Exhibits arranged by Will Tucker, executive secretary of the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission, pointed out sources that have helped destroy for the sportsmen areas once teeming with animals, wild fowl and fish.

APPEALS COURT REMANDS SUIT FOR INSURANCE

Case of Stephen S. Brawner against American National Insurance company, rendered in 91st district court for Brawner, was reversed and remanded for retrial by Eleventh Court of Civil Appeals at Eastland Friday. Creation of mosquito districts.

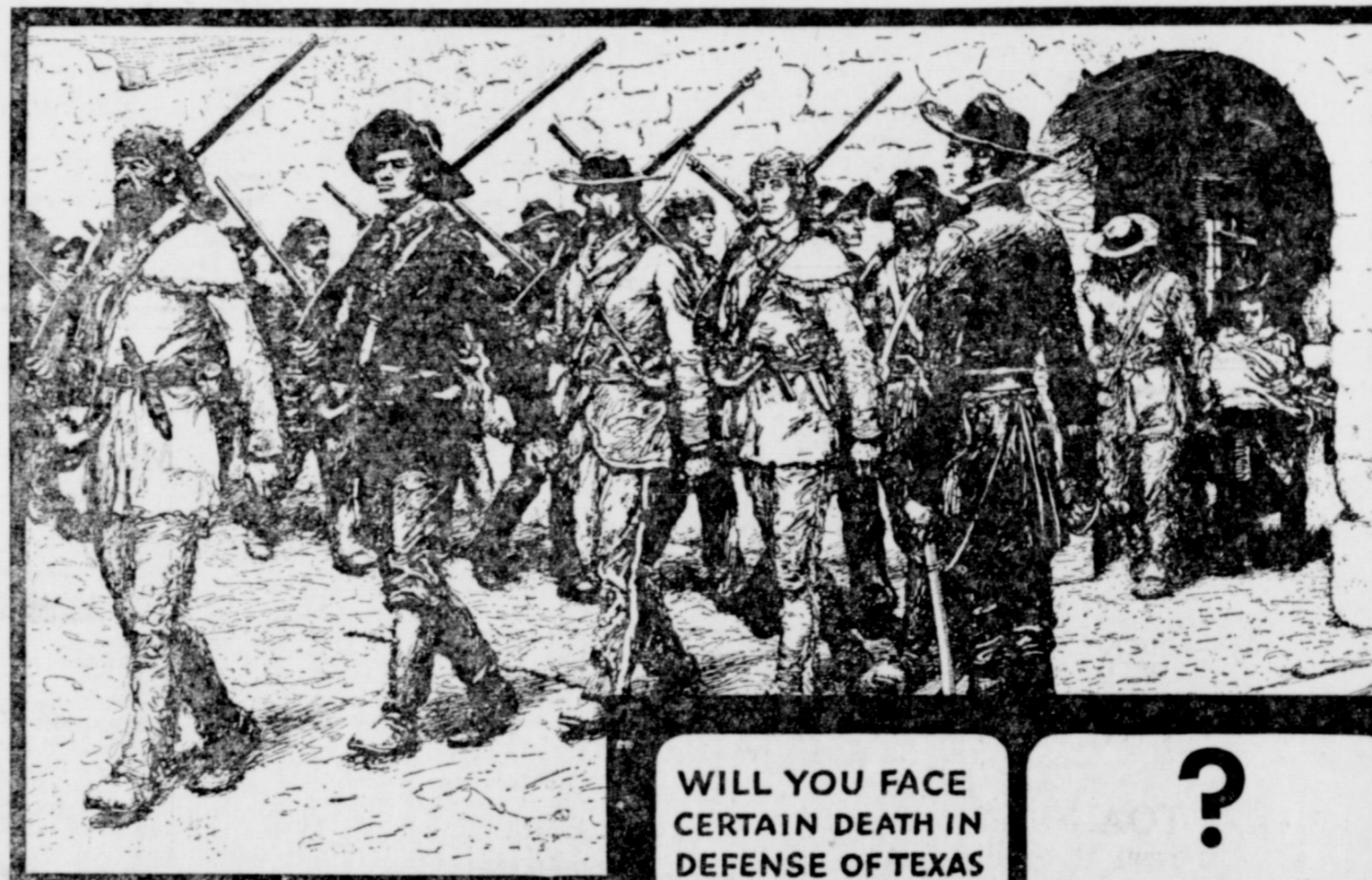
A Centennial health program in Texas cities.

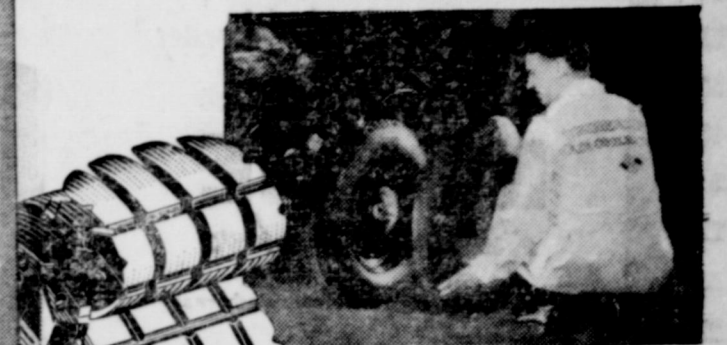

Enrich Civil War Lore

BRIDGEVILLE, Cal.—A packet of letters, revealing a Civil War battle, and throwing new light on the battle of Mission Ridge, come into the possession of the Bancroft Library of the University of California.

The letters will be used as a new historical source for various phases of the Civil War.

An interesting aspect of the letters is the fact that they were written by a Union colonel, Richard L. Lytel, who had been a pro-Confederate. Much of the letters as well as historic value is believed to have come from Realf's association with the Byron family.

Realf, colonel of the 88th Illinois Infantry and aid-de-camp to General Lytel, was one of a group of officers who entered correspondence with a group of young women at Washington, D. C., as a means of keeping their morale at the front through the war years.

Realf's particular "marraine" was a young woman, who now is Sophie Leonard, an aged resident of Oakland, Cal. It was only one of the historical value of letters that she turned them over to the library.

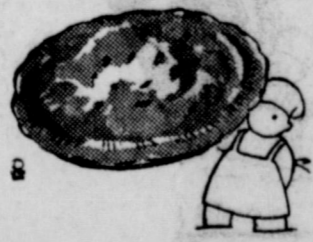

Let Us Defend Today Rights Won in 1776

An enormous amount of water has run over the dam since the day when Washington and Jefferson were risking the scaffold for the sake of liberty; and Democracy, trusting lady that she is, seems to have gotten her feet wet 'way up to the ears, or thereabouts.

To prove that statement, you need only reflect that one of the best ways to get yourself a reputation as a dangerous citizen these days is to go about repeating the very phrases which our founding fathers used in the great struggle for independence.

This discovery has been made over and over, of late, by our school teachers and university professors. It is not surprising, therefore that the most stirring call to arms for the defense of old-fashioned ideas about liberty and freedom should come from the recent meeting of the National Educational Association at St. Louis.

The author of this call to arms was Dr. Charles A. Beard, famous historian, and his words are worth repeating here:

"Let us rededicate ourselves to the American tradition of liberty and to the faith that error need not be feared where reason is free to combat it.

"Let us assert anew against brute force the values of independent scientific inquiry, of the unhampered search for truth, of the fair hearing and the fair play, and uphold them by fearless and united effort.

"Not for the gratification of pride, nor with any gesture of false superiority. Not out of any academic pique. But because in this spirit and by this procedure alone can American democracy cope with its gravest problems under the force of law, thus maintaining amid the wreck and ruin of parliamentary institutions, east and west, the example of a nation that has not lost its head or its heart."

When you remember how our country was born and the ideals to which it was dedicated, you can see that no good American can pledge himself to less than that. For that plea simply embodies the fundamentals of Americanism. And in a period when there is so much attempted repression, so many appeals to ignorance and prejudice, we can not afford to forget them.

Our forefathers thought enough of those fundamentals to fight and die for them. They believed that when a people has lost the right to speak freely, to debate without hindrance, to print what seems good to individual consciences, and to assemble openly whenever the spirit moves it, it has lost everything worth having.

Experiment Farm Location Sought In Four Countries

BROWNWOOD, March 27.—A resolution asking the board of directors of A. & M. College to locate an agricultural experiment station for the Cross Timbers sandy land area, authorized by the legislature last May, in either Brown, Callahan, Comanche or Eastland counties at some point where these four counties join and on either Highway 23, 36 or 206 was passed at a meeting of representatives of Brown, Comanche and Eastland counties held at Comanche recently.

The resolution is as follows: "Whereas, the legislature of the State of Texas on May 9, 1925, enacted Senate Bill No. 402, authorizing the Board of Directors of Agricultural and Mechanical College to establish, and maintain a horticultural and agricultural experimental station at some point within the limits of Brown, Callahan, Comanche, Eastland, Erath or any county in the West Cross Timber section of Texas; and

Whereas, the area most in need of such an experiment station is chiefly within the limits of Brown, Callahan, Comanche and Eastland counties; and

"Whereas, it was clearly the intent that this station should be established for the sole purpose of benefit to the farmers of the West Cross Timber sandy land area, where depletion of soils has been most pronounced and most destructive of values, and where it is absolutely essential that continuous and intelligent experimental farm and horticultural work be definitely established, if that area shall be restored to its once commanding agricultural prosperity; and

"Whereas, representative citizens of Brown, Comanche and Eastland counties assembled in mass meeting at Comanche, Texas, Tuesday, March 24, 1936, after a full and free discussion of every condition regarding the establishment of this station, have agreed to lend full co-operation to the immediate selection of a site for said station;

"Therefore: Be it resolved that it is the sense of the citizens of the counties represented in this meeting that, because of its accessibility, we recommend to and urge upon the Board of Directors of Agricultural and Mechanical College that said experimental farm should be located either in Brown, Callahan, Comanche or Eastland counties at some point near where the four counties above mentioned join and on, or as near as practicable, to either State Highways 23, 36 or 206 for the reason that if located in said section the ex-

perimental station will be in the center of the area where its work is most needed and will be more readily accessible to all that area; and

"Be it further resolved that the secretary of this meeting be directed to send a copy of these resolutions to each member of the Board of Directors of Agricultural and Mechanical College and to Dr. A. B. Conner, Director of Experimental Station."

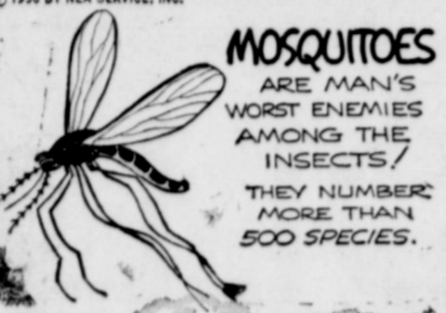

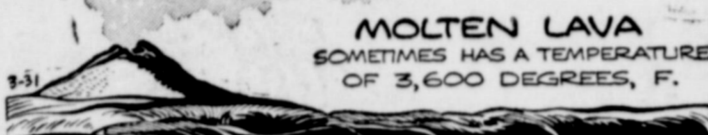

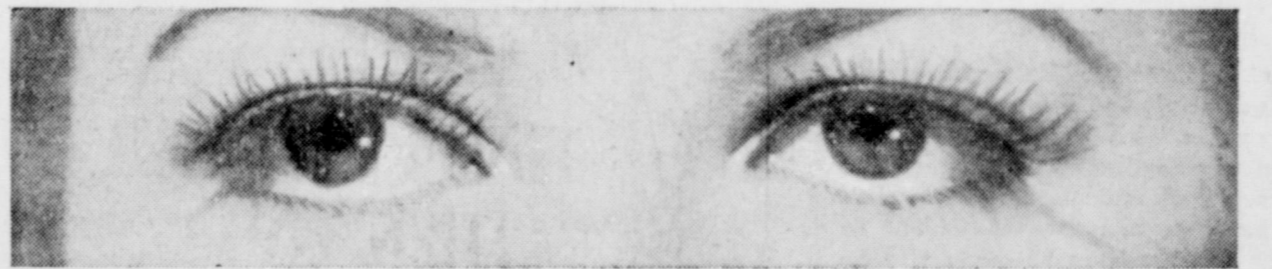

Under the direction of Mrs. A. H. Johnson, chairman of the Thursday club committee, plans are being made to make this one of the outstanding nuptial events of the season.

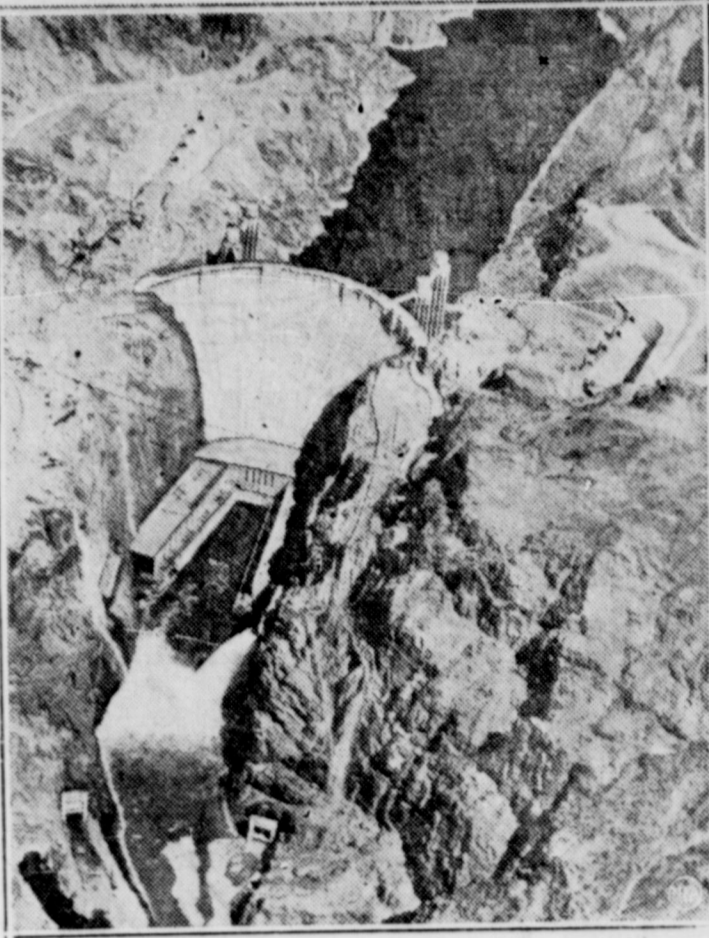
