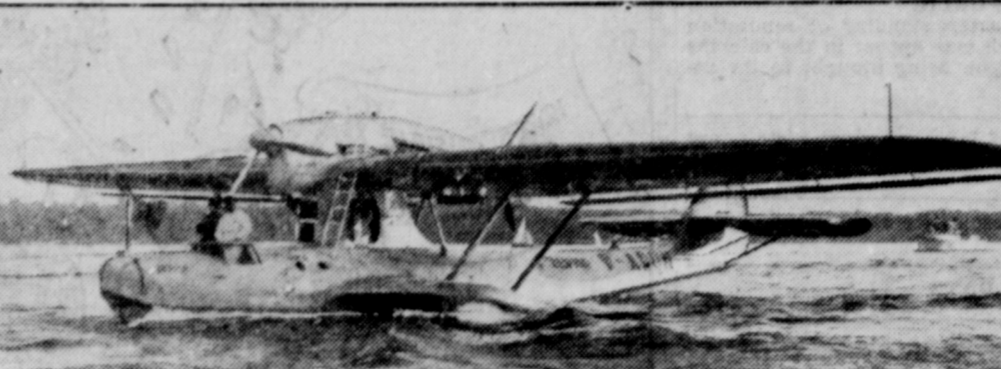

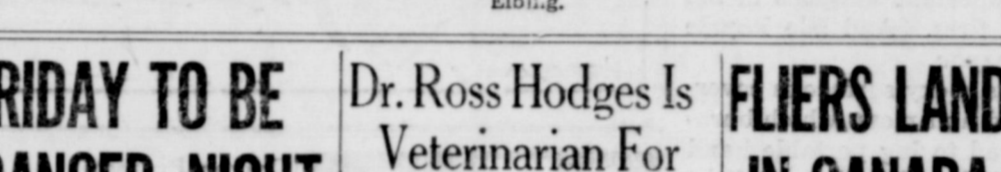
Senator to Urge Advertising Texas

CCC Fire Fighters Cited For Bravery

If the government ever takes to awarding decorations for heroic service in peace time, as it does for bravery in war, some weary lads in CCC outfits must be entitled to stand in line and get pretty, bronze medals pinned on their chests.

The CCC boys work in the forests. Forests frequently catch fire, especially in times of drouth. When they do, the CCC goes into action; and, in case you didn't know it, fighting a forest fire can be one of the hardest, toughest, and generally meanest jobs ever shouldered by perspiring men.

A three-star example is furnished by the recent fires on Isle Royale, in Lake Superior.

Isle Royale is far out in the lake and is preserved as a primeval wilderness. It has no roads at all and its soil is rocky and rough. This makes impossible the use of plows and tractors—two of the most important weapons in the armory of men who fight forest fires. And Isle Royale lacks sand, another important weapon.

Over dozens of square miles its rocky surface is covered by a shallow layer of leaf mold and moss, which burned like tinder. The fire crews had to lug portable hand pumps and to pump water over mile-long hose lines to fight this blaze. With pick and shovel they hacked out 100 miles of fire-checking trenches through hard rock and clay. And all the while they contended with a wind that could whirl blazing bits of bark a mile or more through the air, to set new blazes behind them.

Ben East, correspondent for several Michigan newspapers, visited the Isle Royale front during the worst of the fire and told how the CCC boys worked.

They got up at 3:30 a. m., ate breakfast, and started on a three to five-mile hike to the scene of action. They carried their noonday meal with them, on their backs; they also carried shovels, axes, picks, hand pumps, cans of gasoline, and other impedimenta.

By 6 in the morning they were at the fire. They stayed there until 6 p. m., performing the most back-breaking kind of work imaginable, under the most difficult conditions; then they would be relieved by a night crew, would trudge the long miles back to camp, eat supper, and tumble exhausted into bed—to be routed out at 3:30 the next morning for more of the same.

This, says Mr. East, went on for 19 unbroken days, without a rest or let-up.

You have there a record of bravery and dogged endurance which compares very favorably with the kind of stunts that win soldiers medals in wartime.

The CCC boys met the hardest test that could have been given them, and passed it with flying colors. Incidentally, they saved thousands of acres of magnificent virgin forest for the country's national park system.

If the government has any spare medals, there must be some likely candidates for them among those Isle Royale forest fire fighters.

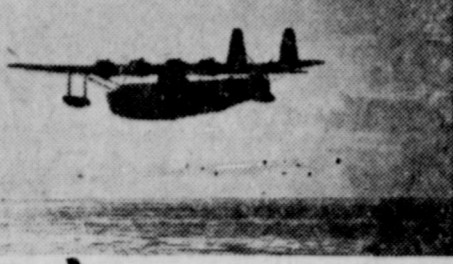

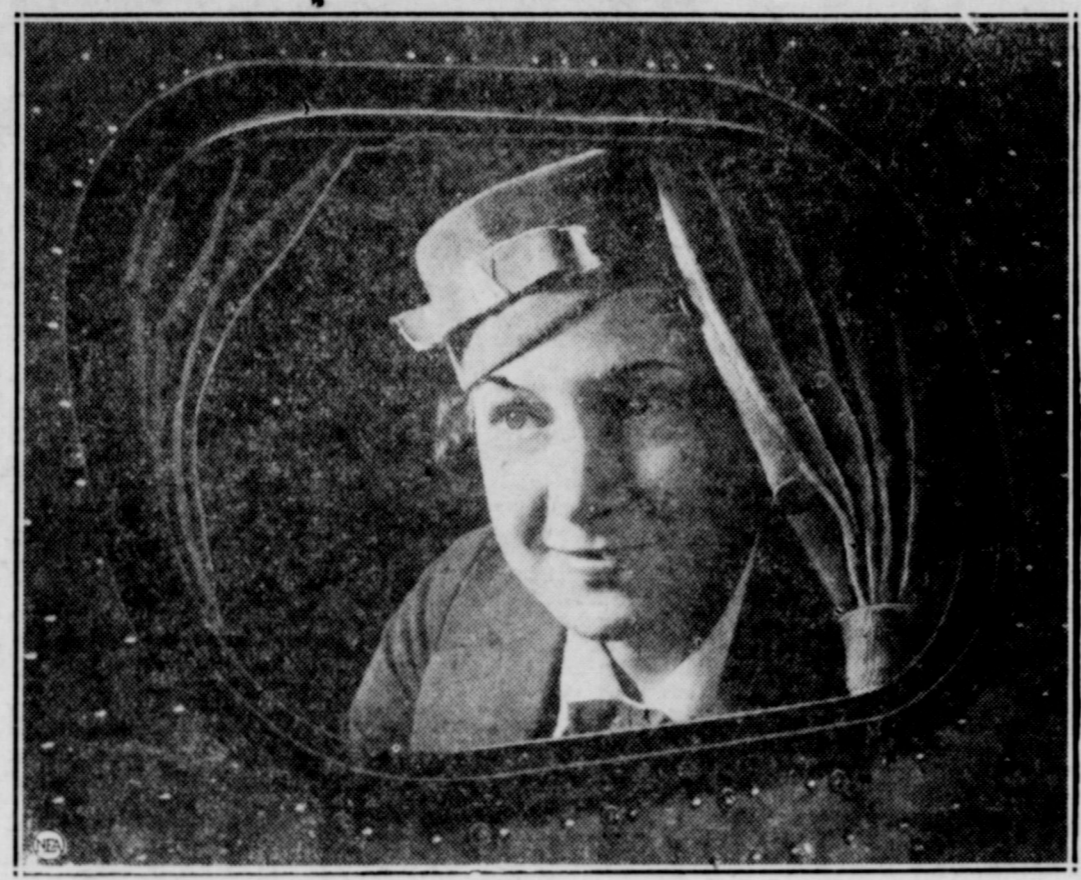

Mrs. Pentecost was a student two years at Ranger Junior College and taught in the primary department of the public schools of Ranger for four years.

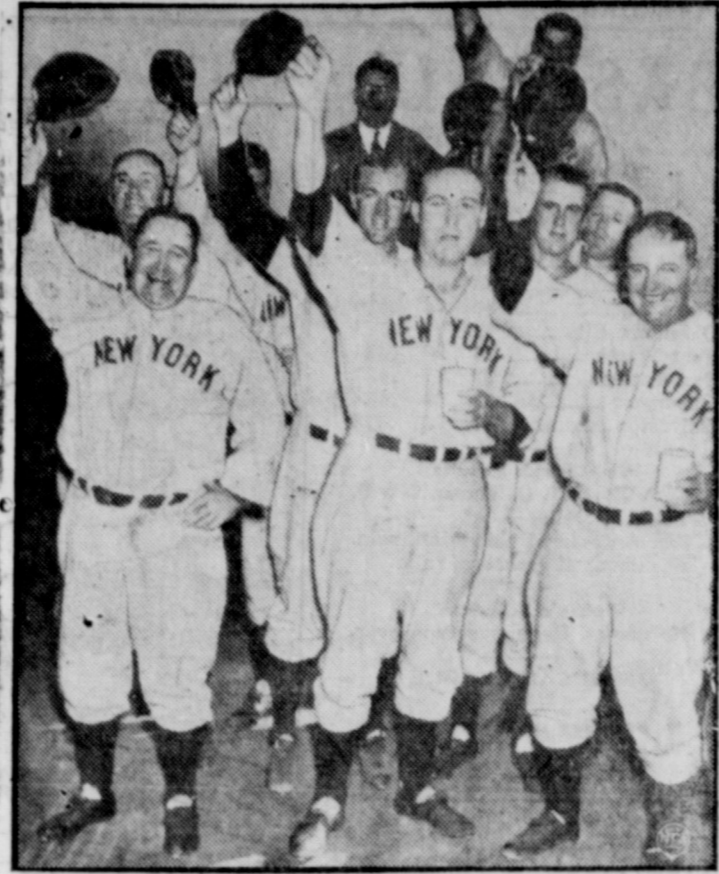
She studied primary work at the Texas Tech at Lubbock, and is well equipped thru her active experience to conduct the kindergarten as outlined.

Club In London Is Organized By Boy Explorers

LONDON.—More than 100 boy pioneers, who have braved perils and privations in wild, distant lands, have formed a club here to perpetuate memories and develop life-long friendships.

They are members of the Public Schools Exploring Society which, in the last three years, has sent expeditions into Lapland, Finland, and unsurveyed regions of Newfoundland. In their club, in Overseas House, London, will be found scientists and explorers of the future.

The inspiration has come from Surgeon-Commander G. Murray Levick, who accompanied the late Captain Scott's Antarctic expedition and founded the exploring society. This summer the commander leads 120 boys, including six boys from working-class homes, on the society's fourth adventure to the Arctic areas of Lapland.

"At least another hundred members will be added to the club when we return," he said. "Many travel miles to meet each other. The club will be an ideal place to perpetuate these bonds."

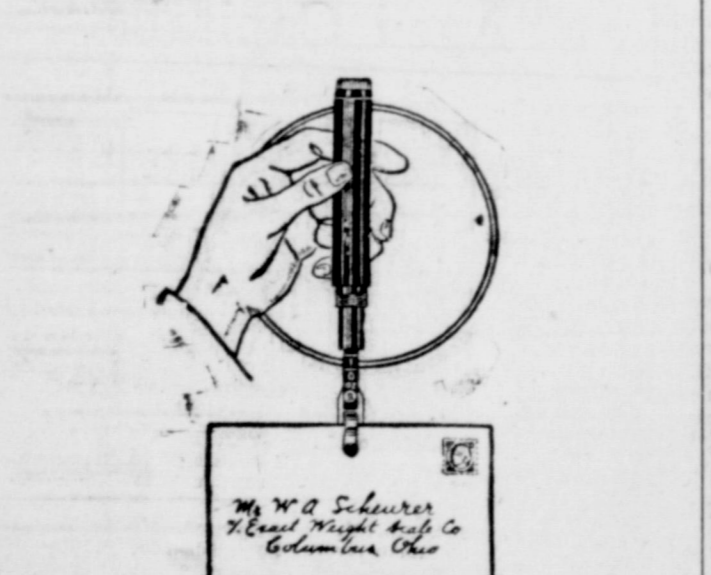
