

Cold Weather Blamed For

Gas Bill Increases Here

"According to weather statistics, every day in the 30-day period through January 20 this year, has required heat for comfort because the daily average temperature has been 65 degrees or less," Westfall said.

"During the period there were 15 days when the minimum temperature fell below freezing and on only one day did the average warm up to 64 degrees." For the same period in 1953, he

pointed out, there were two days when the average went above 65 and only 10 days, as against 15




