





War Insurance Only Half Way to Peace

If a man owned a factory and spent huge sums to pay for fire insurance, but refused to lay out a dime to remedy the defective wiring, faulty flues, and other defects which made fires probable, it would not be long before his friends and relatives gathered about to have his head examined.

There never has been a factory owner like that and there never will be. But mankind as a whole seems to be bent on making a very similar record in regard to the danger of war.

A current bulletin from the League of Nations association in New York illustrates the point.

The League of Nations budget for 1936 has just been revealed. During this year the league will spend slightly more than 9,237,000, all told. This is about equal to four days' expenditure of the United States' 1936 armament budget.
