





AUSTIN, Mar. 5. - Clothing plants employed the largest number of women engaged in industry in Texas, a survey showed.

The survey was made by the woman's bureau of the U.S. Department of labor and covers 43 cities and towns and 369 establishments that were visited in 1932.

Facts developed were: More Mexicans live in Texas than any other state. Two of every 11 wo men included in the study were Mexican. One in each 11 was a ne gro. Women's wages were found to be very low.

Slow Process of Law is **Costly Business**

One of the handiest ways to kid yourself right now would be to suppose that the constitutionality of the vast TVA program has been settled just because the U. S. Supreme Court at last has spoken.

When you stop to review this decision and what went before it, you discover that a good many things still are up in the air; and you also get a look at one of the most cumbersome and inefficient devices of government which. any great nation has ever put up with.

The TVA scheme was put through back in 1933. Under congressional authority, some almost incomprehensibly far-reaching plans were drawn up. Great dams were started; whole towns were taken off the map; new towns were laid out; hundreds of people were moved from homes which their ancestors had occupied for scores of years.

Altogether, the project was one of the most ambitious, in sheer point of size ever undertaken by any government.

Things had hardly begun to move before protests were heard. Men who had devoted their lives to a study of the law asserted that the whole business was unconstitutional, that the federal government was spending millions on a job which it had no right even to touch.

Lawsuits began fluttering through the air like falling leaves in October. One after another, they got into the courts; and in the course of time, the judicial machinery ground one of them all the way up to Washington.

So at last, nearly three years after the great project was started the supreme court handed down its decision. Am

Let the constitutionality of a measure be determined before, not after, the millions are spent.

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


