New Oilfield Law Becomes Effective

A new oil equipment act, passed
during the recent session of the
state legislature, has become ef
fective, according to second-hand
pipe dealers and others.
The act makes all dealers in
second-hand pipe line and oil field
equipment require a bill of sale
from the seller when they pur
chase any equipment with a rea
sonable market value over \$25.
Passage of the act, it is stated,
was because of a wave of oilfield
equipment thefts in recent months.

ERATH TEST CLOSE TO DESDEMONA HAS OIL IN HOLE UP TO 2,000 FEET

Attention of Eastland county
oil men focused this week-end
to the Hickey et al No. 1 W. M. Mar
tin, two miles southeast of Desde
mona (but in Erath county, in
which oil had risen 2,000 feet in
the hole as operators were cement
ing 6 5-8 inch casing to 2,830
feet on top of the sand.
Arnold Kirk of Eastland, owner
of one-fourth interest in the well
expects it to be drilled in Tuesday.
Observers believe the well is an
extension of the old Desdemona
pay or may open up a new pool.
Only a few inches of the sand,
it was reported, had been pene
trated. Location is 530 feet from
the north line, 165 feet from the
west line of subdivision 5 in the
D. J. Millard survey.

One Amendment Opposed Bitterly

AUSTIN, August 21.—One of

early today.

guns blazing. The river blazed
with search lights.

ed a bombing on the Hongkew
section of the city.

HIGHWAY 89 PAVING BEING DONE RAPIDLY

C. D. Woods, chairman of the
highway committee of the Rango
Chamber of Commerce, and J. E.
Meroney, secretary, made an in
spection trip along highway 89 on
Friday, and Saturday reported
that rapid progress is being made
on paving the highway.
"It has been stated a number of
times," Woods said Saturday,
"that work is being held up on the
highway. It is rumored that other
towns are delaying the work as
much as possible, and that the
highway work has been shut down
completely. We found, on our in
spection tour, that these rumors
are unfounded.
The two found that 16 miles of
the highway have been paved, and
that crews are now working on an
other five-mile stretch. The party
was allowed to travel over several
miles of the completed highway,
and reported that it was the best
pavement they had seen being laid
in some time.
According to the contractors,
the work is progressing at a rate
of about one mile per week. Some
delays were encountered for a
time because the highway engi
neers had part of the grading work
done over in order to make the
highway as nearly perfect as pos
sible, it was stated.
As soon as the present stretch
of five miles of paving is com
pleted work will start on the last
23-mile stretch. This last section
is expected to be started within a
week or ten days. Estimates were
that with time allowed out for the
normal rainfall, that the entire
highway paving project would be
completed and ready for use the
latter part of March.
The paving being put down is a
heavy rock base with a concrete
topping."

A Hopeful Outlook for the Fall Trade

So many business predictions go wrong that everyone hates to make them any more. Yet the desire to plan for the future and to try to estimate that future is so strong that it always overcomes the reluctance born of past disappointments.

The fact that almost every surveyor of the business scene today looks ahead to higher business levels in the fall tempts even the pessimistic to be hopeful.

The income of farmers, despite the drop in cotton prices, is expected to approach 1929 levels, and in purchasing power it may even exceed 1929, because farmers will be able to get more for their money than they could in those days.

Steel operations continue to hold up at high levels at a season when they usually decline. Despite lower purchases by the auto industry, other buying holds it up in good style.

Sales of six leading mail order houses will come close to a billion dollars this year, not only an increase of 21 per cent over last year, but far greater than those of 1929.

The outlook for better farm purchasing power as a stimulus to increased fall business is aided by factors like this: Farm mortgage debt is far lower than during the 1929 era, and pays a far lower rate of interest.

Thus, in the fall season when business activity tends to slump off somewhat, there is every reason to expect this year that business will hold up splendidly or even gain somewhat.

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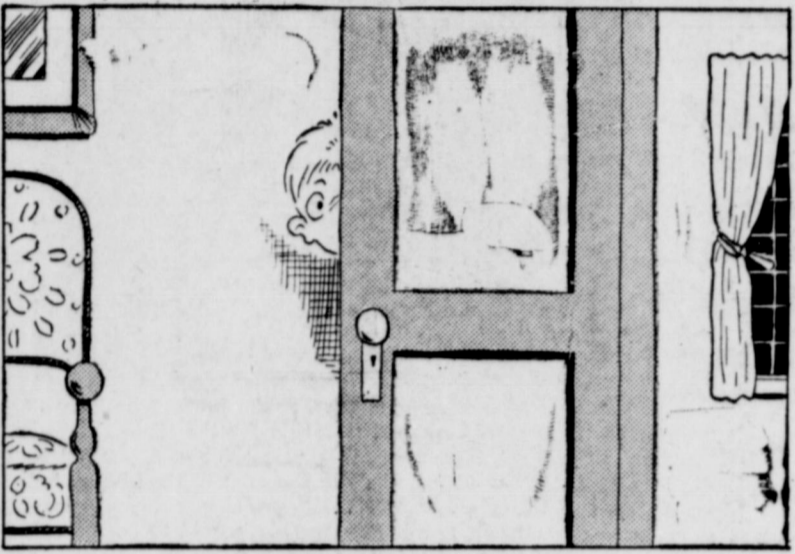

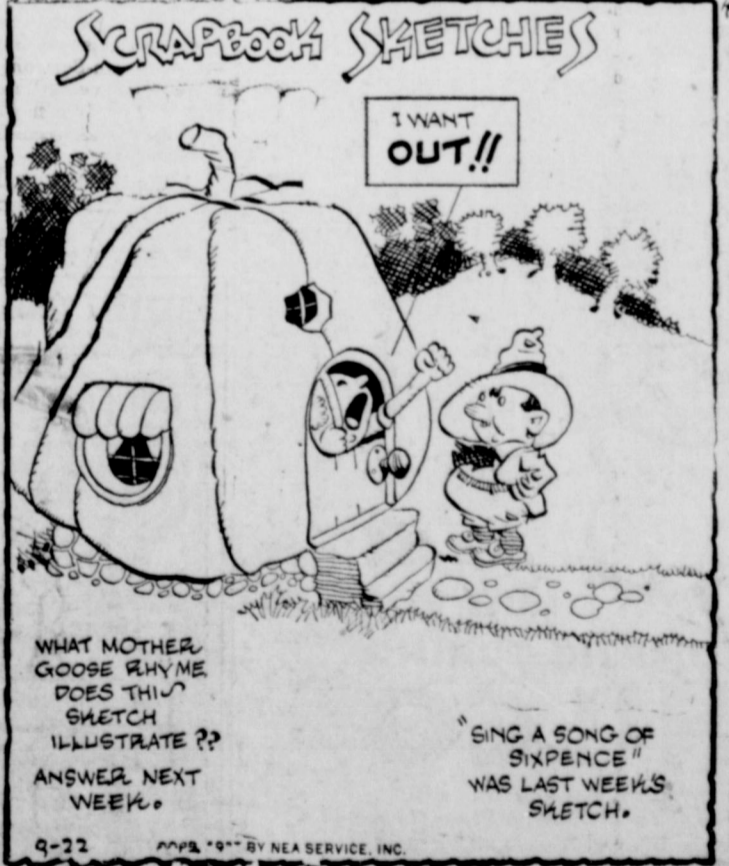
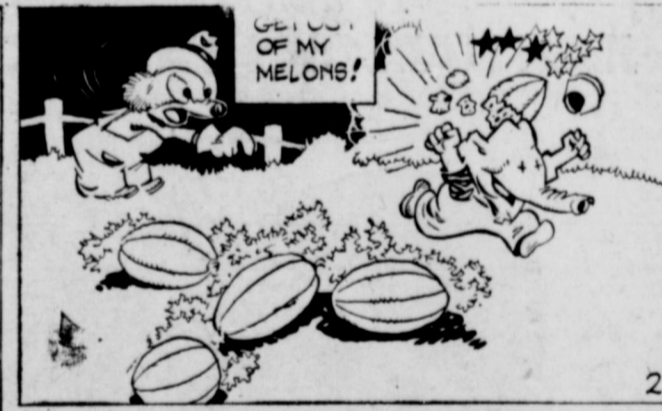

NYA Announcement Is Expected Soon

AUSTIN.—An announcement concerning continuation of the NYA student aid program during the 1937-38 school year is expected within a few days, J. C. Kellam, Texas Director of the National Youth Administration, said today.

Last year the school aid program provided part-time employment for more than 14,000 students in 2,135 Texas secondary schools. The college aid program provided employment for more than 8,000 students in 87 Texas colleges and universities. Mr. Kellam said that minor changes in the rules and regulations governing the program and a slight reduction in the quota of jobs allotted to each school are expected.

Mr. Kellam said that when the announcement is made students who wish to apply for NYA student aid jobs should communicate with the principal or superintendent of the school where they attend; under the new regulations it was his responsibility to select the students employed.

AUSTIN.—Nearly 50 per cent of the drivers involved in fatal accidents have no one to blame but themselves! Figures compiled by the Department of Public Safety for the month of June show 142 fatal accidents resulting in 159 deaths.

Kellam, Texas director of the National Youth Administration, announced today that 165 work projects designed to provide part-time employment for 7,000 needy Texas youths had been approved for operation during the six months period ending December 31, 1937. Other projects may be added to the program as they are developed, he said.

The youths will be paid at prevailing hourly wage rates and will work about one-third time. During their spare time they will be encouraged to attend job training classes. The youths will also be given instruction by their foremen on the job.
