Congressman Martin Dies On the Political War Path

Representative Martin Dies of the Beaumont district is on the political road again. In a radio address broadcast from Washington he assailed "bureaucracy and extravagance in the American government." He declared that bureaucracy is the immediate state between democracy and dictatorship and that the American debt of 30 billion dollars would cost Americans twice that much when interest is paid. He called for abandonment "as quickly as possible of the artificial methods resorted to in combatting the depression." He advised that "having lived in a glass house for many decades, the republicans are in no position to throw stones at the democrats on this question." He asserted that the government was built on "individualism and competition" and said "I don't believe we can bring prosperity by destroying crops, food or cattle and I do believe that such a course will eventually lead to poverty since it is a violation of a great truth and a great principle."

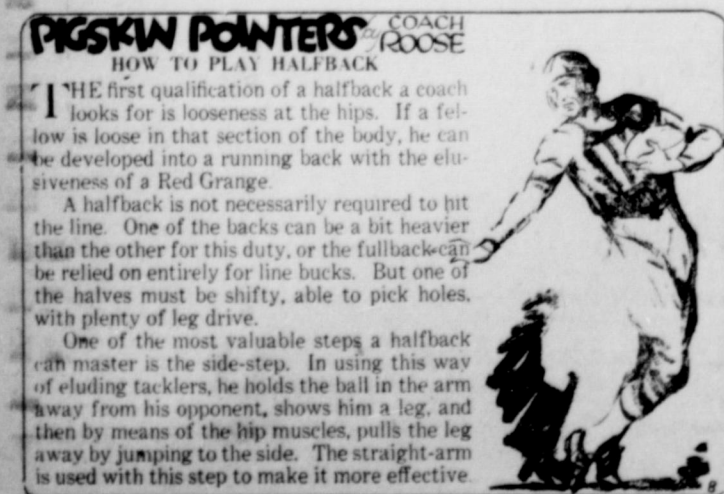

Noted Texas Legionnaire Dies in the Mexican Capital

Hal G. Brennan, former state department commander of the American Legion, is dead in the Mexican capital. He was there on business. His death was wholly unexpected as he had been in excellent health. He conducted a large customs brokerage business in Laredo and maintained a branch in Mexico City. He was a native Texan and born on the banks of the Rio Grande. His father had been chief of police for many years in the wild old days of the border city. Prior to that he had been a customs officer for many years in the service of the federal government in Gulf port cities and was a terror to smugglers on land and sea.

Hal G. Brennan saw service in France. He was one of the organizers of the American Legion. He was widely known the state over and he played his part in state and national politics of his country. He was 46 and he knew his Mexico as well as he knew his native state. He was an aggressive advocate of the bonus proposition and ever active in the affairs of the Texas veterans of the World War. 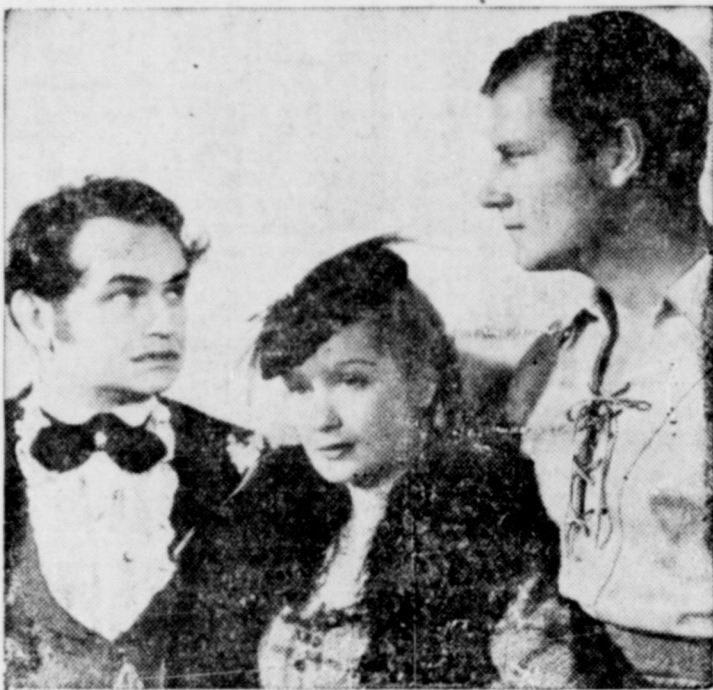

Good Turkeys More In Demand Than The Regular Scrubs

COLLEGE STATION. — With Thanksgiving and Christmas drawing near, the spotlight is again turned on turkeys.

"Texas turkey growers have paid closer attention than ever this year to selection of breeding stock and finished dressing in order to produce birds of prime quality for the market," George P. McCarthy, Extension poultry husbandman, announced.

He pointed out that, although the turkey crop would be shorter in numbers this year, it would nearly balance in tonnage. Last year, 1,600 carloads of dressed turkeys were shipped out of Texas. This year, trade estimates place the carload shipments between 1,300 and 1,400.

McCarthy said that the Luling Foundation has one of the outstanding flocks this year, comprised of 1,800 birds from this year's hatch. Most of these birds will be sold as breeders.

Another good flock is owned by Levi Churchill, turkey demonstrator in Bailey county. Last year, almost his entire flock was graded prime. He will have around 500 birds this year.

"Breeding for quality pays," McCarthy said. He gave as an example the flock owned by the J. T. Owen family in Lynn county. Last year this family stressed quality in their turkeys. As a result of proper management, balanced rations, and good breeding stock, the family made a net profit of \$153 on 85 birds sold.

"Last year," McCarthy emphasized, "prime toms and hens brought from 7 to 8 cents more per pound than ordinary commercial turkeys. There is every indication that the

same price condition will be true this year."

As a result of turkey grading schools held the last two years, the first dressed turkey show in the southwest was opened last December at Plainview. This year the show will again be held during the first week in December at Plainview.

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Texas Rangers Will Guard Centennial Central Exposition

DALLAS. — Texas rangers, among the most colorful law enforcement figures in the world, will guard the Texas Centennial Central Exposition and will patrol the grounds both on foot and on horse if plans of the exposition's management committee materialize.

The management committee, headed by R. L. Thornton, discussed the plan with Capt. Tom Hickman of the Texas rangers. Chief of Police R. L. Jones and acting Mayor D. R. Graham. The committee also discussed a proposal for the erection of a Texas ranger building of logs, to furnish the atmosphere of 100 years ago when the ranger force was organized, and to establish a regular troop of rangers here during the centennial exposition.

Tentative plans for the Exposition's police force, which, at the peak, will number about 150, calls for the appointment of each man as a Texas ranger. They will be costumed appropriate to the general idea of the appearance of a Texas ranger. Some of them will be mounted on horses rigged in the trappings of the west.

The proposed ranger building would be located in the southwest corner of the exposition grounds. It would have dormitories as quarters for the troops of regular rangers and would include a corral for horses and pack trains.

Old time rangers would be invited to make the building their headquarters as long as they desired to attend the exposition.

A section of the structure would be devoted to a museum of Texas ranger relics and would include ancient rifles and pistols, saddles and similar articles. A part of the museum would be devoted to the equipment to the modern day ranger and to a display of the means he uses in the suppression of crime.

Centennial officials expressed the belief that presentation of the Texas ranger idea to the exposition visitors would prove one of the most attractive and interesting features, since many of the visitors will be from northern and eastern states, where the name Texas ranger carries even more glamour than in the southwest.

The committee announced that it would continue working on this plan and that in the meantime it would take steps to assure the finest type of police organization for the celebration, regardless of whether or not the Texas ranger idea is adopted. A well-trained force of 40 men will be policing the grounds by April, the committee said.

Leonard Pack, slated to head the exposition's police force, was present for the conference, however, the committee made no official announcement of his appointment as chief of the organization.
