MASS MURDER IS BELIEVED TO BE SOLVED

ATHENS, Texas, March 11.—Solution of one of the most gruesome mass killings in Texas crime history was believed near today after Sheriff Jesse Sweeten announced he had obtained a signed statement from George Patton, farmer, living north of Athens.

Patton's statement explained his version of the disappearance in November, 1932, of J. W. McGehee, his wife and two children, who lived with Patton.

In the statement Patton claimed McGehee killed his wife and children, then attacked Patton, who killed McGehee in self-defense.

Patton disrobed the bodies, according to the statement, placed them in boiling vats used for cooking meat. Later he took the remains and burned them in a log fire in an attempt to destroy all evidence.

Patton first was questioned in 1932, shortly after neighbors noticed the McGehees were not at the Patton home. The farmer was taken to Dallas, questioned eight days and released when authorities were unable to shake his story.

Your Income Tax

CHECKING DELINQUENTS The bureau of internal revenue has at its command many sources for checking up delinquent taxpayers. One of these is the "information at source" provision of the revenue act, under which persons, "in whatever capacity acting," are required to report to the commissioner of internal revenue at Washington, D. C., payments to another in any calendar year of \$1,000 or more if the recipient of such payment is single. If the recipient is married, reports need not be made unless the payments aggregate \$2,500 or more. If the marital status of the payee is unknown to the payor, the payee is considered a single person for the purpose of filing an information return. Fixed and determinable income includes wages, salaries, royalties, premiums, rent, interest, etc. A separate return of information for each employee is required of employers. The requirements are not limited to periodical payments, but a single payment must be reported. Corporations are required to make a separate report of dividends or distributions for each individual, fiduciary, or partnership holder who was paid \$300 or more during the calendar year. All persons or organizations acting at any time during the year 1935 as broker or other agent in stock, bond, or commodity transaction (including banks which handle clearing orders for depositors or custodian accounts) are required to file returns of information on form 1100 with respect to all customers, depositors, or accounts for whom or which business was transacted during the year, and must show the name and address of other
