### A Hopeful Outlook for the Fall Trade

So many business predictions go wrong that everyone hates to make them any more. Yet the desire to plan for the future and to try to estimate that future is so strong that it always overcomes the reluctance born of past dis-

The fact that almost every surveyor of the business scene today looks ahead to higher business levels in the fall tempts even the pessimistic to be hopeful. Here are some of the indications on which the observers agree pretty unanimously

The income of farmers, despite the drop in cotton prices, is expected to approach 1929 levels, and in purchasing power it may even exceed 1929, because farmers will be able to get more for their money than they could in those days. 

# COLLEGE HOLDS HIGH RATING

By W. T. Walton, President the state has received higher ranking than Ranger Junior College. There are many that are larger and offer a wider selection of courses, but when the State De-partment of Equcation places the institution on the approved list, this means that the school is ranked with the best, and is fully affiliated with all the senior colleges of the state.

Recently two of the leaders of the Texas Association of Colleges, both of whom are on the faculties of strong senior institutions, told a superintendent of schools of another West Texas city that they never had to worry about the standards of Ranger Junior College for the work done here stands

Every department is headed by an instructor with university training, holding the master's degree, and the instruction of these teachers is superior to that offered by most of the assistants in the larger institutions.

The work of the local college is accepted at face value by all the senior colleges and universities. Every year we have graduates who enter these senior institutions and get credit for every hour they have done here. The registrar of the University of Texas has recently offered to accept addi tional work done in Ranger Junior College of two of our graduates over and above the 60 normal hours allowed for the graduate.

These three types of discounting cover all the cases of transfer trouble that have been brought to the attention of the faculty and administration of the local junior college.

IF you are wondering why your corn on the cob hasn't been up to snuff, try these methods of pre-paring it. Experts insist that there are just two ways to boil

### First Method:

Plunge corn into boiling water The water will stop boiling. Bring it back to boil, then reduce heat so that water merely simmers. Leave corn in simmering water for from 10 to 15 minutes. Local corn will require only 10 min-utes; corn shipped needs 15 min-

### Second Method:

Boil corn in husks. Remove all silk from husks and outer leaves. Still wrapped in its own green leaves, plunge corn into boiling water. Cook as above, only give local corn 15 minutes and distant corn 20 minutes. Add a little sugar to water if extra sweetness is wanted.

Sweet corn combines amiably with green peppers. Try this for proof. Serve it with broiled Green Peppers and Fresh Corn

(4 to 6 servings)

One tablespoon butter, 1 green pepper sliced thin, 2 cups fresh corn, cooked and sliced from cob. 1-2 cup heavy cream, salt and pepper, and dash of paprika. pepper, and dash of paprika.



VIENNA-When an Austrian peasant wants to know whether he can safely undertake some field work, requiring sunshine, in the next days, he descends into his cellar and puts his ear to the wine barrels To him, wine is not a luxury

It is on his daily bill of fare, the laborers also receive their ration of wine with their dinner. But wine is not only food and drink, and occasionally a banisher

of care to him, but also a barometer which he considers infall-It is known that when the wine

tands in blossom in the yards, the wine in the barrels become restless in its cask and begins to sing. This phenomenon has not yet been explained. Nor does one know why, long before man and animal have the faintest presentiment of the coming event, the wine in Sicilian cellars becomes riotous and announces, thereby, the impending volcanic eruption.

A change in the weather in Austria invariably is preceded by bubbles rising in the wine barrels. They produce a faint noise which one can perceive by putting an ear to the wood.

To the Austrian peasant, the wine is a far more reliable announcer of weather changes than the finest barometer.

This peculiar quality of wine is being scientifically investigated. Some scientists believe it has to do with atmospheric electricity, especially with short waves, while chemical influences.
