The state's experience in dir ssuance of licenses may result a considerable saving in future years. The drivers' licenses are be ing issued at San Antonio at an average cost of 2 cents each. The issuing expense is about \$100 a 200,000 licenses will be issued

there at a total cost of \$4,000. In counties where the licenses are being issued by county tax collectors, the state pays 5 cents per license. The big future saving is possible, however, on automobile licenses. County tax collectors why objected to issuing the drivers' censes said the drivers' consult take more time than ombile licenses.
