Reading the dispatches from Europe these days is a good deal watching the sputter and crackle of sparks moving along a fuse toward a sheaf of dynamite sticks.

Whatever happens to this newest development in the Rhineland, no one can doubt that the people overseas are building up for a war.

Whoever may have been to blame for the war of 1914, the one clear fact is that when that war ended the way was open, for the first time in modern history, to build an enduring peace in Europe.

But tired old Georges Clemenceau was a great hater, and he took his people along with him.

As the years went on, France's attitude remained the same. Germany was to live, permanently, as a crushed and impotent nation.

The fact that Germany for some years had a government which honestly tried to work out some peaceful solution to Germany's problems made no difference.

Now Europe, after all, is not so very big. The nations that occupy that crowded peninsula have to keep on living together.

And France's contribution to human history in the last 18 years has been to keep those hatreds and fears alive.

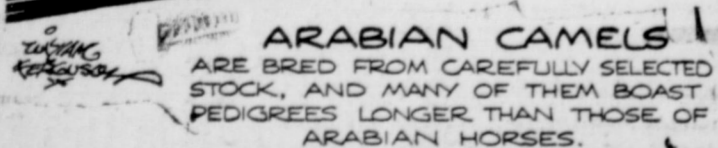
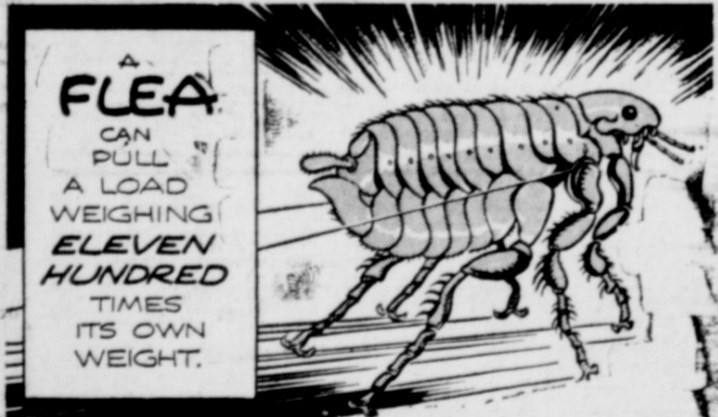

CONGRESS IS ASKED BILLION FOR THE WPA

By United Press WASHINGTON, March 18. — President Roosevelt today asked Congress to appropriate \$1,500,000,000 to continue the works progress administration for another year.

President Roosevelt estimated this sum would be enough to care for the destitute unemployed, together with \$1,000,000,000 in unexpended previous appropriations and the \$600,000,000 carried in the budget for the CCC and various public works.

Limitations of federal relief expenditures to this figure however, is dependent upon reemployment of substantial members of the idle by private industry, the president said.

Texas' Lost Laws Are Still Valid, Court Determines

By United Press AUSTIN, March 18.—Texas' "lost laws" were held by the court of criminal appeals, to be in full effect.

The lost laws were 150 articles to the state penal code, adopted in 1925. They were included in a folio of the code that was accidentally left out of the official copy signed by the officials of the legislature and approved by Gov. Miriam Ferguson.

To impute to the legislature the intent to appeal the statute is to lay at its door the charge of ignoring the moral sense of the people and striking down some of the strongest safeguards of the home. That such was not the legislative intent is apparent from the enrolled bill," the opinion said in part.

Short Coast Road Is Being Urged

By United Press GOOSE CREEK, Texas. — A campaign for opening a short route from Houston to Port Arthur will be adopted within the next month by county officials and civic leaders of Harris, Jefferson and Chambers counties, according to County Judge W. H. Ward, Houston.

Judge Ward said a meeting would be held here to effect organization to represent the counties in an appearance before the state highway commission.

The proposed road would connect with Highway 146 near Mont Belvieu in Chambers county, cross Trinity river near Wallisville and from Anahuac would take a direct route to Port Arthur, Judge Ward said.

Crows are Unusually Numerous in Texas

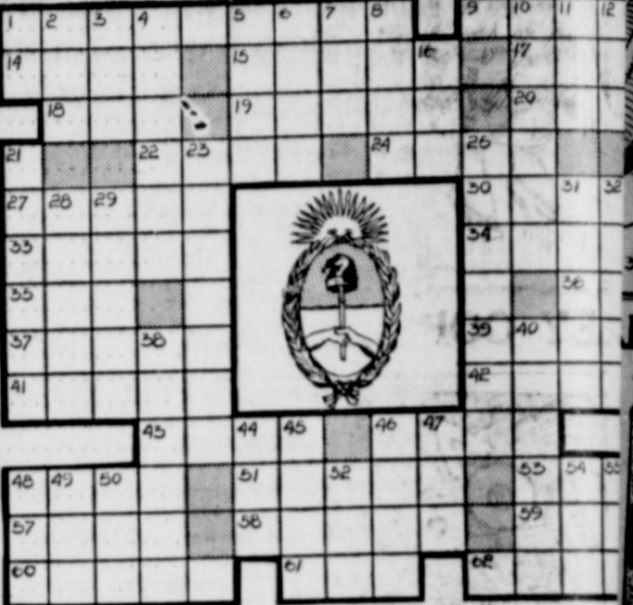

ROME—Students are being selected for the Royal Academy for Dramatic Art, sponsored by the ministries of Press and Propaganda and Public Education to develop a young school of stage and screen actors.

The new academy replaces by royal decree the Royal Recitation School as the "Eleonora Duse School."

In addition to the new academy touring stock companies will be financed by the government to give actors experience and keep unemployment in theatrical ranks to a minimum.

New Cinema City Started The academy and stock companies also will be utilized to develop motion picture stars whose services in large numbers will be required when the new cinema city, said to be the largest in Europe, is completed here next year.

Maestro Silvio D'Amico has been appointed director of the academy. He has selected a staff of instructors and coaches from among the best Italian artists. Special professors will also give their services for short terms.

Subjects to be offered include recitation, dancing, gymnastics, history of the theatre, fencing, transformation exercises, film direction, photography, scenario writing, styles and history of fashion.

Other subjects are to be added. A little theater is to be organized in connection with the academy. Periodic public performances will be offered, in which students will play the leading parts, students cast in secondary performances warrant. Categories of graduation which students to enroll in the stock companies or engage in motion picture work will be given. A few specially selected students will be awarded travel scholarships, especially those gaged in motion picture work.
