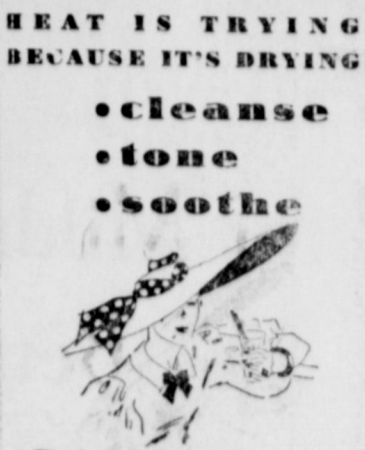

TOMORROW'S MENU

BREAKFAST: Orange juice, cereal cooked with dates, cream, crisp oven toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON: Open turkey sandwiches, chutney sauce, cranberry whip, cocoanut macaroons, milk, tea.

DINNER: Blanquette of lamb, baked sweet potatoes and pineapple, green beans in cream sauce, salad of shredded Chinese cabbage and green peppers in lime jelly, chocolate bread pudding, milk, coffee.

Turkey a la King: For the meals between, use up the small pieces and slivers of meat in rechauffees and salads. For turkey au gratin make a medium white sauce, add chopped fowl and turn into a buttered baking dish. Cover with coarse crumbs and bake in a hot oven until crumbs are brown.

Turkey a la King: can be made at the table in a chafing dish or made in the kitchen and kept hot over hot water.

There are various turkey salads, jellied or hot as suits your needs and tastes. A combination of peas, celery and diced turkey is a good substantial luncheon salad.

Lion Hunting Good In Texas, Famous Hunter Declares

DALLAS.—Bruce Duncan has come down out of the mountains near Alpine, and started counting sheep, deer, stags and rabbit hunters with the lion. He won't have to go all the way to Africa to hunt lions.

"More people," Duncan explained, "know the difference between a mountain lion and the African lion with a bushy mane and a tassel on the end of his tail, but in reality a mountain lion resembles a plain ordinary yellow house cat, with of course the exception that they are larger, in fact, a great deal larger."

Duncan has been hunting panthers, his name for the mountain lion, for over two years and has brought down 22 of them. The largest he ever killed weighed 203 pounds. Duncan says that with the exception of a 212-pounder killed a number of years ago by Teddy Roosevelt while on a hunting trip in Arizona, his is probably the largest ever shot in the United States.

"I had a hard time with that one," Duncan said, "he had killed 700 sheep, 150 horses and had done an estimated damage of \$7,000. The state had put a price on his hide of \$200, and the trouble and time I spent trying to get him was well worth it. I cracked him with dogs for over 20 miles, and after I finally caught up with him it took me five hours to make the kill. I made the kill on Mount Oxt about 7,000 feet above sea level. I finally got him to make a track and I caught him down with a Winchester rifle."

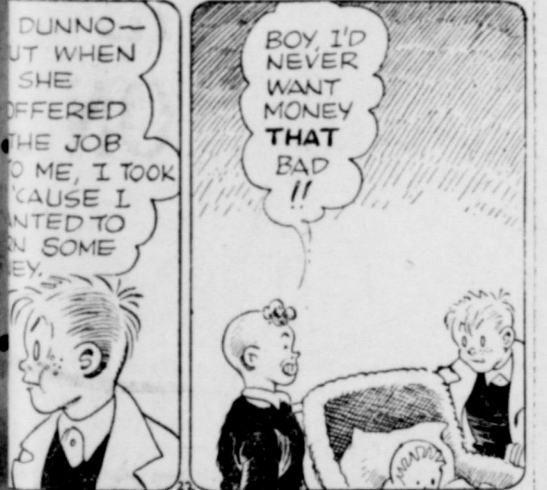

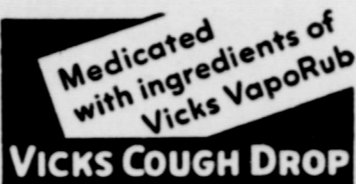

"MUTINY ON THE BOUNTY" A YEAR IN PREPARATION

For the spectacular film, the original H.M.S. Bounty was recreated in exact detail from British admiralty plans to sail the Pacific ocean. A fleet of other sailing vessels, typical of the period, also was duplicated for the picture.
