# **ARE AWAITING** TO START FIGHT

By United Press

The second phase of Italy's occupation of Ethiopia neared completion today with the occupation of Makale, strategic northern point within striking distance of the road leading to Addis Ababa.

As expected, the Ethiopians did not resist. Haile Selassie's strategy is to permit the Italians to penetrate far into the wilderness of his country, hundreds of miles from their bases, before his wild warriors start their attack.

Reports say that this strategy is likely to continue for some time unless the warriors get out of hand and insist on going into battle against orders.

A period of inaction for at least a week can be expected in the It will be one of consolidation for the Italians, during which they will move up supplies, artillery and tanks and straighten their entire line from east to west across the country before striking southward in the third phase of the campaign.

As the push into Makale was completed a more significant drive was in progress in the northwest. A strong Italian force pushed southward along the Sudan border toward Lake Tana, the apple of Britain's eye in this country. Lake Tana forms the headwaters of the Blue Nile, which flows around into the Sudan and British territory in



## PIGSKW POWTERS ROOSE

THE first qualification of a halfback a coach looks for is looseness at the hips. If a fel low is loose in that section of the body, he can be developed into a running back with the elusiveness of a Red Grange.

A halfback is not necessarily required to hit the line. One of the backs can be a bit heavier than the other for this duty, or the fullback-can be relied on entirely for line bucks. But one of the halves must be shifty, able to pick holes, with plenty of leg drive.

One of the most valuable steps a halfback an master is the side-step. In using this way of eluding tacklers, he holds the ball in the arm hway from his opponent, shows him a leg, and then by means of the hip muscles, pulls the leg away by jumping to the side. The straight-arm is used with this step to make it more effective






