Carnegie Centenary

November 25 this year marks the centennial of the birth of Andrew Carnegie who is known as America's greatest library benefactor.

In 1835 there were only a few scattered libraries in this country, most of them small college and subscription libraries. The first free children's library was established in that year in West Cambridge, Mass.

In those days the library was a retreat for scholars; taking a book home would have seemed a preposterous idea. Wire netting across the shelves protected the books.

Now, readers have free access to open shelves; no more wire fences to protect the books. There are reading guides to help adults find books adapted to their needs.

The greatest impetus given the modern library came from Carnegie's benefactions in the early 1900s. In 1881 he had given a library to his native town, Dunfermline, in Scotland.

The Carnegie Corporation has continued library benefactions since his death in 1919. Since 1881 nearly \$65,000,000 has been given by his wealth to equip, build or endow almost 3,000 libraries—1,900 of these in the United States and Canada.

Andrew Carnegie said, "I do not want to be known for what I give, but for what I induce others to give." Under his plan the community receiving a grant furnished a site for the building and an annual maintenance fund of 10 per cent of the gift.

At present, longitudinal routes in South America appear to be developing less rapidly than transverse routes. The major recent developments have been the expansion of highway traffic between Venezuela and Colombia, Peruvian development of highways intended to connect the Pacific slope with the upper Amazon Valley, rapid modernization of highways in Argentina, and reported agitation for a Trans-Andean highway between Chile and Argentina at sufficiently low altitude to permit year-round travel.

Highway officials here feel that practical means of international cooperation in furtherance of the highway to Panama has been established through the Congressional Act of June, 1934, which provided \$1,000,000 "to meet such expenses as the president in his discretion may deem necessary to cooperate with the several governments, members of the Pan American Union, in connection with survey and construction of the proposed inter-American highway."

Prusant to this authority, President Roosevelt in November approved expenditure of \$349,000 toward the construction of bridges over the Chiriqui River in Guatemala. The United States will finance surveys, steel for the superstructure, mechanical equipment, and supervision of construction, while the other country will furnish local materials, labor, and the rights-of-way. Similar arrangements are being negotiated with respect to other Central American bridges. A location survey is being made in Panama to the Costa Rican boundary.

accompanied by technical aides under the auspices of the United States Bureau of Public Roads. Mexico is building her own section of the Pan American highway, and after completion of the route north of Mexico City is expected to turn official attention to the southern half.

Although confident that the Pan American highway will henceforth make steady progress, officials here think that he completed modern route to Panama may not be ready in much less than a decade. This estimate is based on the rate of progress to date. However, the first period of construction has been contemporary with years of general economic depression, and with better times and active enthusiasm, it is physically possible that the average rate of progress may be expedited.

Rear Admiral Says Battleship Is Still Backbone of Fleet

HOUSTON—The battleship, despite rapid developments of other implements of war, continues to be the backbone of a fleet, in the view of Rear Admiral E. B. Fenner, Boston, commandant of the Eighth Naval District.

Admiral Fenner, who visited Houston as representative of Secretary of Navy Claude G. Swanson to the annual meeting of the American Association of Port Authorities, said the United States must have had battleship parity for adequate defense.

"I have been through three distinct periods of naval evolution," he said, "during which many said the battleship was an obsolete vessel."

"First, there was the torpedo boat. They said a torpedo boat was better than a battleship. "Next, it was the submarine. The statement often was made that one submarine rendered one battleship helpless.

"Now it's the airplane. But the airplane is merely an adjunct to a fleet and nothing ever will replace the battleship because the navy needs the battleship's gunpower."

Admiral Fenner said that no fixed number of ships could defend adequately the United States' coastline if another nation developed greater strength.

"Everything in naval work is relative. Under the last treaty, the program of the United States provided for an adequate naval defense. However, it appears that Japan intends to obtain naval parity and have as many or more ships than we have.

"We cannot see why, under existing conditions, Japan needs as large a navy as the United States."

he said. The only limit to a "wide open" naval building race between nations, he said, is the length of each nation's "purse strings."

Not boosting Runyon or the news service whom he represents, the style is original and at least a far cry from the pseudo-dramatics used by some sports-writing ex-players.

Pensions Bring Up Some Novel Ideas

AUSTIN.—Old age pension discussion, particularly the talk of what to do with men placed on the shelf, has led to the intriguing suggestion that the state constitution be changed to raise the age requirement for governor and
